## January 2013 Snapshot of Panhandlers

## **Experiencing Homelessness in the Richmond Region**

The following data were collected in Homeward's 15<sup>th</sup> winter (January 24, 2013) count of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the Richmond region. A total of 885 adults and 114 children were counted, and 78.0% of adults experiencing homelessness completed the Homeward point-in-time survey. The statistics reported below represent the 14.5% of adults who indicated that they had gotten money in the past year from "panhandling or asking strangers for money."

- 78.1% are males, and 20.8% are females. Most panhandlers (60.4%) are single, never married adults. 47.1% are or have been in families, including those who are married, as well as those who are separated, widowed, or divorced.
- 6.3% reported having children living with them.
- The highest percentage of respondents report that they are White (50.5%), followed by African-American (42.1%). 6.6% indicated that they are Hispanic.
- The average age for adults is 41.8 years.
- 59.4% have only a high school education or GED. 20.8% attended some college, and 8.4% have a college degree.
- 13.7% are veterans.
- The majority (89.6%) served some time in jail and/or prison. Out of all individuals surveyed (including those who have not served time in jail and/or prison), 59.4% reported serving time in jail, 1.0% reported serving time in prison, and 29.2% indicated that they had served time in both jail and prison. Of those who served time in jail and/or prison, 50.6% indicated that they were homeless when they last went to jail/prison, and 51.8% indicated that they were homeless upon release.
- 37.9% have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime. Of those experiencing domestic violence, 36.7% had experienced it in the past year.
- 59.6% report having a problem with alcohol sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with alcohol, 69.6% are currently in recovery.
- 71.0% report having a problem with drugs sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with drugs, 67.7% are currently in recovery.
- 49.5% report having a mental health problem sometime in their lifetime. Of these, 59.6% are currently being treated, and 61.7% are taking medication for mental health problems. 91.5% are receiving counseling for mental health problems.
- 61.5% report having a long-term disability. Of those reporting a long-term disability, 81.5% indicated that their disability was drug or alcohol abuse; 64.3% indicated that their disability was a mental illness; and 50.9% indicated that their disability was a physical disability. (Note that respondents could select all, some, or none of these options.)
- 9.5% are employed.
- The median length of time respondents have lived in Greater Richmond is 13 years; 48.4% have lived in the area for 15 years or more.
- The largest percentage of respondents (57.9%) reported having their last housing in Richmond. Others indicated previous housing in Henrico (3.2%), Chesterfield (5.3%), and Hanover (3.2%). 15.8% of respondents last lived elsewhere in Virginia, and 12.6% lived in other states.
- In the past three years, most homeless persons have been homeless once (34.4%) or twice (30.2%); 35.5% have been homeless three or more times during this time period.
- A little less than half (49.4%) of homeless persons have been homeless for six months or more.
