## Our Faith Must Be Lived, Not Concealed

Today's readings are both encouragement and instruction for us as Christian stewards. They offer clear direction on what matters most to God and how He calls us to use the gifts He has entrusted to us.

In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah gives us straightforward guidance: "Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the naked when you see them, and do not turn your back on your own." There is no ambiguity here. Caring for our brothers and sisters in need is not optional — it is a fundamental responsibility of the Christian steward.

Yet the Lord also reminds us of His generosity when we live this way. "Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your wound shall quickly be healed." When we give of ourselves, we do not lose — we gain. God's grace grows within us, and we experience deeper joy and peace as our lives become more aligned with His will.

In the Gospel, Jesus speaks plainly to His disciples — and to us — calling us the "salt of the earth" and the "light of the world." But salt loses its purpose if it goes stale, and light cannot shine if it is hidden. Our faith must be lived, not concealed. We are called to act so that others may see the way we serve, how we care for the vulnerable, how we prioritize our families, and above all, how we love God — and through our witness, give glory to Him.

This is the stewardship way of life. Let us embrace it fully.



## *From the Desk of Father Justin*

Today I just wanted to express my gratitude for the wonderful Masses we had for January 31<sup>st</sup> and February 1<sup>st</sup>. Although we can't repeat such things too often, it was really nice to have a weekend of Masses with a minimum of preaching and a maximum of devotional prayers and blessings. This certainly seems to be one of those "good things in small doses" situations. If we did personal blessings (such as the Saint Blaise throat blessing) on a regular basis, it would become very boring and routine very quickly. However, if this is done once per year, it effectively retains its significance over time.

In order to explain exactly why the weekend went so well, from my perspective, allow me to address the other side of things. The stereotypical pattern between secular progress and religious consistency has been expressed by many people in both non-fiction and fiction. As the world gets more modernized and an average person's life becomes busier, certain expectations toward faith begin to be expressed: people want shorter worship times, more modernized language, more attention-grabbing phrasing or actions, and less intellectually or spiritually demanding goals for the people. In essence, as life gets busier and more hectic, people expect their spiritual lives to mirror that hectic pace. "You gotta keep up with the times", to use the classic trope.

The problem with the above attitude, however, is obvious once it's stated clearly on paper. Religious activity is meant to be a counterweight to secular society, not its ritualized parallel. True religion is meant to help us take a step back from our ordinary lives and remember what's really important. Religion is that which expresses one's deepest and most important beliefs, truths, and values – the very things we shape our lives around. So when our daily lives become mired in greed and selfishness, a healthy sense of religion should be that counterweight: "hey, do you really need all that stuff?" When we are broken and divided in some way, a healthy religion is the voice that says "what good is all this division achieving? Can't we be better than this?" It's when daily life and religion run parallel that we get into real trouble. We get greedy and selfish, and our religion encourages that because the religion is equally greedy. We break and divide, and our religion rejoices in fresh enemies to point at and scapegoat. You get the idea. When that becomes the case, religion only hastens the problem-at-hand. It becomes medicine that accelerates sickness rather than cures it.

Getting back to last weekend's Masses, we all did a great job at letting our faith be something of a counterweight to trends in our daily lives. We're Americans: we're always in a rush, we're addicted to our phones, and we're thinking more about the future than the present. What did the blessing of Saint Blaise offer us? Everyone who wanted a blessing got one: a ten-second moment with a deacon or priest. For many, there was a physical connection (a hand on a head), there was true eye contact, and it was a tiny sliver of time when the present moment was far more attention-grabbing than our runaway thoughts about what to make for dinner or the emails that had to be written in the next few hours. In short, hundreds of us had a tiny holy moment that can only exist in church. It's special precisely because those moments don't really happen elsewhere: they happen when we take a break from the daily grind and reorient ourselves to that which truly matters. And what was the price? I had to give a very short homily and Mass was ten or fifteen minutes longer than usual. I'd say that price was worth paying.

Thank you all so much for a uniquely powerful Mass. It was a Sunday where we talked about faith a little bit less and lived that faith a little bit more. We need that from time to time, as a counterweight to our daily routine which so often goes completely unchallenged.
