## January 2017 Snapshot of People Who Were Homeless or in Foster Care as Children

## **Experiencing Homelessness in the Richmond Region**

The following data were collected in Homeward's  $19^{\text{th}}$  winter (January 25, 2017) count of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the Richmond region. A total of 606 adults and 56 children were counted, and 80.5% of adults completed the Homeward point-in-time survey. The statistics below represent the 11.1% of individuals who indicated that they were homeless or in foster care as children.

- 65.4% of adults are males, and 34.6% are females. Most are single, never married adults (74.1%). 25.9% have been in families, including those who are married, as well as those who are widowed, separated, or divorced.
- 11.5% have children living with them.
- The largest percentage report that they are African-American (47.2%), followed by White (37.7%). 7.4% indicated that they are Hispanic.
- The average age for adults now homeless who experienced homelessness as children or were in foster care is 38.2 years.
- 49.3% have just a high school education or GED. 15.1% attended some college, and 18.9% have a college degree or higher.
- 19.6% are veterans.
- 71.2% have been to jail and/or prison. Of those serving time in jail and/or prison, 33.3% reported having felony convictions, and 52.4% reported being homeless before incarceration.
- 40.7% have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime. Of those experiencing domestic violence, 45.5% had experienced it in the past year.
- 37.0% report having a problem with alcohol sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with alcohol, 65.0% are currently in recovery.
- 37.0% report having a problem with drugs sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with drugs, 89.5% are currently in recovery.
- 53.7% report having a mental health problem sometime in their lifetime. Of these, 55.2% are currently being treated, and 44.8% are taking medication for mental health problems. 89.7% have also received counseling for mental health problems at some time in their lifetime.
- 37.5% report having a long-term disability. Of those reporting a long-term disability, 55.6% indicated that their disability was drug or alcohol abuse; 72.2% indicated that their disability was a mental illness; and 64.7% indicated that their disability was a physical disability. (Note that respondents could select all, some, or none of these options.)
- 25.9% are employed. Of those who are employed, 14.3% do day labor or temporary work, 35.7% work part-time, and 50.0% work full-time.
- The median length of time respondents have lived in Greater Richmond is one year, and 25.0% have lived in the area for 10 or more years.
- The largest percentage of respondents (40.8%) reported having their last housing in Richmond. Others indicated previous housing in Henrico (8.2%) and Hanover (2.0%). 14.3% of respondents last lived elsewhere in Virginia, and 30.6% lived in other states.
- In the past three years, most homeless adults have been homeless once (57.4%) or twice (9.3%); 33.3% had been homeless three or more times during this time period.
- A little more than half (52.6%) have been homeless for five months or less.
