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


GE volunteers organized by Amy Zurawka planted 15 large shade trees and 16 bushes to create a park in front of the residential homes.

Teresa has lived in several places in her 50 years, and of all the places, she is the happiest at Safe Haven. The farm neighborhood provides her with enriched living experiences and freedom of safe exploration around the large property not found in her previous urban and suburban communities.

Jade loves to snuggle under a blanket and wrap herself tight while she watches TV. She enjoys books, puzzles, walking, shopping, holding hands, and riding in the car. Disney movies are the "icing on her cake," according to her mother, Haidi. Jade's new bedroom is decorated in—what else—a Disney princess theme.



Jade moved into House 1 in March. Jade's parents, Haidi and Jerry, have been involved with Safe Haven from the very beginning, attending all of the informational meetings from 2009 on. Because Jade was still in school when Safe Haven opened in 2010, Jade was placed on the waiting list. Over the past four years,

Haidi and Jerry have helped Jade acclimate to Safe Haven by bringing Jade to almost all of the monthly dances and holiday parties.

Jade comes to Safe Haven from Toledo, where she lived in a home run by Lutheran Homes Society (LHS). After graduating from school at the age of 21, she moved home with Mom and Dad and waited for an opening at Safe Haven Farms.

When an opening became available, Bittersweet's 30-day intake program gave Jade time to adjust to her new surroundings before her move-in date. Over the course of thirty days Jade spent a few hours per week in Day-Hab and stayed overnight on weekends in House 1.

"One of Jade's caregivers from LHS came down for Jade's first overnight," Haidi says. "We were thankful


Shopsmith... Times Two!

Equestrian Program for Children and Adults with Autism . . . Starting Soon!

Experience has shown that horseback riding has significant therapeutic benefits for people with autism and Safe Haven is thrilled to offer such an important activity. Our goal is to provide riders with a sense of personal achievement through therapeutic experiences, using equine-related activities. Physical and Sensory Benefits. People with autism often have decreased coordination, strength and muscle tone. Riding the horse develops strength as the rider constantly adjusts his body to stay on and control the horse during changes in speed, direction, hills and curves on a trail. Controlling the reins to steer or stop helps the rider develop coordination between the left and right sides of the body.

Cognitive and Language Benefits. People with autism sometimes struggle to comprehend directions and communicate. Riding a horse provides activities that require following directions—such as touching the mane and tail, steering the reins at a junction or

saying "Go" after the instructor says, "One, two, three." The horse provides a natural learning environment because the rider is motivated to move, and the instructor can stop the horse to let him know that he must listen and respond before movement resumes.

> The rider often shows a great deal of pleasure and sense of

accomplishment after learning to associate the words with the response of the horse. He learns to focus on something outside himself, an important step for a person with autism. He also learns to communicate and interact with the instructors and volunteers who are leading the horse or walking beside him and to respond to

verbal cues from the instructor as he completes specific tasks.

Emotional Bond between Rider and Horse. Riding horses is much more than just a physical experience. While the movement of the horse is great for improving circulation, muscle control, and coordination, there is also a profound bond that riders healthy and disabled-develop with their mounts.

People with disabilities know the horse will love them for who they are despite their difficulties in speaking or how they look. Caring for a horse helps the rider learn about the feelings of another living being. Hopefully, that bond will help the person with autism develop social and communication skills in other areas of his life.

Horses—We Have Big Ones and Little Ones!

Two miniature horses were recently donated to us by farm supporter, Ingrid Anderson. So doggone cute, Jack, a black gelding, and Lacy, a palomino mare, are about the same size as our Great Pyrenees, Riley. Farmer Emily has christened them the "horse puppies."

Ingrid also donated a riding cart for Jack and Lacy to pull, so any farmers who may be reluctant to ride our full-size horses can enjoy a ride around the property in the cart. Donna Farler notes that Jack and Lacy are sweet natured and have been well socialized to be around people. They arrived at the farm in style in a large full-size horse trailer, also donated with them.

for (their willingness to help with Jade's transition)."

Haidi continues, "Jade has adjusted very well from the beginning. Everyone in her home seems to enjoy her. She's very happy and contented, she's laughing. All of the staff in the day program have commented on how well she's doing, too.

"Jade could have lived at home as an adult," Haidi remarks. "We've always taken her everywhere. She's

never been sheltered. We've taken her to Disney World, we stay in hotels, we go out to eat. But what happens when we're no longer here? We have no extended family, nowhere for her to go after we're gone. This has been our real concern all along.

"We'll do anything for Jade to be happy. And we'll do anything for Safe Haven. We're here." Haidi hesitates for a moment. "We are hopeful this will be Jade's home forever." Jon passed away unexpectedly after surgery on January 13, 2014, at the age of 40.

In his moving tribute read at Jon's Celebration of Life, Dan Norris said, "Our children exhaust us, soften us as men, teach us to cry and create a fierceness of spirit. Another crisis, a school break down, care givers not showing up, another police run, another hospital run, what are we to do with the future, to protect our deepest treasure? None of the options available are acceptable. We can't do it alone."

The Safe Haven family became true family through Jon's loss. We learned the deep truth of these words—we can't do it alone—and gathered together as one to support Don and Suzanne, and to support one another in this tragic loss even as we

Jon, we smile as we remember your love for long hikes, swimming, dancing, and eating dessert. Those of us who were there at your final goodbye will never forget celebrating your life as we sang and clapped to that uplifting song, "Spirit in the Sky."

You are missed, but you live on in the legacy of this farm that your mother and father helped bring to reality. –KB

as they share times of questioning,


