They came to know the Bernardine Franciscan Sisters 77 years ago in their hometown of Swoyersville, PA, where they were taught by the Bernardines at St. Mary's Grade School. Interestingly, their mother had known the Bernardine Sisters in Poland and had considered joining the order.

Sister Melita was the first to feel a call from God and went to Mt. Alvernia High School in Reading, PA with the intention of becoming a Sister. Sister Cynthia went to Marymount High School in Wilkes-Barre, PA with no thought of becoming a Sister-until she went on a school retreat. "That retreat changed my life!", Sister exclaimed. "That's when I realized my calling. I certainly surprised my friends and family."

Our "sister Sisters" have experienced much happiness living out their vocations in the same religious community. "We love being 'sister Sisters' in the Bernardine Franciscan community! We laugh with each other, cry with each other, and challenge each other." As the last two living siblings from their family of 15, they have been a great support to one another in balancing their life in community and the needs of their family.

Today, Sister Melita and Sister Cynthia live in the convent at St. Thomas More Parish in Allentown, PA. Sister Melita is retired but helps as best she can at the convent. Sister Cynthia remains engaged in Parish Ministry. These two "sister Sisters" are happy to remain a loving presence in the Parish as they grow in age. †

Here the residents struggle daily as they endure the harsh realities of extreme and abject poverty. Each day, Sister is confronted with the challenge of stretching her very limited resources in order to carry out religious activities as well as provide nutritional and healthcare assistance to those in dire need.

Sister Helena is profoundly touched by the people's deep trust in God and their amazingly joyful spirit

even as they cope with rampant food insecurity, disease, malnourishment, and low literacy. Just to be with the people gives Sister untold joy and a great sense of reward.

Having ministered for 30 years as a Bernardine in various places, Sister Helena has been instrumental in transforming the lives of countless individuals. "I feel truly happy knowing that the small seeds of faith I have sown are alive and flourishing,"
