

¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, 12so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit;14this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory. 15I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason ¹⁶I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, 18so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, ¹⁹and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. ²⁰God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹ far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. ²²And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

A Word about Holy Communion

We invite all who wish to follow Jesus to be baptized, and we invite all baptized Christians to receive the gifts of Jesus' Body and Blood. All are welcome at the altar rail: the baptized for communion, everyone for a blessing.

- To receive the common cup or just the wafer, come to the lectern side of the altar rail.
- If you would rather not drink out of the common cup, come to the pulpit side of the altar, where the clergy person will dip your wafer in the wine.

Gluten-free wafers are available. Just let clergy know that you need one. In lieu of communion, you may receive a blessing at any station.

Preparing for Sunday, Nov. 9 – 22nd Sunday After Pentecost Readings: Job 19:23-27a; Psalm 17:1-9; 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17; Luke 20:27-38. **Question for reflection**: We each have our own ideas and visions of what happens to us after we die. When the opponents of Jesus tried to trick him by asking a convoluted question about what heaven is like after we die, Jesus replied by saying that God is not the God of the dead but of the living because we are always alive to God (Luke 20:38). How does that inform our sense of Christian community of the communion of saints, and of life everlasting?

Adult Forum next Sunday: In the Bleak Midwinter

In the Adult Forum a few weeks ago, we began to look at making a more holy Christmas. Part of the holiness of the season can be found in recognizing and responding to those who find the holidays a particularly difficult time due to trauma, loss, loneliness, etc. On Nov. 9 at 9:15 AM, the Rev. Becky Glass, Executive Director of the Peninsula Pastoral Counseling Center, will join us in the Forum to lead us in that recognition and offer ways to pastorally respond.

St. Andrew's Day Celebration on Nov. 16

On Sunday, November 16 we will celebrate the Feast of St. Andrew, our parish's patron saint. Andrew is the patron saint of, among other things: fishermen, Greece, Russia, Barbados, Ukraine, and Scotland. That's why Scotland's flag has an X-shaped cross on it. Our Episcopal Church shield also includes an X-shaped cross because the first American bishop was consecrated in Scotland (not England!). Our St. Andrew's celebration will include a bagpipe parade, starting at 10:15 at the River Road doors; and a festive coffee hour following the 10:30 service. In honor of St. Andrew's Day, please wear plaid (tartans are great if you have one!); or red, the color of martyrdom. Our bagpiper will be Bob Ewing, father of Becky Fulcher!

Turkey and cranberry time!

Once again St. Andrew's has volunteered to assist our partner school, Sedgefield Elementary in providing 100 school families a Thanksgiving basket.
