## January 2011 Snapshot of People Who Were Homeless or in Foster Care as Children

## **Experiencing Homelessness in the Richmond Region**

The following data were collected in Homeward's thirteenth winter (January 27, 2011) count of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the Richmond region. A total of 943 adults and 159 children were counted, and 75.2% of adults completed the Homeward point-in-time survey. The statistics below represent the 94 individuals who indicated that they were in foster care or homeless as children.

- 68.1% of the people now homeless who experienced homelessness or foster care as children are males, 29.8% are females, and 2.1% are transgender. Most are single, never married adults (67.0%), and 33.0% have been in families, including those who are married, as well as those who are widowed, separated, or divorced.
- 10.6% have children living with them.
- The largest percentage report that they are African-American (48.9%), followed by White (43.5%). 4.4% indicated that they are Hispanic.
- The average age for adults now homeless who experienced homelessness as children or were in foster care is 39.7 years.
- 55.3% have just a high school education or GED. 12.8% attended some college, and 8.6% have a college degree or higher.
- 12.9% are veterans.
- 69.1% have been to jail and/or prison. Of those serving time in jail and/or prison, 49.2% reported having felony convictions, and 34.4% reported being homeless before incarceration.
- 52.7% have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime. Of those experiencing domestic violence, 50.0% had experienced it in the past year.
- 39.4% report having a problem with alcohol sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with alcohol, 62.2% are currently in recovery.
- 40.4% report having a problem with substance abuse sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with substance abuse, 63.2% are currently in recovery.
- 46.2% report having a mental health problem sometime in their lifetime. Of these, 51.2% are currently being treated, and 51.2% are taking medication for mental health problems.
- 50.0% report having a long-term disability. Of those reporting a long-term disability, 42.6% indicated that their disability was drug or alcohol abuse, 70.2% indicated that their disability was a mental illness, and 55.3% indicated that their disability was physical. (Note that respondents could select multiple disability types.).
- 13.8% are employed. Of those who are employed, 25.0% work full-time, 41.7% work part-time, and 33.3% do day labor or temp work.
- The median length of time respondents have lived in Greater Richmond is two and a half years; 23.9% have lived in the area for 17 years or more.
- Most (53.2%) reported having their last housing in Richmond. Others indicated previous housing in Henrico (6.4%), Chesterfield (6.4%) and Hanover (2.1%). 14.9% of respondents last lived elsewhere in Virginia, and 17.0% lived in other states.
- In the past three years, most have been homeless once (47.3%) or twice (28.0%); 24.7% had been homeless three or more times during this time period.
- More than three-fifths (61.5%) have been homeless for five months or less.
