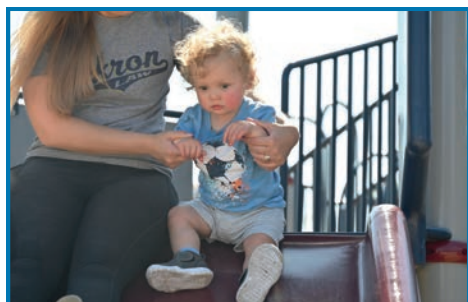


Early Intervention Playdate

VOICE, which stands for Valued Options, Independence, Choices, and Education, empowers individuals with developmental disabilities to build confidence and speak up for themselves while forming strong community bonds. The picnic offered the perfect setting for these values to come to life.

Attendees enjoyed a delicious lunch, meaningful conversations about self-advocacy, and a karaoke session that had everyone smiling and singing along. It was a wonderful reminder of the power of community and the importance of giving every voice the opportunity to be heard.



Smoke the Bus Event

In August, our Transportation Department was proud to partner with the Howland Fire Department and our staff for a hands-on training session that brought safety planning to life.

During the training, school bus scenarios were simulated with smoke and a rollover, where staff practiced evacuating students, including those in specialized safety seating under real-world conditions. Our transportation team, bus drivers, and aides joined firefighters in small teams to drill response steps together. The goal was to build confidence, coordination, and a shared understanding of how best to respond when every second counts.

Staff saw firsthand what challenges could occur and practiced adaptations for individuals with different mobility needs or seating configurations.

We are grateful to all who took part for their dedication and courage. Together, we made our community stronger.

Mobile Response Stabilization Services

We are excited to share information about MRSS — Mobile Response & Stabilization Services, a program offered through Alta Care Group that provides immediate, on-site behavioral health support for youth and families in crisis.

On April 21, 2025, Governor DeWine announced the statewide, regional expansion of Mobile Response & Stabilization Services. As part of this initiative, Alta Care Group was selected as the Region 7 Provider of MRSS in Mahoning and Trumbull Counties.

In addition, beginning September 2, 2025, Alta partnered with the Region 11 Provider, OhioGuidestone, to serve as the MRSS responding provider for Columbiana County on weekdays from 8 AM to 8 PM. Alta also selected Coleman Health Services to serve as the MRSS responding provider for Trumbull County during the same weekday hours. Together, regional MRSS providers ensure 24/7 availability to respond to youth in crisis across each county of coverage.

What is MRSS?	MRSS is a team of licensed clinicians and support staff who can respond within about 60 minutes to emotional or behavioral crises wherever the youth is located (home, school, etc.). They offer short-term support aimed at stabilizing the situation, connecting families to ongoing services, and helping reduce risk.
Who is MRSS for?	MRSS is for anyone going through a behavioral situation under the age of 18, as well as everyone involved including families and school staff. For families, Alta's MRSS team can help de-escalate situations in homes and school staff can use MRSS to de-escalate situations on site as well as receive continued support when necessary.
