# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

We have just completed another good year in Algoma Highlands Conservancy history. I will touch on some highlights here but please read on for details in the pages that follow.

Conservation through land acquisition is the Conservancy's primary mandate. After our 2023 purchase of the 332-acre Ebare Tract, which adds most of King Mountain's eastern portion to our holdings, we initiated the Ebare Tract Campaign with the goal to raise \$320,000. Funds are intended to:

- (1) Pay off acquisition transaction costs and private loans (\$130,000 - received as a 2023 grant from the federal government's Land Trust Conservation Fund):
- (2) Seed our newly established Stewardship Endowment Fund (\$90,000 - a mechanism that is being adopted by land trusts to uncouple stewardship expenses from unpredictable operational budgets and secure their payment from interest accrued by permanently invested funds); and
- (3) Replenish our land acquisition reserve for future purchases (\$100,000 - our goal is to protect the entire King Mountain formation).

At the close of 2024, we had raised \$262,000 towards that goal.

Thanks again to all our donors and members on both sides of the border for your generous and ongoing support. Our campaign continues in 2025 to raise the remaining \$58,000 so please stay tuned for more to come.

In 2024 we made a contribution to Canada's goal of conserving 30% of its geography by 2030. We did so by registering our entire holdings (King Mountain, Robertson Cliffs and Ebare Tract properties, totalling 3248 acres or 1314 hectares) on the Canadian Protected and Conserved Area Database, a long and process that was completed convoluted September. With this move our local conservation efforts have gained national significance. release available **here**.

The Ebare Tract purchase secures the Hakon Lien trail as a permanent feature of the Stokely Creek trail system as a challenging but favourite ski route to our much-visited asset on Bone Lake, Norm's cabin. In 2024 we transferred the rights to operate Norm's cabin as a backcountry ecotourism destination during the summer and fall from BlagBear Eco Adventures Routes to Forest the Canoe.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE con't

The AHC continues to manage winter rentals and provides a volunteer host each weekend to connect with Stokely Creek Lodge guests and other day-skiers.

Project and laid the foundation for extending our research activities. Trail cameras from the project were reassigned to a network of permanent wildlife monitoring sites on AHC lands, as a key component of our stewardship responsibility to track ecosystem health, in particular impacts of increasing trail use on biodiversity values.

In 2024 we received recognition for the contributions we make to our community by being awarded one of Sault Ste. Marie's Community Builders Award.



# **NORM'S CABIN**

Norm's cabin is a remote destination for outdoor enthusiasts. The necessity to access the cabin by skiing, snowshoeing, hiking, biking or paddling makes the arrival feel truly rewarding. Norm's cabin overlooks Bone Lake and views of the water and surrounding hills are enticing throughout the year.

During the ski season, the Algoma Highlands Conservancy provides hosts during the weekends who keep the cabin warm and provide tea, cookies and the opportunity to chat. Regrettably, the 2024 ski season could be remembered as the year we didn't have winter due to the insufficient snowfall and temperatures that were too warm to keep the base. Kees van Frankenhuyzen and Paul McBay were the hosts again but their duties were limited from mid-January to the end of February due to the dismal ski season.

We are grateful that Carole Blaquiere of Blaq Bear Eco Adventure Routes continued to manage the bookings for the 2024 winter season and guests were able to make a reservation on a per room basis. However, after 6 years of doing an excellent job of managing Norm's cabin which included the summer rentals from promotion to customer service, Carole decided not to renew the agreement.

In June, Forest the Canoe, took over the right to operate Norm's cabin as an ecotourism destination. The bookings were made through AirBnB and for the entire cabin during the summer and fall. Unfortunately, there were very few bookings for Norm's cabin last year even though it had been very popular during the pandemic.



Back country enthusiasts are invited to book the cabin for an overnight stay or drop by for a day visit to experience the beauty of Bone Lake and the surrounding hills and forests.



### Snowshoeing with Land Based Learning Class - January 2024

White Pines Grade 7-8 Land Based Learning Class came out for a snowshoe in the highland's outdoor classroom! We scouted tracks, looked for spoor, and did bum-slides down the ravines. Students learned about flora and fauna, conservation efforts and updates on the wolf project. They journaled, read and took photos for a class project.



## Jane Goodall Reasons for Hope - March & November 2024

AHC was invited to participate in this event, hosted at the Bushplane Museum, and geared to teaching grade 4 students from ADSB and HSCDB about conservation and our initiatives. Hands-on activities and a slide show were developed and presented in 30 minute blocks of time and reached over 400 children. The activities focused on wolf research, perceptions of wolves, and food webs. The success of our outreach was evident in the feedback received from teachers, EA's and students.

#### BioBlitz - June 2024

In cooperation with the Sault Naturalists and through independent citizen scientists, the species of flora and fauna on the AHC land holdings continue to be documented. This blitz resulted in 215 observations of 127 species! This expanding database is crucial to our ongoing conservation efforts.




Fall Colour Hike Stokely Creek with Sault Naturalists - October 2024

## **ALGOMA REGIONAL ENVIROTHON**

Fall, Winter & Spring Workshops & Spring Competition Sept 2023 - May 2024



Envirothon is an international team-based environmental learning competition for high school youth. Over three decades, Envirothon in Algoma has reached thousands of students, helping influence post-secondary education and career decisions, enabling a connection with the outdoors and the development of environmentally responsible citizens. Partnering with Canadian Institute of Forestry, the AHC has taken on the coordination of the regional workshops and competition for over a decade.

2023-24 was an active Envirothon year with three main events. The October 2023 workshop, held at the Sault Ste Marie Conservation Authority, focussed on soils, forests and the special topic. It was a wet day, so students were happy for the indoor session on Biodiversity in a Changing Climate. Sault College was the venue and organizer for the winter workshop in March of 2024, with 2nd year students in the Wildlife Management courses leading workshop events. Stokely Creek Lodge was the venue for the May workshops and competition where 50 students from 5 area high schools took part in the two day overnight event that was supported by multiple community partners and a fleet of volunteers.

Special mention goes to Paul Hazlett from Sault Climate Hub, who proposed a Legacy Project. With the help of Alex, from Invasive Species Centre, and a host of volunteers, we pulled a swath of periwinkle from parts of Stokely Creek Property. Periwinkle, an invasive species, spreads as a thick mat and chokes out native species. This project will continue for years to come, and educate students about the importance of fostering native species in the quest for more biodiversity.
