


Alva INC Oversight Committee reports on the MD80 motorcoach resort planned for Rte 80


Alva INC met on Tuesday January 10th and focused on the largest project in years to be planned in the area of the Alva Plan (Lee County development plan for the

Alva Area – North and south of the river; Old Olga to the Hendry County line).

Roxanne Gause reported that there are 3 parcels, totaling 192 acres, owned by Stan Whitcomb on the south side of Rte 80 (Palm Beach Boulevard) From Bateman Road (starting at the Hickey Creek Mitigation Park east boundary and continuing east). One is zoned Urban, the other two rural. Mr. Whitcomb would like to get the rural property rezoned to Sub Outlying Suburban.







(more than 6 months per year--high end) and the rest for transient RVs, (less than 6 months per ye

If the county does not give him the zoning changes, he could build only 619 RV units. He is also requesting a 30,000 sq. ft. Commercial Strip along Rte 80. If the current request is approved, he would only build 756 units instead of 783. When asked about potable water and sewer issues, Lee County has said they have capacity, at Mr. Whitcomb's expense, to provide public sewer and water that might allow other rte 80 businesses or residences to hookup at

their expense, OR might demand those owners connect and close their wells and septic tanks.

Ms. Gause said that Alva Inc's approved Lee County Community Plan would have the retail built only in the 'village' area along Rte 80, near the Alva drawbridge. She shared that the 783 unit plan's estimated population is 2,020, that would increase Alva's population by 67% (Alva's population according to the 2020 US Census is 3,013).

Roxanne also mentioned that in the list of natural fauna species affected by this project the endangered Florida Panther, of which we have had numerous sightings and several road deaths, in recent years was left off the projects list.

Holly Schwartz, reporting for the committee, shared that even at this early stage of the approval process, Lee County's staff have issued two "insufficiency letters" in the project plan that Mr. Whitcomb will have to address.

Denise Eberle also reported that her research tells her that the property with the approved residential zoning was approved and never acted on by the owner 13 years ago, and is currently re-applied for. She also told those gathered that the resort, while originally promoted as an exclusive high end coach resort only, will actually allow all kinds of RVs in other sections of the plan.

Alexis Crespo of Waldrop Engineering, hired by Mr. Whitcomb for the project, shared that there will be no deed restricted sites in the resort, and that there would be a Homeowners Association. She also shared that the first public hearings on the plan will take place this summer and that she and Stan had come to Alva INC this early to get opinions and ideas for the project so they could work them in, where possible, to their planning. Alexis expects the final hearing, with shovels in the ground, by early 2024.

Ms. Crespo also shared that she will present the plan for the commercial part of the property at the February 14 Alva Inc meeting.

Questions from the floor of approximately 40 Alva residents included some by Richard Durling who lives west of Alva off North River Road and owner of Marvin Homes Development. Mr. Durling believes that Lee County will continue to permit new development and highway expansion in our northeast

corner of Lee County. Just this week a judge allowed a 10,000-home development that was heavily opposed to begin construction in the southeast section of the county.

Richard suggested we work as much with the developers as we can to plan site plantings and buffers, even architectural plans, if possible. However, he told the room that simply avoiding growth will be a very difficult task.

On that note Alexis Crespo said she would get the Land Development Code that North Olga is working with developers on to Alva INC so that they may possibly ask the county to duplicate the rules for Alva.



The recent article in the Fort Myers News Press shown to the right was mentioned. A new motorcoach resort is being completed now just 5 or so miles east of the Alva drawbridge over the Hendry County line on the south side of Rte 80. Can another resort here be a viable business?

What we know now is that over 5,000 homes are currently being proposed or have been approved for construction along all of these bridge feeder roads, with a large amount of additional retail space also being proposed. Beyond traffic access, public water and sewer must also be provided. None of the new homes can have wells or septic systems.

North Olga Residents Group meets to learn about Expansion of North River Road Development



Alexis Crespo led the discussion of changes to the Neal Development Corporation changes to their planned North River Road (Rte 78) development near the unincorporated village of North Olga, about 6 miles west of Alva.

Since originally planned the site has grown tom 900 acres with 1000 to 1100 mostly single family homes and some villas (duplex, side by side homes at about 1200 SF). Larger homes are hoped to sell between \$400k and \$1m.

With purchase of additional land, the project is currently called the Cary/Duke/Povia development. After ongoing

meetings like this one here and with the Alva INC residents' group Neal will seek zoning changes to begin the construction process which they now hope to start by the beginning on 2024.

Ms. Crespo shared that the major changes the new land acquisition creates beyond room for additional homes includes:

-Three access roads which do not create additional traffic concerns (pending FDOT and Lee County Road planning). No access road to Duke Highway along the river, but a hope that hydrants on Duke Highway could be installed from this projects water source.



- -Two instead of one amenity center for residents of the gated, non-age restricted, community.
- -Attractive naturally planted flood berms wherever needed around the perimeter.



-50 acres of the site will be original wetland preservation and 300 acres of former pasture will be planted preserve with only indigenous trees and shrubs, not to be developed in the future.

Attending residents repeated their concerns about traffic from this development when completed with about 3000 new residents. Also mentioned was the concern since Hurricane Ian for flooding caused not just by the river rise but also over flow from the development onto Duke Highway homes.

In Ian water was known to exit downhill from Babcock Farm communities in Charlotte County to add to the Caloosahatchee rise.

Also shared at the North Olga Meeting:

OWL CREEK DEVELOPMENT CANCELLED




-Alexis Crespo stated that the OWL CREEK development by DR Horton just west of the Cary/Duke/Povia site has been CANCELLED by DR Horton and that land, while now re-zoned is again for sale by the original owner. No reason for the cancellation was given.

-John, a Babcock Ranch representative, shared that 900 home sales were closed by the community developers in 2022 and they expect a rise above that to occur in 2023.

-John also strongly invites all interested residents to attend the January 31 Florida Department of Transportation open house showcasing FDOTs plans for Rte 31 from the river drawbridge to Babcock Ranch, as well as acceptance of questions for that and Bayshore Road, North River Road and the bridge itself. Come to the Babcock Ranch Field House 5 to 7pm for the presentation and Q/A.

-Chief Underwood of the Bayshore Fire Department updated all on the ongoing construction plans for the Rte 31 fire station, EMS and helipad south of the Charlotte County line on Rte 31.



Captains for Clean Water named Gulfshore Life's Men of the Year

A pair of Southwest Florida boat captains came together to create the nonprofit Captains for Clean Water and educate people about the environment.

"The vast, vast majority of our supporters are not captains; half of our supporters don't even fish," said Capt. Daniel Andrews. "But we have the business community that typically doesn't want to talk about environmental issues, because they don't want to impact their tourism. They're our biggest supporters now."

"Senate Bill 2508 is a good example of that power, of that movement and the engagement of the people," said Capt. Chris Wittman. (Note, SB2508 was recently vetoed by Governor DeSantis).

With only a few hours' notice, troops rallied from around the state to oppose the bill they feared would undo Everglades restoration...

"I personally canceled thousands of dollars' worth of charters to be here," Wittman said. "I would say in the room behind me, we have over \$40,000 worth of income that was canceled to be here today."

"We had about 50,000 people reach out to their elected officials during that time... that's more captains than we have in the state times five," Andrews said.

How did two men born and raised in Southwest Florida go from fishing guides to stewards of environmental activism, liaisons of the waterways and Gulfshore Life's men of the year? Like many, their adult passions started as childhood interests.

"Both of us, as kids, didn't really care a whole lot about anything else besides being outdoors and fishing, and hunting and hiking, and whatever we could do just not have to be inside," Andrews said.

"Even if our kids don't have any interest in fishing or being outdoors, you at least want them to have the opportunity to make that choice themselves, not watch these places [be] destroyed."

As fishermen and fishing guides, Andrews and Wittman both had front-row seats to the blue-green algae water crisis in 2016.

"We felt the impact of, you know, discharges' poor management and the symptoms that come along with that," Wittman said.

In February of 2016, Andrews, Wittman and four other captains penned a petition to the mayor of Fort Myers, and Captains for Clean Water was born.

"The next morning, we wake up, and there's like 300 people that were like, you know, 'I'm a local guide, add me to the list,'" Wittman said.


"If people understood the science behind it, and the policy solutions to make it happen, then you actually have a chance at fighting the fight and saving the place," Andrews said.

Since then, their goals, reach and impact have only grown.

"I think, to see the rise of people holding water quality as the highest standard of what is important to our community, even times outside of crisis, is the biggest measure of the success of organization," Wittman said.

What do the next six years look like? Continuing the Everglades Restoration Project.

"It's about maintaining that momentum or even growing that momentum, and we want to see Everglades restoration completed, all 68 projects; we want to see our water specs, and at that point, that's when we'll look to what is the next fight."



Ross Chastain enters the season as NASCAR's top free agent for 2024

Ross Chastain has stayed strong through an up-and-down NASCAR career and everything paid off when he signed on to drive the No. 1 car for Trackhouse Racing during the 2022 season and beyond.

Chastain ended the year with two wins, 15 top-5 finishes, 21 top-10 finishes, and a 13.3 average finishing position. While the driver of the No. 1 car came up just short of the championship behind Joey Logano, it was a very successful season.

Trackhouse Racing now goes into the 2023 season with

Chastain and Daniel Suarez looking to improve by one spot. However, there is some work to do if the organization wants to continue the partnership moving forward.

It is never too early to look at who will be in the final year of their contracts. This is especially true as Kevin Harvick has announced he will retire at the conclusion of the 2023 season.

As we look at who will become available, one name sticks out among the rest. According to FOX Sports' Bob Pockrass, Chastain is among the drivers who will be free to sign with any team for the 2024 season.

The list includes Chastain, Denny Hamlin, Chase Briscoe, Alex Bowman, Daniel Suarez, Martin Truex Jr., Aric Almirola, Michael McDowell, Justin Haley, Harrison Burton, Todd Gilliland, Ty Dillon, Corey LaJoie, Noah Gragson, and Ryan Preece.

Out of these names, Chastain and Hamlin will end up being the big-ticket options. The driver of the No. 1 car will likely continue with Trackhouse Racing as it remains a perfect fit but nothing can ever be ruled out during the NASCAR silly season process.

Hamlin's situation could be slightly different. The driver of the No. 11 car will be entering the final year of his contract but most importantly, FedEx's contract with Joe Gibbs Racing also expires.

Former Joe Gibbs Racing driver Kyle Busch saw Mars leave the sport and that is why he will drive the No. 8 car for Richard Childress Racing moving forward. This is a different situation but one that requires monitoring.

Among the others, Truex will likely retire or stay with Joe Gibbs Racing at this point. The other four major names (Bowman/Briscoe/Suarez/Almirola) seem likely to stay barring any retirements or unexpected moves.



RAIDers, Residents Against Increased Density

fear they have lost to BIG DEVELOPMENT

Two years ago, over 100 residents and friends of the Greenpointe Development gated communities collectively named RIVER HALL on Rte 80, Palm Beach Boulevard, Alva, met at the Alva Community Center to take up once again their fight to keep their development owner from expanding the density restrictions of River Hall to allow as many as 400+ new residents, in smaller footprint homes and possibly multi-story condos from building.


This fight has been going on, and off, for about 15 years. On January 18th the fight may have given up the ghost.

Robert Glandorf, current leader of the group called "RAIDers, Residents Against Increased Density" shared through an email that only about a dozen residents showed up at the first of two LEE COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, ZONING and COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AMENDMENT HEARINGS planned about this project. He had hoped for dozens, not one dozen, concerned citizens.

While the county has not made a final decision as of this writing, Mr. Glandorf has resigned from his leadership position, quoting Mike Greenwell, the newly elected commissioner for the Alva Area District, "As long as the applicant is within the governing laws and ordinances of the county, they are going to get what they want." Mr. Glandorf added, "The only chance we had as a community was to stand together in unison against this density increase. That didn't happen."

The second and final meeting date with the Lee County Commissioners has not yet been announced,

however acceptance of Greenpointe's request to increase density and begin building is expected, as is state approval from Tallahassee.





Study suggests US freshwater fish highly contaminated with 'forever chemicals'

Nationwide report affirms what has been known in Southwest Florida waters for years

Eating just one serving of freshwater fish each year could have the same effect as drinking water heavily polluted with "forever chemicals" for an entire month, a new study finds.

The equivalent monthlong amount of water would be contaminated at levels 2,400 times greater than what's recommended by the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) drinking water health advisories, according to the study, published Tuesday in Environmental Research.

The research added that locally caught freshwater fish are far more polluted than commercial catches with per- and polyfluorinated substances (PFAS) — so-called forever chemicals that are notorious for their persistence in the body and the environment.

PFAS are key ingredients in jet fuel firefighting foam, industrial discharge and many household products, including certain types of food packaging. For decades, they have leached into drinking water supplies while also contaminating irrigated crops and fish that inhabit local waterways.

Fish consumption has long been identified as a route of exposure to PFAS, according to the study. Researchers first identified such contamination in catfish that inhabited the Tennessee River in 1979.

"Food has always been kind of the hypothesis of how most people are exposed to PFAS compounds," corresponding author David Andrews, a senior scientist at the Environmental Working Group, told The Hill.

But Tuesday's study is the first analysis to connect U.S. fish consumption to blood levels of PFAS, while also comparing PFAS levels in freshwater fish with those in commercial seafood samples, the authors explained.

To draw their conclusions, the researchers evaluated the presence of different types of PFAS in 501 fish fillet samples, collected across the U.S. from 2013 to 2015.

These samples were acquired through two EPA programs: the 2013-2014 National Rivers and Streams Assessment and the 2015 Great Lakes Human Health Fish Fillet Tissue Study.

The median level of total targeted PFAS in fish from rivers and streams was 9,500 nanograms per kilogram, while the median in the Great Lakes was 11,800 nanograms per kilogram, according to the study. These levels indicate that the consumption of such fish "is potentially a significant source of exposure" to PFAS, the authors determined.

While the samples included many types of forever chemicals — of which there are thousands — the biggest contributor to total PFAS levels was the compound known as PFOS, responsible for about 74 percent of the total, the researchers found.

Although PFOS has largely been phased out of manufacturing, it used to be the main ingredient in fabric protector Scotchgard, and it lingers on in the environment.



PFOS is so potent that ingesting just one serving of freshwater fish would be equivalent to drinking a month's worth of water contaminated with PFOS at levels of 48 parts per trillion, according to the study.

"The extent that PFAS has contaminated fish is staggering," first author Nadia Barbo, a graduate student at Duke University, said in a statement. "There should be a single health protective fish consumption advisory for freshwater fish across the country."

Although scientists might not know precisely how people are being exposed to PFAS, the study "clearly indicates that for people who consume freshwater fish even very infrequently, it is likely a significant source of their exposure," Andrews said.

Of the 349 samples analyzed in the National Rivers and Streams Assessment, only one sample contained no detectable PFAS, the authors determined.

All 152 fish samples tested in the Great Lakes study had detectable PFAS — and had "overall higher levels of PFOS" in comparison to those in the national assessment.

"PFAS contamination may be of particular concern for the Great Lakes ecosystem and the health of people who depend on fishing on the Great Lakes for sustenance and cultural practices," the authors noted.

Contamination in the Great Lakes, as well as in other lakes and ponds, may be comparatively greater than the PFAS pollution in rivers and streams because these basins don't cycle as frequently, according to Andrews.

"The water doesn't get flushed out as quickly," he said.

Median levels of total detected PFAS in freshwater fish were 278 times higher than those in commercially relevant fish tested from 2019 to 2022.

"It's incredible how different they are," Andrews said.

The data on retail fish came from the Food and Drug Administration's Total Diet Study datasets from 2019 to 2021, as well as a specific sampling of seafood conducted in 2022.

Some commercially caught fish may be less contaminated because they are grown in controlled aquaculture environments, Andrews explained. Meanwhile, large-scale ocean fishing often occurs farther offshore, where PFAS pollution would be more diluted, he added.



Andrews acknowledged, however, that the data on commercially caught fish is much more recent than the freshwater contamination figures.

He also recognized that with the industrial phaseout of PFOS production, the pollution "levels in rivers and streams do seem to be decreasing, which is important."

"At the same time, the levels are still so high that any fish consumption likely impacts serum levels," Andrews said. "But they are moving in the right direction, which I think is

some good news, at least in terms of the rivers and streams."

While this study did not evaluate whether PFAS uptake is worse in some fish versus others, Andrews pointed to recent tests demonstrating that even small fish with short lifespans can amass dangerous quantities of these compounds.

Last week, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services updated its "Eat Safe Fish" guidelines to limit the amount of rainbow smelt that should be consumed — based on elevated levels of PFOS.

Rainbow smelt — small, silvery fish with short life cycles — are "low on the food web and don't generally bioaccumulate chemicals," Michigan Live reported.

The Hill has reached out for comment on the study from the Michigan PFAS Action Response Team, a state Department of Health and Human Services group working on the Great Lakes contamination issue and that oversees the Eat Safe Fish program.

In comparison to commercially caught fish, local freshwater fish consumption can be difficult to quantify, as "there is significant variability with respect to dietary fish intake," the study authors acknowledged.

But the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has determined that the general population eats about 18 grams per day of fish, with greater consumption occurring among men and adults ages 31 to 50, according to the study.

High fish consumption — eating one or more fish meal per week — is typical among anglers, individuals living along coasts or lakes, communities for which fishing is culturally important and immigrants who hail from countries where fish is a dietary staple, the authors noted.

The researchers therefore characterized exposure to PFAS in freshwater fish as "a textbook case of environmental injustice" in which certain communities are "inordinately harmed."

Contamination of this food source particularly "threatens those who cannot afford to purchase commercial seafood," the authors stressed in a statement accompanying the study.

Andrews emphasized the need for both guidance for anglers and action on "this environmental justice issue" from a federal level.

Attention to this subject, he added, must address "this contamination of a source of protein for many communities who rely on it both for subsistence as well as for cultural reasons."

A note from Ken DeWalt-

We have known for a long time that our fresh waters in Southwest Florida were not very fresh, and the normal dark color of the tannin infused liquid is not what anyone is worried about.



John Cassani, local, now retired Calusa Waterkeeper biologist, has said for years that an adult should eat no more than one fish a month from the fresh and briny waters of Southwest Florida's waters and our Caloosahatchee. Children and pregnant mothers are at much greater risk.

Since Hurricane IAN, with huge amounts of metals, chemicals and fecal bacterial matter flushed into the Gulf of Mexico he recommends catch and release for all fish being caught in estuaries and thorough testing can be done by state and county officials.

Also, know where the fish and seafood come from that you consume in restaurants or purchase in stores. It could save your or your children's lives.



PIE CRUST


3 c King Arthur all-purpose flour

1 tsp salt

3/4 c lard (cold and diced into pieces)

1/4 c butter (cold and diced)

1/2 c iced cold water



Unwrap one ball and roll out on a floured board to desired shape. Repeat with second dough ball.

For the pot pie, I put a bottom crust rolled out on a buttered/floured glass baking dish and then add the filling. Then top with other ball rolled out and vent with a sharp knife the and decorate with trimmings of pie crust.

POT PIE

2 diced or shredded cooked chicken breasts

1 small bag of frozen mixed vegetables

2 med potatoes cut into bite sized cubes-boiled in water and drained

3 stalks celery chopped small

1 small onion chopped

2 tsp butter

1 can Cream of Chicken Soup

1 can Cream of Celery Soup (tonight I used leftover chicken gravy instead of soup)

2 Tbsp poultry seasoning

1 tsp salt

1 tsp pepper

Mix all together and pour into pie crust. I used a 9x13 sized pan. Bake 35 to 40 minutes at 350 or until top is nicely browne



IRS REFUND SCAMS

Tax season is just around the corner, and IRS impersonators will be modifying their tactics accordingly. Instead of contacting you about a tax debt and making threats to get you to pay up, scammers may send you a text about a "tax rebate" or some other tax refund or benefit. The text messages may look legit, but no matter what the text says, it's a scammer phishing for your information or your money.

The government doesn't text people out of the blue with threats or promises of money. If you click on the link to claim your "refund," you may expose yourself to identity theft or malware that the scammer could install on your phone or other device.

If someone unexpectedly contacts you about a tax rebate or refund:

• Never click on links in unexpected texts. Don't share personal information with anyone who contacts you out

of the blue. Always use a website or phone number you know is real.

• Know that the IRS won't call, email or text to contact you for the first time. They'll always start by sending

you a letter. If you want to confirm, call the IRS directly at 800-829-1040.

- Find the status of any pending refund on the IRS official website. Visit Where's My Refund at www.IRS.gov.
- Report unsolicited texts or emails claiming to be the IRS. Forward a screenshot or the email as an attachment to phishing@irs.gov.

If you clicked a link in a suspicious text or email and shared personal information, file a report at IdentityTheft.gov to get a customized recovery plan based on what information you shared. SalusCare Crisis Stabilization Unit remains closed due to hurricane damage

Months after Hurricane Ian damaged a mental health care facility, their doors are still closed, meaning people in the Fort Myers area desperate for mental health care are going without. Currently, their hallways are empty, the beds are covered with tarps, and board games are sitting untouched.

"People are dying as a result," said SalusCare President Stacey Cook.

People are dying because the locked doors lead to the SalusCare Crisis Stabilization Unit. The only mental health crisis unit in Lee County. Since the hurricane, hundreds of patients facing a behavioral health crisis are not getting the help they need, and Cook said that could be life-threatening.

"We're able to stabilize an individual who is suicidal and homicidal. We're able to link patients to services that they need in order to become well. So it's absolutely critical. It's an important and essential component of healthcare. And it's missing right now. It is a huge missing link," said Cook.

SalusCare is also the place where police departments take people having a mental health crisis. Now many of them go to Lee Health.

Two feet of water flooded the SalusCare facility during Hurricane Ian. Now, the center is caught in an insurance battle between wind and water insurance carriers.

SalusCare says it does not have the \$1.5 million to pay for repairs out of pocket. FEMA might be an option, but so far has not offered public assistance.

While SalusCare is fighting hard to reopen its doors, as of now, there is no timetable for when that will be. Before the hurricane, SalusCare received 500 to 600 patients a month through the Baker Act while also caring for 250 to 300 adults and children in crisis.
