## July 2012 Snapshot of People Who Were Homeless or in Foster Care as Children

## **Experiencing Homelessness in the Richmond Region**

The following data were collected in Homeward's sixth summer (July 26, 2012) count of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the Richmond region. A total of 772 adults and 135 children were counted, and 83.5% of adults completed the Homeward point-in-time survey. The statistics below represent the 12.6% of individuals who indicated that they were homeless or in foster care as children.

- 67.1% of the people now homeless who experienced homelessness or foster care as children are males, 32.9% are females. Most are single, never married adults (59.5%). 40.5% have been in families, including those who are married, as well as those who are widowed, separated, or divorced.
- 16.0% have children living with them.
- A majority report that they are African-American (57.1%), followed by White (35.1%). 6.8% indicated that they are Hispanic.
- The average age for adults now homeless who experienced homelessness as children or were in foster care is 40.2 years.
- 54.3% have just a high school education or GED. 25.9% attended some college, and 3.7% have a college degree or higher.
- 25.7% are veterans.
- 75.3% have been to jail and/or prison. Of those serving time in jail and/or prison, 59.6% reported having felony convictions, and 33.3% reported being homeless before incarceration.
- 30.4% have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime. Of those experiencing domestic violence, 41.7% had experienced it in the past year.
- 53.2% report having a problem with alcohol sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with alcohol, 71.4% are currently in recovery.
- 45.5% report having a problem with drug abuse sometime in their lifetime. Of those reporting a problem with drug abuse, 85.7% are currently in recovery.
- 41.8% report having a mental health problem sometime in their lifetime. Of these, 51.6% are currently being treated, and 39.4% are taking medication for mental health problems.
- 41.7% report having a long-term disability. Of those reporting a long-term disability, 63.6% indicated that their disability was drug or alcohol abuse; 55.6% indicated that their disability was a mental illness; and 48.1% indicated that their disability was a physical disability. (Note that respondents could select all, some, or none of these options.)
- 29.5% are employed. Of those who are employed, 38.9% work full-time.
- The median length of time respondents have lived in Greater Richmond is two years, and 18.4% have lived in the area for more than 20 years.
- Most (41.6%) reported having their last housing in Richmond. Others indicated previous housing in Henrico (11.7%), and Chesterfield (2.6%). 20.8% of respondents last lived elsewhere in Virginia, and 22.1% lived in other states.
- In the past three years, most have been homeless once (56.8%) or twice (23.5%); 19.8% had been homeless three or more times during this time period.
- Less than half (46.4%) have been homeless for three months or less.
