

Anointing may also be done by appointment.



#### Sacraments

<u>Baptism:</u> Parents who wish to have their child baptized must be registered members of St. Joseph Parish and practicing their Catholic Faith. A pre-baptism class must be attended prior to the date of the baptism. Baptisms are celebrated at one of the weekend Masses or at another arranged time.

<u>Funerals</u>: Please call the Parish Office in the event of the death of a loved one. Arrangements will be made for planning of the service including the musicians. Advanced planning may be done by making an appointment with Father.

Reconciliation: Monday 9:00am-9:30am, during adoration, Saturday 3:00 pm-3:50 pm, Sunday 7:00am-7:50am, some Sundays 9:45am-10:20am or by appointment. Please call the Parish Office.

Weddings: Couples must contact the pastor to make arrangements for marriage. No date should be set until this is done as the church may not be available. The Catholic party must be a registered and practicing member of the parish for at least six months prior to setting a date. In addition, a six month period of preparation is required for marriage.

#### Go and Do Likewise

In today's Gospel passage, from Luke, we read the well-known parable of the Good Samaritan. Here, Jesus teaches us in rich detail what stewardship in action looks like. In fact, this parable could just as accurately be called the parable of the Good Steward.

The first thing we note about the Good Samaritan is that he is aware of the needs of those around him and responds generously. While the priest and Levi brush right past the man on the side of the road, the Samaritan is watching for those who might be in need. He has a hospitable way of looking at the world around him and so he is able to "see" in a way that the others did not, and he was "moved with compassion at the sight" of the man.

Next, we see the Good Samaritan spring into action to serve this man, setting aside his own schedule and plans to meet his needs. He does not just give the man a few dollars or offer quick words of encouragement from across the road. He goes right up to the man. He cleans and bandages his wounds. He puts the man on his own animal and brings him to an inn where he can heal. He ensures the innkeeper would continue to look after him, and he commits to re-turning to the man on his way back.

That is how we live out God's commandments.

That is true hospitality and service.

That is how a good steward springs into action when he comes upon a neighbor in need. And Jesus says to each of us personally, just as He did in today's Gospel, "Go and do likewise."

## From the Desk of Father Justin

Just to reiterate what was said at Mass for the previous two weekends, we're getting a group together for the Sacrament of Confirmation. We're going to try to take advantage of the time slot between the 8:00 and 10:30 Masses on Sunday, while religious education is out for the summer.

Confirmation is probably the hardest Sacrament to understand. Most folks get the basic idea about the other ones, from baptism to holy orders. A lot of the time, we think of Confirmation as a moment when an adult commits to Christ of their own free will. That's perfectly reasonable, considering that most Catholics are baptized as babies. And indeed, it is important that we commit to Christ of our own heart and mind. We shouldn't be, as some denominations say, "wet sinners": baptized people who don't live their faith in any meaningful way. We should be baptized and live a life of deep gratitude and service to Christ, as a response to His promise of salvation.

That being said, the Catholic Sacrament of Confirmation is deeper than that. The Sacrament of Confirmation, like the other six Sacraments, is an infusing of the Holy Spirit upon a living human being. That's phrased very specifically: the Sacraments are of no use to the dead, nor to animals. They are external signs of an internal reality of faith, which we live out between our birth and the Final Judgement which is what awaits us beyond death.

In the case of Confirmation specifically, the Holy Spirit dwells in a person's soul in a unique one-of-a-kind way, as a compliment to and deepening of baptism. Baptism is also a unique one-of-a-kind indwelling of the Holy Spirit, with Confirmation uniting us more firmly to Christ and His Church. Confirmation marks us more fully as one who lives and acts as a part of the Body of Christ. It bolsters our spirits and our ability and drive to serve Christ and represent Him in the world. In that way, some people think of Confirmation as Baptism 2.0. In any case, Confirmation is certainly more than saying "yes" to Christ, even though that "yes" is the most important one of your life. Confirmation is more than your consent, because your "yes" is not what makes the Sacrament real. The Holy Spirit makes it real.

As my final little tidbit of information here, the Sacrament of Confirmation happens when the celebrant marks the person with holy oil (the sacred chrism, to be exact) upon their forehead. The symbolism and significance of that has plenty of grounding in the Old Testament, but we have been anointing with oil from the very beginning of the Church. It is documented most clearly in the Letter to the Hebrews, but there are a variety of references to the apostles' laying on of hands for the gift of the Spirit. In short, Confirmation has always existed within the Christian faith, as an invitation to the Holy Spirit by way of sacred oil and the laying on of hands. It is a beautiful thing to take part in something that has always been a part of our collective devotion to Christ - right from the very beginning.

Seriously, I hope you can swing by on Sunday mornings if the parish can aid you, or someone you know, in this way!


