Bittersweet Farms Comes to Safe Haven

Spring blew into Safe Haven Farms this year with high winds and the hiring on March 1, 2013 of Bittersweet Farms as our residential provider. Bittersweet Farms in Whitehouse OH was established in the early 80's as a farm for adults with autism and serves as a worldwide benchmark for good practices in its field.

Vicki Obee, Executive Director, has played a large role in strategic planning for the transition. Dustin Watkins, Assistant Executive Director, is responsible for overseeing program services at Safe Haven. Dustin comments, "We are in the process of establishing a fixed leadership team, but have assembled a team of intermediate leaders from our other programs for the initial transition as we move forward." Dustin is joined by Tom Oster,

Staffing Manager, Stacy Roberts, Program Manager, Natalie Reynolds, Program Leader, and Janice Tinch, Quality Assurance Coordinator.

Asked about Bittersweet's goals for Safe Haven
Dustin answers, "To imbed our philosophy of
MAPS (Meaning & Motivation, Aerobic Activity,
Partnership, and Structured Supports). This allows us to meet the individual needs of the
Safe Haven participants and to teach them the necessary skills to build

towards greater independence, self-worth, and overall health."

The MAPS model focuses on individualized program goals, continuous data collection by direct care staff and weekly monitoring of individual progress by the support team

"Change can be difficult," Dustin says, "and I think the best surprise has been how well everyone has responded to changes and challenges so far. The staff, families, and participants have been extremely flexible and patient through the transition and receptive to new ideas and approaches.

Bittersweet will take over Day Services as well on June 1, 2013.

The residents, families, and supporters of Safe Haven Farms look forward to a fruitful collaboration with Bittersweet Farms. Welcome!

Safe Haven Farms is home to six alpacas donated by sisters Julie Bodette and Kimberly Buechner Fouse. Julie's farm, Sunny Meade Alpacas, Ltd. is located in Swanton, Ohio just down the road from Bittersweet Farms in Whitehouse, Ohio. Kimberly owns Alpacas of the Covenant, Inc., an alpaca breeding business in Cold Spring, Kentucky.

While their breeding businesses are separate, the sisters own a third business together, All Things Alpaca, LLC, originator and distributor of the Alpaca Fleece-Filled Bird Nesting Ball (patent pending).

The sisters share two passions: alpacas, and giving back to their communities. Julie became interested in autism when a neighbor on the autism spectrum came to visit her farm. She saw, firsthand, the intuitive spark between the alpacas and this young man. She began looking for ways to use her herd to make a difference in the lives of those with autism.



Starbuck, Ray, Otis and Lucado joined the Safe Haven family in June 2010. In the fall of 2012, Julie donated two more alpacas to Safe Haven, Dexter and G.

Several of the Safe Haven farmers have been involved in making the Nesting Balls. This activity provides a concrete end result, increases focus, helps develop motor skills, and serves as a creative outlet for people on the autism spectrum. This perfectly matches Safe Haven's mission of providing meaningful work for its farmers.

It is hoped that enough of the Alpaca Fleece-filled Bird Nesting Balls will be generated so the farmers of Safe Haven can sell them during the summer at area farmers' markets, a venture that can increase the farmers' confidence in the public arena and further introduce Safe Haven to the larger community.

Safe Haven's alpacas were sheared in April of 2013. Farmer Jim was a big help, and several other farmers came to the barn to observe. The best quality fiber was gathered for product use, and the "seconds" were saved for Nesting Ball material.

Alpaca Nesting Balls provide an all-natural nesting material for backyard birds. The 4" nesting ball offers birds a soft, insulating material with which to line their nests. Even when exposed to the elements, the fleece dries back to its natural, soft state.

Nesting Balls can be purchased online at www.allthingsalpaca.com and other authorized retailers and soon from Safe Hayen.

Abby currently performs the bulk of the duties; Bill still works full time but helps out during evenings and on weekends.


Abby credits farmer Jim Wilson for being her solid right-hand man. "He is my official farm manager assistant and he is just wonderful," she said. "He loves doing repairs, is strong and so loving and gentle with the animals. He takes his job very seriously."

Animal care and farming skills are being taught to the farmers so they can take over many of the farm responsibilities. Abby is actively training staff members to instruct and assist the farmers. "Even something as simple as the correct way to pick up a wheelbarrow needs to be taught," she stressed.

2013 Development Focus

People on the autism spectrum love the sensory input of the great outdoors. Animals, birds, plants, and water help to create a calming environment.

We are continually looking for ways to make Safe Haven a beautiful, homelike setting that brings our farmers outdoors to enjoy nature. This year's planned improvements for the farm include:

- Add a new chicken coop with run to house a dozen chickens (fresh eggs for breakfast!)
- Build a duck shelter on the small pond for 6-8 ducks
- Install a fountain and deck for the small pond near the houses
- Create a park-like setting around the picnic shelter in front of the houses, with walkway, benches, and plants
- Build a gazebo behind the Hatton Center, with seating for the farmers and staff
- Create a new patio setting around the gazebo, including a grill for cookouts

In 2012 we saw the construction of a useful and exciting addition to the farm landscape—the new pole barn. It contains needed storage space for farm equipment and hay, but it seems to have gone to the dogs, literally.

Safe Haven canines-in-residence Bo and Mattie call the barn their home and love the convenient doggy-door access.

Bo, the 10-year-old beagle, wandered onto the property at Christmas time in 2011 and started to make a bed out of hay in the main barn and eat out of the



trash. The dog hung around for a few days, so the farmers, with the help of staff members Kari and Mike Rogers, made *Lost Dog* fliers and posted them locally. "We went door to door and no one knew him," said Mike. "So he ended up living with Kari and me until March 2013 when the dog room and doggy door were completed. Now that Bo has moved back to the farm, he is reported to be much happier in his outdoor environment with his companion Mattie.

Mattie is a playful 3-year-old black lab that seems to fit right in with both fourlegged and two-legged friends at the farm. She was a gift from Penny Dixon, a relative of one of the day farmers.

Mike said that the two dogs were instant "best buds" from the first day and that they go everywhere together.



The pampered pups are fun for the farmers to have around and they serve a practical purpose as well. The farmers must walk, feed, groom and bathe them and also clean the beds and towels in their doggie "digs" on a weekly basis. Now that's Four Star service!

It was through the generosity of the Hatton Foundation that Safe Haven was able to construct and equip the new pole barn. We are deeply grateful.
