Gratitude is Powerful

Gratitude is the key to a stewardship way of life. Today's readings demonstrate the power and vital importance of gratitude in the life of the Christian disciple, for gratitude leads us to worship God who offers us salvation.

We see the power of gratitude on display in the Gospel passage from Luke after Jesus heals ten lepers. "And one of them, realizing he had been healed, returned." Only one of the ten recognized the tremendous blessing he had received from Jesus and returned to thank him.

While it's easy to feel indignant at the failure of the nine others to return and thank Jesus, how often do we fail to recognize the blessings, answered prayers, and healings (both physical and spiritual) that the Lord showers upon us, day and night?

The truth is that our very lives and every breath we take are His gift to us. But we can get so caught up in the stresses and distractions of daily life that we lose touch with this truth.

The Samaritan reacts to his gift of healing with the proper response to our loving God. Recognizing what he had just received from the Lord, he "returned, glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked Him." He was grateful for what God had done for him, and this gratitude led to worship.

And because of this response, Jesus offered him a far more precious gift than physical healing; He offered him the gift of salvation. "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

Too often, we hear the phrase, "Count your blessings," and write it off as nothing more than a trite saying. Today's Gospel shows us otherwise. Gratitude is powerful. It deepens our faith in God and leads us to fitting worship of Him.


From the Desk of Father Justin

Good morning and welcome to the second week of Respect Life month. For my article here, please allow me to stack a bit of embellishment onto last weekend's homily. I put an above-average amount of work and preparation into it, because it's such a critical topic. In

short, my grand point was that as Catholics, we really do need to be grounded in the 10 Commandments and other critical teachings of Scripture, and we need to realize that our respect for others has to go beyond any particular group or groups of people. Rather, that respect has to be universal. Scripturally, that's an easy position to defend: Christ teaches us that "love your friends and hate your enemies" is not enough of a moral stand. We really do have to "love our friends and love our enemies." and let go of any "eye for an eye" instincts that we may have within us.

Now, the biggest thing I didn't have time to explain on Sunday was how we respect other people. As disciples of Christ, we do indeed have to respect babies, parents, felons, immigrants, friends, and enemies. The tricky part of life is figuring out exactly what shape that respect takes. We care for babies because they can't care for themselves – that one's pretty easy. We show respect and consideration for our parents and other elders, and we make time for our friends. But what about felons, convicted criminals, or actual enemies? Well, for a start, we respect life when we remember that these people are still human beings made in the image of God. That affords them the sort of basic dignity that everyone deserves.

Still, even beyond basic universal dignity, there are ways to show respect to criminals or people that are sincere dangers to society. No matter who they are or what they've done, they deserve a fair trial. They also deserve to have an appropriate and proportional punishment as consequences for their actions - perhaps you may remember a phrase from your high school civics class: "cruel and unusual punishment." "Cruel and unusual punishment" is never justice, but rather a product of our collective thirst for vengeance -

those are hardly decisions motivated by the Holy Spirit. Finally, anyone serving time in a correctional facility has the right to have access to their faith: they deserve occasional visits from a priest or other minister, as well as access to their Holy Book. I happen to know that even inmates in high security wings of prisons are permitted a single book, on the grounds that it has religious significance. That privilege can be taken away due to bad behavior, but inmates do have that access to Scripture by default. With these examples as well as others, the concept of "respect" is indeed a factor within the judicial system. We obviously don't (and shouldn't) respect inmates by ignoring the crime or by treating them like other citizens, but there is nevertheless a way to uphold respect and human dignity among literally all walks of life.

Carry on with Respect Life month, and I repeat once again: it's not merely about the unborn, but everyone. If Jesus can love tax collectors, the poorest of the poor, and soldiers of a foreign occupying power, we can love one another by the help of his grace.


