

Celebrating Giving Black

Giving Black is a celebration of Black Philanthropy Month, drawing on traditions of generosity among continental Africans and Africa's global diaspora in the Caribbean, Europe, the Americas, the UK, and across the world.

The Giving Black Virtual Conference brings together a global community of Black philanthropy experts. This free, virtual conference attracts diverse audiences from Australia to Zimbabwe and offers community development through learning about traditional and contemporary customs of generosity among Black people.

The Giving Black Podcast is the world's first podcast dedicated to global Black philanthropy and generosity. Series One of the podcast is based on 12 episodes detailing diverse aspects of Black philanthropy. In honour of the Giving Black Conference this year, we are proud to release a special recording of the podcast featuring Ray Williams, Chair and Co-Founder of Canada's Black Opportunity Fund.

The Giving Black Marketplace is a new addition to the Giving Black suite of offerings. This year, we unite under the theme of Sankofa—an Akan tradition from Ghana, reminding us that to move forward, we must look back, ensuring no one is left behind, marginalized, or made invisible.

This fifth conference seemed impossible at one stage – it nearly didn't happen. A restful Spring and a relaxing Summer culminated in a well-deserved rest from work. Thanks to our sisters in the Black Canadian Fundraisers' Collective, and Brother Floyd Jones at Black Philanthropy Month, we gradually started to piece together the plans for a conference we could be proud of.

The number five was a recurring inspiration and theme in our exploratory discussions about the 2025 conference:

- **5 years** since the publication of <u>Collecting Courage</u>, an anthology capturing the voices and experiences of 14 Black Fundraisers in North America.
- **5 Years** of Celebrating **The Giving Black Conferences** in honour of Black Philanthropy month and the generous traditions of Africa's diaspora all over the world.
- 5 years (well, actually, six years but who's counting?) since the release of agentsC's <u>COVID-19 Research Series</u>, which sparked our commitment to sector-wide research at agentsC., and highlighted the unique experiences of Black Fundraisers during the pandemic and amidst the global reckoning after George Floyd's murder.ds.

We knew this Giving Black Conference must be steeped in the Black Philanthropy Month call to action, Sankofa: Remember, Reclaim, Rise! Once our ideas crystalized, we decided to shift our usual conference date from August (Black Philanthropy Month) to October (Black History Month in the UK). In between, we created videos and podcasts to celebrate our five-year milestones, all of which may be found on The Giving Black Website: www.givingblack.ca.



Your Giving Black Conference People, Program, and Agenda

Guided by the call to action—Sankofa: Remember, Reclaim, Rise—our conference spotlight is on agentsC's new research, *Fundraising While Black: Harm, Happiness, and Healing*. With a publication date of November 2025, the research reveals how Black fundraisers in Canada and the USA navigate systemic anti-Black racism within predominantly white Institutions, drawing on happiness through their networks, and wellness from mindful practice.

Our incredible Spotlight Panel—featuring Chairs and founding members of five Black Fundraising Membership Associations (BFMAs) in Canada and the USA—shine a light on how their associations create spaces of belonging, safety, and connection, where Black fundraisers can heal, grow, and rise together, free from the discrimination they face in Predominantly White Institutions of the non-profit sector.

Kimahli Powell LL.D (Hons) an International Human Rights Activist working at Harvard University's Kennedy Centre is a Carr Ryan Fellow, at a time when the university is under government threat and as freedom of speech, and the rights of intersectional and marginalized people are being challenged. He's answering a central question, what is the role of Black philanthropy during our trialling times.

The Giving Black Award for Philanthropic Achievement goes to Birgit Smith Burton, Founder and Chair of the African American Development Officers (AADO) network.


Birgit is a treasured friend and revered sister to many in the global non-profit sector. She approaches her work with love and compassion. She is a mentor to hundreds if not thousands of fundraisers. Birgit leads with vision, strength and courage. She is a skilled songstress, and wonderful storyteller. Her jokes are legendary and her generosity has no limit.



Birgit is a trailblazing leader in global philanthropy and a passionate advocate for equity in fundraising. As Founder and CEO of the African American Development Officers Network

(AADO), she has spent over two decades advancing fundraisers of colour through mentorship, education, and community. At Georgia Tech, where she served for 26 years, Birgit led foundation relations that raised more than \$700 million for scholarships, programs, and capital projects. In 2023, she made history as the first African American woman elected Chair of the Association of Fundraising Professionals (AFP) Global Board. Her work is featured in Collecting Courage and The Philanthropic Covenant with Black America. A recipient of CASE's Opportunity and Inclusion Award, Birgit continues to champion inclusion, leadership, and opportunity, inspiring a generation of fundraisers to build a more just and connected philanthropic sector. Join us in celebrating Sister Birgit for her remarkable achievements and lasting impact in fundraising and philanthropy.

She serves on the board of the Association of International Schools in Africa and chairs the Mastercard Foundation advisory committee in Ghana, championing inclusive education and EdTech innovation across the continent. Dr. Ashun co-founded His Majesty's Christian School to deliver transformative education in rural Ghana and has spearheaded initiatives including TEDxSixteenMileCreek, the TIME Educators Conference. and mentorship programs through the African Leadership Academy. A distinguished Ghanaian-Canadian author writing under the names Mary Ashun, Asabea Ashun, and Abena Apea, she has published over ten works bridging science and storytelling, making STEM accessible to young readers while celebrating African experiences.

Nasra Ayub is a multi-award winning campaigner, writer, and public speaker passionate about tackling racism, ending violence against women and girls, and

Marcus Brewer Chair, Men of Color in Development

Marcus Brewer is a dedicated leader in the non-profit sector, known for his commitment to advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion within fundraising

and community development. He currently serves as the Chair of Men of Color in Development (MOCID), a national network focused on supporting men of color in the fundraising profession.

In addition to his role at MOCID, Marcus is Chief Collaborator at MB Consulting. Marcus builds strategies to help non-profits: create mutually beneficial partnerships, and develop a process to help connect with corporations and foundations.

Marcus is also an advocate for Black philanthropy and has contributed to discussions on Black fundraising practices, including participating in the #CauseChat conversation about Black fundraising and philanthropy.

His leadership and advocacy efforts have made a significant impact on the non-profit sector, particularly in promoting inclusivity and supporting the professional growth of men of color in development.



Birgit Smith Burton Chief Executive Officer, African American Development Officers

Birgit Smith Burton (USA) is the Founder and Chief Executive Officer of the African American Development Officers Network

(AADO), established at Georgia Tech in 1999 to advance professional development, education, employment support, mentorship, and networking for fundraisers of color. A respected speaker on fundraising and diversity, she has authored articles on advancing equity in philanthropy and co-authored The Philanthropic Covenant with Black America. She also contributed to Five Minutes for Fundraising: A Collection of Expert Advice and shared her personal journey in Collecting Courage (2020), which highlights the lived experiences of Black fundraisers.

Over a 26-year career at Georgia Tech, Birgit's leadership secured over \$700M for programs, scholarships, and capital projects. She was the first African American woman elected Chair of the AFP Global Board and has served nearly a decade on AFP's board. Her accolades include the Opportunity and Inclusion Award from CASE, and the R.I.S.E. Fund was established in her honor to support women of color in fundraising.

Birgit chairs the A.E. Lowe Grice Scholarship Fund, serves on advisory boards for Somos El Poder and Women of Color in Fundraising and Philanthropy, and is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority.





Christal M. Cherry Founder, Fabulous Female Fundraisers

Christal M. Cherry is the Beyoncé of board leadership. Founder of The Board Pro, Christal is a nationally recognized nonprofit consultant, speaker, and coach who brings

courage, curiosity, and care to every boardroom. With over two decades of experience in fundraising, board governance, leadership development, and DEI strategy, she helps nonprofit leaders and boards move from stuck to soaring. and gender roles were central not only to her family but to herself, including the harsh realities of how skin color can shape one's role, future, and existence within Brazilian society. Camila first engaged in philanthropy through her family's community initiatives, igniting a lifelong passion for racial justice and equity. Her career in the charitable sector is a means to contribute towards the eradication of all forms of prejudice preventing the advancement and betterment of humankind.

Camila is a senior fundraising professional in Toronto, an avid researcher and consultant on issues of race, gender, diversity, racial justice and equity, as well as a coach to Brazilians involved in philanthropy and fundraising in Brazil and Canada. She holds a PhD in Public Policy & International Relations.

Camila is a co-editor and contributor in the book "Collecting Courage: Joy, Pain, Freedom, Love" a collection of personal testimonies written by 15 Black American and Canadian non-profit professionals about racism and exclusion in the sector. She is a member of the Black Canadian Fundraisers Collective and serves on the Board of Directors of the Alzheimer Society of Ontario. Camila is a daughter, sister, aunt, wife and her family is complete with two lovely cats.



Kimahli Powell LL.D (Hons) Carr-Ryan Center Fellow, Harvard University

Kimahli is fellow at the Ryan-Carr Center for Human Rights at Harvard Kennedy School.

He is a senior leader in the INGO field with expertise in community building and strategic advocacy with a focus on international development, law and policy, HIV/AIDS, and internally displaced persons. Kimahli completed his undergraduate studies in Political Science at the University of Ottawa. He holds a Doctor of Laws from the University of Victoria. Among his career highlights is supporting Dignitas International's innovative work in supporting community based – system health strengthening in Malawi, as well as helping launch the HIV Legal Network's constitutional challenge to Jamaica's anti-sodomy law while developing a monitoring and evaluation framework on legal advocacy.

At Rainbow Railroad, Kimahli led the organization through transformational growth, helping thousands of people in the process. Under his leadership, Rainbow Railroad expanded its international reach and completed successful crisis interventions in Chechnya, Egypt, Uganda, Afghanistan and Ukraine. Most recently, Rainbow Railroad achieved a historic partnership with the Canadian government and working partnerships with the US government and the UN Refugee Agency. Kimahli has served as a board member for ILGA, former Chair of the Dignity Network and is a current board member of the Foundation for Black Communities and Refugee Council USA. Kimahli is a regular contributor to international media with appearances on CNN, MSBC, CBC, BBC and a profile on 60 Minutes.





Brenda Richardson Founder, NuGenesis Breathwork

Brenda is a certified breathwork facilitator and the founder of NuGenesis Breathwork, a wellness practice dedicated to helping individuals and

teams manage stress, improve focus, and build emotional resilience through guided breathwork.

Her approach integrates conscious connected breathing, meditation, and affirmations to support nervous system regulation and overall well-being. Drawing from her own lived experience with anxiety, burnout, and chronic stress, Brenda brings empathy, clarity, and grounded presence to every session.
