Our alumni have been back in school regularly throughout the term, offering incredible work experience opportunities and advice and support across a range of careers including technology, construction, advertising, finance, energy, transport, engineering, and public service. We also report back on another excellent year of GCSE and A Level results, our amazing student trip to China, and kicking the festive season off in style with the annual Christmas concert.

Robert Clack School celebrates exceptional GCSE success

We are delighted to share that students at Robert Clack have delivered the school's strongest-ever GCSE results, with improvement across every key performance measure—despite national outcomes falling for the fourth consecutive year.

Robert Clack's results are significantly above national averages. An impressive 76.4% of all entries achieved grade 4 or above (compared with the national figure of 67.4% and the London average of 71.6%), while 25.8% of entries were awarded grade 7 or higher (exceeding the national average of 23%). These achievements are particularly noteworthy given that Robert Clack is the largest comprehensive school in the country, with 480 Year 11 students sitting GCSE examinations.

In total, 21 pupils earned grades 7 to 9 in every subject they studied, and we are especially proud of two students who achieved an exceptional eight grade 9s. Additionally, more than a third of pupils secured grades 5 to 9 across all their subjects. Three-quarters attained at least a grade 4 in both English and Maths, and over half of the cohort achieved grade 5 or above in these core subjects.

Russell Taylor, Executive Headteacher, said: "As national results continue their downward adjustment to pre-Covid levels, I am thrilled that, at Robert Clack, we have sustained year-on-year improvement, and with our largest-ever cohort of 480 students. I would like to wish our students the very best of luck for the next stage of their education in our outstanding sixth form. I also want to express my gratitude to our staff, governors and parents for their unwavering dedication to our children."

Robert Clack continues its success with outstanding A Level results
Robert Clack students have once again excelled, achieving impressive outcomes in A Level, Vocational, and Tech Level qualifications. As a result, around 140 students are set to begin university courses this September.

A large number of students will be progressing to universities across the country to study a diverse range of degree subjects, including aeronautics and astronautics, biochemistry, computer science, economics, engineering, history, physics, and psychology.

We are particularly delighted that three students have secured places to study medicine, two have earned places in dentistry, and ten have been accepted to study law.

Many students have also gained places at prestigious Russell Group universities, with a significant number choosing leading London institutions such as Imperial College, King's College London, Queen Mary University of London, and LSE. We are equally pleased to see students heading to renowned universities further afield, including Warwick, Durham, Nottingham, Southampton, and Birmingham.

Several students opted to pursue highly competitive degree apprenticeships and have been offered placements with organisations such as TFL and top construction and insurance firms. In A Level qualification, students achieved an average grade of B-. Notably, twenty students (26%) attained the 'gold standard' of AAB or higher, and ten students achieved grades equivalent to AAA or above.

For Vocational and Tech Level qualifications, the average result was a Distinction. Fifteen students (27%) were awarded grades equivalent to Distinction-Distinction-Distinction or higher, and one student achieved the exceptional level of Distinction*-Distinction*-Distinction*.

These results are a major milestone for Robert Clack students and set them on course for bright futures full of opportunities. Well done to all.

An unforgettable adventure: Robert Clack's first-ever trip to China

On 19 July, 58 excited students and staff set off on an extraordinary journey—the school's first trip to China.

After a long flight, tired faces were quickly replaced with smiles of anticipation as we landed in Beijing. From there, we travelled to Tianjin, our home for the week, where we settled into the warm and welcoming campus of Tianjin Normal University. Our first day was spent exploring the university grounds and getting familiar with our surroundings—a perfect beginning to an unforgettable adventure.

Over the following six days, students immersed themselves in Chinese culture, language, and traditions alongside new friends from China and the United States. Each day brought a rich mix of learning and exploration, and the enthusiasm, curiosity, and energy from everyone involved were truly inspiring.

Highlights of the trip included:

- Martial arts training
- A visit to the National Maritime Museum of China
- Creative Chinese art workshops
- A trip to the picturesque town of Yangliuging
- Vibrant traditional dragon dancing
- Exploring China Stone Park, where students experienced local crafts, flavours, and history

Student Reflections

Another shared: "It was a helpful experience because we could hear someone's personal story from when they were in our position at school. A third added: "I found it very helpful, as everyone there had followed the same path I aspire to. Hearing their personal stories and challenges made it much easier to relate."

I hope to return to the school again early next year with an electric bus, so that my team and I can talk to students again and give them an even closer look at the work that goes on behind the scenes to keep the capital's public transport moving."

This event demonstrates our ongoing commitment to providing students with the guidance and inspiration they need to achieve excellence. Notably, three Year 11 students who attended last year's Careers Day have since secured engineering apprenticeships with the Stagecoach bus group—an achievement that highlights just how life-changing these opportunities can be.



Three Year 11 students secure apprenticeships with Stagecoach Bus Group

We are delighted to share that three of our former Year 11 students have officially secured apprenticeships with Stagecoach Bus Group!

In March, students across all three sites were given a unique opportunity to explore exciting careers in both engineering and driving, thanks to a visit from Stagecoach arranged through our alumni network. Stagecoach representatives arrived with a brand-new bus and delivered engaging presentations to our Year 11 cohort. Among the speakers was former student Callum Ferris, who left Robert Clack in 2019 and is now thriving as a Stagecoach apprentice—an inspiring example for our current students.

Engineering specialists spoke about the wide range of opportunities within the sector, including the growing demand for hybrid and electric vehicle expertise. Driving professionals shared insights into the qualifications and skills required to become a bus driver, while the recruitment team introduced Stagecoach's apprenticeship programme and explained the selection process.

During the visit three Year 11 students, Charlie S, Ellis M, and Dilpreet S, expressed a strong interest in the engineering pathway. After successfully completing the interview and assessment stages, the students faced the final hurdle: waiting for their GCSE results. Upon receiving them, all three were officially enrolled onto the apprenticeship programme, where they continue to progress and flourish.

This achievement highlights the remarkable impact of partnerships between local businesses and our alumni community. When these networks work together, they create real opportunities that can shape the futures of our young people.

Our collaboration with Stagecoach continues to strengthen, and we look forward to seeing more students follow in the footsteps of Callum, Charlie, Ellis and Dilpreet. We wish them every success in their careers and hope they will return to school in the future to inspire the next generation.



Alumnus Jamie Coughlan speaks to Year 11 student about the realities of firefighting

After Year 11 student Jack R expressed an interest in becoming a firefighter, our Development Officer, Ellen Monk, immediately searched our alumni network to find someone who could offer guidance on the best route into the profession. Jamie Coughlan, who has been a firefighter for 15 years, was delighted to speak with Jack about his journey into the service, what day-to-day life as a firefighter looks like, and the skills and fitness levels needed to meet the entry requirements.

On Tuesday 8 December, Jamie and Jack met via Teams to discuss what Jamie described as "one of the best jobs in the world." Jamie spoke passionately about his career, explaining how much he enjoys the variety and challenge of the role—no two days are ever the same. He shared that he knew from a young age that he didn't want an office job; he wanted something exciting, community-focused, and rewarding.

Jamie also talked honestly about the emotional demands of the job, as well as the pride and fulfilment that comes with saving lives. He encouraged Jack to focus on his education, noting that strong GCSE grades make the entry process easier.

He also stressed the importance of physical fitness and even offered to design a strength-building programme to help Jack prepare for the physical assessments. He reminded Jack that it's okay to make mistakes—no one gets everything right the first time. The important thing is to acknowledge them and learn from them.

Jack came prepared with thoughtful questions, including whether having another skill, such as mechanics, would be useful. Jamie explained that this is an excellent idea, as many firefighters take on second jobs due to shift patterns, and mechanical skills can be particularly valuable within the service.

Jamie has generously offered to meet with Jack again in three months, and there may also be an opportunity for Jack and his family to visit the fire station.

Former student inspires Year 12with insight into management consultancy

Throughout his talk, Luqmaan highlighted the importance of curiosity and being open to new opportunities. He reminded students that career paths often evolve from unexpected interests, and that learning continues long after school or university.
