BACKGROUND:

Previously ERMU had partnered with Minnesota Municipal Utilities Association's (MMUA) statewide scholarship program. With MMUA adapting its program, ERMU communications staff took the opportunity to update its own program, specifically focusing on improving response rates as well as supporting students seeking careers in electric, water, and/or conservation service fields. The program was also updated in 2025 to provide up to two \$1,000 awards annually.

Staff reviewed scholarship programs from various organizations and created an application that encourages students pursuing vocational, two-year, or four-year schools to apply. The traditional essay format was replaced with short-answer questions designed to provide insight into the applicant as an individual, their post-secondary education plans, and their understanding of municipal utilities' role in the community.

DISCUSSION:

ERMU is excited to announce that Elk River High School seniors Andrew Madson and Owen Westberg have been selected as the recipients of the 2025 ERMU scholarships. Andrew will attend line school this fall, as he was drawn to the profession for its blend of physical work, problem-solving, and career stability. Andrew also participated in a line crew job shadow at ERMU recently. Owen Westberg plans to attend a four year university to pursue a degree in engineering, with a possible emphasis on electrical engineering, leveraging his strengths in math and science.

ERMU wishes both students the best as they pursue their goals in these vital fields.

1.0 GOVERNANCE

1.1 Call Meeting to Order

The regular meeting of the Utilities Commission was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Chair Dietz.

1.2 Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

1.3 Consider the Agenda

Moved by Commissioner Westgaard and seconded by Commissioner Stewart to approve the April 8, 2025, agenda. Motion carried 5-0.

1.4 Resolution Recognizing 2025 Drinking Water Week

Mr. Ninow presented his memo on 2025 Drinking Water Week, occurring May 4-10. Explaining that this year's focus is exploring the science of safe water, advocating for infrastructure improvement, and promoting responsive stewardship.

Moved by Commissioner Zerwas and seconded by Commissioner Bell to adopt Resolution 25-2 Recognizing Drinking Water Week, May 4-10, 2025. Motion carried 5-0.

1.5 Resolution Recognizing 2025 Lineworker Appreciation Day

Mr. Sumstad presented his memo on 2025 Lineworker Appreciation Day. He explained that ERMU currently has 10 lineworkers, consisting of 8 journeymen and two apprentices, as well as a foreperson. Mr. Sumstad commended staff and the work they do.

Moved by Commissioner Stewart and seconded by Commissioner Westgaard to adopt Resolution 25-3 Recognizing Lineworkers and Designating April 18, 2025, as Lineworker Appreciation Day. Motion carried 5-0.

1.6 Recognition of Employee Longevity – Mike Tietz, 8 years; Chris Sumstad, 24 years

Mr. Geiser recognized Mr. Tietz and Mr. Sumstad for their respective longevity terms. Mr. Geiser explained that Mr. Tietz is a crucial member of the Advanced Metering Infrastructure project, as well as managing substations, infrastructure locates, technical services, and more. Mr. Geiser shared that Mr. Sumstad plays an important role in managing line crews, inventory, and daily responsibilities. Chair Dietz presented each staff member with the corresponding longevity payments. Both expressed their appreciation and there was a round of applause.

1.7 Recognition APPA Certificate of Excellence in Reliability

Mr. Tietz presented his memo which explained that the American Public Power Association (APPA) had recently honored 255 public power utilities with a certificate of excellence in reliability, of which ERMU was one. Mr. Tietz noted that ERMU's System Average Interruption Duration Index, which measures the average outage time per customer, was 42.083 minutes in comparison to an industry average of 148 minutes.

2.0 CONSENT AGENDA (Approved By One Motion)

Moved by Commissioner Bell and seconded by Commissioner Westgaard to approve the Consent Agenda as follows:

- 2.1 Check Register March 2025
- 2.2 Regular Meeting Minutes March 11, 2025
- 2.3 Resolution Electing Not to Waive Statutory Tort Limits for Liability Insurance
- 2.4 Updated Travel Expense Guidelines

Motion carried 5-0.

3.0 OPEN FORUM

No one appeared for open forum.

4.0 POLICY & COMPLIANCE

4.1 **2024** Financial Audit

Mr. Nilson from ABDO Solutions presented ERMU's 2024 audit results, which issued a clean, unmodified audit opinion and compliance with Minnesota state statutes. He also showcased charts comparing expenditures, receipts, cash balances, and debt obligations over the past four years. He detailed a key expenditure in the Electric fund which is purchased power. Within the water fund depreciation and operating costs were discussed as well as a modest drop in usage. There was discussion.

Commissioner Zerwas provided context from his experience with the state legislature, explaining how commonly small rural utilities rely on state funding for major projects. He stated his perspective that ERMU is in good position relative to others by having some funds available for projects. Mr. Hanson added that resilience and reliability are major contributor to a utility's financial stability, referring to the previously discussed reliability award.

Moved by Commissioner Stewart and seconded by Commissioner Bell to receive and file the 2024 Annual Financial Report. Motion carried 5-0.

4.2 **2024** Year End Reserve Balance

Ms. Karpinski presented her memo which recommends that unrestricted reserve balances above target levels for the Electric Utility fund, calculated at \$3,026,233, be designated for electric service territory transfer costs, and capital infrastructure costs; and that unrestricted reserve balances for the Water Utility fund, calculated at \$8,538,018 be designated for current and future capital infrastructure costs.

Moved by Commissioner Westgaard and seconded by Commissioner Zerwas to designate unrestricted reserve balances above target levels for Electric and Water funds. Motion carried 5-0

4.3 <u>Utilities Performance Incentive Compensation Distribution</u>

Ms. Karpinski presented the memo which called for a 3% distribution to qualifying employees per the terms of the policy and based upon staff achieving all stated goals.

Staff explained that this was a \$140,000 budget item and that next year the maximum distribution will be reduced to 2% as part of the approved Wage & Benefit Committee recommendations in 2024.

Moved by Commissioner Zerwas and seconded by Commissioner Bell to award the Performance Metrics and Compensation Distribution of 3% to qualifying employees per the terms of the policy. Motion carried 5-0.

4.4 <u>Commission Policy Review – G.4a – Succession of Leadership</u>

Mr. Mauren presented his memo which proposed changes to the commission policy establishing that the interim acting general manager job description would effectively be the current general manager's job description until a special meeting is convened to establish the role description.

The memo also established the operations director as the primary successor and the administration director as the secondary successor.

Moved by Commissioner Zerwas and seconded by Commissioner Westgaard to approve recommended language updates. Motion carried 5-0.

4.5 Electric Vehicle Charger Discussion

In response to staff's question, the Commission expressed no interest in offering free energy through ERMU's currently owned EV chargers. They directed staff to hold discussions with local stakeholders (the Downtown Elk River Business Association and Rockwoods restaurant) to gauge their interest in taking over the chargers in the downtown Elk River parking lot and near the restaurant, respectively. If there is no interest the Commission directed staff to proceed with removing the chargers. ERMU will continue to operate a public charger at City Hall as a means to service its own EV.

5.0 **BUSINESS ACTION**

5.1 Financial Report – February 2025

Ms. Karpinski presented the financial report for February 2025. The report shows a profit of approximately \$412,000 with a profit margin of 5.6%. Both electric and water departments performed favorably compared to budget. Increased usage and sales helped contribute to favorable results in the electric and water budgets. There was discussion.

Moved by Commissioner Westgaard and seconded by Commissioner Stewart to receive the February 2025 Financial Report. Motion carried 5-0.

5.2 **Annual Reliability Report**

Mr. Tietz presented his memo which highlighted report data on ERMU's result from the 2024 eReliaiblity Tracker. Mr. Tietz highlighted report data showing that tree contact caused 37% of outages in 2024, squirrels caused 26%, and vehicle accidents caused 9%. Mr. Tietz

explained that ERMU will continue its dedicated tree trimming program and commended staff and the utility's robust system for contributing to strong results.

Chair Dietz asked if ERMU is allowed to trim trees on private property. Staff explained that they will always communicate the need to trim trees with residents, but ERMU has the right to maintain plant growth in the right of way.

5.3 Water Service Line Ownership

Mr. Hanson presented his memo and invited the Commission to discuss what if any changes they'd like staff to pursue in water service line ownership. The topic had previously been covered in a discussion of the curb stop valve break during open forum at the December 2024 meeting and during business action at the February 2025 meeting. Mr. Hanson explained the potential iterations of ownership based on his research of 50 Minnesota municipal water utilities.

The four options discussed were to maintain status quo with customers owning service lines through the curb stop, maintain status quo but with a protection program, and ERMU owning the service line up to the curb stop with or without commercial exemption.

A review of insurance options and cost implications (annual costs approximately \$47,000—\$61,000 with additional deductible considerations) was provided. Mr. Hanson explained that ERMU would need to incur insurance costs over \$100,000 to break even and shared his opinion that this having costs over that amount were unlikely.

There was discussion around the relative infrequency of water service line breaks, generally occurring one to two times a year. Given this infrequency, Commissioner Stewart suggested that pursuing a change in policy could be an example of a "solution in search of a problem." The group also discussed the availability of the Dispute Resolution Committee to address individual cases.

The Commission reached consensus to continue with the current water service line ownership policy and revisit potential changes based on feedback from a future customer survey and the 2025 rate study. Accordingly, communications and finance staff will investigate pursuing the survey and the study.

5.4 Advanced Metering Infrastructure Update

Mr. Tietz explained that Allegiant has completed its portion of the residential work on the project due to intermittent water appointments and low inventory on electric meters, adding that ERMU staff will complete the rest of the installation work.

Residential water meter exchange work is approximately 92% complete with roughly 500 replacements remaining.

There have been 86 residential water repairs performed by Archer Plumbing totaling \$30,610.36, which is within the budgeted amount.

Commercial water meter work is approximately 45% complete.

Residential electric meter replacement is about 78% complete. Commercial electric meter replacements are pending delivery.

An estimated 85% of all AMI meters (11,689 electric, 5,224 water) are currently installed.

6.0 BUSINESS DISCUSSION

6.1 **Staff Updates**

The Commission discussed plans and travel arrangements for the APPA Summer Conference in New Orleans and the Minnesota Municipal Utilities Association Summer Conference in Rochester, MN.

ERMU is entering into an agreement with Summit Collection Agency beginning June 1, 2025, which is a change in service providers.

6.2 <u>City Council Update</u>

Chair Dietz provided a City Council Update.

6.3 **Future Planning**

Chair Dietz announced the following:

- a. Regular Commission Meeting May 13, 2025
- b. 2025 Governance Agenda

6.4 Other Business

Commissioner Bell shared that he would be moving to Florida in April 2025 which will require him to resign from the Commission. The Commission thanked him for his dedication over the years and wished him well.

Moved by Commissioner Zerwas and seconded by Commissioner Westgaard to adjourn the regular meeting of the Elk River Municipal Utilities Commission at 5:36 p.m. Motion carried 5-0.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

Recently staff noticed that the last paragraph of the ERMU Policy G.4g1 – Performance Metrics and Incentive Compensation established the following distribution process.

The UPMIC Performance Based Compensation Incentive distribution will be made to Qualifying Employees on the first payroll date after the thirty-day period following the date on which the Commission formally receives its annual auditor's report in an open meeting.

Per finance staff, this is not the current practice, as distributions are able to be made within two weeks of approval of the audit. Per counsel, there is no legal reason why the distribution would need to be provided as written. Legal counsel did recommend establishing a time window for distribution so staff would be able to expect the funds within a set period. In order to not unnecessarily delay distributions and establish that timeline, staff is proposing the following paragraph replace it.

The UPMIC Performance Based Compensation Incentive distribution will be made to Qualifying Employees within thirty days of the date on which the Commission formally receives its annual auditor's report in an open meeting.

1.0 PURPOSE AND SUMMARY

The successful performance of the ERMU is measured in terms of the Utilities' ability to meet our strategic goals and mission. By improving our efficiency and level of performance in meeting our strategic goals and mission we can improve the delivery of value to our customers.

To create incentives for employees to take personal responsibility for accomplishment of the Utilities' strategic goals and mission, the Utilities has established a Utilities Performance Metrics-based Incentive Compensation system ("UPMIC"). Through UPMIC the employees of ERMU will have an opportunity, as a group, to earn annual incentive compensation for each qualifying employee by contributing individually to the overall success of ERMU on a daily basis.

Under UPMIC, either all qualifying employees will earn an incentive compensation distribution in a given year, or none will. And not only will incentive compensation under UPMIC in that sense be an all or nothing proposition each year, but there will be an equal percentage share basis for all on which the incentive compensation will be paid out if earned. This appropriately reflects the reality that we all succeed, or fall short, together as a team.

To administer the UPMIC and measure objectively the level of performance that must be achieved for qualifying employees to earn incentive compensation, the attached UMPIC Performance Metrics Policy Scorecard ("Scorecard") has been created. The Scorecard will be subject to revision annually based on the performance metrics adopted by the Commission annually for the coming year ("Performance Metrics"). By tracking and measuring the Performance Metrics and creating incentive for employees to achieve the goals the Metrics embody, the Utilities believes it will be better able to focus efforts and resources on becoming more efficient and successful in meeting our strategic goals and mission and delivering improved value to our customers.

2.0 UTILITIES PERFORMANCE METRICS SCORECARD

As reflected on the Scorecard, the Performance Metrics are divided into the following five categories: Safety, Reliability and Quality of Utility Services; Workforce Development; Financial Goals; Communications/Customer Service; and Strategic Plan. These categories are used to characterize the overall strategic goals and mission of ERMU.

Under the Performance Metrics, these five main categories are then divided into various weighted factors, or sub-categories. These sub-categories, their percentage weight, and the goal or target for each, shall be established by the Utilities Commission annually. The Performance Metrics as adopted are reflected in the attached Scorecard. As discussed above, the Performance Metrics and thus the Scorecard are subject to modification and adoption by the Commission annually, which will normally occur during the Utilities' budgeting process.

3.0 UTILITIES PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE COMPENSATION DISTRIBUTION CRITERIA

Under the UPMIC a Performance-Based Compensation Incentive, if earned, will be distributed to Qualifying Employees annually. The total amount available to be earned by Utilities employees as a Performance Based Compensation Incentive each year will be an amount up to 2% of the Utilities' total gross wages paid to Qualifying Employees during the Measurement Period.

The measuring period used to calculate how much, if any, of the Performance-Based Compensation Incentive the Utilities employees have earned will be the calendar year (the "Measurement Period"). After the Measurement Period is complete and the Commission has received its audit in the spring of the year following the Measurement Period, the Performance Metrics will be applied to determine whether the Performance-Based Compensation Incentive has been earned for the Measurement Period. In doing so, the performance of the Utilities in each sub-category will be reviewed. If the sub-category performance meets or exceeds the established goal, the sub-category will be scored with the designated percentage that will contribute to a total Performance Metrics Multiplier to be used as a factor in calculating the distribution earned, if any, as shown in the Scorecard ("Multiplier"). The Multiplier has a maximum factoring effect of 100%. The Multiplier is used to determine how much, if any, of the amount established by the Commission for the UPMIC Performance-Based Compensation Incentive has been earned in the Measurement Period. (For example, if the Multiplier equals 100%, the distribution would equal 2%. If the Multiplier equals 75%, the distribution would equal 1.5%.) In other words, the amount established by the Commission may be earned on an annual basis by the group of Qualifying Employees (as defined below in Section 4.0) in whole, in part, or not at all.

After the Multiplier is calculated on the Scorecard, the Performance Based Compensation Incentive earned, if any, will be distributed to Qualifying Employees. The total amount to be distributed as the Performance Based Compensation Incentive will be the product of: a) the Multiplier; and b) 2% of the Utilities' total gross wages paid to Qualifying Employees during the Measurement Period.

The percentage of the Performance Based Compensation Incentive awarded to each Qualifying Employee will be based on the gross wages of each Qualifying Employee during the Measurement Period. To each Qualifying Employee, the distribution would be allocated in a lump sum equal to the product of: a) the Multiplier; and b) 2% of that employee's gross wages paid during the Measurement Period. For example, if a Qualifying Employee's gross wages earned during the Measurement Period were equal to \$50,000 and the Multiplier was equal to 100%, the total distribution to that employee would be equal to: \$50,000 x 2% x 100% = \$1000.

If the Utilities' margins are negative due to sudden and unforeseen material changes to the industry or customer base, the Commission reserves the right to withhold distribution of the Performance Based Compensation Incentive in any given year.

4.0 EMPLOYEE QUALIFICATIONS AND DISTRIBUTION OF THE INCENTIVE COMPENSATION

An employee of the Utilities will be eligible for participation in the Performance Metrics Incentive Compensation distribution if the employee meets the following eligibility requirements and is therefore a "Qualifying Employee" for purposes of this policy.

- a. The employee is in good standing with the Utilities. An employee would not be eligible while on disciplinary probation or a performance improvement action plan.
- b. The employee was a Full Time or Part Time employee during the Measurement Period. Seasonal, and Temporary employees are not eligible.

The UPMIC Performance Based Compensation Incentive distribution will be made to Qualifying Employees on the first payroll date after the within thirty days period following of the date on which the Commission formally receives its annual auditor's report in an open meeting.

BACKGROUND:

First quarter delinquent items are presented for your review. We have previously reported on four different categories of delinquents as follows:

- Assessments are delays in collecting the money owed and is assessed to the property taxes in the fall. Please note this number will only be presented in the fourth quarter.
- Collections amounts are those we send to the collection agency to try and collect
 after we have exhausted all our internal collection efforts. We receive 70% of the
 amounts collected after the agency receives their split.
- Revenue Recapture (RR) is the program through the state where funds are collected from individuals' tax refunds and remitted to us, with the balance (if any) remitted to the individual. It presents an opportunity to collect funds rather than splitting with a collection agency or having to write them off completely. There is a six-year limit for keeping items on RR and if uncollected at this time, amounts are removed and written off.
- Write Offs are amounts removed from the books with no further collection efforts being extended.

DISCUSSION:

I have for review recap comparisons with last year, identifying the categories and amounts for each quarter and the running totals. Regarding the first quarter totals:

- The amounts listed for assessments culminate in the fourth quarter and include items
 previously submitted to other collection services, and if not collected, are removed, and
 assessed. The assessment amount for 2025 is \$0.00 as there has been no activity yet for
 this year.
- The amounts submitted *only* to Collection Agencies for 2025 is \$0.00. (Please note that amounts submitted to Revenue Recapture were also submitted to Collection Agencies.)

- The amounts submitted to Revenue Recapture were higher than the prior year. The Q1 2025 RR amount is \$3,379.27. We have collected a total of \$10,193.73 from RR in Q1 2025.
- Write Offs for Q1 2025 of \$3,097.48 which is slightly more than the prior year. \$2,821.84 of the Write Offs were due to the removal of old account balances due to a six-year limit mandated by the state.

The attached report listing shows those dollars submitted to both the Collection Agency and RR. The first quarter totals are \$3,379.27 broken down by provider are: \$3,054.88 for Electric, \$271.35 for Franchise Fees, \$41.58 for Sewer, \$8.18 for Water, and \$3.28 for Storm Water.

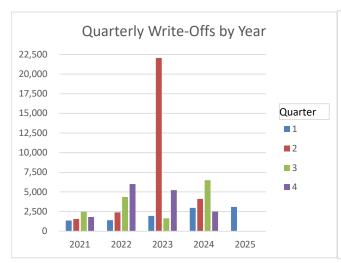
Our allowance for doubtful accounts (a reserve for bad debt/write offs) is \$25,605 or .05% uncollectible accounts per revenue dollar. According to the American Public Power Association's most recent published standard ratios (2021) the industry standard is between .15% and 1.49%. Interestingly, the Northern/Central Plains average is .15%. Our totals for the year are below the national average, at .03%.

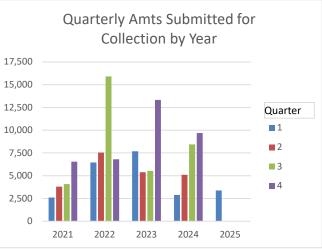

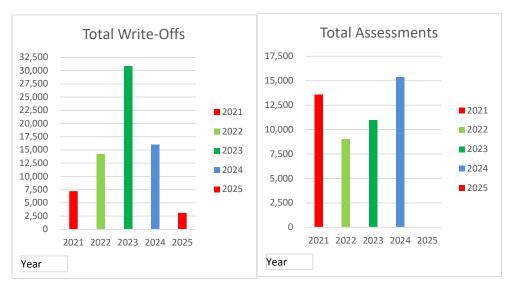
- 2025 First Quarter Delinquent Items Comparison
- 2025 First Quarter Delinquent Items Submitted

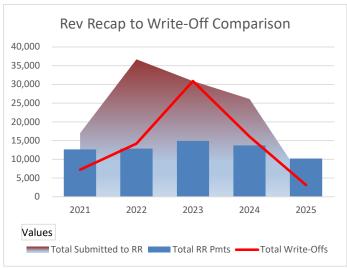

PURPOSE:

With this policy, the Commission communicates its expectations for information and support from the General Manager.

POLICY:

The General Manager shall not permit the Commission to be uninformed or unsupported in its work.

Consistent with this general statement, the General Manager shall:

- 1. Inform the Commission in a timely manner about ERMU's significant successes or shortcomings with respect to Commission policies, goals and other directives.
- 2. Submit timely, accurate, and understandable financial, operating and other monitoring data required by the Commission in a form that directly relates to the provisions of the Commission policies being monitored. (See *Monitoring Performance of the General Manager Policy*)
- 3. Report in a timely manner any actual or anticipated instance of management noncompliance with Commission policies.
- 4. Inform the Commission about significant events and situations that are directly relevant to the Commission's policies, especially any changes which may materially alter assumptions that the Commission has used previously to establish policy and make other significant decisions.
- 5. Advise the Commission if, in the General Manager's opinion, the Commission is not in compliance with its own *Governance Policies* and *Commission-Management Connection*

Policies, especially where Commission actions or behavior (individual or collective) are detrimental to the working relationship between the Commission and the General Manager.

- 6. Advise the Commission if, in the General Manager's opinion, the Commission is unfocused in its work or out of step with ERMU's strategic framework (vision, core purpose, core values, mission and strategic objectives) as stated in the *Authority and Purpose Policies*.
- 7. Bring before the Commission in a timely manner as many internal and external points of view, issues and alternatives as the Commission may need to deliberate effectively and make fully informed decisions.
- 8. Bring to the Commission, in support of the Commission's deliberations and decision-making, the recommendation(s) of management, the rationale for those recommendations, and the process(es) by which those recommendations were developed.

BACKGROUND:

On June 3, 2024, the City Council adopted City Ordinance 24-14 - Amending Chapter 2, Article V, Boards and Commissions of the City of Elk River, Minnesota, City Code, which includes a provision that all City of Elk River commissions will review their bylaws annually. ERMU's bylaws were reviewed at the March 11, 2025, commission meeting. Since that time, however, City staff have identified an oversight regarding ERMU commission member eligibility requirements as updated by Ordinance 24-14.

During the update of the ordinance, eligibility requirements for the various city commissions were removed from city ordinance as part of an effort to shift meeting requirements to the respective commission/board's bylaws.

DISCUSSION:

Since ERMU's commission receives delegated authority from the City Council, best practice is to put commission eligibility requirements in city ordinance. In discussing next steps with City Administrator Cal Portner, it was determined the best course of action is to first discuss eligibility requirements with ERMU commission members, then bring proposed updates to the City Council for consideration when they revise the ordinance. The following ordinance requirements should be considered for implementation:

- All Commissioners shall be ERMU customers.
- Up to two commissioners may be City of Elk River Councilmembers,
- At least one, preferably two, commissioner(s) shall be ERMU water customers, and
- Up to one commissioner may live outside of Elk River city limits.

ARTICLE I – AUTHORITY

Section 1. The Village of Elk River Water, Light, Power and Building Commission was created on July 11, 1947, by resolution adopted by the Village of Elk River Trustees.

Section 2. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 412.331, adopted in 1949, any water, light, power and building commission then in existence was required to thereafter operate as a public utilities commission under Minnesota Statutes, Sections 412.321 to 412.391. The Village of Elk River Water, Light, Power and Building Commission became Elk River Municipal Utilities.

Section 3. Elk River Municipal Utilities is a public utilities commission operating pursuant to and subject to Minnesota Statutes, Sections 412.321 to 412.391 and Elk River City Code Sections 2-271 to 2-276.

ARTICLE II - JURISDICTION

Section 1. Elk River Municipal Utilities has jurisdiction over:

- A. The City of Elk River Municipal electric utility; and
- B. The City of Elk River water utility.

ARTICLE III - COMMISSION MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Pursuant to Laws of Minnesota 2016, Chapter 97 – House File No. 2718, and Elk River City Code Section 2-271, the Elk River Municipal Utilities Commission shall consist of five members. No more than two members may also serve as City Council members.

Section 2. Commissioners shall be appointed by the City Council to staggered terms.

- Section 3. Each Commissioner shall serve for a term of three years and until a successor is appointed and qualified.
- Section 4. Commissioners shall comply with the City's conflict of interest ordinance, Elk River City Code Sections 2-131 to 2-135.
- Section 5. No member of the Commission shall receive a salary except as fixed by the City Council.

ARTICLE IV – OFFICERS

- Section 1. The Commission shall annually choose a president from among its members. The president shall be designated the Chair of the Commission and shall perform such duties as shall be delegated to the Chair in the Commission's adopted policies
- Section 2. The Commission may also annually appoint a Vice-Chair of the Commission who shall perform such duties as shall be delegated to the Vice-Chair in the Commission's adopted policies. The Vice-Chair shall preside at meetings of the Commission if the Chair is absent.
- Section 3. The Commission shall also appoint a Secretary for an indefinite term. The Secretary need not be a member of the Commission and shall perform such duties as shall be delegated to the Secretary in the Commission's adopted policies.
- Section 4. The Commission shall have the power to revoke a Commission member's appointment as Chair or Vice-Chair, and appoint a replacement Chair or Vice Chair, if the Commission determines, by a vote of a majority of its members, to do so. The Commission shall also have the power to replace the Secretary at any time by a vote of the majority of its members.

ARTICLE V – MEETINGS

- Section 1. The Commission shall hold at least one regular meeting each month, on the day and at the time designated by the Commission from time to time. Regular meetings shall be noticed as required by Minnesota Statutes.
- Section 2. The Commission may hold special meetings from time to time at the request of the Chair or the request of two other Commissioners. Special meetings shall be noticed as required by Minnesota Statutes.
- Section 3. A majority of the Commissioners shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the votes of a majority of the Commissioners present shall be sufficient to adopt any motion or resolution. The votes of members on any action shall be taken by ayes and nays recorded in the minutes.
- Section 4. Commission meetings are open to the public unless closed as authorized by Minnesota Statutes, and shall be governed by Roberts Rules of Order, latest revised edition, for

all situations to which they apply and in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws, the Commission's adopted Policies, and any special rules of order that the Commission may adopt..

ARTICLE VI – POWERS

Section 1. The Commission shall have all of the powers enumerated in Minnesota Statutes, Section 412.361 and, except as provided in the Bylaws and the Commission's adopted Policies, shall exercise those powers on its own behalf.

ARTICLE VII – GENERAL MANAGER

Section 1. The Commission shall have the power to appoint a General Manager, whose responsibilities, duties, limits of authority and accountability to the Commission shall be set forth in these Bylaws and as designated by the Commission from time to time in its adopted Policies.

Section 2. The General Manager shall have the authority to implement the Commission's powers under Minnesota Statutes, Section 412.361, Subds. 1 and 2 to enter into contracts for the operation of the utility and to employ all necessary help for the management and operation of the public utility, by entering into contracts and employing personnel consistent with the Commission's adopted budget and pay plan. However, all contracts requiring public bidding, all contracts falling under Minnesota Statutes, Section 412.361, Subds. 3, 4 and 5, and all contracts required by the Commission's adopted Policies to be approved by the Commission, shall be approved by the Commission.

Section 3. If the position of the General Manager is vacant, the Commission may designate another to perform all or some of the General Manager's duties.

ARTICLE VIII – FINANCES, FUNDS AND REPORTS

Section 1. The Commission shall maintain the funds, conduct the audits and make the reports required by Minnesota Statutes, Sections 412.371 and 412.381.

ARTICLE IX – APPLICATION AND AMENDMENT

Section 1. In the event that any provision of these Bylaws is or may be in conflict with the laws of any governmental body or power having jurisdiction over the Elk River Municipal Utilities Commission, or over the subject matter to which such provision of these Bylaws applies or may apply, such provision of these Bylaws shall be inoperative to the extent only that the operation thereof unavoidably conflicts with such law and shall in all other respects be in full force and effect.

Section 2. These Bylaws may be amended by the Commission at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the entire Commission, provided the proposed amendment is on the agenda and made public no later than three days before the meeting.

Section 3. In addition to these Bylaws, the Commission may adopt, from time to time, Governance Policies (adopted Policies) that are not inconsistent with these Bylaws.

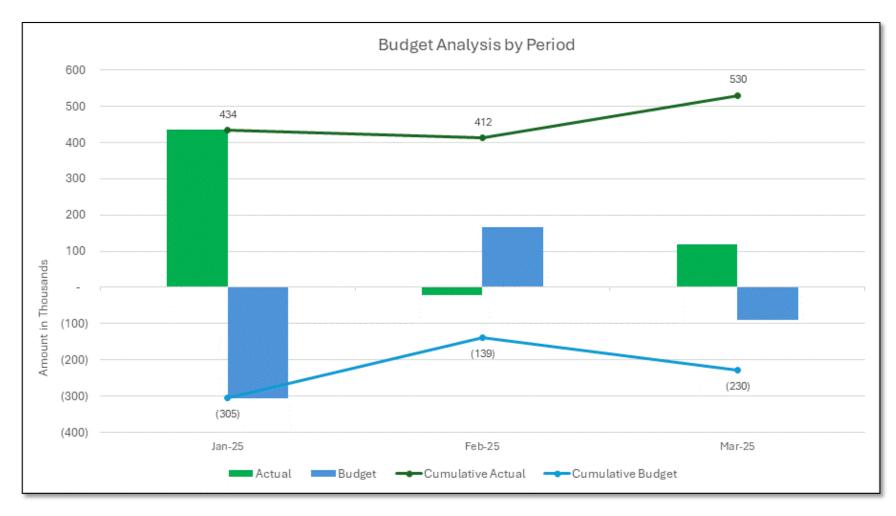

March YTD Actuals to Budget Comparison

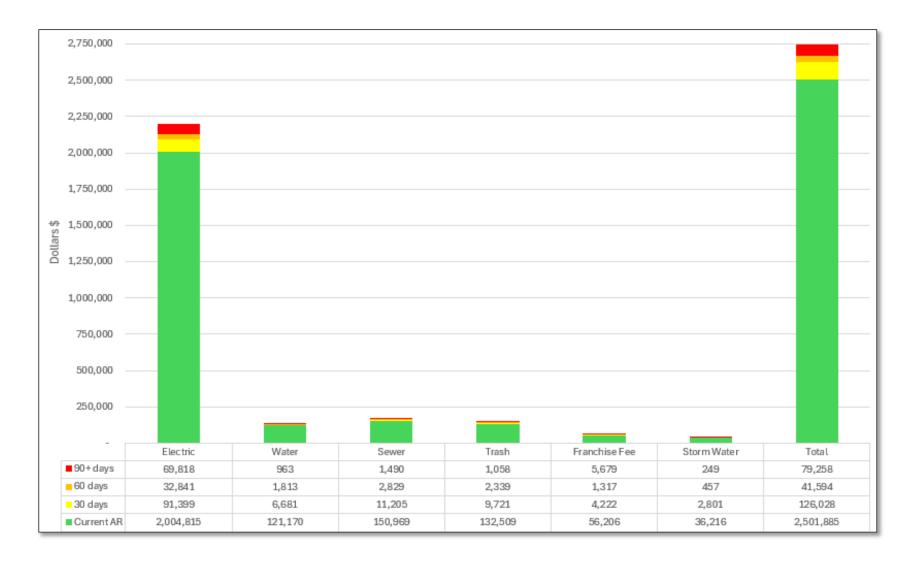

Accounts Receivable-Utility Aging 3/31/2025



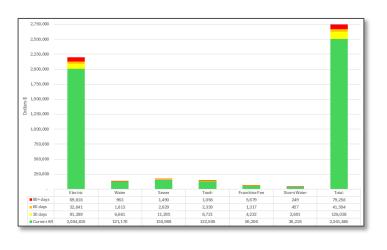

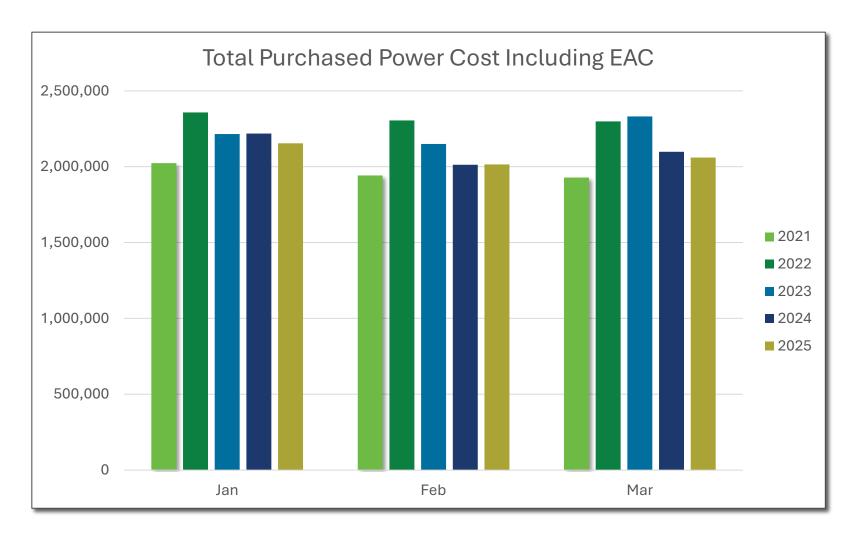

Electric Department - Purchased Power

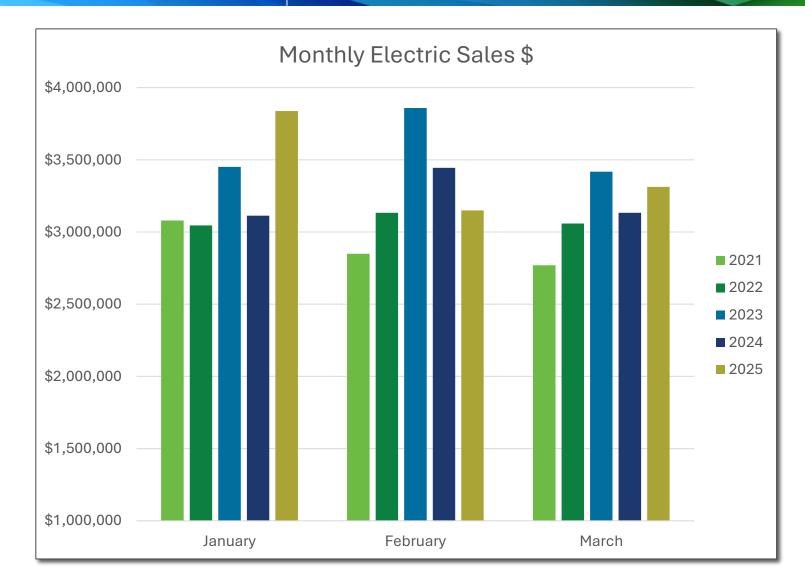


Purpose: To illustrate trends in purchased power costs.

Electric Department – Electric Usage Sales

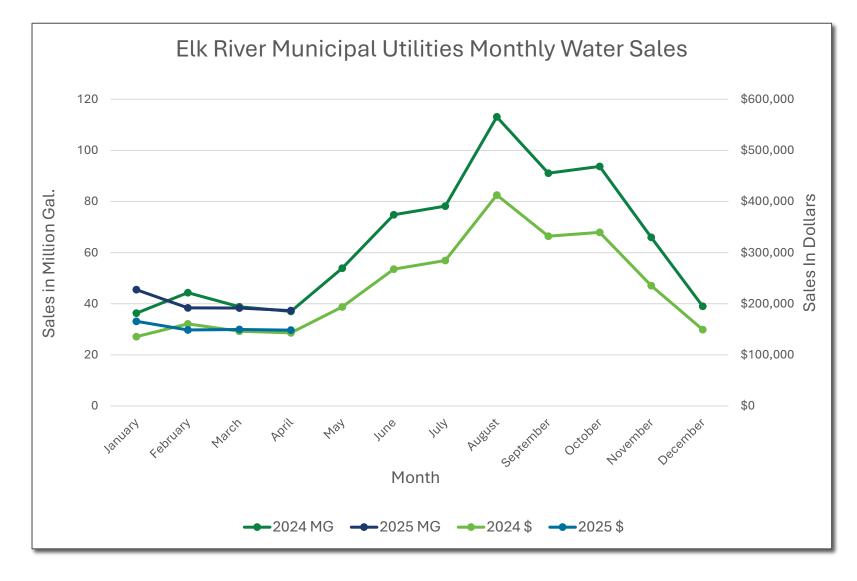


Purpose: To illustrate a 5-year comparison in electric usage sales.

DISCUSSION:

At the end of April, Allegiant completed 4,000 residential water meter replacements and 519 retrofits. With Allegiant having moved on from our project, ERMU staff are now working with customers to schedule and complete the remaining residential meter exchanges. The residential meter exchange is approximately 92% complete.

To date we have made 100 residential repairs utilizing master plumber Karsten Nelson (Archer Plumbing) with a running total of \$35,410.36 in repair costs. In April 2024, the Commission voted to absorb these residential costs at an estimate of \$300 per job for approximately 100-150 homes, totaling between \$30-\$45K.

Allegiant completed 420 commercial meter replacements and 52 retrofits by the end of April. The commercial water meter exchange work is about 70% complete. Archer Plumbing will continue to do plumbing repairs and commercial meter replacements directly for ERMU.

Allegiant completed 9,586 residential electric meter replacements. Allegiant completed approximately 78% of the residential electric meter work. ERMU staff will complete the remaining residential meter exchanges that Allegiant was unable to replace along with the 3S, 4S & 2S-320A meters when they become available sometime in Q2 of 2025.

ERMU has a close-out meeting with Allegiant scheduled in May to finalize any outstanding items.

We are still waiting for the delivery of our commercial electric meters for the project. ERMU staff will replace all commercial electric meters and test current transformers/potential transformers during each visit to verify equipment is working correctly and accurately. We are still expecting these to be delivered in Q2 of 2025.

Overall, approximately 88% of the total available AMI meters have been installed.

This will be the final separated AMI update as I will continue to inform the Commission of the project's progress in my monthly staff update.

BACKGROUND:

At the March 11, 2025, commission meeting, the Commission received a presentation by LEO A DALY Architects on potential layouts for a proposed conversion of the Elk River Municipal Utilities (ERMU) power plant to a history/education center. Staff retained the services of LEO A DALY to review the building's structural integrity, identify potential funding sources, explore potential design layouts, and estimate the potential construction costs. The Commission decommissioned the plant at their September 10, 2024, meeting via Resolution 24-10.

The Commission reached consensus on the following discussion points:

- Of the three layouts presented, they preferred the combined adult/child centric theme.
- The estimated \$1.0M \$1.5M cost to convert the building (after offsets) was too much to spend at this time.
- The estimated offsets for grants/donations were likely optimistic, which effectively increases ERMU's estimated costs.
- The building should be preserved due to its architecture and historical significance to ERMU but converting it to another use is not feasible at this time.

Staff was directed to pursue the second phase of the preliminary review with LEO A DALY to fine-tune the layouts/estimates based on commission feedback and to create artist renderings of the facility for use in future discussions.

DISCUSSION:

Staff recommend additional planning/design efforts be paused until the larger assets identified below can be removed, including the engines. Once the engines are removed, staff will explore costs to level the concrete floor (fill in the engine foundations) and remove the interior conference room and office space. These efforts will enable the building to be used for indoor equipment and material storage. Estimates to convert the facility to a history/education center can then be re-evaluated since several of the larger expenses will have been completed. Staff will provide relevant updates as they are known.

- Since the March meeting, staff have had several conversations with representatives of Glencoe Light & Power (GLP) regarding the external fuel tanks and approximately 10,000 gallons of stored diesel fuel. GLP stated they expect to spend \$35,000 to transfer the storage tanks and fuel and another \$20,000 to \$25,000 to rehab and paint the tanks. These costs will be split between Glencoe and Janesville, another municipal utility, as they will each take one of the tanks. In recognizing these additional costs, ERMU staff has proposed a nominal price of \$500 per tank and \$1000 for the five-year-old fuel, pending ERMU Commission approval. The revenue will offset the cost to retrofit the external filling station so the engines' internal day tanks can be filled for demonstration purposes. Our legal counsel at Campbell Knutson has confirmed ERMU can sell directly to another municipal agency without using an open-bid process.
- Staff are also in talks with representatives of the Minnesota Municipal Power
 Association (MMPA) as they are interested in purchasing the plant's transformer and
 recloser. Both items are expected to be used in future renewable energy projects
 supporting ERMU's service territory. Staff have proposed the equipment be sold at
 their respective depreciated balances, pending ERMU commission approval. Campbell
 Knutson has confirmed that MMPA is considered a municipal agency.
- Staff will begin pursuing options for marketing the large engines in the coming months. One municipal utility has expressed interest in the largest engine but is not able to take it for three to five years. Updates will be provided as they are available.

Discussion Questions:

- Is it acceptable to the Commission to offer equipment assets to peer municipal utilities at potentially below market rate?
- Is it acceptable to the Commission to suspend planning efforts on the future of the power plant until after the larger equipment assets presented above are sold and removed?

- Water Superintendent Dave Ninow and I met with representatives from ISD 728 to discuss the possibility of constructing a water treatment plant on district-owned property at Twin Lakes Elementary School. This is an ideal location for the plant as ERMU will be drilling our next municipal drinking water well on the adjacent property, Fire Station #3. The conversation went well with the district representatives confirming a willingness to work with ERMU. They will discuss our request with the district superintendent and the school board. Two potential paths for moving forward include creating a utility easement on school property or selling the requested property to ERMU. Staff will continue to keep the Commission apprised as more detailed information becomes available.
- Staff continues to work on several lease agreements with cellular and fiber carriers. Verizon
 wants to add additional antennas to Auburn Tower, AT&T would like to install antennas at
 Freeport Tower, and both Verizon and Comcast have requested to attach fiber lines to our
 existing utility poles. Staff has worked with Campbell Knutson to update our standard lease
 agreement terms for each effort.
- Staff has had several meetings with Minnesota Municipal Power Agency (MMPA)
 representatives to coordinate upcoming project needs and timing. MMPA has already
 started work on their renewable natural gas project at the Waste Management Landfill site.
 Work on their solar site west of city limits is planned to begin next year.
- The MMPA Board of Directors met April 22, 2025, at the Faribault Energy Park in Faribault, M and via videoconference. Commissioner Stewart and I attended. The public summary follows:
 - The Board reviewed the Agency's financial/operating performance for March 2025.
 - Participation in the residential Clean Energy Choice program increased by 57 customers. Customer penetration for the program is 6.2%.
 - The Board discussed the status of renewable projects the Agency is pursuing.

- Office walk-in traffic for April consisted of 122 customers, averaging 22 customers per week over the four-week period.
- ERMU disconnections for April: The Cold Weather Rule was in effect, meaning customers could not be disconnected until 30 days after they receive their disconnection notice.
 - Cycle 4 5 disconnections
 - Cycle 1 13 disconnections
 - Cycle 2 7 disconnections
 - Cycle 3 10 disconnections
 - Cycle 4 7 disconnections
- The Cold Weather Rule ended on April 30, 2025. Customers will receive one past due reminder and an automated phone call that they are subject to disconnection for nonpayment. Once a customer is disconnected, they must pay their full past due balance for services to be restored.
- During the month of April 2025, the customer service team entered 72 payment arrangements with customers. During April 2024 there were 40 payment arrangements.
- A substantial portion of staff time is currently devoted to the Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) project, with customer service representatives actively making outbound calls to arrange water meter replacements.
- Currently there are ten active residential solar photovoltaic projects planned or under construction in the ERMU service territory.
- In the last 30 days combined, the level two chargers located downtown and in the parking lot in front of ERMU had 25 sessions and provided customers with 353 kWh of green energy.
- The administrations director, IT staff, and finance manager participated in a three-day training session focused on security permissions, conducted by the National Information Solutions Cooperative.

- The 2024 Utilities Performance Metric Incentive Compensation was processed and distributed to employees on April 18 via direct deposit.
- The Energy Information Administration (EIA) reports 860, 861, and 923 for 2024 have all been filed. These are federal reports that are required to be filed annually related to the output of our plant standby engines and fuel sources; our system distribution numbers in MW, revenues, and meters served; wind and solar participation; and reliability numbers.
- The Property & Casualty Insurance renewal application has been sent to the underwriter for the 2024-2025 year. There have been some follow-up questions that have been addressed.

- Working through the second round of maps for the new GIS mapping system that we plan to move forward with in the future. Maps 1 through 62 are complete.
- The dehydration of the existing Cooper/Eaton switchgear has come to an end.
- Staff is still dealing with the lack of communication and action taken from the vendor on our recalled reclosers. We are waiting on all 30 units to be fixed as this time.
- I attended pre-construction meeting for Anna's Acres 2nd Addition in Otsego.
- ERMU staff have been working with Minnesota Municipal Power Agency on their landfill and solar projects.
- Construction season is in full swing.
- With the retirement of Line Crew Foreperson Scott Thoreson, Matt Schwartz and Mitch Girtz have been promoted from lead lineworkers to line crew forepersons and Matt Zipp and Alex Paschall have been promoted from lineworkers to lead lineworkers. All four promotions were effective Tuesday, April 29. Matt and Mitch bring a combined experience of over 25 years in a variety of positions within the lineworker field. With a combined 15 years of experience in linework, Matt Zipp and Alex also bring an impressive skillset and vast experience to their new roles. The promotion of a second line crew foreperson represents a change from past practice. This change supports expanded position responsibilities, including substation and transformer maintenance, as well as technical support for GIS/app systems. As Scott Thoreson prepares to depart in July, he will spend the next few months training and mentoring Matt and Mitch, ensuring a smooth leadership transition. There is no budget impact as the gap between Scott's retirement and our planned replacement of a lineworker in October/November will more than offset the incremental increase of a second foreperson.
- Our seasonal lineworkers will be starting on May 13.
- ERMU staff and I have had interviews for a GIS intern.
- I attended the Minnesota Municipal Utilities Association's Job Training & Safety Meeting in Marshall, MN, April 23-24.

- I attended the Lineworker Advisory Board Meeting, April 16, at the Wadena Technical School.
- Substation 14-4 lost power due to a squirrel getting into the high side of Feeder 41 which opened the high side breaker. This created approximately an 80-minute outage for 1441 customers. Repairs to 14-4 were completed the next day. Last known picture of the squirrel is below.

- Installed 17 new residential services, which involves the connection of a secondary line once the customer requests service.
- Joe Schmidt, safety instructor from Minnesota Municipal Utilities Association, was here on April 24, and held a safety meeting for field staff on chainsaw operations.
- Crews finished tree trimming on April 15.
- The bore crew along with a line crew are currently working on replacing older open concentric wire in the Deerfield Addition in Elk River.
- Crews replaced 500 MCM underground wire at West substation, Feeder 71, from the sub out to the first pole. This was older wire due for replacement. A ganged switch was also installed at the pole replacing single blades.
- The second phase of the overhead rebuild on Feeder 65, north of our North substation was recently started.
- Crews along with the substation technician are in the process of changing out the
 controllers at our switched capacitor banks located at various locations on our overhead
 feeders. They are also confirming operations and performing any maintenance needed
 at each location.
- Crews are working on maintenance items we have identified through our equipment checks over the winter on both the overhead and underground system. We are also replacing fault indicators. These instruments are placed on the line, and blink if the fault has passed through, helping to pinpoint the location of the problem and reduce outage time. These instruments have a battery life of 15-20 years.

- In April, the locators processed 495 locate tickets. These consisted of 434 normal tickets, 1 emergency ticket, 37 updated tickets, 8 meets, 4 planning, 1 correction, and 10 cancellations. This resulted in a 133.5% increase in tickets from the previous month and a 2.7% increase from the prior April.
- Electrical technicians completed 638 service order tasks, updated the power bill, addressed customer meter issues and any off-peak concerns.
- The Advanced Metering Infrastructure residential water and electric meters continue to be installed in new services. The electrical technicians have been busy changing our current Automated Meter Reading meters to AMI for small non-demand commercial customers. Approximately 5,365 water meters and 11,981 electric meters are currently active within our AMI system.
- Staff has begun changing out capacitor back controllers throughout our system. We are replacing all seven over the next two weeks. These new controllers have communication ability to help us monitor statuses remotely along with integration into our future Conservation Voltage Reduction strategies.
- On April 30, staff completed a two-month long project of dehydrating and replacing oil in Cooper/Eaton Switchgear with their being high moisture levels in the oil. We believe this moisture is responsible for the faults we have experienced previously with these units. Staff successfully reconditioned 47 units, documenting the final moisture content of the reconditioned oil, pressure testing them for air leaks, and verifying the lid bolts were torqued properly. While this project to recondition the oil was a success, it is only a temporary fix as we work to replace these over the next few budget cycles.
- Our monthly peak was 43.42 MW on April 28, at 11:12am.



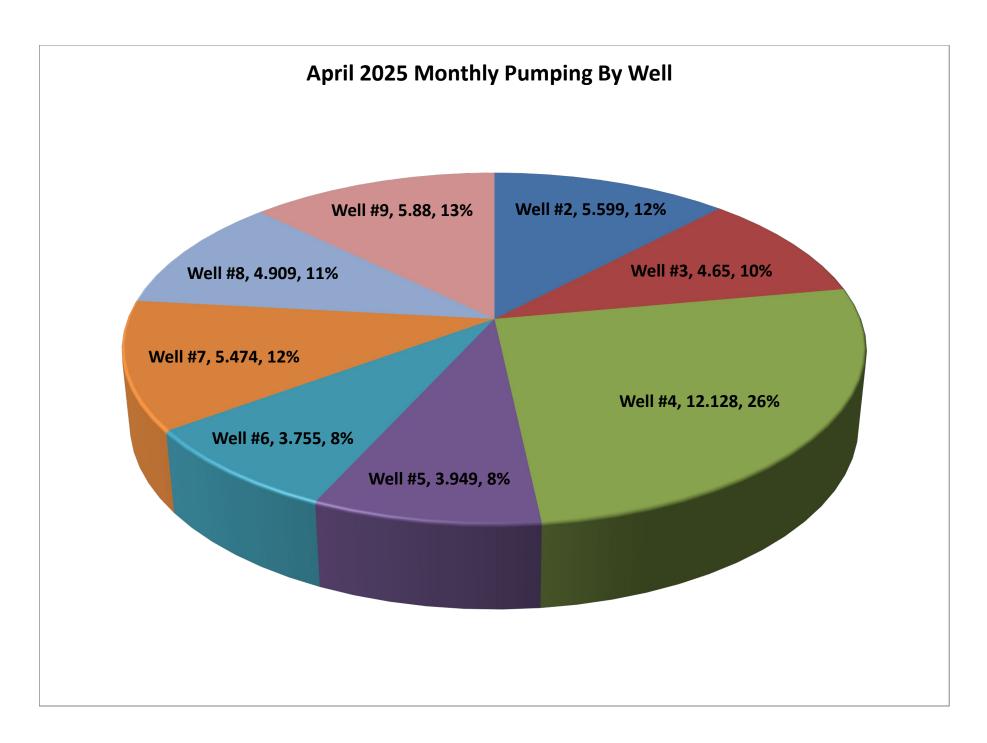

- Delivered seven new water meters, installed a Smart Point module, and took curb stop ties.
- Completed 20 BACTI/Total Chlorine Residual Samples
 - All confirmed negative for coliform bacteria
 - Bacteriological/Disinfectant Residual Monthly Report submitted to the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH)
- Completed 22 routine fluoride samples
 - All samples met the MDH standards
 - Submitted the MDH Fluoride Report
- Submitted Discharge Monitoring Report (DMR) for the Water Treatment Plants to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA).
- Submitted DMR for the Diesel Generation Plant to the MPCA.
- We plan to begin flushing hydrants the week of May 12 to better align with the water department's schedule and workload. Customers will be notified and a map with the zones and dates for flushing will be made public. Flushing is expected to take approximately six weeks. We are increasing the amount of time scheduled for flushing due to the number of fire hydrants now in the distribution system.
- ERMU staff have worked with city staff on water main valve maintenance in the
 Westwood neighborhood as part of the 2025 street rehab project. The subcontractor for
 the street project will excavate each valve in this area and replace corroded bolts
 holding the valve body together.
- The subcontractor performing the water main valve maintenance work inadvertently hit and damaged a residential water service line causing a leak at the end of Albany Street. The water main on that street needed to be shut down to perform repairs to the service line. Twelve houses were without water service for about three hours during the repair.
- To help maintain grassland and control woody plants around the backwash pond areas at each water treatment facility we are working with the city parks and fire department staff to preform prescribed burning of these areas.

- A resident on Xenia Avenue whose house is not connected to the municipal water system reached out to inquire about connecting. Currently there is no water main along Xenia Avenue to connect to. The resident indicated that they will be polling their neighbors to see if they would join in petitioning the City and ERMU to have water main installed along Xenia Avenue, York Avenue, and Second Street.
- Water Department staff continue to spend much of their time performing water meter exchanges for the Advanced Metering Infrastructure project.
