BEACON VILLAGES DESERT ISLAND DISCS - GLENN JOHNSON

I was born in Aldershot, Hampshire in 1952 and grew up listening to the popular music of the day, particularly with a love of Country and Western music and the music my parents grew up with! My father worked for the Post Office and would arrange the PO Social and entertainment evenings. He played guitar, ukulele and snare drums. It was during the 50's he taught me to play which set me 'on the road' later in life. I joined the PO at sixteen and by the early 70's, started entertaining at small venues locally. I married Christine in 1985 and after two moves, settled here in Devon. By this time, I went professional, finally just working/performing in care homes, leading up to bereavement in 2010. I retired from performing in 2020 during the pandemic but now concentrating on promoting Christine's two novels she completed before her passing.

Eight pieces of music to choose from, a difficult decision! Finally, here's my list.

'CATTLE CALL' (ORIGINAL 1955 RECORDING) SLIM WHITMAN.

The high yodel, voice breaks and the haunting steel guitar evoked wonderful memories from this era along with Slim's melodious voice. Conjured up great images from the films and TV Western series of the decade and my all time favourite Western song!

• 'WONDERFUL LAND' THE SHADOWS with the Norrie Paramor Orchestra (1962)

A beautiful instrumental with Hank's guitar and enhancement by the Norrie Paramor strings. The piece of music I love to play while driving through wonderful Devon.

'WHITE HORSES' (1968) JACKY

This next choice is the theme tune from the 1960's TV series 'White Horses' by Jacky Lee (originally lead singer of the Teardrops). Composed by Ben Nesbit and *Michael Carr (*who co-wrote the hit song 'South of the Border'). Still have the original PHILIPS single which I often play.

• 'GIRL DON'T COME' (1965) SANDY SHAW

My favourite female singer from the 60's. Some fantastic songs by Chris Andrews were tailor-made for her voice and style but this one stands out amongst all the others. This one personifies this decade!

• 'SLEEP WALK' (1959) SANTO AND JOHNNY

A wonderful Hawaiian guitar hit single on both sides of the Atlantic in 1959. A jukebox favourite of the time when the rockers would slow down and couples would 'smooch'. A number one in the USA. Dreamy visions of blue skies, palm trees and surf. Beautiful!

'HEY GOOD LOOKIN' (1951) HANK WILLIAMS SNR

Growing up on Hank's music, a difficult choice but has to be this one! In an upbeat happy mood, sung in C Major, he was the Shakespeare of Country music and left behind a legacy of music that has featured in other genres! Along with Slim Whitman, they both influenced me!

• 'OH BOY' (1958) BUDDY HOLLY & THE CRICKETS

A difficult choice amongst the many Rock and Roll songs of the 50's. I think this is the one that sums up that era. He wrote some great numbers, just as popular today.

'THEME FROM A SUMMER PLACE' (1959) PERCY FAITH AND HIS ORCHESTRA
 A wonderful orchestral arrangement and recording played many times back in
 its day on the BBC Light Programme. Conjures up beautiful images and always
 been a firm favourite over the years.

UPDATE FROM KESWICK

It's almost six months since, having just watched all my goods and chattels being driven away by Reddaways, I said goodbye to Devon. And by 'Devon' I really mean all my dear friends and neighbours in and around Sticklepath, and my garden, the Taw River Inn, the Devi, St Marys, Dartmoor, and indeed everything that for the past thirty years had been so important a part of my life. I felt uprooted and sad as my daughter, who had come to fetch me, began the long drive back to her home in Cumbria. And the weather, horribly wet and blustery, didn't help.

But it was no good feeling miserable. After all, the decision to move nearer my family was mine and I knew it was the right one; I was lucky to be going from one very beautiful part of the country to another, equally beautiful; plus, 'the cockles of my heart' were still warm from the wonderful send off I had been given in Sticklepath Stores the day before. "Come and have a goodbye coffee with one or two friends," they had said, and at first, on arrival at the shop, I couldn't think why it was so full. Then it dawned; everyone there was there to wish me well. I was so touched. How can I ever thank you, all those of you who gave their time to be there for me that morning, and all those of you who couldn't make it but popped in or stopped by at my gate during the surrounding hours? I can't, except to say here, how much I appreciated then and still appreciate now, your doing so, and how I will always treasure the memory of that morning.

For the next couple of months after that, I lived with my daughter and her family about eight miles from Keswick, where I was in process of buying a retirement flat. Every few days, Jane would drop me off in Keswick so that I could begin to find my bearings in the town where I would soon be living. And gradually it all happened: contracts were signed; carpets went down, Reddaways delivered my furniture, and I moved in. And I'm happy here. Still things to sort; still things that I don't yet know where on earth to put them; but making friends, appreciating the surrounding countryside and generally enjoying life.

My new home is on the second floor of a block of flats. We share laundry facilities and there's a communal lounge. Everyone is very helpful and I am no longer the newest arrival. Positioned at the head of a T junction, I have a long street-view westwards towards Grisedale Pike, which being so high comes and goes with the cloud. A birch tree is just outside. When the skies are clear I can watch the setting sun. And at dusk, bats flit around outside my window, literally at eye level. I'm within fairly easy walking distance of the shops, bus station and Derwentwater (the local lake); and very easy walking distance of some beautiful parks and the River Greta. I've joined u3a, found my way to the local church, and now that the town isn't so busy, began to explore the tourist spots. Living nearer the family is great. My daughter calls every few days; my elder grandson pops in with his girlfriend, and my younger one likewise when he's home. My son has already been down several times from Scotland and on one such occasion recently we took a rowing boat out on Derwentwater. It was enjoyed by everyone except perhaps his dog. Even I got a turn with the oars. And it was on that occasion that I suddenly realised that flat 35 had ceased to be my 'new home' and had somehow and unobtrusively become - just 'home'.

I promised Ali and everyone at the post-office coffee morning that I would keep in touch and am sorry it's taken so long to keep that promise. But I do think of you often, cherish the cards you gave me, and trust that if any of you ever find yourselves in the north you will feel able to call. I'd love that; but be warned: the weather here is at least as wet as in Devon. However, to compensate, just like Devon, when it's nice it's glorious, and it's still lovely even when wet.

If you want a small rooted specimen, please come with a sack. Norway spruce transplant well up to 3' 6" in height but not so Nordmann's fir on account of

their long tap root.

BEACON RECIPE OF THE MONTH – Taylor Made

CHRISTMAS FUDGE

Simple to make and ideal for Christmas gifts.

1 tin of Carnation condensed milk

120ml milk

115g butter

450g. Brown sugar.

Put all ingredients in a large pan on a low heat, until the sugar has melted. Stir well.

Bring to the boil slowly, then simmer on a low heat for 10/15 minutes, stirring well.

Drop a ball of mixture into cold water. If ready it will solidify. Be careful this will be very hot.

Tip into a greaseproof lined 8inch dish. Smooth the top. Put into the fridge overnight.

Carefully cut into squares and enjoy!

Just like that, we are in to December. It never ceases to amaze me how quickly time flies. It has been an incredible year across the Dartmoor National Trust places. We have welcomed new volunteers to the team, had over 200,000 visitors to Castle Drogo, Finch and Lydford Gorge, improved our facilities for people who live with a disability (still lots more we want to do) and fundraised nearly £30,000 in our second hand bookshops to go towards caring for these very special places. We couldn't do all this without the support of our local communities and neighbours. Thank you for your patience, support and helping us to look after this little part of the Moor.

Thank you to everyone who got in touch to offer help planting trees. I am delighted to tell you that we are now fully booked and even have a waiting list. So many people wanted to get involved that we are looking at other opportunities for people to get involved. Look out for groups of people from local youth clubs, scouts groups, youth rangers and many more over the winter months. Just a reminder that 2025 marks 50 years since Castle Drogo was first opened to the public by the National Trust. As part of this milestone, there will be a new exhibition in the Night Nursery, focusing on the 1920s, 1970s and today. It will celebrate the stories, objects and features that make Castle Drogo special. As we prepare for it, we are asking for everyone to give us their thoughts on the following question. What makes Castle Drogo special to you?

There will be lots of 50th anniversary activities next year so look out here for more announcements.

COUNCILLORS' ANNUAL REPORT 2024 WEST DEVON

Hello all and I wish you a peaceful Christmas and New Year. It has been another busy and productive year for the Borough council. I will outline some of our aims and achievements to date.

The council has agreed on 8 key priorities for the next 2 plus years.

- 1. Natural Environment We have secured funding to deliver projects including developing plans for active travel. The Beacon Path from Sticklepath to the Okehampton Interchange is one of the routes to be considered for funding. I have instigated this project so I am so pleased it is included. Support for agriculture to implement regenerative farming practices, we are working with organisations to deliver this. Developing sustainable and renewable energy projects across West Devon with Tamar Energy being funded to work on this project. We aim to incentivise renewable energy projects.
- 2. Built Environment the council aims to preserve and protect Devon's historic buildings. We are part of the Joint Local Plan with Plymouth and South Hams councils to deliver the sustainable homes we need. We have delivered our quota of homes so far. An upcoming review of the JLP will be carried out in 2025 to ensure it meets local needs.
- 3. Housing The council has declared a housing crisis and are striving to tackle this locally. The cost of homes to buy or rent is high and many local people find difficulty in obtaining an affordable home, especially in rural areas. I have instigated a Community Land Trust in this area so that the local community can work to meet our local affordable housing need. We have the evidence from our housing need survey carried out last year to underpin this project.
- 4. Health and Wellbeing the council is proactive in supporting healthier, safer and fairer communities. There are a range of grants to support local organisations and community centres to thrive. We inspect food premises and carry out environmental protection schemes. We respond to concerns about private sector housing standards. Waste collection and recycling is a core strategy to ensure healthy communities.
- 5. People and Community the council will support local communities to deliver their own ambitions. Our ground maintenance services keep open spaces available for people to enjoy. We have our locality teams that visit and engage with local organisations and residents. We lobby other organisations on behalf of the West Devon community, on issues such as road conditions.
- 6. Economy and Jobs the council creates an environment to enable businesses small and large to flourish and develop. We will strengthen our visitor economy and lobby on behalf of farmers. We have plans to promote our cultural heritage and sports activities.

- 7. Performance and Resources the council needs to deliver good quality services that are value for money and will continue to lobby the government for fairer funding on behalf of residents.
- 8. Accessibility and communications West Devon Borough Council business is mainly carried out online with most of our customers choosing this method of contacting us. We know that some residents prefer telephone and face to face contact and will continue to deliver these services whilst they are needed. We aim to put the needs of the community at the centre of our communications.

I hope this report gives a flavour of the work of West Devon Borough Council this year and our aims for the next few years.

REYNARD'S NATURE NOTES

I had planned to write this article about my fourth trip along the Torridge heading towards Meeth but can make that the subject of my first article for 2025. In the bird world something rather exciting and unusual has occurred. We have had a visitor from across the Atlantic!

Some time ago I told you about an experience I had on Lundy Island in the middle of the Bristol Channel. My friend and I had gone to stay there for a fortnight in September. We were out on the North end of the island and could see a big storm cloud heading our way. Just before the rain hit us a bird flew out of the cloud, landed in front of us and began to feed feverishly. It was a Buff-breasted Sandpiper that ought to have been migrating down the east coast of America to wintering grounds in South America. It had been blown drastically off course and Lundy was the first land that it had seen.

On November 2nd this year, a photograph was sent to my phone of a small Dunlin sized wader seen locally on Northam Burrows. The lady who sent the photo suggested that the bird might be a White-rumped Sandpiper, a rare American bird. I had no previous experience of this species so sent the photo to a friend who had seen several in his time as a birdwatcher. The reply came back immediately that the bird was *indeed* a White-rumped Sandpiper. This wader was extremely rare and we expected that a lot of birdwatchers would descend on the Burrows in order to see it. Many of you will have seen the news item about another very rare bird that appeared just outside Halifax in a tiny, quiet cul-desac. Within hours of news that this bird had been seen the cul-de-sac was anything but quiet! Whilst not expecting crowds of quite the size waiting to see the Halifax bird we did anticipate that there would be a lot of birdwatchers wanting to see this little wader. Another of our concerns was that of dog

disturbance. Whenever possible whoever was watching the bird was aware of disruption and was quick to point out the bird and encourage whoever might be doing the disrupting to come and have a look at it through a telescope and marvel at its story.

Nobody will ever know the true story of this White-rumped Sandpiper. We do know that severe storms generated in the Caribbean sweeping across the Atlantic Ocean can and do pick up migrating birds and blow them onto our shores. We also know that birds can hitch rides across the Ocean on boats heading to ports along European coasts. I think another possible explanation exists. In the early part of November no less than 17 White-rumped Sandpipers were identified at different UK locations. The Arctic ice is melting at an alarming rate, and I wonder if this is opening up another possible line of movement for birds that breed in the far north of Canada. Birds can cover incredible distances during their various migrations so it might just be that some of these waders head into Greenland, 'hop' across to Iceland and work their way down the eastern side of the Atlantic. Come the spring the reverse migration could take place and the 'displaced' waders will find their way home. Reynard.

Advent calendars are like a countdown to the real event. They can be fun, especially the chocolate ones, but ticking off the days is not a good way to live your life. Much better to recognise that we are here for a limited time only and that every day is priceless. Then when the big day comes it will be all the more special.

LOCAL NEWS FROM ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO (AND FIFTY YEARS AGO) - DECEMBERS 1924 & 1974

Just like today, people were complaining about the state of the roads one hundred years ago. Colonel Hutchison (Resugga) and William Pike (Moorlands House), who both lived at Birchy Lake, Belstone, wrote to Okehampton Rural District Council protesting about the 'disgraceful' state of the roads at Belstone. Very little had been done to them for years, the hedges were not cut, and the water tables were not cleared. A member said the steam roller could not get in until a hedge had been cut. It was resolved that the chairman and the surveyor visit Belstone and bring up a report of all defaulters with regard to the cutting of hedges and inspect the water tables, and see if the complaint was warranted.

Another hot topic of today was echoed back then; Before the Okehampton magistrates several owners of ponies were summoned for allowing animals to stray from Hatherleigh Moor and Dartmoor, and in each instance a fine of 1s per animal and costs was imposed. The Superintendent of Police said he appreciated the difficulty of keeping stock from straying off the Moors, but there had been three cases lately of people being thrown off bicycles by straying animals. One man was found at night by the roadside bleeding profusely, and it was lucky someone came along and was able to convey him to South Zeal. Owners should give more attention to their animals, especially in rough weather, for it was then that straying mostly took place, when they sought shelter. It was a serious danger to the travelling public.

Two plays, the one-act farce *Domestic Economy* by Mark Lemon (1809-1870) and *Faces and Fortunes* were staged in the Memorial Institute at Belstone, a building which sat almost opposite the current Village Hall until it burnt down in 1945; *It would be invidious to criticize in detail where so many showed ability, but one must single out the vivacious acting of Miss Ida Parker in the second piece. But the outstanding features of the performance were the remarkably fine setting by George Moorlock and the beautiful scenery, painted in distemper, by his son, Cyril Moorlock. Miss Parker married in 1929 and, as Mrs Ida MacCullock, lived on in Belstone until she died in 1992. Cyril Moorlock married Ida's sister Blanche in 1937 and they also lived on in the village for the rest of their long lives. When the Belstone Players formed in 1956 Cyril revived these theatrical skills to become the backstage craftsman who designed, built and painted the sets for every performance until 1976.*

Long-time readers may remember that the name John Durant was mentioned several times in my First World War articles. He died this month giving me the

opportunity to repeat his remarkable exploits – recognising the value of sphagnum moss as a dressing for wounded soldiers he collected over 2½ tons of the stuff, in the process walking about 3000 miles up onto the moors from Okehampton, including visiting Cranmere Pool an authenticated 202 times (is this still the record?).

Local news was a bit scarce in December 1924 so I had a look at 50 years ago, December 1974, and found this piece of front page tabloid-speak about Prince Charles, courtesy of the Daily Mirror; The Prince, who is training as a helicopter pilot at Yeovilton, had flown to Okehampton for a weekend exercise. But bad weather grounded the royal flier. He spent his unexpected holiday:

DRINKING in two of the local pubs.

TESTING the West Country rough cider, known as 'scrumpy'.

ASKING about the local female talent and

WATCHING the X certificate sex comedy 'Percy's Progress' at the town's cinema [The Carlton].

The cinema's owner said: 'It is the first time we have had royal patronage. He came in with a couple of his pals and sat at the back in the 43p seats, although for another 11p each they could have had a box. He obviously thoroughly enjoyed the film.'

Earlier, the Prince, wearing camouflaged combat gear, turned up at the 'Plume of Feathers' hotel — named after his own royal crest. Chatting to the regulars, he asked about the girl situation in Okehampton. But before he could get expert advice he dismissed the subject, saying wistfully: 'Every time I go out with a girl it gets into the papers.' Then he asked about 'scrumpy', only to find that the Plume does not sell it. The next day two officers from the Camp called at another local pub, the King's Arms, and took away a gallon of scrumpy for the Prince to try. Landlord Bill Gater said: 'In the evening they came back to return the plastic container and I asked: 'Did Charlie enjoy his scrumpy? A voice said: 'Yes, thank you'. I looked up and saw the Prince grinning at me. He stayed for about half an hour drinking another half-pint of cider, so he must have taken quite a liking to it.'

Belstone's Rector John Stark had his '15 minutes of fame' on 12 December 1974 when he appeared in the third semi-final of BBC1's prime-time hit *Mastermind*, losing to the eventual winner Elizabeth Horrocks. He had of course already won his first round, with a specialist subject of St Paul.

Visit and see the project unfold! There's been some very moving conversations about loss sparked by the project. One person brilliantly summed up losing her animal friend as 'a healing kind of grief that helped me to deal with my other griefs, which seemed so unmanageable'.

We hope that there will be a slow filling out of the maze, and would like to offer people in the Beacon Villages the opportunity to take part when there is a need to make a tribute, whether it is to an old loss or a new one. A small donation to St Mary's (suggested £10, more if you can. Less if you can't.) would be very much appreciated. (We have big expenses coming up at the church and need all the help we can get!).

We have enough to keep us going in the oil-based marker pens which are the best, easiest, thing to use for a little while, and these are also very affordable and easy to buy for oneself. We hope the Labyrinth is a service to the community and a creative response to loss. If you are reading this outside of the Beacon Villages why not think about borrowing or adapting the idea? Let us know if you do!

A box marked 'Sticklebeasts' will be placed in the Church, near the Sticklepath Pantry in the carpeted area to the right as you come in. This will have some of the right size paving bricks washed and prepared. We have enough to keep us going in the oil-based marker pens which are the best, easiest thing to use for a little while, and will leave some in the box. These are also very affordable and easily available to buy for oneself: have a look and you'll know what you're looking for. Inspiration for the variety and range of ideas are available from the existing memorials! The point is that they're personal and unique.

Please leave any finished memorials back in the box, and you can use it as a letter box for any questions. We'll check it regularly. It is important that the decorated stones are (relatively) durable, so they will then be given several good layers of varnish before being placed, which may take us a week or two.

TIS THE SEASON

"My children love Christmas and they're already picking extra treats off the shelf when we go shopping and telling what

presents they want. I want to make it special for them, but times are tough and I worry about overspending and getting into debt. What can I do?"


