## Stagecoach London donates bus to Robert Clack School for library project

Robert Clack School has received a generous donation from Stagecoach London in the form of a decommissioned bus, which is set to be transformed into a magical cafe and vibrant new library for primary school students.

The idea for the mobile library originated with the school's Business Manager, Emily Lines. It all started after a conversation with staff member and Alumni Trustee, Teri Webster, who contacted Stagecoach where her daughter, Georgia Webster, also an alumna, works as Communications Manager for London, about the possibility of acquiring a bus to convert into a dedicated reading space. Stagecoach responded favourably and donated one of their retired buses just before the Easter break.

The bus generated lots of excitement among staff and students alike. With the vehicle now on-site, the next phase begins —fundraising and planning the transformation of the bus into a fully equipped, engaging learning environment. In a thoughtful gesture, Stagecoach also provided a personalised destination blind, proudly reading "Robert Clack School" along with the bus number, "21" reflecting the year the primary school first opened, 2021. On Wednesday 25 June, the Engineering Director of Stagecoach, Mark Wallis and Georgia Webster attended an official handover of the bus at the school's primary site on Lymington Fields. They were joined by Executive Head Teacher and Alumni Trustee Russell Taylor, alongside Emily Lines and Teri Webster. Emily shared her ideas and plans, explaining how she aimed to create a welcoming and inspiring space where the youngest students can fall in love with reading. Her vision is to transform the bus into a mobile café and library, giving children a cosy place right on school grounds to enjoy stories with friends, spark their imaginations, and develop a lifelong love of books.

"I was honoured when Mr. Russell Taylor asked me to lead the primary phase of our school in 2021 and I am fortunate enough to lead a team whose shared belief in our school's core values, knowledge, and care, drive everything we do, said Emily. Balancing this additional leadership responsibility with my role as School Business Manager has been a challenging but truly rewarding experience.

With school budgets under constant pressure, resources are limited, so we're incredibly grateful to Stagecoach for their generous donation of the bus and the ongoing support we have received from them especially Georgia and Mark. It's allowed us to turn a vision into something real and meaningful that our children can benefit from. This library isn't just a creative idea it's a response to a real need. In Barking and Dagenham, only 69% of pupils meet the expected reading standard at Key Stage 2 (Age 11). And with so many children growing up behind iPad screens, we want to give them something real: the joy of stories, a spark of imagination, and the confidence that comes from reading. Again, without this generous donation from Stagecoach this vision would not be becoming a reality. We are truly thankful to everyone that supports our project."

Russell Taylor extended his thanks and gratitude to Stagecoach saying, "At Robert Clack School, we believe in creating opportunities that inspire a lifelong love of learning. This generous donation from Stagecoach London is more than just a bus, it's a symbol of community spirit and innovation. By transforming it into a library and café, we're giving our youngest children a space where imagination can flourish and stories come to life. We are deeply grateful to Stagecoach and all those supporting this project, which will leave a lasting legacy for generations of pupils to come."

Mark Wallis added, "This bus donation is a great example of our communityfocused work with Robert Clack School, and we're proud to support something that sparks curiosity and creativity in young minds. It's a school that holds real meaning for us - many of our employees attended Robert Clack themselves - so being able to give something back is especially rewarding. Whether it's through encouraging apprenticeships, giving career talks, or repurposing a bus into a reading hub for primary students, we want to show children that learning and opportunity take many forms. It's all about helping them see what's possible, no matter where they start."

## Robert Clack Alumni Entrepreneur Academy: Celebrating young talent and innovation

Robert Clack's budding entrepreneurs were thrilled to participate in this year's Entrepreneur Academy, a unique initiative launched by the Development Trust Trustees back in 2017. Designed to help students realise their entrepreneurial potential, the academy is supported by the school's Business Department and real-life entrepreneurs from the Alumni Association.

#### Entrepreneur Academy (cont.)

These experienced mentors deliver a series of workshops, before students embark on their own ideas, to equip them with the skills necessary to create successful, profitable businesses.

The students were tasked with a challenge from the Business Department: create a product or service suitable for 16-21-yearolds. The brief was clear but open-ended: the product could target either male, female, or both genders and could be an invention or innovation. The students were not given a specific budget but were asked to research and record costs. The products needed to be applicable to individuals' attending college or university.

With this brief in mind, our alumni volunteers led a series of workshops to guide the students through the key concepts of entrepreneurship, from idea generation to product development. The workshops covered crucial skills that would help transform their ideas into a successful business venture.

One of the academy's regular supporters, Tina Dulieu (Class of 1975), an awardwinning business coach, spoke to the students about evaluating their business ideas, the tools needed to start a business, and how to make it a success.

Another frequent supporter, Jamie Mason (Class of 2008), who now works as an Agency Account Director at Clear Channel UK and is involved with The Brixton Finishing School, also contributed his expertise. Jamie, alongside his colleague Jordan Smith, also an Accounts Director, provided an exciting opportunity earlier in the year for the students to visit the offices of Clear Channel UK. The visit offered a deep dive into digital advertising, as well as a session on the art of presentations, encouraging students to step out of their comfort zones and engage actively.

Students also had the opportunity to hear from other alumni entrepreneurs:

- Azmir Khan (Year 13) spoke about his involvement in his brother's online tutoring business and how he promotes it.
- Anish Vara (Class of 2020) shared his career journey from running a trainer sourcing business to becoming an underwriter at RSA.
- Jamie Coughlan (Class of 2009), now a firefighter and business owner in the supplements market, spoke about staying on trend in the business world.
- **Daniel Perry** (Class of 1996) discussed the challenges of transitioning from corporate life to entrepreneurship.
- Rob Gilbert (Class of 1996), MD at Totalmobile, shared insights on the future of field service.

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#### Entrepreneur Academy (cont.)

Following these sessions, the students were divided into seven teams and set off to create their own business ideas. After brainstorming, designing, and researching costs, they were ready to present their concepts to a panel of judges made up of alumni, industry experts, staff, and even a celebrity! The panel included Tina Dulieu, Jamie Mason, Jordan Smith, Dean Franklin, owner of ADL Air Conditioning and candidate on this year's Apprentice, Farren Joseph, former student and Head of Sixth Form. Zara Azad, Head of Business, Kate Graves, Business Teacher, Ellen Monk, Alumni Development Officer, and Teri Webster, former student and Alumni Trustee and Communications Lead.

The atmosphere during the presentations was electric as students showcased their ideas. Each group demonstrated impressive professionalism and creativity, presenting solutions for a variety of needs. The ideas included:

- Pitchmate: An app helping users find nearby football pitches, including details on availability and pricing. The team showed great preparation, providing handouts to judges and confidently answering questions.
- Textbook: A platform for buying, selling, or swapping school supplies, textbooks, and revision resources, reducing waste and giving old materials a second life. Students answered questions about pricing and advertising with ease.

- Skill Swap +: A concept for skillsharing and swapping services, depending on membership, the more access to more skill sets. Students handed out leaflets and gave judges a QR code for more information. The presentation was energetic and well delivered.
- Project Red: Wearable devices designed to help individuals in dangerous situations, discreetly collecting evidence such as audio, video, or GPS data. The team's visual presentation and advert demonstrated the product's potential in emergency situations.
- Elev8: A natural energy drink aimed at improving cognitive performance, with ingredients that help students perform better in exams. The team presented a well-researched idea, offering QR codes for more product information.
- Elevate London: A service providing aspiring young athletes from deprived backgrounds access to high-quality sports equipment. The team's presentation was confident, with a thoughtful response to questions.
- Sipsure: A life-saving device disguised as a straw that detects harmful substances in drinks. Students presented a demo and handled tough questions, including some from Headteacher Mr. Russell Taylor, showing impressive research and confidence.

After all teams presented, the panel faced a tough decision. Following deliberation, the judges unanimously decided that Sipsure should take first place, with Pitchmate as the runner-up.

As always, our students didn't disappoint. The level of creativity and professionalism in the presentations was truly outstanding and we saw some groundbreaking ideas. The future of entrepreneurship is undoubtably in good hands.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to our panel of judges for their time and invaluable feedback. The Entrepreneur Academy would not be possible without your support, expertise, and wealth of knowledge.

Special congratulations to Dean Franklin (Class of 2008), winner of this year's, The Apprentice! Your success is truly inspiring, and we couldn't be prouder. This prestigious recognition is testament to his hard work and commitment.

Paul has been a pillar of our school's sporting life since joining Robert Clack in 2002.

Starting out in part-time coaching roles, he quickly became a familiar and inspiring presence across our sporting community. In 2013, he joined the staff full-time—and hasn't looked back since. His passion for sport extends beyond the school gates, as Paul also dedicates his weekends to umpiring, coaching at Dagenham Rugby Club, and organising cricket sessions on Friday evenings, ensuring all who participate have every opportunity to thrive.

Paul's tireless efforts over the years have not gone unnoticed. He was honoured with a 'Chance to Shine' special recognition award in 2016 for his contributions to cricket, followed by the Essex RFU Unsung Hero award in 2022. Now, his impact has been recognised at the highest level with the prestigious British Empire Medal.

On Friday 4th April, Paul and his wife Maggie attended a formal presentation ceremony at the Tower of London, where he received the medal from Dr. Kenneth Olisa OBE, Lord Lieutenant of London. During the ceremony, Dr Olisa shared fond memories of his own visit to Robert Clack—a special moment for both men. The celebration continued with a well-deserved lunch at the Dickens Inn, overlooking St Katharine's Dock.

Tendayi and Laiba began the session by reflecting on their own paths from Robert Clack to university, offering a relatable and motivational introduction. They provided an honest and informative overview of the application process, including:

- Preparing for entrance exams (UCAT/BMAT)
- Navigating the application timeline
- Succeeding at interviews and assessment days
- Gaining work experience and writing strong personal statements

Their first-hand insights and practical advice gave students a clearer understanding of what to expect and how to prepare for these competitive courses.

Both speakers are passionate advocates for widening participation in higher education. They spoke powerfully about the importance of representation in healthcare and the significance of giving back to their former school community. Their words left a lasting impression on students and staff alike. To end the session, students engaged in a hands-on activity, role-playing mock consultations between doctors and patients. These interactive case studies brought medical history-taking and diagnostic skills to life and encouraged enthusiastic participation.

The workshop was a fantastic opportunity for students to gain relevant knowledge, build confidence, and feel inspired.

## Year 10 Interview Day 2025: A resounding success across all three sites

On Thursday 10 July our Year 10 students took part in the highly anticipated annual Interview Day - an event held simultaneously across all three school sites and designed to give students a realistic and valuable introduction to the world of professional interviews.

We were proud to welcome an incredible group of alumni and employers from a diverse range of industries including Savills Property International, Senior Livery Company, a Captain and Master Aviator from British Airways, USA Fisher Investments, a CEO from the Savoy and Claridges Hotels, the Educational Trust and Head of Hospitality from Chelsea FC - who has offered one of our students a ball boy job! - to name but a few. These professionals generously volunteered their time to put students through mock interviews that mirrored real-world scenarios, offering immediate feedback and a performance score out of 25.

Among our dedicated alumni volunteers were Richard Harrington, Melissa Pepper, Jeff Stafford, Chris Marshall, Jo Reeves, Divine Joseph, Ashmeet Virdi, Rhyanna Williams and Noor Rahim who returned to support the next generation of professionals and inspire them with insights from their own career journeys. The sessions not only tested the students' communication and interpersonal skills but also encouraged them to reflect on their future ambitions.

Over the course of the day around 540 students took part in the interviews. The results were outstanding, with a majority achieving performance scores of 25/25.

All students who received full marks were recognised in assembly with a special Outstanding PSHE/Careers Achievement Certificate, a well-earned accolade for their exceptional performance.

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#### Year 10 Interview Day (cont.)

Feedback from interviewers on the day was very positive:

"I was very impressed by the students; most of them seemed so much more confident and assured of themselves from what I remember when I was their age! Strong interpersonal skills, breadth of knowledge, and a lot of clear awareness and direction of their interests and what they'd like to do. Overall, very impressed with the performance of the school. Looks like you all are taking the mission of nurturing the next generation of leaders very seriously!"

The event began with a warm welcome from Pete Goyette, Director of Sport, who introduced this year's distinguished guests. Pete expressed sincere appreciation for the dedicated PE staff, who generously volunteer their time to lead extra-curricular clubs and support students during fixtures, as well as gratitude to the students for their commitment, and parents for their ongoing support.

He also acknowledged the vital backing from the Senior Leadership Team, emphasising. "Without their support, the opportunities your children receive simply wouldn't be possible. Barry worked at the school for over 35 years and laid the foundations that we continue to build upon today.

He is still a huge supporter of the school; he regularly attends fixtures and offers advice to staff and students alike.

We were also delighted to welcome former student Billy Driver. Billy initially came to Robert Clack in Year 7 as a footballer, but it wasn't long before Mr Cook spotted his quick feet, strong spatial awareness, and mental toughness, marking the start of his rugby journey. Throughout his time at the school, Billy won multiple Essex titles, earned county representation, and played for Clack with great honour and distinction. He was also selected for Harlequins, where he played for seven years. Billy then joined Barking, then spent two years at Southend before returning to his hometown club, Dagenham, at age 28. There he played a key role in leading the club through its most successful five-year period in history.

Billy's impact went beyond his sporting achievements. He remained at Clack for sixth form, earning high grades that secured his place at St Mary's Sports University. Today he co-owns and runs one of the largest sports coaching companies in the area. Billy is not only a shining example of a Dagenham lad who made the most of the opportunities provided by Robert Clack and sport, but he is also an outstanding role model. Our young athletes could certainly learn a lot from his journey!

The ceremony began with the prestigious presentation of colours, awarded to the topperforming athletes across each year group. Year 7 students received socks, Year 8 shorts, and Year 9 rugby shirts, each symbolising exceptional commitment and achievement among a cohort of over 540 students per year group. The pride on the recipients' faces was a joy to see.

Individual awards followed, recognising talent in cricket, football, netball, dance, athletics, and rugby. Students were celebrated as Players, Dancers, Athletes, and Most Improved Players of the Year. The highlight was the presentation of the overall Sports Person and runners-up, acknowledging all those who excelled across all sports.

The evening was also a celebration of an extraordinary year of sporting success across a wide range of sport, highlighting the dedication and determination shown by students in everything they took part in. The event concluded with two inspiring speeches.

Firstly, Billy Driver expressed his gratitude to the PE department for inviting him back to be part of such a prestigious occasion. He shared, "If I hadn't come to Robert Clack School, I wouldn't be where I am today. The support I received from all my teachers was incredible—especially from the PE staff. I'll never forget when Mr Cook drove all the way to Norwich to pick me up while I was on holiday, just so I could play in a rugby match —and then took me back! That's real dedication. I feel truly privileged to have been a student here. You're all lucky to be part of this school. Cherish these memories they'll stay with you forever. Thank you again!"

Finally, Russell Taylor brought the evening to a close by commending the dedication of the PE department. He noted that the story of Mr Cook going above and beyond to drive to Norwich was no surprise to him. Mr Cook has devoted his life not only to the school's rugby program but also to his work throughout the borough. We were proud to see this dedication recognised earlier this year when he was awarded the British Empire Medal—an honour well deserved.

Russell also reflected on memorable sporting moments, recalling a rugby match involving Billy against a school famous for its rugby excellence. Despite a tough 50-0 loss, the determination and resilience shown by the boys was remarkable. They never gave up, held their heads high, and came back even stronger in the following game. Our students embody our school motto, 'Forti Difficile Nihil,' "For the Brave, Nothing is Difficult." Always strive to be a winner and never give up!

One student reflected on her experience with pride, saying;

"Our tutor, Mr Rolf Hellebust. Wow—what an honour to be taught by him, with his comparative literature, eccentric teaching, and insightful lessons. At first, I think we were all slightly anxious hearing the words 'university level,' 'PhD tutor,' and 'final essay.' But as soon as I walked into that first session in January, I knew that I had been blessed. Whoever has the privilege of being taught by him next is in for a good run.

When I look back at my sixth form time, when I'm old, hunched, and grey, this experience will stand out as one of the best in Year 12."

This programme continues to be a transformative experience for all involved, giving students a glimpse into academic life at top universities and strengthening their university applications through both skills development and confidence building.
