Thoughts from Deacon Chuck

So, what happened to Deacon Terry Mason? He was here, and now he's not. For the past 5-6 years, our parish has been supporting Terry and his wife Kim as he discerned entering the process of becoming a permanent deacon within our diocese. There is a lot of prayer and trepidation in the journey to ordination. Eventually, we enter the seminary for the final three years of training. We wonder what we're getting into and how it will affect our personal life, especially our family life. Every other weekend for three years, we are in class, sometimes wondering what we have gotten into after so many years away from school. We enter the program knowing that, like our parish priests, we serve the Bishop and the needs of the Diocese first. In time, we are ordained and receive assignments. Fifteen years ago, I found out the evening before ordination that I would be coming to St Barbara. In Terry's case, he was ordained before the official assignments were made. There were more parishes needing a deacon than were available this year. Terry recently found out that he was being assigned to St. Patrick Parish in Taylor Mill. In speaking with Terry, after the shock wore off, he accepts the challenge of his new parish. Terry shared with me that the welcome he has received is God's way of letting him know this is where he is supposed to be.

This being said, your help is needed. We, as a Church, are in dire need of men accepting the call to a vocation. Priests and deacons are in short supply, and as time goes by, the shortage becomes that much greater. Our Diocese is facing a challenge of responding to the needs of our people. Retired priests and deacons continue to give their time to the people of Covington. Our Bishop is working to meet the needs of our congregations. As Catholics, we all have a part to play. We must encourage men to recognize the call to serve and to respond.

So what can you do? Has the Holy Spirit called you, or someone close to you, to the priesthood or the diaconate? We, as members, must pray that men continue to step up to respond to the call of the Holy Spirit. The journey of ministry takes many challenging twists and turns, but the rewards are heartwarming. God bless you, and please pray for more vocations.

If you or someone you know would like to explore your faith and find out what the Catholic foundations of faith are all about, we can help.

OCIA is the formal process by which non-Catholics learn about our Faith in Jesus Christ in the Holy Trinity, as well as the history and the teachings of the Church. Beginning Sept 21 and continuing through the Easter season, we will meet after the 9 AM Mass for about an hour. Through the process, participants can prayerfully decide whether to become a member of the Catholic Church. 
