## January 2015 Snapshot of Panhandlers

## **Experiencing Homelessness in the Richmond Region**

The following data were collected in Homeward's 17<sup>th</sup> winter (January 28, 2015) count of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the Richmond region. A total of 730 adults and 88 children were counted, and 84.8% of adults completed the Homeward point-in-time survey. The statistics below represent the 17.0% of individuals surveyed who indicated that they had gotten money in the past year from "panhandling or asking strangers for money."

- 75.2% are males, and 23.8% are females. Most panhandlers (59.4%) are single, never married adults. 40.6% are or have been in families, including those who are married, as well as those who are separated, widowed, or divorced.
- 5.0% reported having children living with them.
- The highest percentage of respondents report that they are African-American (49.5%), followed by White (44.4%). 5.2% indicated that they are Hispanic.
- The average age for adults is 45.4 years.
- 51.5% have only a high school education or GED. 21.8% attended some college, and 6.8% have a college degree or higher.
- 17.2% are veterans.
- The majority (85.6%) served some time in jail and/or prison. Out of all individuals surveyed (including those who have not served time in jail and/or prison), 51.3% reported serving time in jail, 1.3% reported serving time in prison, and 32.9% indicated that they had served time in both jail and prison. Of those who served time in jail and/or prison, 47.7% indicated that they were homeless when they last went to jail/prison, and 58.5% indicated that they were homeless upon release.
- 38.6% have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime. Of those experiencing domestic violence, 40.7% had experienced it in the past year.
- 73.7% report having a problem with alcohol sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with alcohol, 60.7% are currently in recovery.
- 73.7% report having a problem with drugs sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with drugs, 66.1% are currently in recovery.
- 48.7% report having a mental health problem sometime in their lifetime. Of these, 62.2% are currently being treated, and 48.6% are taking medication for mental health problems. 89.2% have received counseling for mental health problems at some time.
- 50.6% report having a long-term disability. Of those reporting a long-term disability, 68.9% indicated that their disability was drug or alcohol abuse; 50.0% indicated that their disability was a mental illness; and 52.3% indicated that their disability was a physical disability. (Note that respondents could select all, some, or none of these options.)
- 14.3% are employed.
- The median length of time respondents have lived in Greater Richmond is eight years; 35.6% have lived in the area for 20 years or more.
- The largest percentage of respondents (50.0%) reported having their last housing in Richmond. Others indicated previous housing in Henrico (5.3%) and Chesterfield (7.9%). 11.8% of respondents last lived elsewhere in Virginia, and 23.7% lived in other states.
- In the past three years, these persons have been homeless once (43.0%) or twice (22.0%); 35.0% have been homeless three or more times during this time period.
- A little more than half (52.7%) of homeless persons have been homeless for nine months or less.
