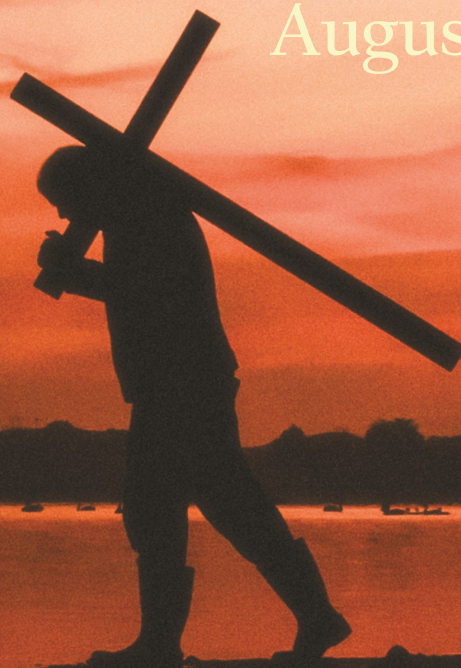

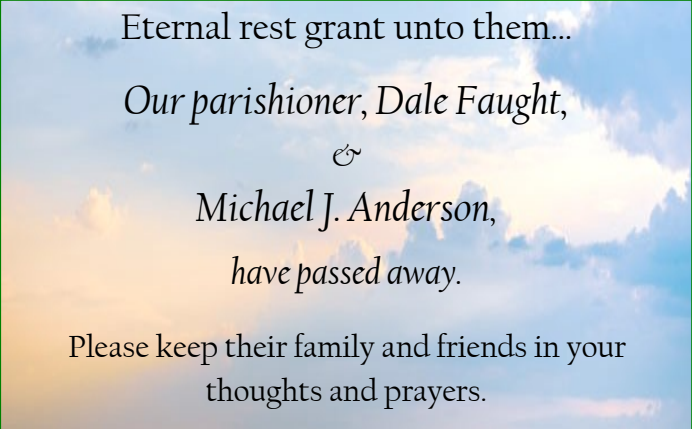

Sacraments

Baptism: Parents who wish to have their child baptized must be registered members of St. Joseph Parish and practicing their Catholic Faith. Weddings: Couples must contact the pastor to make arrangements for marriage. No date should be set until this is done as the church may not be available. The Catholic party must be a registered and practicing member of the parish for at least six months prior to setting a date. In addition, a six month period of preparation is required for marriage.

From the Desk of Father Justin

This article is another follow-up to last weekend's homily, which included the reality that priests occasionally deny someone absolution in the confessional. When that happens, the person walks away with their sins retained, not forgiven, requiring them to make a further examination of conscience before returning to the Sacrament at a later time. This is rare and meant to be used as a last resort, when a priest cannot in good conscience complete the Sacrament. Some people are rather surprised about that: they figured that a priest must forgive the person of their sins, no matter what. However, the missing detail is that the confession must be valid, sincere, and authentic. So below, I've listed a few examples of when a priest would be required to deny a penitent absolution, on the assumption that the penitent meant exactly what they said and remained unwilling to alter the original confession.

I've chosen to stick with absurdly comical examples for two reasons. The first is to make the point clearly, without the nuance of real life getting in the way. And two, I want it perfectly clear that these are purely hypothetical examples and in no way reflect actual confessions I may or may not have heard while celebrating the Sacrament in the past. Everything below is purely fictitious and written with the express intention of being of educational value to you. Any similarity to a confession you gave in the past is purely coincidental. That said, here are a few things you should absolutely never say in the confessional:

1. "Forgive me, Father, for I have sinned. I've been a bad Christian this month. I've been so busy, I've only had time to beat up a few Jews since my last confession. But with the grace of the Holy Spirit, I am determined to beat up twice as many Jews this coming month to make up for it. For these and all my sins, please have mercy."
2. "Forgive me, Father, for I have sinned. There's a big party coming up next weekend and I just know I'm going to drink a ton of liquor. I'm also going to have plenty of fun with my girlfriend too. So, if you could absolve me of all that stuff now, that would be great. You know, we can get it out of the way while there's time."
3. "Forgive me, Father, for I have sinned. I did [insert valid sins here] in the past two weeks. Look Father, I'm here against my will, because my mom is forcing me to do this. So, if we could hurry this up, I'd appreciate it. I'm not going to do whatever penance you give me, so let's speed this along and stop wasting each other's time, what do you say?"
4. "Forgive me, Father, for I have sinned. My boss is a mean old jerk-face. I'm not here for myself because I haven't committed any sins recently, but I'm here so that I may obtain grace for his sake because he's a really bad person and needs Jesus."
5. "Forgive me, Father for I have sinned. I watched Casablanca last weekend, which is, of course, commie propaganda. I'm sorry for failing Jesus in my moment of weakness and welcoming Satan into my soul."

Hopefully, those examples are clear enough to illustrate the point of this bulletin article. If a priest heard any of those "confessions" listed above and granted the penitent absolution, he would not be authentically be forgiving sins but somehow encourage an error of the Catholic faith. If you'd like the official reasoning in plain English, I offer the answers on the third-to-last page of the bulletin.

In closing, never be fearful or doubtful of the Sacrament of Reconciliation: it is there for you and for your good. It is meant to be of peace rather than a source of anxiety and judgment. However, it can only be real when you approach it with authenticity, a heart open to God's mercy, and a desire to do better in the future. So be brave, be sincere, and trust always in the Lord!

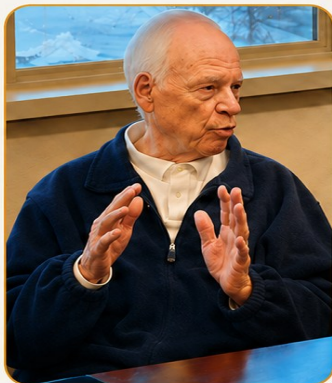

Go-Getters Senior Club Meeting

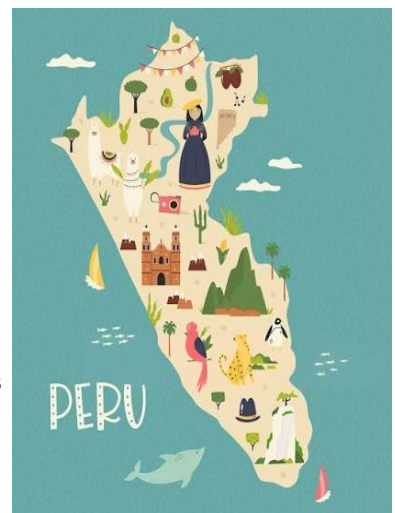
Join us for an exciting speaker dinner meeting!

Father Justin Answers to Bulletin Article:

1. The penitent believes that his evil actions are good; his moral compass is more-or-less completely dysfunctional. Absolving him would be to literally encourage him to do more evil acts in the future.
2. The penitent is not confessing sins but asking for permission to sin in the near future. No one can validly confess future sins.
3. The confession is not sincere as the penitent was sent against his will and resistant to the purpose of the Sacrament. Of these five examples, this one would get the most compassion out of me. I'd have to deny him absolution but I would offer him a blessing and express my sincere wish that he may one day discover the value of Reconciliation. Perhaps I'd say something like: "Come back soon, of your own free will and without your mom, and we'll pick up where we left off."
4. No one can confess other peoples' sins. If someone confesses their sins and their bosses' sins, the priest should cut the penitent off when they talk excessively about other peoples' flaws. I'd probably say something like "I'm sorry that your boss is a jerk-face, but he's not here right now. Let's focus on you and your sins. Do you have anything else to confess?" If the answer is "no, I have no sins of my own to confess because I'm not the problem", then I'd be forced to deny absolution.
5. This one is a little more complicated. Some people confess things that are not evil (unlike example #1) but feel guilty about something that is entirely untrue or superstitious. Casablanca is not "commie propaganda" (which is kind of a weird slam against that movie in the first place), and there is no reason a grown adult should regard watching Casablanca as a sinful act. To offer a person absolution for such an act would only encourage that person's superstitions and/or inaccurate understanding of what sin really is in the eyes of God. It would be like going to confession for liking candy more than popcorn at the movie theater. If it's not a sin, a priest can't absolve you of it.

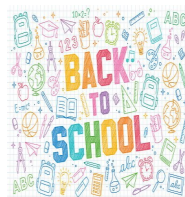
