# A Message from Fr. Tuan

Dear Parishioners,

A reflection for this weeks readings 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C,

We like to visualize the Holy Spirit coming as a dove, a symbol of peace. But at Pentecost the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles as tongues of fire. Fire has a much different connotation, suggesting danger and destruction. This is the image Jesus uses in today's Gospel. He has begun his journey to Jerusalem, so heavy on his mind is the knowledge that he will face people with evil in their hearts, people who are willing to put that evil into action. Like Jeremiah in the first reading, Jesus has angered the political and religious authorities. At this point peace is not his goal. First, the evil in people's hearts must be destroyed. When ignored, evil can flourish, spreading among those willing to look the other way, infecting an entire household or a whole community. Jesus would rather a family be divided than corrupted. The Holy Spirit who comes to us in baptism, gives us the wisdom and fortitude to confront evil and the purifying fire to cauterize it before it spreads. May our Lord inspire us to do so, for "he endured such opposition from sinners, in order that (we) may not grow weary and lose heart" (Hebrews 12:3).

When have you felt prompted to stand up to evil? When have you done so and when have you failed to do so?

## Bishop Hicks Named Sixth Bishop of Joliet



When Bishop Ron Hicks was ready to share his amazing news with his parents, he drove to their home in Tinley Park. With his parents and him wearing masks, sitting in his parents' garage at a safe distance away from them, he said, "I have some news for you. Your son is soon going to be appointed the bishop of his own diocese. Would you like to guess where?"

His father commenced to guess. He guessed Denver. Then Cincinnati. Then Columbus, Ohio. And he keptgoing — naming places in California and Texas.

"He was going all around the country, just shooting out these possibilities," Bishop Hicks said. "My mom was sitting there with a blank look on her face. I said no. I'm going to be your neighbor, right over the border. I'm going to Joliet. My mom, without missing a beat, just shouted out, 'Oh, praise God!' They're happy that I'm close. I'm happy to be here."

Bishop Hicks, who turned 53 on Aug. 4, will be leaving his current position as vicar general at the Archdiocese of Chicago to be installed as the next bishop of the diocese at the Cathedral of St. Raymond Nonnatus in Joliet on Sept. 29, the feast of the Archangels.

The previous bishop of the diocese was Bishop R. Daniel Conlon, who, last December, asked Pope Francis for a medical leave of absence, which was granted. Then, several months ago, in early May, Bishop Conlon signed, citing that, at the age of 71, he was no longer able "to carry the burden of leadership" of a diocese with around 616,000 Catholics.

Since December, the diocese has been led by Bishop Richard E. Pates. Once the installation occurs, Bishop Pates, the former bishop for the Diocese of Des Moines, will go back to retirement, which is what he was enjoying when he was called into service to become the diocese's apostolic administrator.

"The Diocese of Joliet is most grateful to Pope Francis for the appointment of Bishop Ronald Hicks as its sixth bishop," said Bishop Pates. "The bishop owns a reputation for pastoral leadership and is totally committed to the ongoing renewal of the Catholic Church. He is a worthy successor to Bishop Conlon and his predecessors."

"Bishop Hicks, a native of Harvey, IL, grew up in South Holland, IL, where he attended St. Jude the Apostle Parish and Grade School. He remembers the vibrant parish and school with fondness, full of gratitude for the wonderful nuns, teachers, lay people and "extraordinary priests."

When he was in the sixth grade, one of the priests invited him and several other students to attend a high school, Quigley South, seminary summer program. Although he wasn't thinking of priesthood at the time, he liked the school, and, with the encouragement of the priest, he attended it, graduating in 1985.

"Quigley was outstanding," he said. "It was the seed that was planted that said maybe I should keep on thinking about the priesthood."

"He took the next step on that path by attending Niles College of Loyola University Chicago, where he graduated in 1989, getting a B.A. in philosophy.

When he graduated, at the age of 21, he felt sure that God was calling him to the priesthood in the Archdiocese of Chicago. He also felt that there needed to be more Spanish-speaking priests, so the rector of the seminary recommended a mission in Mexico, called Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (NPH), which is Spanish for "Our Little Brothers and Sisters." NPH is a home dedicated to caring for more than 3,400 orphaned and abandoned children in nine Latin American and Caribbean countries.

The priest recommended he spend a year there and paid for his airfare and for two weeks of language school to learn a little bit of Spanish before he arrived. The experience at the NPH impacted him tremendously.

"Learning Spanish has been a beautiful gift that has opened up not only the culture, but the ministry and all the people," he said.

Not only did he learn to be fluent in the language, but, after witnessing all the unconditional love that occurred at the home, he felt convinced that the Lord was calling him to the priesthood.

His next degrees — a Master of Divinity degree in 1994 and a Doctor of Ministry degree in 2003 — were both from the University of St. Mary of the Lake in Mundelein, IL.

One of his classmates at Mundelein — they both started there in 1990 — was Father David Boettner, who is now the vicar general for the Diocese of Knoxville. They lived on the same floor, shared similar tastes in music, participated in the same formation group at the seminary and became great friends.

"As a seminarian and as a priest, he has always had a deep love of people and a generosity of his time to serve the needs of others," Father Boettner said. "I am not surprised at all that God has called Bishop Hicks to be a bishop. He has always lived his promise of obedience to the Church, and his first answer when asked to serve is almost always yes. ... I know that he will be a gift to the Church of Joliet."

# Question of the Week

Last week's Gospel prompted this question several times.


Q. Do I have to Pray every Day?

A. A few other questions to ask as well: "Do I have to eat every day?" "Do I have to sleep every day?" "Do I have to brush my teeth everyday?" For a day, maybe even more, one could forgo doing these things, but a person would not like it and it could actually do harm. By not praying, one could become self-centered, selfish, and depressed. These are just a few of the consequences. Perhaps that is why Christ commands His disciples to pray always.

Christ also tells His disciples that when one prays, he should go to his inner room and to pray alone. Yet, Christ also says that when two or three are gathered in His name that He is present. Christ wants both private and communal prayer. Prayer, whether private or communal, may come in many forms: blessing and adoration, petition, intercession, praise, and thanksgiving. In all these forms, prayer is a conversation with God. At times it is a dialogue, but many times it is listening. Sadly, many people think that prayer is telling God what they want or need. These people are disappointed when they do not get what they want. This is why it is important to see it as a conversation where one also allows God to communicate what He wants for that person.

Would one ever ask "Do I have to speak to my closest friend every day?" Of course not! That's because one usually longs to speak with his or her friend to strengthen that friendship. So too, God wants His disciples to grow closer to Him. This is done through prayer. If one practices praying everyday, one grows closer to God, one grows closer to the Saints in Heaven, one becomes less self-centered and, therefore, more God-centered.

So, start praying to God! Try not to do too much in one day. Prayer, like physical exercise, needs to be built up. One who is out of shape cannot do a marathon on his or her first day of exercise. Some people get discouraged when they cannot do all-night vigils in front of the Blessed Sacrament. Talk with a priest and come up with a plan. If you can visit a Church, try stopping in for five minutes of adoration. Find and recite a daily morning prayer and, at the very start of your day, dedicate it to Christ. Read a passage from the Bible, especially from the Gospels and the Book of Psalms. While reading the passage, simply ask God to open your heart to what He is telling you. Try praying the rosary. If that seems a little much at first, try praying just one decade. The important thing to remember is to not get frustrated but to listen for the Lord to speak. When you speak, keep it focused on asking God to help others, especially the sick and suffering, including the souls in purgatory.




# Saint of the Week

Our Saint for this week is

St John Eudes.

John Eudes was born at Ri, Normandy, France, on November 14, 1601, the son of a farmer. He went to the Jesuit college at Caen when he was 14, and despite his parents' wish that he marry, joined the Congregation of the Oratory of France in 1623. He studied at Paris and at Aubervilliers, was ordained in 1625, and worked as a volunteer, caring for the victims of the plagues that struck Normandy in 1625 and 1631, and spent the next decade giving Missions, building a reputation as an outstanding preacher and confessor and for his opposition to Jansenism. He became interested in helping fallen women, and in 1641, with Madeleine Lamy, founded a refuge for them in Caen under the direction of the Visitandines. He resigned from the Oratorians in 1643 and founded the Congregation of Jesus and Mary (the Eudists) at Caen, composed of secular priests not bound by vows but dedicated to upgrading the clergy by establishing effective seminaries and to preaching missions. His foundation was opposed by the Oratorians and the Jansenists, and he was unable to obtain Papal approval for it, but in 1650, the Bishop of Coutances invited him to establish a seminary in that diocese. The same year the sisters at his refuge in Caen left the Visitandines and were recognized by the Bishop of Bayeux as a new congregation under the name of Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of the Refuge.



John founded seminaries at Lisieux in 1653 and Rouen in 1659 and was unsuccessful in another attempt to secure Papal approval of his congregation, but in 1666 the Refuge sisters received Pope Alexander III's approval as an institute to reclaim and care for penitent wayward women. John continued giving missions and established new seminaries at Evreux in 1666 and Rennes in 1670. He shared with St. Mary Margaret Alacoque the honor of initiating devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus (he composed the Mass for the Sacred Heart in 1668) and the Holy Heart of Mary, popularizing the devotions with his "The Devotion to the Adorable Heart of Jesus" (1670) and "The Admirable Heart of the Most Holy Mother of God", which he finished a month before his death at Caen on August 19th. He was canonized in 1925. His feast day is August 19th.


