True Change of Heart

Today's readings challenge us to reflect on the true state of our hearts as it relates to stewardship. Do we think of stewardship as something we take care of once a year, simply a matter of ticking off boxes on a commitment card — or do we choose to embrace it as a spirituality and a way of life that allows us to grow in conformity to Christ every day?

Our first reading, from the Book of Sirach, teaches that our good God has given us the freedom to make this choice — “Before man are life and death, good and evil, whichever he chooses shall be given him.”

The concept of stewardship helps us live out this fundamental choice to put God first. Stewardship is not meant to be a mere external exercise that we participate in on an occasional basis. It is meant to be embraced as a way of life — a life that involves a continuous conversion of heart.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus illustrates the difference between an external observance of the law and a true conversion of heart, saying, “You have heard that it was said ... you shall not kill ... But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment.” Our Lord is asking us not only for exterior acts, but for a true change of heart. In stewardship terms, that means seeing everything as a gift from Him, to be used for His glory and the good of others.

In the week ahead, let us examine the state of our hearts and ask whether we have allowed stewardship to shape the way we live each day. When we do, we open ourselves to its deeper meaning and its power to change our hearts. The choice is ours.



Lenten Regulations

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age and are under 59 years of age. Those who are bound to this are to take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if needed to maintain strength according to one's needs but eating between meals is not permitted. Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves for these prescribed minimal penitential practices.



From the Desk of Father Justin

Yes, I'm aware that many of you are reading this on February 14th. I'm not even going to acknowledge that "holiday" by name. May you all enjoy your Sunday, and know that I'll enjoy a quiet night in... perhaps with a nice war film or horror movie to keep my mind off the occasion. What can I say, February 14th was never a day I looked forward to, well before priesthood.

Regarding more important things, Lent begins on Wednesday and I look forward to seeing many of you at one of our three Masses of the day. If you'd like a nice dark cross on your forehead that will last most of the day (or longer), all you have to do is wander over to my line. Don't worry: you can be sure that I'll take care of you.

Otherwise, looking at Lent in general, remember that Lent is a prime opportunity to live out our "Response" to faith. Echoing last weekend's homily, a Christian has four basic beliefs: CREATED, CAPTURED, RESCUED, and RESPONSE 1) the world was CREATED by God, 2) evil CAPTURED the world, 3) Christ has RESCUED us from that evil, and 4) we are called to provide a RESPONSE to the first three beliefs. In essence, our faith is an active one.

I didn't have time to expand any further during Mass last weekend, but the three pillars of Lent are a good way to summarize that RESPONSE. Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. So imagine you say to a friend, "I am responding to the beliefs of my faith." Reasonably, they inquire, "how exactly are you responding?" You can very sensibly say "with prayer, fasting, and almsgiving." That is a very good answer. Regardless of your prayer style, prayer is giving time to God and listening to God: that is certainly a way to RESPOND to faith. Furthermore, fasting is anything where you say "no" to your body or your desires. You practice a fast when you turn away food you don't need, when you exercise even though you don't enjoy it, and when you put that darn phone down because you stare at that glowing rectangle for no less than four hours a day every day. Fasting is a way to rise above the addictive and/or sinful pleasures of the world. Finally, almsgiving does not require the literal giving of money. You practice almsgiving when you give of your time, energy, and attention. When you spend time with family (instead of staring at your phone, for instance), that's almsgiving. When you help someone in need, even though it's a bit of an inconvenience, that too is almsgiving.

Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. They're the classic ways to RESPOND to faith. Do you believe that there is goodness and meaning in the world? Do you believe that there is also wrongness and suffering in the world? Do you believe that we really do have a savior who loves us beyond all telling? If so, then great! "Yes" is the right answer for all three of those questions... but what are you going to do about it? How will you RESPOND to the reality of good, evil, and ultimate salvation? For starters, take the idea to prayer, try to say "no" to your body from time to time, and be good and generous to others in your life. If you can do that, I'm sure the Holy Spirit will ultimately take care of the rest.


