## New Exhibition of Dartmoor photographs goes on show this summer at Throwleigh

The well-known Dartmoor photographer Chris Chapman, who lives locally at

Throwleigh, has been taking pictures of life around the moor for fifty years. Over this time he has built up a nationally important archive of photographs.

With the support of a grant of £9,647 from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, the members of Providence Methodist Chapel, Throwleigh, will be mounting a special exhibition of Chris Chapman's photographs during a series of open days between June and October. Details of opening times will be announced in May.

lan Crawford, the chapel's project coordinator, said: "We are delighted to be opening our doors this summer to give everyone the chance to see Chris Chapman's wonderful Dartmoor photographs. We look forward to welcoming local families and visitors from further afield, including walkers along the new Archangel Way."

The chapel's heritage project is also being supported by the Methodist Church and Devon County Council. Cllr James McInnes, County Councillor for Hatherleigh and Chagford, said: "This is an important project. Chris Chapman captures the essence of Dartmoor and its residents. It's a rare gift and this project will bring his pictures to a wider audience."

Alongside the exhibition, Providence Methodist Chapel will be hosting a series of talks and running a project to discover more about the families who have been connected with the chapel going back over eight generations to 1839. #### **Weather Watch**

On the TV forecast, or any forecast you will often hear the presenter describe the temperature for the following day and then say something like "that's a few degrees warmer than average". When I began working for The Met Office as an observer, compiling the monthly weather report was part of the job. That involved gathering all of the months data from our twice daily climate reports, checking it over and working out where is sat compared to our long term average, for which we would use the past three decades. Working out the average or mean temperature for the month back then was just a case of working out the average maximum (by adding up the 30 or 31 maximum temperatures for each day then dividing by 30 or 31) and minimum temperatures, adding them together and dividing by two to get the mean.

Nowadays weather stations are more sophisticated, and they will automatically record the temperature every minute. That's why in my stats the mean temperature is not quite the same as the average max and min divided by two. With that in mind I always think its an odd turn of phrase to say that a temperature on any given day is "a little above where it should be", because more often than not the maximum and minimum temperatures will be warmer or colder than the average temperature, and to actually get a temperature bang on average is quite unusual.

As you can tell from me talking about how we work out statistics, March was a pretty quiet month weather wise, certainly nothing like a repeat of Eunice thankfully! Although we did get some lovely warm sunny days which fooled us into thinking spring had sprung, by the end of the month a blast of arctic air brought us some light snow flurries on the 31st, the first "proper" snow flakes I have seen all season!

I don't think I have ever gone through and entire winter season without seeing snow, even in these days of milder winters. I for one am glad that I can still say that. I think it will be a sad day when we have a completely snow free winter, but I expect that time will come within the next few decades.

#### **HMP Dartmoor**

If you care about the fair and humane treatment of prisoners why not consider joining the Independent Monitoring Board at HMP Dartmoor?

In every prison there is an Independent Monitoring Board (IMB) made up of volunteers from the community who are appointed to independently check on conditions in custody. They are independent of the Prison Service and are responsible for monitoring and reporting on behalf of the community.

HMP Dartmoor, in Princetown, is a Category C adult male training prison with around 650 men. The IMB at HMP Dartmoor is currently recruiting and is looking for people from all walks of life who live locally (within 30 miles) to join them.

Board members regularly visit the prison to carry out a range of duties to ensure that people in custody are treated fairly and humanely. Members have unrestricted access to the prison at any time and can talk to any prisoner they wish to, out of sight and hearing of members of staff if necessary. A typical monitoring

visit might include time spent in the kitchens, workshops, accommodation blocks, recreation areas, healthcare centre and chaplaincy. Board members also play an important role in dealing with problems encountered by people in custody such as concerns over lost property, visits from family or friends, special religious or cultural requirements, or serious allegations such as bullying. Importantly, the Board's monitoring at this training prison includes looking at the range of educational and vocational programmes.

Paul Snell, a current IMB member at HMP Dartmoor, says: "You see the criminal justice system from the inside and work as part of a really dedicated IMB team. Anyone over 18 can apply – prisoners come from all backgrounds and so should our members."

You will usually need to give about two to three days a month, but this can be flexible depending on your circumstances. Members are required to attend at least nine of the twelve monthly board meetings.

Whatever your background, if you're enthusiastic and open minded, have good people skills and sound judgement, and have a commitment to independence and inclusion, then you could be the person we are looking for. You don't need any special qualifications or experience, as the Board will provide mentoring, alongside training and support. This is an unpaid voluntary role, but expenses such as travel, childcare and loss of earnings are covered. Appointments to the Board are made by government ministers and you would need to undergo a security check before appointment.



beside the shores of Lake Garda. Pauline would frequently be at the wheel of their car, towing the caravan to Italy. As Norman's eyesight deteriorated, Pauline would drive the entire route. They spent twelve happy summers there, greeting guests and eventually turning to entertaining them on stage with their brilliant Abba performances. Pauline's ability to always work with a smile on her face, and Normans irresistible comic character, inevitably led to them making more friends who would return year after year to the site to enjoy their company.

Eventually poor health forced them to leave Eurocamp and they settled back into Sticklepath full time, where they soon became well known in the village. Pauline played for the Taw River darts team on occasion, tried her hand at patchwork, and still enjoyed her knitting. She was a good artist, and remained active, lively and fun loving right up to her diagnosis of dementia. In 2019 her daughter Linsey moved in with them to give care for her mother. Pauline's infectious laughter and her love of life won her many friends. Her sudden death on the 24th March has shocked many. She passed away peacefully in her sleep at Lakeside Care Home; the family and friends are very appreciative of the care and support given by staff in the Home. She will be sadly missed.

We have also hosted a creative writing workshop at Parke with the Learn Devon team and plans are underway for workshops at Lydford Gorge too. By the time you read this update, both Lydford Gorge and Finch Foundry will have also re-opened but it is always best to check the website for all the latest opening details – storms seem to sneak up on us all at the moment.

We are now well in to ground nesting bird and lambing season. I'd also like to mention the butterflies who are starting to appear from the undergrowth - they definitely need us to be kind to them. #### Dartmoor Diary - The Light of the Rain

The Iris is a lovely thing ...there are so many different kinds. But in common they all have the same wonderful, complex form, and

their liquid transparency is astonishing. The white flag is one of my favourites. It seems to thrive on neglect. All my efforts to refine or enrich the numbers inevitably fail. Left well alone, it does much better than when I get involved.

The light of the rain is a wonderful thing. There isn't a light as soft or diffuse anywhere, and the gift of nuance and tone, and the suggestion of form are all powers that the light of rain has in spades. The gentle light of rain takes a colour and triples it, so the world appears saturated and full of tone.

The white flag Iris is the perfect partner for this miraculous light. Its translucence, sensuous detail and complex texture is perfect for demonstrating its best qualities.

That is what I've been doing today. Marrying the two. Photographing indoors with the irises that I've taken from the allotment that I've soon to surrender. An homage if you like, because I don't know if I'll be successful in bringing them on again. Maybe I will. Maybe I won't. Either way I have the light and for now at least, I have the Irises. I place them together with natural Foxgloves that offer a similar scale, but otherwise couldn't be more different in character.

He'd probably disagree, but Trevor, who gifted my first Iris, a Yellow Marsh Iris, was both a mentor and a great friend. He taught me most of what I needed to know about teaching. And that was simply to care. A modest and gentle man, whose kindness some mistook for weakness, in fact had a fury, a passion and determination to help others. He had a gift for noting where he was needed and he dropped everything to be there immediately.

#### Local News From One Hundred Years Ago – May 1922

There's no doubt about the top local story this month, coming three years after the scheme was first proposed. Under the headline 'Red Letter Day' we read; Friday [26 May] was a proud day for South Zeal and South Tawton, and crowds gathered to witness the laying of the foundation stone of the new Victory Hall at South Zeal. As planned at present the building will consist of one spacious hall, but the hope and intention is to enlarge the scheme later when circumstances permit, by the addition of a reading room and a games room, with probably a billiard table. An excellent site in the centre of the village was generously given by Mr and Mrs George Keener, of South Zeal, and the invitations for subscriptions to defray the cost of the building has been handsomely responded to. After defraying preliminary expenses there was in the hands of the treasurer prior to Friday's ceremony, a sum of £540 towards the £1000, the contract price of the Hall.

The Hall will have a clear inside space of 30 feet by 60 feet. It is being built of Dartmoor granite with cement and rough cast outside, and varnished match-boarding inside. There will be a platform, and provision will be made for movable partitions. It will be well lighted and ventilated, and heating will be by means of large fire grates. The work is being executed by Messrs W Counter and Sons, local builders. The Executive Committee have as chairman Edwin Stanbury, of North Wyke, South Tawton, who became chairman on the death of Mr GD Cann, and who has thrown an immense amount of zeal and energy into the matter.

The principal stone was laid by Mrs Kingsford-Lethbridge, of Wood, and three others were placed in position by Mr and Mrs Keener, Mr Stanbury and Petty-Officer David Rees, representing ex-servicemen, this stone being in remembrance of comrades who fell in the war and whose names will be recorded on a roll of honour to be placed inside the hall. Mr Keener said that was the happiest moment of his life. If they wanted young men to remain on the farms they must provide places

where in their leisure they could amuse and educate themselves. The Victory Hall would, he hoped and believed, provide facilities to that end. Mr Keener handed to the chairman of the Parish Council (Mr W Tucker) the deeds of the site as a free gift to the parish. Mr Stanbury observed that he was born in the parish 65 years ago, and it had always been his wish to do everything he could for its welfare. His father's name was engraved on one of the bells in South Tawton Church tower; his own name was now recorded on one of the Victory Hall stones, and the name of one of his sons [Richard] was inscribed on the roll in the Parish Church of those who fell in the war, so that three generations of his family were memorialised in the parish. He hoped the Hall would prove a real benefit to the present generation of parishioners and to posterity.

Ever since early 1921 Belstone Commoners had been fighting Devon County Council over plans to open a quarry in Belstone Cleave. Now, all of a sudden, it looks like they have another battle on their hands – and unlike the quarry dispute, they were not alone. At South Zeal, some consternation has recently been caused in this district by an Order from the Duchy of Cornwall Authorities prohibiting the removal of fuel etc from Dartmoor. At a public meeting it was unanimously resolved to form a voluntary fund to contest the case should any Commoner be prosecuted. In the meantime parishioners were asked to 'carry on' exactly as in former years. Mr Perryman of Chagford, and George Glanfield, of Belstone, were present, both of these parishes having been similarly warned. As usual, opinions differed; a well known authority on Dartmoor says he does not think that it is a matter of the real peat-cutting being stopped so much as aiming at the prevention of 'skimming'. This 'skimming', he explained, means just removing the surface layer without touching the underlying peat at all. The practice seemed to be particularly common in the Chaaford district, where acre after acre was to be found that had been treated in this manner. It takes anything from ten to twelve years for any herbage to grow again on the land that has been 'skimmed', and has meant the destruction of much pasture land.

In brief. Work on the bowling green in Okehampton's new pleasure ground is nearing completion. The tennis courts are also being prepared with all speed. The turf is being brought from the moor. With the arrival of the 61st Battery, Royal Field Artillery, Okehampton Camp re-opened for the first time since the start of the First World War in 1914. Having made a wager that he could walk from Okehampton to Plymouth instead of returning to school after the Easter holidays, a

schoolboy managed to escape from the custody of his mother whilst walking on the moors. He got as far as Mary Tavy and asked for refreshment. Word was sent to Tavistock police in the meantime, however, and the boy was sent back to Okehampton. #### Thought for food

Spring has sprung and nature is reborn

The curved circle of life has thrived in this mild and relatively dry winter on the edge of the Moor.

January started with dark days and gloom. Nature was asleep. At the end of the month, almost like clockwork, the pond woke up to a chorus of frogs: Hundreds of them. They made a wild mass croak but as soon as they detected human presence the sound stilled. However it was unmistakable as the first sign of new life in a new year. The resulting mass of frog spawn was quickly followed by the arrival of a grey heron. The solitary creature feasts on the newly laid spawn in the following weeks. Nature is cruel.

Over the coming months the spawn turns to tadpoles and these in turn transform into young frogs who are superb hunters of slugs

and snails. Our later plantings of lettuces and other vegetables are well protected by them, in fact it is rare to see a slug in our vegetable garden. Throughout the year, frogs can be found throughout our property wherever there is a bit of dampness. To encourage them we leave small piles of logs, which provide an excellent moist habitat. The abundance of frogs enables another higher predator to survive: The grass snake. As with all predators, they serve a purpose in keeping their prey population healthy and in balance.

February saw an abundance of fungi, particularly in our higher fields bordering the South Tawton Common. These much misunderstood creatures, neither plant nor animal, are one of the most important indicators of soil health. They play an important role in connecting the plant ecology and the geology, helping to build soil fertility.

March was exciting as we were able to stop feeding our cattle hay and let them graze the winter forage rye, which was sown last September. There are many benefits to out wintering cattle and this year ours were indoors for only eight days: This avoids burning diesel to transfer their dung and straw to the fields: Instead they deposit the fertiliser in situ, as nature intended. It also helps to sustain the dung beetle population. These essential creatures pull manure down into the ground, capturing its fertility and carbon. We encourage them by providing them with cattle dung all winter and avoiding the use of cattle worming medication by good grazing practice.

As I write in April, the copper beech tree outside my window has just started to come into leaf. The bees have survived the winter and are already gathering pollen from the abundant willow blossom. Plants which will form a green manure have been sowed to feed the bees, birds, cattle and soil. We have grey and pied wagtails as well as many other birds making nests and the cuckoo flower is in bloom, This means its namesake will shortly arrive from its long journey from warmer climates. By the time you read this, the swallows will have returned to nest, marking the spring time complete. Clarence

### Notes from the minutes of South Tawton Parish Council March meeting

West Devon BC Cllr Lynn Daniel reported that a Council-backed low interest-rate lending scheme can help local home owners to make essential repairs and efficiency improvements to their home. West Devon Borough Council is reminding residents of a local scheme to help with the cost of fixing your home.

#### Victory Hall Committee

Hall improvements have been carried out, with more decorating taking place over the Easter holidays. No members of the public have come forward to join the committee and membership is very low.

As all Cllrs are Trustees for the Village Hall, it was agreed that all Cllrs would become members of the committee and attend meetings when they can. Parish Clerk volunteered to take on the role of Committee Secretary.

#### Platinum Jubilee

Events will take place on 3<sup>rd</sup> June between 12.30 and 6pm on the Recreation Ground Field (or Victory Hall if wet). STPC will provide pasties and buns and attendees are encouraged to 'bring and share' their own food. The Wreckfords will be playing 2 musical sets. A jubilee coin will be given to all U11 children who live in the Parish with any spares available to be purchased. The lighting of the beacon has been approved by the DNPA, Commoners Association and the Furzdon Estate. Permission from the Duchy is still awaited.

#### Beating the Bounds

Event will take place on 28<sup>th</sup> August, Ian Brooker will be asked to lead the walk. A hog roast and pasties/buns along with drinking water will be provided by the council and the Commoners Association will donate a barrel.

#### 20's plenty for Devon (Doc D09/22)

The South Tawton parish community has clearly expressed in the past, and continues to express, its concerns about the impacts of speeding traffic on the residents of the villages. The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) states: A large number of evaluation studies have demonstrated a link between the introduction of 20mph zones and a subsequent reduction in casualties. South Tawton Parish Council is implementing a number of measures to help mitigate the effects of climate change and support opportunities for improved health and wellbeing. A 20mph limit would be consistent with, and would underpin, these measures through, for example, significantly reduced vehicle carbon emissions throughout the villages.

Therefore, in order to:

Increase child and adult activity levels

Promote healthy active travel options (walking and cycling)

Address climate change challenges and opportunities

Reduce accidents and casualties to people and livestock

Reduce inequalities

Lower vehicle emissions

Reduce congestion

Meet the wishes and expectations of the majority of residents South Tawton Parish Council resolve to request Devon County Council to normalise a 20mph limit/zone throughout all residential roads and areas in the villages of South Tawton and South Zeal with the utmost haste.
