GETTING TO KNOW OUR HOSPITAL ADMINISTRATOR

In 2001, a young medical student was making the long bumpy trek up the mountain road to Bonne Fin. This young student, Frantz Codio, had little idea at that time how important this journey was. Frantz was a medical student at University Lumiere, a medical school in Port-au-Prince. At the end of his journey that day was Hospital Lumiere and the beginning of a long association with the hospital that continues to have a great impact today.

Dr. Frantz Codio, better known as Dr. Frantz, serves today as the Administrator of the hospital. He leads a team of five new directors and managers, all born, raised, and educated in Haiti. The hospital leadership has been undergoing quite a

change over the past two years. Hospital management was formerly under the leadership of missionaries sent from various congregations across the United States. However, as service terms of missionaries ended, God saw fit to lead the hospital on a path of transition to Haitian leadership. The Haitian leadership team works hand in hand with the hospital's Executive Director and Board of Directors through frequent visits to the hospital, weekly teleconferences and daily communication.

Getting to Know Our Hospital Administrator

From the beginning of HarvestCall management of the hospital, this type of transition has always been a goal. With Dr. Frantz leading this new team, the goal has been realized.

Dr. Frantz was born and raised in Carrefour, a well-known area of Port-au-Prince. His family was in business, although his father passed away when Dr. Frantz was age 9. While growing up in Carrefour, he met many American Christian missionaries. These relationships helped him develop very good English language skills.

Most importantly, through this influence, he came to know the Lord Jesus, and became a Christian at the age of 16.

His first visit to Hospital Lumiere was part of his medical schooling through his university. Dr. Frantz completed medical school in 2007 and went on to serve a year of public service to complete his education and receive his medical license. In 2010, he and his wife, Charenne, also a physician, were married. They have one daughter, Chaneka (age nine), who attends school in Port-au-Prince. Today, they reside in Gressier, a town near Port-au-Prince.

Dr. Frantz and his wife each have post-graduate degrees,

Dr. Frantz in community health and Dr. Charenne in health management. They have a heart for Haiti and their people. On weekends, they operate a mobile clinic serving people in a rural mountainous area near their home.

Life in Haiti can be very hard as opportunities to succeed can be few. Dr. Frantz was tempted at times to leave Haiti. However, God's call to remain in Haiti has been clear.

"I strongly think that God wants

me to stay here and to make a difference. I decided to stay to show others

BED SPONSORSHIP LEVELS

\$145/mo. – sponsors a 1/4 of a hospital bed

\$300/mo. - sponsors a 1/2 of a hospital bed

\$600/mo. - sponsors one hospital bed for a full year

ovember 3-55 During Dr. Frantz's time as a medical student at Hospital Lumiere he often had opportunities to translate for visiting American physicians. Through

this work, he met his mentor, Dr. Robert Belding, an American Orthopedist that has served Hospital Lumiere for many years. Dr. Frantz recalls many Bible studies at night with Dr. Belding after long days of treating patients in the hospital. This relationship continues today.

> Dr Frantz has worked with many medical mission organizations over the years. Some of his past associations have been with Doctors Without Borders, Save the Children and Haiti Companions to name a few. In 2018, he was called back to Hospital Lumiere. He began employment

at the hospital as the Medical Director, leading the medical department. In 2021, he accepted the new role of Administrator when Rick Aberle, former missionary now serving as Executive Director, left the field. When asked why he wanted to come and work at Hospital Lumiere, Dr. Frantz responded "Hospital Lumiere saw me growing up, it is where I came to know how to practice medicine. It is part of my life so I feel like it's a blessing to be able to give back some of what I learned through the hospital."

Dr. Frantz shares how important he believes the hospital is to the community. It is the "blood that flows in the community's veins." If there is no hospital, there is no traffic for motorcycle taxis, no customers to purchase food or drinks the merchants sell, and most importantly, no jobs for over 200 employees who provide for their families.

Dr. Frantz takes leadership of a hospital that is seen as the best hospital in the south of Haiti and one of the best in all of Haiti. This is because of the services the hospital offers and the manner in which patients are served. Hospital Lumiere is often described as a "reference" hospital, one to which other medical centers refer difficult cases. This type of service is possible only by God's grace

When asked what his vision for the future of the hospital is, Dr. Frantz responds very simply, "To keep it open, so that the glory of God could be seen through the services we are offering with compassion and Jesus' love."

Earthquake Rebuild Update

It has been about seven months since the devastating 7.2 magnitude earthquake struck Hospital Lumiere, causing damage to most buildings and destroying the surgical suite and garage. Since that time, with the help of a donated surgical tent and other temporary structures, the hospital has restored full functionality of services at a reduced capacity. To date in 2022, the staff has been very busy, even at this reduced capacity in serving more patients than expected.

Plans for repair and rebuilding are well underway. The hospital has engaged a US partner, former missionary Brett Herrmann and his employer STAND Engineering, a structural engineering firm, to help develop preliminary repair plans
to damaged buildings.
Initial designs for a rebuilt
surgical suite and garage
are complete. Those designs
are presently in the hands of
Haitian construction firms that
are preparing cost estimates and
designs which will be reviewed by the
Governing Board, STAND Engineering
and HarvestCall leadership.

Once final cost estimates, plans and timelines are complete, the board hopes to begin fundraising activities. While much is yet to be determined related to this project, there has been great progress made. As details are

Gilieu Bueno lives in Les Cayes, Haiti, about one hour away from Hospital Lumiere, with his wife Pherah and two children. Like many Haitians, Gilieu relies on a small motorcycle for their daily transportation. In December, Gilieu was riding his motorcycle when another cycle suddenly swerved in front of him and they collided.

Gilieu suffered a broken left femur in the collision and was knocked unconscious. An ambulance transported him to Hospital Lumiere, where surgery was performed to repair the broken femur. Fortunately, Gilieu is now doing well and can now get around using a walker. He is thankful he found good care at Hospital Lumiere. Gilieu shared "Everything they do for me here at Hospital Lumiere is good. They are always consistent with good care".

Gilieu makes a living working on his feet as a mason, so the accident was tragic for him and his family both physically and financially. Gilieu is thankful that

his recovery is going well and hopes to return home and resume his normal daily activities soon.
