VOLUNTEER EMERGENCY TELEPHONE SERVICE (VETS)

South Tawton Parish Council is looking for volunteers for VETS VETS is here to assist in the lone rescuer situation where the rescuer must stay with the patient, and help needs to be found in collecting the community defibrillator.

All volunteer telephones are polled at the same time, not one after the other, not all lines will ring at the same time.

VETS relies on volunteers within our community to be able to be called to be asked to fetch a defibrillator or to assist with CPR,

however you are not under a mandate to attend a rescue, if you hang up the phone the other volunteer numbers will continue to be polled. Modern AED's/Defibrillator equipment is designed to talk to you and tell you what to do. When applied to the victim, voice commands will guide you step by step through the rescue.

The AED will also make the decision on whether to shock someone, as such you cannot shock someone who does not require it. In fact with basic CPR and defibrillation members of the public like you give the greatest chance for a positive outcome to someone who has suffered a Cardiac Arrest.

Thought for food

Count the small things, because small things count.

One morning in January, in one of my fields bordering South Tawton Common, I found the largest worm cast I have ever seen. The cast itself was shaped like a mini volcano: The base was 70mm in diameter and the summit 30mm above the surrounding soil. At its centre was a burrow no less than 8 mm in width, which suggested it was excavated by a very large earthworm. My excitement was all the greater because this was most likely formed by a deep burrowing lob worm and its presence is a good indicator of soil health. This type of worm works with fungi to turn leaves into deep soil organic matter, which is an important means of storing the carbon plants extract from our atmosphere.

Earthworms are the unsung heroes of soil health. They are nature's greatest geo-engineers. Charles Darwin studied earthworms extensively and wrote an entire book on his findings titled, "The Formation of Vegetable Mould through the Action of Worms with Observations on

their Habits". In it he describes the work of earthworms and how, over long periods of time, they manufacture soil by breaking down minerals and organic matter.

I recently heard a conventional farmer say, "It won't be long before I won't be able afford to go farming, fertiliser is now £700 a tonne." One of the many benefits of regenerative farming is worms make fertiliser for free! At a population of 25 worms per square foot, you will have more than a million worms per acre and between them they produce 30 tonnes of worm casts per year. As well as producing nutrient rich casts, their tunnels provide a route for water in infiltrate the soil, reducing flooding in winter and helping store water in summer. Crop roots grow deeper and therefore more healthily, aided by worm tunnels. Finally, the soil structure is improved making it less prone to compaction by grazing animals.

Healthy soil is the foundation of healthy crops and livestock. Earthworms are my 24x7 farm labourers. Keeping them happy is an important goal. This applies whether you are a farmer or a gardener. So what makes for happy earthworms? First, know your soil: Dig a hole and count your worms. Do this every year and monitor your worm stock. Second, increase your soil organic matter to feed them. They like composted dung, but green manure crops are like worm caviar. Third, avoid compacting soil. Fourth, minimise soil disturbance by ploughing or digging. Fifth, keep soil moist and covered by using green manures or species rich grasses. Sixth, monitor and adjust the pH, ideally to keep it above 5.7. This is tricky on the fringes of Dartmoor where I have acidic soils, so I treat this as an aspiration more than a target. Finally, do not poison your soil by adding chemicals.

The worm who lives in the burrow I found could live for up to twenty years, so I hope to see it again soon.

Jeff's Dartmoor diary

The colour, form and indescribably sweet scent of the hyacinth defies description in English. Like Georgia O' Keefe's paintings, its sensuality somehow evades precise definition. I do remember the Latin for its parts though, learned parrot-fashion in Biology classes in 1977 Androecium-Gynoecium-Calyx-Corolla

Maybe these erotic sounding words with their beautiful rhythm and inflection come closest for me. It doesn't matter that they aren't easily decipherable.

Our Cottage garden is positively blooming. It felt right to fill it with flowers. The garden too has become transformed by the promise of spring, and everywhere you can see the hand of Carol who lived here before us, and who lived for the garden, especially in the lockdown.

The Hyacinth was a parting gift from her to us, and it has ripened implausibly well, flowering so profusely that I needed to add a stick to help it stay standing at all.

Yesterday We snatched a chance to take a leisurely stroll down to the River Wakham at Grenofen just before Dusk, quite alone.

We communed with the river - taking stock of every inch of new territory it had stolen from the land in the last run of spates. We saw how much more the bankside trees had been undermined, clinging nonetheless precariously still to the silty banks.

We saw the scattered dust from an old iron pan, embedded deep in

the soil, gloriously red. There were nodules of brilliant quartz, slugs of rusty sandstone and glistening slates exposed there too. Around the way, stranded floodwater stagnated in pools near the path, their surfaces gradually becoming milky, like a rheumy eye. The river smells, and always has, with a verdant life all of its own. It catches the last rays of the sun as they become gradually eclipsed by the shadows from the high sides of West Down. The last flashes of light rise up through the trees quickly, blazing briefly like flames at the top of the valley. The light changes then, becomes cold, luminous and blue. The rocks fade into one mass, the birds gradually become quiet. Only the river is not silent and in this pregnant stillness the sense of the place comes alive.

Weather watch

Every now and again Mother Nature likes to remind us of her power. At 04:14 GMT on the morning of Saturday 15th January, Hunga Tonga volcano, close to Tonga in the South Pacific Ocean was the site of an enormous eruption, likely the largest of the 21st century so far. The sound of the eruption was heard as far away as New Zealand and even Alaska almost 6000 miles away. The eruption ejected ash and sulphur dioxide as far as 30 km (around 100,000 feet) into the atmosphere.

The blast caused extensive ashfall across Tonga and a tsunami which spread around the entire Pacific Ocean over the following hours. Thankfully this was much smaller than the Indian Ocean event in December 2004 and did not produce the devastation and loss of life seen on that occasion.

Being about as far away from Hunga Tonga (around 10,300 miles) as its possible to get, you would think South Zeal would not see any effects of the eruption. Well, we did! The force of the eruption sent out a shockwave which circulated around the entire planet several times. Our atmosphere is a fluid, so if you imagine the ripples which spread across a pond when you drop in a pebble, it's pretty much the same thing.

The shockwave travelled at close to the speed of sound, which is around 767 mph. This suggested that it would have taken around 14 hours or so to reach us here, and sure enough, just after 7 pm on Saturday evening my weather station recorded as sudden jump then fall in atmospheric pressure which was the signature of the shock arriving.

This shock was so small by the time it reached us it would not have been noticed by anyone. However, it does go to show that even something which occurs on the other side of the planet can be felt here too.

As far as January 2022 was concerns it was a much drier than average month here, seeing less than half of our average rainfall. After an exceptionally mild start we ended up with just a slightly milder than normal January overall. Interestingly the 9 air frosts I recorded was in stark contrast to my friend who lives in the middle of Okehampton who recorded just 1. It just goes to show the effect even modest sized towns can have. I saw sleet fall in the village on 2 days, with the slightest of dustings of snow on The Beacon twice.

Perhaps the January statistic which may surprise you most was that England as a whole had its sunniest January on record. Clearly down here in the Southwest we missed out on much of that!

I hope that you are all keeping well and Mational Trust making the most of the cold and dry winter days we have been seeing in January. I am starting to see little hints of Spring in the garden at Castle Drogo and I am already day-dreaming of swathes of daffodils.

The teams across Dartmoor are turning their attention to re-opening the built places in our care. The deep clean of Drogo is well underway and each time I walk around the castle, there is an extra sparkle to the precious items on display. The garden team have been busy too working on the parking area next to the castle. They are using the historic architectural drawings as inspiration to transform this area in to the 'servants garden' Lutyens originally imagined. The area transformed, seemingly over night, and looks incredible already.

250g mixed dried fruit
75g caster sugar
150ml water
Butter for greasing, and to
serve
250g self raising flour
1tsp mixed spice
1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
1/2tsp vinegar, malt or cider
3tbsp milk
1 lb loaf tin, lined and greased

Place the fruit, water and sugar in a pan and bring to the boil.

Reduce the heat and gently simmer for five minutes.

Pour into a large bowl and leave to cool for approx thirty minutes.

Preheat the oven to 180oC Grease and line a 11b loaf tin. Stir the spice and flour into the mixture, then add the milk, vinegar and bi carb. Gently fold it in, trying not to

knock the air out or the cake will become too heavy.

Spoon into the tin and smooth top

Bake for 45 minutes until a skewer inserted comes out clean.

Leave in the tin for five minutes then turn onto a wire rack to cool.

Serve sliced and buttered. Enjoy.

Local News From One Hundred Years Ago

You don't see this sort of reporting in the press these days.

'That's not mine!' Thus ejaculated John Reddaway, farmer, of **Belstone**, when the Chairman at Okehampton Petty Sessions informed him that he had a bad record, and that there were twelve previous convictions for cattle straying. Reddaway, who was summoned for allowing three sheep to stray on the highway, said he believed he had only been in the Court about twice previously. Those twelve convictions were not his. What his father did before him, he could not stand for – (laughter).

Supt Gordon: You are John Reddaway?

Defendant; Yes sir. But there is more than one John Reddaway. The question of defendant's age arose, and the Chairman remarked he was 65 years.

Defendant: What!

Supt Gordon: Well, what is it? We have to put your age down. Defendant did not reply.

The police constable who proved the case, said the fences were in good condition, although there was one gap, through which, apparently, the sheep got out. The Bench fined defendant 10s and costs.

It's not hard to see why the court was confused. There are records in the Belstone Archive of John Reddaway being fined for either pigs or cattle straying in 1873, 1883, 1888, 1897 and 1904, but I don't know which JR was involved any more than the court did. The JR of this 1922 case was a farmer who lived at The Lees in the centre of Belstone, where he died in 1928, aged 66. His father John, who JR was blaming for the earlier cases, had lived at The Lees before he died in 1900, aged 75. Further into the past, our man's grandfather, another farmer, was also called John (1786-1846). Our JR had a nephew called John (1891-1957), another farmer, who was known around Belstone as 'Uncle John'. Our JR also had a real uncle called John, born in 1826; he was a butcher, not a farmer. John the butcher had a son, also called John who was a policeman and a cousin of our JR. In all, 11 John Reddaways are recorded in the St Mary's Church baptism records between 1630 and 1891.

Here's another thing that doesn't happen nowadays, having been banned by the Hunting Act in 2004. Hatherleigh Harriers, on the occasion of the meet at the Cawsand Beacon Hotel, **South Zeal**, had two good runs, although there was no kill. The first hare was found near Cawsand Beacon, and led straight on to Creber, near Gidleigh, then back again, and, after running for an hour and fifteen minutes, was lost on Mr Hill's Week Farm. The second hare also provided a good run.

This was the last meet for the season. During the season hounds have accounted for 24 brace of hares.

Back with the courts, a harsh sentence was handed out to Henry Cowler, for the previous 13 years a shunter for the L&SWR railway at **Okehampton**; he was fined £10 11s 3d (around £500 today!) for stealing a 2lb pot of strawberry jam, valued 2s 6d, from Okehampton railway station.

A brief report from **South Zeal**; Several of the new District Council houses at Zeal Head are nearly fit for occupation, the first being occupied this week. The number under construction is ten.

Belstone's plan for a war memorial at the church encountered unexpected opposition, as described in the Okehampton Deanery Magazine by Herbert Wilson Milner, the village's rector; The proposed plan of placing the bronze figure of our Blessed Lord against the outside of the church, approved by the Church Council, and apparently generally acceptable to all, does not meet with the approval of the Bishop. This is most unfortunate, as the expense of the architect's plans has been entailed, and various other expenses. The Bishop urges instead that a rood beam should be erected in the church, and the figure placed there upon a cross, and that we should wait and hope in time to get the customary accompanying figures of our Lady and St John. A meeting of the Church Council is to be held to consider the matter.

We all know that the price of gas has soared recently and is about to translate into higher energy bills as the energy price cap is raised significantly. Interesting then that 100 years ago, the price of gas at **Okehampton** is to be reduced by 8d per thousand cubic feet.
