

# MUSKOKA CONSERVANCY

Look ahead to 2024 and know you are making a difference

It's important that we take note of how we are each making the world a better place. There are big problems on planet Earth and let's face it, it can feel heavy at times. Being part of solutions is positive and that feels good!

Muskoka Conservancy is the perfect example. By supporting your local land trust, you are part of a Muskoka-wide effort to protect nature. Together, we protect wetlands, shorelines, forests, and species at risk right here, under our noses. But what makes our efforts really impactful? Muskoka Conservancy is part of a much broader international movement that protects millions of acres of ecologically important land around the globe. There are 148 community land trusts protecting over 275,000 acres of ecologically sensitive land across Canada. Land trusts in the United States have protected over 61-million acres, and the Land Trust Alliance in the U.S. has set the goal of protecting another sixty million acres by the end of the decade. That's massive!

Together, we land trusts are enacting nature-based solutions to serious problems like climate change, habitat loss, and the biodiversity crisis. Our actions ensure that people continue to enjoy the benefits of ecological services. For example, local wetlands provide flood mitigation, prevent erosion and protect Muskoka's famous water quality. On a much larger scale, protection of wetlands sequesters carbon and helps to address societal challenges like population displacement.

We act locally and our impact is global, so even though we are small, we are quite a big deal! By supporting your local land trust, you are a part of it! You are a big deal, too, so please feel good! As we look ahead to 2024 and plan our program and budgets, we can see some potential challenges. Recent years of high inflation have had an impact. Thankfully, Muskoka Conservancy has a strong, committed base of supporters. We regret to relay the news of the passing of Rose-Maria Koetitz at the age of 88 in early September 2023. Rose - Maria Koetitz was a large donor to Muskoka Conservancy. In 2022, Muskoka Conservancy was gifted Lake Rosseau Headwaters, a 428 acre property. This is currently the largest property protected by Muskoka Conservancy and was generously donated to us by Rose-Maria Koetitz.

She was born in Germany and when she was 19, she moved to Canada where she became a teacher. As an avid animal lover, she dedicated much of her time to helping preserve wildlife and nature. She participated in wildlife rescue with Aubrey Tournay at Aspen Valley Wildlife and the Zoocheck wildlife protection charity. Both Zoocheck and Aspen Valley Wildlife are animal sanctuaries. Her passion for nature was inspiring and we know that her land donation will help to protect many species in Muskoka.



Thanks to her generous donation, 428 acres of wetland and forest will be permanently protected as a Nature Reserve. This land includes a large wetland that leads into the Rosseau River. It is important to protect this wetland as it is part of a filtration process that has heavy influence on water quality in Muskoka.

Natural wetland are critical to 20% of species in Ontario. Rose-Maria's considerate donation of this property means that many species are now permanently protected.

#### **INVASIVE SPECIES UPDATES**

Muskoka Conservancy has been working with volunteers to fight invasive species each year on our nature reserves.

At Bert and Millie's Marsh, volunteers have come out to help on all 3 of the Phragmites Phighting Days. These days consisted of spading the invasive phragmites plants and putting them into dark garbage bags. These bags are then left to "cook" in the sun for several weeks until the plant and its seeds are no longer able to spread and reproduce. These bags are then emptied in the composting site on the property to decompose.

This year, in an effort to reduce the amount of phragmites returning again in the spring, a restoration experiment was conducted. This experiment consisted of volunteers and staff planting 200 meadowsweet plants. Meadowsweet is a native plant which typically grows in marsh environments including at Bert and Millie's Marsh. The goal outcome is that the meadowsweet will grow healthy and continue to spread seeds which will eventually keep the phragmites at bay.

Invasive phragmites originally came from Eurasia and now pose a threat to Canada's native species. The invasive phragmites produce a biochemical that is released from its roots into the soil which makes it difficult for other plants to grow in that soil. This results in an upset in the natural biodiversity of the area.

#### Community Engagement

Recently, Conservation Coordinator, Amanda, visited a Montessori School in Huntsville. The students listened to a short Winter Tree Identification presentation to teach them key characteristics that can be used to differentiate between tree species, specifically, in the winter when most trees have lost their leaves. Then they got the opportunity to head outdoors and put their knowledge to the test in their own school yard.
