Mass Intentions		Live Out Our Baptism Call	
Monday, January 12th 8:15am Anne Thomas		<p>Today marks the close of the Christmas season, but before we return to Ordinary Time, we have one more great feast to celebrate — The Baptism of the Lord. Today's feast is a perfect opportunity to consider the privileges and responsibilities we all share as Christian stewards by virtue of our own Baptism.</p> <p>At the moment of our Baptism, we became adopted sons and daughters of God, members of his holy, Catholic Church. Though we may not have realized it, the moment of our Baptism is also the moment we become Christian stewards, disciples of Jesus Christ, tasked with the work of following in His footsteps day by day and sharing the Gospel message with all those around us.</p> <p>In our second reading from the Acts of the Apostles, St. Peter gives us a glimpse of the person of Jesus we should imitate. "He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him." We must live our lives like Jesus, seeking to do good to everyone we encounter; not just those in our inner circle of family and friends, but everyone in our community since the Father loves us all and Jesus sought out everyone with His saving message.</p> <p>In the Gospel passage from Matthew, we see yet another aspect of Jesus in action, this time as he humbly stands before John to be baptized by him. What humility and what willingness to unite Himself to us our Lord demonstrates by this act. We can do no less as we live out our daily lives as his disciples.</p> <p>And when we do strive with all our might to live out our Baptismal call to Christian stewardship, we will experience the deep honor of knowing that we, too, are God's "beloved" sons and daughters "with whom He is well-pleased."</p> <p>-copyright: Catholic Stewardship Consultants, www.CatholicSteward.com</p>

From the Desk of Father Justin

Welcome, one and all, to the 2025 edition of the Father Justin “Books Read in the Past Year” review. For several years now, I’ve had a personal goal of making time for at least 30 minutes of productive reading per day, not counting my formal prayers. That being said, here are my stats for 2025:

Books read in total: 23

Nonfiction: 7

Fiction: 16

Most Challenging Book of the Year: *The Divine Comedy* by Dante Alighieri

Most Enjoyable Book of the Year: *No Country for Old Men* by Cormac McCarthy

The Father Justin Book Recommendation of the Year: *Our Lady of Fatima* by William Thomas Walsh

All-in-all, the grand total of books read was a little light at three fewer books than last year. To be fair, a couple of very long books keep me occupied for a while, otherwise I could have gotten my total book count up to 30 or more. For that same reason, I was a bit heavy on fiction this year. I read a good number of true classics, with some of them being real page-turners and others being slogs that I had to work to finish.

The most challenging book I read was the *Divine Comedy*. I am deeply grateful that I made the time to read it, and I got a bilingual edition so I could enjoy the meaning in English while keeping an eye on the poetry that only exists with the original Italian. When I was in my 20’s, I remember proudly declaring that Dante’s *Inferno* was a terrible book. When my friend and his mom asked me “how can you confidently say that if you haven’t read it?” I responded “I don’t need to read it to know why it’s a terrible book!” In the many years since that conversation, I have come to renounce that attitude. I see now that even if I don’t agree with a book, it’s a bit cocky to declare such a thing without actually giving the book its day in court. Of course, this lesson goes double here because *The Divine Comedy* is brilliant – including *Inferno*. I just needed to grow up a bit to understand what Dante was really trying to say. For the rest of my life, I will hold *The Divine Comedy* as a classic example of a literary classic that cannot in any way be judged by its cover. If/when you’re ready, read it. Join him on his journey of salvation through hell, purgatory, and heaven. Amen amen, I say to you: it is a literary journey that will strengthen your soul.

The most enjoyable book, overall, was *No Country For Old Men*. I’ve been very clear that the movie is one of my favorites, and some people have understandably found that perplexing. *No Country For Old Men* is hardly a Catholic story. However, now that I know the movie inside and out and have read the original book, I maintain that there is a lot to learn within those pages. Many people can read or watch this story and come to different conclusions about what’s really trying to say to its audience. Realizing my obvious bias as a priest, this is a story about good and evil to me. It’s tragic because good does not win at the end of the book. However, it’s still a worthy story about what evil so often really looks like and how good carries itself when it breaks itself from what our media tends to portray goodness as. It’s not a story that’s for everyone, but it’s one I will dearly appreciate for the rest of my life. I’m only embarrassed that I was ignorant of the book’s existence until this past year!

Finally, it was tough to choose the recommendation of the year. However, as much as I wanted to recommend *Dracula* by Bram Stoker, I need to go for *Our Lady of Fatima*. The book is an easy read and is not that long. Just about anyone can get through it, and it’s a real page-turner once you get past the first dozen pages which detailed life in rural Portugal back in 1916. When it comes to miracles or Marian apparitions, it’s probably a bit unfair to declare one that is more significant than the others. Still, *Our Lady of Fatima* is a story all Catholics should know as best as they can. The Blessed Mother revealed the power of faith in Christ to a nation utterly exhausted by years of humanistic and secular conflict. It was not an event meant only for the Portuguese or those coping with World War I. It was an event meant to give hope to the Catholic faithful, and to jumpstart our zeal for our faith and devotion. You don’t need to understand every detail of the event. This book by Walsh is an excellent way to make yourself aware of the essential details and significance of what happened, without getting you bogged down in academic minutia. It’s worth the paltry \$18 on Amazon, and gets the Father Justin prize of “most highly recommended” for 2025.

Whether you’re working on the same books as me or otherwise, I wish you happy reading! May the written word always be in service to our spiritual wellness and our desire to be the best disciples of Christ we can be.

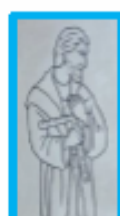
