January 2011 Snapshot of Panhandlers

Experiencing Homelessness in the Richmond Region

The following data were collected in Homeward's thirteenth winter (January 27, 2011) count of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the Richmond region. A total of 943 adults and 159 children were counted, and 75.2% of adults experiencing homelessness (709 people) completed the Homeward point-in-time survey. The statistics reported below represent the 12.4% of adults who indicated that they had gotten money in the past year from "panhandling or asking strangers for money."

- 84.1% are males, 14.8% are females, and 1.1% are transgender. Most panhandlers (61.4%) are single, never married adults. 1.1% are married, and 38.6% have been in families, including those who are married, as well as those who are separated, widowed, or divorced.
- None reported having children living with them.
- The highest percentage of respondents report that they are African-American (50.0%), followed by White (38.6%).
- The average age for adults is 43.8 years.
- 54.5% have only a high school education or GED. 25.0% attended some college, and 5.6% have a college degree or higher.
- 20.7% are veterans.
- The majority (88.6%) served some time in jail and/or prison. Out of all individuals surveyed (including those who have not served time in jail and/or prison), 44.3% reported serving time in jail, 5.7% reported serving time in prison, and 38.6% indicated that they had served time in both jail and prison. Of those who served time in jail and/or prison, 55.1% indicated that they were homeless when they last went to jail/prison, and 69.2% indicated that they were homeless upon release.
- 38.4% have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime. Of those experiencing domestic violence, 34.4% had experienced it in the past year.
- 67.4% report having a problem with alcohol sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with alcohol, 62.1% are currently in recovery.
- 62.8% report having a problem with substance abuse sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem, 67.9% are currently in recovery.
- 51.1% report having a mental health problem sometime in their lifetime. Of these, 46.7% are currently being treated and 46.7% are taking medication for mental health problems.
- 62.1% report having a long-term disability.
- 9.2% are employed.
- 19.5% have lived in subsidized or public housing.
- 32.2% reported that they have been evicted from a property at which their name was on the lease.
- 52.9% of respondents have lived in Greater Richmond for more than four years; 29.9% have lived in the area for 15 years or more.
- The highest percentage (51.1%) reported having their last housing in Richmond. Others indicated previous housing in Henrico (8.0%), Chesterfield (2.3%), and Hanover (1.1%). 23.9% of respondents last lived elsewhere in Virginia, and 13.6% lived in other states.
- In the past three years, most homeless persons have been homeless once (43.2%) or twice (22.7%); 34.1% have been homeless three or more times during this time period.
- A little more than half (53.0%) of homeless persons have been homeless for eight months or more.
