

Bishop Hicks' Column

May 2022 | Your parish family waits for your return



Shortly before Holy Week, I issued a letter noting I was lifting the dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass on Palm Sunday since the possibility of catching COVID-19 had dramatically decreased. I knew I would hear grumblings from individuals who had gotten used to attending a virtual, livestreamed Mass. But I was surprised to hear from several people who had no idea that such an attendance obligation existed.

Canon law is straightforward in its direction: "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are obliged to participate in the Mass." (Can. 1247) Now, this responsibility to attend Sunday Mass does not exist in the Catholic Church to be punitive. It exists as something that brings us life through the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We come together to celebrate Jesus' sacrifice as a Eucharistic community.

In simpler terms, being together matters. I was struck by the importance of this belief during this year's Chrism Mass, which was only the second time I had celebrated this powerful liturgy as the bishop of Joliet. Last year, we were limited to 20% capacity of the cathedral, so only a few priests attended, and about three people were sitting in every other pew. This year, a multitude of priests gathered behind me on the altar, and I looked out onto pews filled with so many good people of God from our parishes across the diocese. There were feelings of hope and joy and exuberance in the air. As I recessed down the aisle to a triumphal hymn at the end of Mass, I felt so alive - I felt like I was walking on a cloud! I could see the same excitement in the smiles of people as I blessed them on my way out.

When I reached the narthex of the cathedral, I saw Sr. Sharon Stola, OSB, the diocese's director

of divine worship. I spontaneously said, "I hope this is OK. I just want to thank you for organizing all of this." And then I gave her a big hug and blessed her. I could see in her smile that she was resounding with the same joy I felt, as we were all gathered as one body in Christ.

Jesus stressed the importance of coming together to worship in Matthew 18:20: "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." The Second Vatican Council followed up on this by recognizing that "this full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else; for it is the primary and indispensable source from which the faithful are to derive the true Christian spirit." And now, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, on the feast of Corpus Christi on June 16, is launching a three-year eucharistic revival to kindle a living relationship with our Lord, Jesus Christ, in the Eucharist.

Think of this eucharistic revival as a family reunion of sorts, since it is beginning as we embark on what we hope and pray will be a post-pandemic society. Please know that I am grateful for the technology that allowed us to worship virtually when safety measures restricted us from meeting in person. Livestreamed Masses served as a lifeline for us all, and they continue to serve as an option for the sick and homebound.

Yet, if you are able, come back to your parish, where your family in Christ is waiting for you. Return so that you may join your brothers and sisters in Christ to adore God, praise him, and receive his love in the Eucharist. Remember that we must first come together as one before we can "go in peace to love and serve the Lord."

Dear Parishioners,

Here is a reflection for this weekends readings:

"We will...make our dwelling with him (or her)" (John 14:23), Jesus promises his disciples in his conversation with them at the Last Supper. He tells them that the Holy Spirit will come after he leaves. The Holy Spirit dwells with us, guides us, counsels us, advocates for us, and gives us peace. The leaders of the early church relied on the Holy Spirit when facing issues Jesus had not explicitly addressed. For instance, Paul and Barnabas asked them to decide what Jewish practices were necessary for Gentile Christians. A requirement of circumcision would have been a burden to men with no tradition of the practice. More significantly, it relegated women to second-class status. Guided by the Holy Spirit, the decision they made brought peace to the newly baptized Gentiles. Two thousand years later, the Holy Spirit still dwells with us and Guides us. May we allow the Holy Spirit to guide us to peace, the peace that Jesus gave to his disciples with some of the last words before he died and in his first words to them after he rose.

How can you bring the peace of the Holy Spirit to your family, your community, and the world?



time. Someday, I will smile and melt my parent's heart. Right now, my heart beats quickly at 150 beats per minute. Isn't God wonderful? Pray for me."


Question of the Week

Question:

Did Jesus have a sense of humor? I see movies and TV shows that depict different kind of God's reactions, which is true?

Answer:

Humor was part of Jesus' humanity. We see this in Scripture (e.g., Luke 18:25). However, when a Christian is wondering whether to watch an irreverent movie that has no redeeming value, the go-to question should be, "Would Jesus watch this with me?" Some people may find this to be a corny question, but is it?




We can control what movies or television shows we watch. We can also control how we nourish and feed our spiritual life. By reading good literature (including spiritual reading), and pursuing holiness, crude and irreverent humor will be less attractive.

I might add that there are movies and books that are morally problematic yet have redemptive value (e.g., Graham Greene's The End of the Affair and The Power and the Glory, both of which were made into movies) and could be comfortably viewed or read by most Catholics.

Saint of the Week

St. Bede the Venerable, Bede also spelled Baeda or Beda, (born 672/673, traditionally Monkton in Jarrow, Northumbria [England]—died May 25, 735, Jarrow; canonized 1899; feast day May 25), Anglo-Saxon theologian, historian, and chronologist. St. Bede is best known for his Historia ecclesiastica gentis Anglorum ("Ecclesiastical History of the English People"), a source vital to the history of the conversion to Christianity of the Anglo-Saxon tribes.

During his lifetime and throughout the Middle Ages, Bede's reputation was based mainly on his scriptural commentaries, copies of which found their way to many of the monastic libraries of western Europe. The method of dating events from the time of the incarnation, or Christ's birth—i.e., AD (anno Domini, "in the year of our Lord")—came into general use through the popularity of the Historia ecclesiastica and the two works on chronology. Bede's influence was perpetuated at home through the school



founded at York by his pupil Archbishop Egbert of York and was transmitted to the rest of Europe by Alcuin, who studied there before becoming master of Charlemagne's palace school at Aachen.


Bede's works fall into three groups: grammatical and "scientific," scriptural commentary, and historical and biographical. His earliest works included treatises on spelling, hymns, figures of speech, verse, and epigrams.
