WITH TENDER HEARTS

The mission of HarvestCall's child sponsorship program is to "provide a Christ-centered education to needy children." Child Sponsorship directly supports the education (tuition, uniforms, books) of over 1,800 students in five countries: Haiti,

Guatemala, Jamaica, Mexico, and Zambia.

In addition, the program also sponsors \sim 135 schools in Haiti, with the gospel message reaching \sim 15,000 students annually.

Widespread poverty, high crime and corruption, large-scale unemployment and underemployment, rampant violence, inadequate education, and lack of strong institutional Christian

influence — these challenging themes are consistent across the five countries served by Child Sponsorship, although each country has its own history and story.

Haiti

Haiti is the third largest and most populous country in the Caribbean. Historically poor and politically unstable, Haiti has the lowest "Human Development Index" in the Americas, a measure of a country's

health (quality of life and longevity), education (access and literacy rate), and income (living standards).



Of the ~135 schools we sponsor in Haiti, approximately half were either destroyed or severely damaged by the August earthquake. HarvestCall designated funding for Child Sponsorship to provide 150 tarps to schools so they can temporarily resume classes until they can implement a more permanent solution. ▼

Regarding education, more than 80% of Haiti's primary schools are privately managed by churches, communities, and for-profit operations, with little government oversight. This is where child

sponsorship can really make a difference: many young children don't have access to public education and their families can't afford the costs of private education. Due to the lack of public funding for education, Haiti ranks in the bottom 10% globally for literacy rate (49%).

Guatemala

Guatemala is one of the most populous and poorest countries in Central America. Guatemala exhibits one of the most unequal income distributions in the hemisphere — nearly two-thirds of its ~18

million people live on less than two dollars per day, with many involved in subsistence agriculture. Guatemala's social development indicators — such as infant mortality, child malnutrition, and illiteracy — are among the worst in the region.

Many Guatemalans do not attend school (4.1 was the average years of schooling completed a decade ago), but work at a

young age to help sustain their families (2019 per capita income was \sim \$8,600 compared to \sim \$62,500 in the U.S.). The educational structure needs an overhaul – schools often don't have enough supplies and some don't even have chairs and desks. Around 25% of Guatemalans over 15 are illiterate, the highest rate in Central America. In addition, only

2% of Guatemalans attend universities, while 70% of high school graduates in the U.S. attend college.

Jamaica

While Jamaica isn't known for the stark poverty represented by Haiti, almost 40% of its nearly 3.0 million population live on less than \$2.50 per day, the "official" poverty line as defined by the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

With a shrinking economy critically dependent on declining mining and agricultural industries, many Jamaicans have had to depend on lower-paying services work, heavily reliant on a cyclical tourism industry. The result is extremely high unemployment at 13%, with that rate doubling for young people - a significant crisis for the country which contributes to the

jobs, education is one of the first areas to suffer - many Jamaicans can't afford to send their children to school. This issue is especially acute for Deaf children, which has been the focus of Child Sponsorship in Jamaica for ~20 years.

Mexico

Mexico is a developing country with a large population and robust economy. However, the country continues to struggle with social inequality, poverty, and extensive crime, highlighted by a pervasive drug cartel presence that openly challenges governmental authority and profoundly impacts the safety of its citizens and visitors.

While Mexico has a very organized educational system, there are still major pockets of impoverished population in rural areas and within the slums of the large cities (estimated at 25-30% of the population) who can't afford to attend school and aren't exposed


to the gospel message. HarvestCall's child sponsorship program focuses on some of these schools in the larger urban areas.


Zambia

While Zambia has a stronger economy than several of the countries we serve, ~60% of Zambians live below the national poverty line (the rural poverty rate is ~80%) and struggle to access the basic necessities of life, let alone education. Most rural Zambians are subsistence farmers, and unemployment and underemployment are serious problems in the urban areas. Several social indicators continue to decline, highlighted by a short life expectancy (41 years) and high maternal mortality rates (830 per 100,000 pregnancies).

Another special issue associated with Zambia is its high orphanage rate, due to the HIV/ AIDS epidemic. Orphans represent nearly 10% of Zambia's 13 million population, which is the focus of HarvestCall's child sponsorship program in Zambia.

Magdalena the New Frontier

After all, the CVE ministry has been in place for nearly 20 years. We are thankful for the brotherhood's investment in the mission of CVE over this time and ask that you continue to support this mission as we chart a new course for the future.

So is Magdalena a "new frontier?" Not really, but yes! Have you ever

had a situation in which you went through an experience, and realized at the end you were a different person? You have profound gratitude for the lessons learned and trust it was the divine leading and love of God, even though it has been challenging. This has been the experience at CVE. Our missionaries there thank God for how he has led the ministry over the past decades and given life and hope to many children and families in the Magdalena community.



CHANGES WHICH REQUIRE A NEW DIRECTION

At the same time, it is clear God is leading CVE down a new path, and they give God the praise for this as well. There are several factors that have been significant in clarifying God's direction.

- Childcare ministries across the globe are moving away from residential facilities towards long-term, family-based or foster care approaches. In these cases, there is an effort to support a family so they can keep a child in their home. CVE can assist in this.
- There are few believers from either Mexico or the U.S. willing and able to devote the time and energy needed to care for traumatized children in a residential setting.
- 3. CVE desires the long-term fruit of the gospel in Magdalena to be a thriving local church, which will require more time invested in the Magdalena church.
- 4. CVE is deepening their commitment and investment to the process of learning and listening to those in the community. This asset-based approach will be used in navigating and assessing the ongoing effectiveness of ministry.

Our Call to Live Missionally

Many years ago, the English theologian Charles Spurgeon said "Every Christian is either a missionary, or an imposter." While this statement seems extreme at first glance, it does challenge us to be sharing Christ in the normal course of our daily lives — even if we aren't technically a missionary.

The practical reality is that most Christians will not move away, start a ministry in a different state or country, or be heavily involved in an official mission that is beyond the needs of a local congregation. Many live in the same community they grew up in, attend the same church, follow a local career path that fits their skillset, and live what our modern society would describe as ordinary lives. And that's fine.

But, every believer is charged to live missionally. HarvestCall defines "missionary" as "a follower of Christ sent for a role purposed towards the fulfillment of the Great Commission" which usually entails going to a foreign country. That certainly applies to some, but living missionally applies to each of us, right where we live.

Every life has equal value in the eyes of God. We all have a common purpose to "teach all nations" in different ways. Here are a few questions to inspire and challenge us to live missionally:

- Am I faithful in prayer each day?
