Reflection from Steve Sully, Free Churches Representative for CTiH on 'Prince of Peace

In the beginning of time, through the creation of this world, God tamed the darkness and chaos and brought peace and order. All of creation lived in peace and unity with one another and with God. But peace in the garden was disrupted when creation was corrupted by sin. The peace between God and His creation was replaced with conflict and fear. God saw our sin-filled world and longed to restore it with his peace and love. To have peace within ourselves. So, God sent Jesus, the Prince of Peace (Isaiah 9:6) to restore our relationship with Him.

When we think of the word "peace", we think of the lack of conflict or hostility, or we picture someone being free from any anxiety. However, the Biblical concept of peace is much fuller than that. The Hebrew word for peace, *šhālôm*, means a sense of totality or completeness, wholeness and harmony. In John 14:27 we read of this promise from the Prince of Peace himself "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."

The peace Jesus brings is one that is beyond comprehension. It is a peace that comes from knowing that God has everything well in hand, even when it doesn't look like it. It is knowing that in the middle of the storm you have something beyond what is visible to anchor you.

It is knowing that you are part of an unshakable Kingdom.

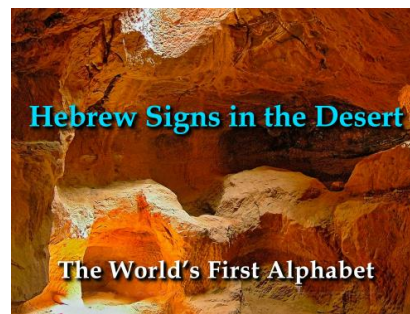

“St Martin’s Foodshare relaunches as South Wye Foodshare with diocese, cathedral and ecumenical support



St Martin’s Foodshare, which was established in 2020, began as a small operation distributing surplus food to those who needed it. Over the last six years it has grown to become a thriving project run by around thirty volunteers, serving 5-600 people in south Hereford every week. The project obtains surplus food from local supermarkets, the national charity FairShare and other sources which is then shared with the local community.

The project had originally operated from St Martin’s Church but a change in circumstances during October 2025 meant that Foodshare had to find a new home. Supported by the Diocese of Hereford and Hereford Cathedral, plans were established to ensure the long-term sustainability of this vital community project. Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church and Belmont Community Centre are now both distribution points and Hereford Cathedral will be overseeing the operations of the project, to enable the volunteers to focus on what they do best. The cathedral's Kirsty Price and Tom Milton from the diocese, pictured above, are both supporting the project.

- Everyday from 10pm @ Pomona Place

An inspiring collection of community responses to The Hereford Gospels, one of Hereford Cathedral's greatest treasures, will go on tour around the diocese this summer.

The initiative of Bishop David Thomson, pictured, the project features over 60 artist submissions in response to The Hereford Gospels, a fascinating manuscript which was created around 800AD.

Bishop David, who has led the project, said, "I am absolutely thrilled at the way in which the oldest treasure of our diocese has inspired so many of our people today, over 1200 years later."

The Hereford Gospels for Today [were] dedicated on Pentecost Sunday... The book will travel to Leominster Priory 27 May - 22 June, where Bishop David will lead a service on Trinity Sunday, 31 May. It will then be displayed in St Mary's Church, Ross-on-Wye (27 June - 6 July), Much Wenlock Parish Church (11-19 July), Hereford Cathedral (25 July - 6 Sept) and St Laurence's Ludlow (10 - 23 September).

As part of the diocese's 1350 Year of Celebration, the Cathedral is currently displaying The Hereford Gospels in its exhibition Shaping Early Medieval Faith: The Hereford Gospels.

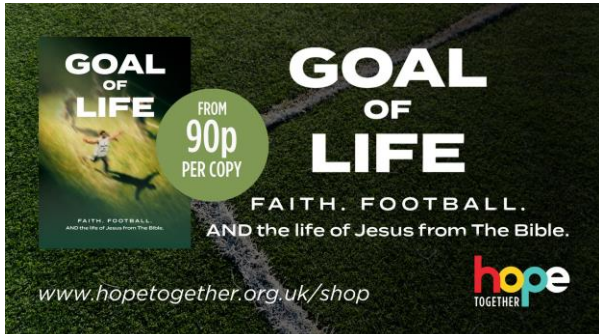

“Messy Momentum helping older children to stay in Leominster’s Messy Church

Messy Church, beloved by many of our churches, has always been intergenerational – meaning from babies and toddlers all the way up to some of our oldest parishioners. But after Year 6 of primary school, there is a perception that children may ‘age out’. Ed Ceney, Youth Pioneer at our nationally funded Youth Hub project in Leominster, is one of several youth leaders in the diocese piloting a new scheme called Messy Momentum, which finds ways to re-engage some of these older children in Messy Church.



He explains, “Messy Momentum says to these children and young teens, “you’re still welcome here”. It encourages young people who have been attached to a Messy Church to continue in their faith life, in their faith development, their growth as young disciples, and remain part of their Messy Church.”

Ed continues, “Messy Momentum offers a few different schemes. The one we’re trying in the diocese is ‘Gather’. Gather is a tried and tested youth work technique of bringing a number of youth groups together in one place. In Leominster we have young people from Leominster Messy Church as well as young people from other churches including a Methodist chapel.”
