# Orkney XX Island Games - WIIGA Report

## Introduction

The 2025 Island Games in Orkney were the 20<sup>th</sup> iteration of the Island Games, marking 40 years since the inaugural Games in the Isle of Man in 1985. These were the 10<sup>th</sup> Games that the Western Isles had competed in since joining the IIGA in 2003. The Games were held between 12-18 July 2025, with competitions taking place across the Orkney Islands – making it one of the smallest ever hosts in Games history. This was the first ever time that Orkney had hosted the Games and 24 member Islands competed across 12 sports. An estimated total of 2,000-2,500 Athletes competed at the Games, with an additional 1,000 volunteers ensuring the smooth running of the week's events.

The host Island selected the following 12 Sports to be contested at the Games\*:

- **Archery**
- **Athletics**
- **Badminton**
- **Lawn Bowls**
- **Cycling**
- **Football**
- **Golf**
- **Gymnastics**
- **Sailing**
- **Squash**
- **Swimming**
- **Triathlon**

*(**Bold** denotes WIIGA participation)*

*\* Orkney had originally included Shooting in their selection of Sports however this was dropped from the events in February 2024 due to financial concerns by the event venue.*

## WIIGA Squad

After the selection process had been completed for each sport, the WIIGA squad was announced on 17<sup>th</sup> April 2025 {See Appendix A}. With a team of **104** athletes and managers, as well as medical staff, press and Comhairle representatives, this was one of the largest ever Western Isles squad to compete at the Games. The squad comprised of experienced Island Games athletes as well as many competing at the Games for the first time, with representatives being selected from right across the Western Isles and the mainland.

Following a first foray into the Archery and Women's Golf events in 2023, both teams went to Orkney with expanded teams – building on the groundwork that had been done at the previous Games. There was also a welcome return to the squad for Commonwealth Games athlete Kara Hanlon after an absence of 6 years.

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Over a third of the team were Games debutants, with **40** members of the squad heading to their first ever competition. Among the team were also 2 athletes competing at the Games in a different sport than one they had previously represented WIIGA in:

- Jane Nicolson – Golf 2023 / Football in Åland 2009
- Colin Macritchie – Golf 2023, 2005 & 2011 / Football in Rhodes 2007 & Åland 2009

Additionally, there were various families representing WIIGA in Orkney, including 3 siblings in both the Archery & Swimming teams:

- Luke & Sam Mackay (Men's Football)
- Michael & Robert Jones (Men's Football)
- Krysta & Harry Bray (Women's & Men's Football)
- Kyle, Keira & Aleah MacDonald (Swimming)
- Rochelle, Danielle & Philip Van Niekirk (Archery)
- Kara & Matthew Hanlon (Swimming – *where parents David & Marilyn are the managers*)
- Kenneth 'Spaid' Macdonald and daughter Anna Macdonald (Athletics)

The average age of the *competing* squad was **28**; with our two youngest competitors not long having turned **15** and the oldest turning **78** during the week of the Games.

**37%** of the squad were age **21 or younger**, with **68 of the 87** athletes being Island-based.

As the youngest competitor in the squad, Aleah Macdonald (*Swimming*) was chosen as water carrier at the Opening Ceremony – with Kara Hanlon (*Swimming*) selected by the WIIGA Committee as Flag Bearer. The Opening Ceremony took place in Kirkwall on Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> July with thousands turning out to welcome the teams, where Princess Anne opened the Games.

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### Sponsorship

With a large squad heading to Orkney, the support given to the team through sponsorship was as vital as ever. As in previous years, **Bakkafrost Scotland** were the main team sponsor and this allowed WIIGA to invest in sponsored team kit as well as helping with the overall promotion and wider costs associated with the Island Games.

In addition, the team were greatly boosted by additional sponsorship from **Ishga, Scottish & Southern Electricity Networks, Urras Oighreachd Ghabhsainn** and **Northland Power**. These contributions allowed for the purchase of additional kit and contributed to a reduction in competitor fees, significantly assisting our athletes to compete at the Games. **Cala Hotels** also supported the team by providing a van which transported equipment from Stornoway to Kirkwall and around the venues during the week of the Games.

These fundraising efforts would not have been possible without the help of local businesses and organisations who provided venues, supplies and prizes in support of the fundraising efforts.

### Games Review

2 years on from what could be viewed as a 'transitional Games' in Guernsey, the Western Isles team arrived in the blistering Orcadian sunshine with a sense of confidence and optimism in the talent within its ranks. With a large number of the team only having made their Games debut in 2023, many were returning to the competition with greater experience and personal development under their belt. Now competing at its 10<sup>th</sup> Games and having been the best-performing Scottish Island for the past 4 of those, there was a sense of intrigue as to how this squad would fare, with a strong blend of youthful energy and extensive Games' experience within the team. Gold medals eluded WIIGA in 2023 however as the plane left Stornoway Airport there were quiet hopes that there would be some on board the return journey home this time around.

As has been the case at recent games, the squad departed across two separate flights on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> July. With special permission granted by HIAL, Peter Mackay (*father of runner Ailyn*) piped the team from the airport, along the runway and onto the plane – which provided a fantastic send off for the team. Once again Keith Bray Snr willingly drove the equipment van from Stornoway to Orkney, a journey of over 12 hours which included two ferry journeys in one day. The majority of the team stayed in the Kirkwall Youth Hostel, with the men's and women's football teams being housed in the Kirkwall Grammar School accommodation. Events were generally within the Kirkwall vicinity, although the Golfers had a couple of rounds in Stromness and the Football teams did some travelling to matches. Once again the team benefitted from a well-run Games bus service.

Having had a day to familiarise themselves with their surroundings and get some practice in, the team enjoyed the spectacle of the Opening Ceremony at Bignold Park, having paraded through the streets with the other 23 competing Islands. HRH Princess Anne officially opened the Games, alongside Games ambassador Lorraine Kelly. Competition began in earnest the next day, with Athletics, Badminton, Football & Lawn Bowls up first on day one. Archery, Golf and Swimming soon followed suit as the week's action got into full swing in the warmth of the Orkney sunshine.

As has so often been the case in the past, the team took their performances to new levels right across the board and were excellent ambassadors for the Western Isles throughout the week.

In Guernsey Louise Campbell & Gary Ross-Jordan became the first ever Western Isles **Archers** to compete at an Island Games, however such has been the success of the sport locally that this time they were joined by 3 other competitors, all who came from the same family. Rochelle, Danielle and Philip Van Niekirk were all making their Games debut in Orkney, with Rochelle breaking new ground in the Archery as the Western Isles' first ever compound shooter.

The recent resurgence of Western Isles **Badminton** continued with some stand-out performances against skilful opposition, with both the team and the individuals therein picking up a few impressive wins along the way.

In spectacular surroundings, the **Men's Golf** team performed well, with all 4 members finishing in the top half of a field of 66 players, contributing to a very solid 6<sup>th</sup> place finish out of 16 teams. With only 2 players involved, the **Women's Golf** didn't meet the criteria for entering the team event however both players competed well in the individual event and will be looking to add to their ranks ahead of 2029, with the Faroes dropping Golf from the schedule in 2027.

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In the pool, the **Swimming** team were boosted by the return of multi Island Games medallist and record holder Kara Hanlon, after last being involved in the setup during the 2019 Games in Gibraltar. With 4 members of the squad returning from the 2023 Games, big strides were made and the 3 new faces competed well at their first competition. Kara medalled in each of the individual events she participated in, with 4 Golds and a Bronze – as well as recording 3 new Games Records.

A smaller than originally planned **Cycling** team consisted of WIIGA regular John Macarthur and debutant Brian Macphee. Already a brutally difficult sport to compete in, the team had to deal with the surprisingly hot Orcadian weather – with both performing admirably in the Time Trial, Town Criterium and Road Race events.

**Lawn Bowls** replaced indoor bowls from the Guernsey Games where returning player Peter O'Donnell was joined by 2 debutants in John & Terry. In a tough field, there were some stand out moments including a nail-biting 10-9 triples win over Bermuda.

Drawn in a tough group which included the eventual winners and runners up, the **Men's football** team put in some terrific displays and were unfortunate to finish the group without a win. In a dramatic 7/8<sup>th</sup> place play-off match, WIIGA clawed their way back from 3-0 down after 20 minutes against Gozo to take the game penalties, where their Maltese counterparts came out on top.

With a range of event specialists within their team, the **Athletics** squad performed superbly across the board. Plenty of PBs were recorded throughout the team, competing under similarly hot conditions with 4 medals being collected, and several others coming within a hairsbreadth of a podium finish.

While there were far too many super-human efforts to give credit to them all, mention must be made of the performances of our medal winning athletes.

On the back of silver in Guernsey, the **Women's football** team once again cruised through the group stage and onto the semi-final where they met the Isle of Man. After a hard-fought draw the sides couldn't be separated and WIIGA were on the wrong side of a penalty shoot-out loss, after some good saves from the opposition goalkeeper. The team lifted themselves admirably in a convincing 3-0 display over Gozo in the Bronze medal match and cemented their place as one of the top competitors in the women's football competition for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Games running.

Invariably there were medals won by our now all-time record medal winner Kara Hanlon, who added a mightily impressive 4 Golds and 1 Bronze medal to her ever-expanding Island Games medal haul. In doing so, Kara also broke *her own* Games Records in the 50m, 100m & 200m Breaststroke events!

In the Women's half-marathon event, WIIGA stalwart Mhairi Hall ran superbly and earned a hugely well-deserved Individual Bronze, finishing almost a minute ahead of her closest chaser. This outstanding run, combined with the positions of teammates Muriel & Ailyn secured a phenomenal Gold for team Western Isles, albeit with a bit of a nervy wait as scores were totalled up!

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Abbie Stewart, still only 17 and already at her 2<sup>nd</sup> Island Games showed that she could compete with the best with a Silver and a Bronze to show for her efforts. In the 800m a solid run earned her a 3<sup>rd</sup> place finish, with an even more impressive display coming in the 1,500m which clinched her 2<sup>nd</sup> place.

In arguably one of the performance of the Games, Benbecula's Amie Ringstead secured WIIGA's first medal of the Orkney Games, winning Gold in the women's Javelin. Having debuted at the 2023 Games in Guernsey where she finished a very respectable 6<sup>th</sup> place, Amie threw a personal best and her 40.46 throw was enough to secure Gold in Orkney.

Island Games success is measured far beyond 'simply' winning medals and the whole team can be tremendously proud of their efforts and the way in which they represented the Western Isles. The team spirit was plain to see with athletes turning up in droves to support their team mates at every event, and the spectacle of the celebrations which took place back at the team base each time a medal was won.

We look forward to continuing to build on the excellent progress that was made by a youthful and talented WIIGA team in the Faroe Islands in 2027.

### Archery

With Louise & Gary breaking new ground in Guernsey, the squad was boosted by the three Van Niekirk siblings in Orkney. In the women's knockout the team had the misfortune of having teammates drawn against each other, with Louise edging Danielle out in a tight 6-4 match. Both shot well with Louise finishing 10<sup>th</sup> out of a field of 22, and Danielle coming not far behind in 14<sup>th</sup>. In the mixed knockout the team lost a thrilling encounter 5-4 to the archers from Menorca. Rochelle became the first WIIGA archer to compete in the compound competition and made it to the quarter-final after some impressive performances.



### Athletics

In addition to the medal successes of Lewis, Mhairi & Muriel, the whole team had a hugely successful week. WIIGA Athletes competed in several event finals and by the end of the week 24 PBs had been recorded as well as 4 Western Isles records being broken. With only 3 of a 17-strong squad having any previous Island Games experience, this young squad can be confident of future success in years to come.



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### Badminton

Building on the return of a WIIGA badminton team at the 2023 Games, the assembled squad competed well against high-quality opposition. Wins were recorded in the men's doubles event by Kevin & John and the mixed event by Kevin & Julie. A convincing 4-1 win over Froya gave the Western Isles a 15<sup>th</sup> place finish in the overall standings. The team were disappointed to lose Barra's Ben Denehy who was injured in the lead-up to the Games.



### Bowls

With the focus changing from 2023's Indoor Bowls event to Lawn Bowls in Orkney, WIIGA sent a team of 3 to compete in the singles, doubles and triples events. Captain Peter O'Donnell was joined by John Blunt & Terry Condie, both competing at their first Games. As ever in this sport, the standard was exceptionally high, however the team remained competitive and recorded a well deserved 10-9 win over Bermuda in the triples.



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### Cycling

With a lack of sufficient entries in the women's mountain bike events, the cycling team were left without Kerry Macphee who would have been competing at her 5<sup>th</sup> Games. John Macarthur and Brian Macphee made up the participants for the 3 events, with John's highest finish being 28<sup>th</sup> of 48 in the Time Trial with Brian coming 27<sup>th</sup> of 48 in the Road Race.



### Men's Football

Drawn in perhaps the competition's toughest group the men's team performed admirably against eventual winners Bermuda and runners-up Ynys Môn. The team were unfortunate not to get at least a draw in the latter match, where a deflected long-distance effort hit the back of the net in the final seconds of the game. A superb comeback in the play-off match against Gozo saw WIIGA overturn a 3-0 deficit thanks to goals from Mikey Jones, Ross Macdonald and Stevie Mutch. An eventual loss on penalties gave the team an 8<sup>th</sup> place finish



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### Women's Football

Having made it all the way to the final in Guernsey, the team had their sights on at least equalling that result and came within a penalty shoot-out from doing so. Having recorded 3-0 and 4-2 wins in the group stage, WIIGA faced the Isle of Man for a place in the final. Having taken the lead, they were pegged back and the sides couldn't be separated in extra time. It all came down to penalties and this time around it was the Manx side who prevailed. The team bounced back with a convincing 3-0 win over Gozo in the 3<sup>rd</sup> place play off to secure Bronze.



### Golf

The men's team competed very well across the board and all finished in the top 36 in a field of 66 players. David Black finished the highest in a very respectable 15<sup>th</sup> place and scored the lowest round with a 68 in R3. The team's combined performances left them with a 6<sup>th</sup> place finish out of 16 Islands competing in the team event. Jane Nicholson and debutant Melanie Duff competed well in the women's contest with Jane's round of 83 being the lowest of the scores.



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### Swimming

Aside from the experience of Kara Hanlon within the team, this was another young squad with an average age of 17, who recorded 10 PBs across 15 swims in one day. Kara medalled in each of her individual events with 4 Golds and a Silver, with each of the relay teams putting in good times in their events. Another encouraging week for the swimmers all round.



### WIIGA'S 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

The Games in Orkney marked 20 years since the Western Isles Island Games Association was formed and subsequently accepted as a member of the International Island Games Association. With our first competition taking us to Shetland in 2005, it was perhaps fitting that our 10<sup>th</sup> competition took place on the home of their neighbours in Orkney. Much has changed over those 20 years however the talent, abilities and discipline of our talented athletes remains as strong as ever. The occasion of our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary was marked with a specially commissioned flag and pin badge, with an exhibition at the Museums in Stornoway and Benbecula planned for 2027.

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### Betri Island Games – Faroe Islands 2027

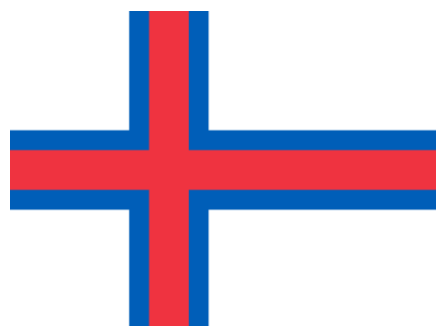
As the Orkney Closing Ceremony drew to a close the Island Games ceremonial flag was handed over to the Faroe Islands, to be raised again in Tórshavn in 2 years' time. Having originally been awarded the honour of hosting the 2031 Games by the IIGA, the Faroes stepped in to fill the void left for the 2027 Games after Ynys Môn withdrew from hosting at the end of 2023. These will be the 21<sup>st</sup> International Island Games and the second time the Faroes have hosted, having held the event for the first time in 1989.

The Games will take place between 3-9 July 2025 and the hosts recently confirmed that the following 14 sports would take place at the Games:

Basketball, Judo, Shooting, Table-Tennis, Tennis and Volleyball have all been added in place of Bowls, Golf, Sailing and Squash. This will be the first time Judo has been included since 2019.

Organisers are expecting around 3,000 competitors and officials to take part in the Games and a pre-Games visit is likely to be scheduled for July 2026, one year out from the Opening Ceremony.
