We share the kind of joy that can make us quiver with anticipation—hardly able to hold in our excitement for what will soon be birthed in the world and in our very selves.





The Lessons

Our readings from the Bible each week usually include one from the Old Testament or Hebrew Scriptures; a Psalm; one from the New Testament or Christian Scriptures; and a reading from one of the four Gospels, the accounts of the life of Jesus.

First Lesson (Isaiah 7:10–16)

Lector: A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz, saying, Ask a sign of the Lord your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven. But Ahaz said, I will not ask, and I will not put the Lord to the test. Then Isaiah said: "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary mortals, that you weary my God also? Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel. He shall eat curds and honey by the time he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. For before the child knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land before whose two kings you are in dread will be deserted."

Second Lesson (Romans 1:1–7)

Lector: A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans.

Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the Gentiles for the sake of his name, including yourselves who are called to belong to Jesus Christ,


To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints:

The Gospel (Matthew 1:18–25)

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

"Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,"

which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

Deacon: The Gospel of the Lord. People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

The Nicene Creed

The congregation stands as able. This statement of belief dates from the 4^{th} century. Here we use it as a prayer. In our post-Enlightenment times, it is helpful to think of the word "believe" not as meaning merely "I intellectually assent," but rather, "I place my trust."

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit
he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,
and was made man.
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again
in accordance with the Scriptures;
he ascended into heaven
and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,
and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayers of the People

Intercessor: O Spirit of the Living God, lead us on the path of endurance. May we, your Church, rise out of our silence and inaction to be the hands and feet of our Lord Jesus. Empower us to welcome, comfort and stand alongside those who are fearful, hurting, or oppressed. In this week's cycles of prayer, we pray for the Good Shepherd Endowment Trustees; for St. James, Cathlamet; St. Timothy, Chehalis; and All Saints', Vancouver; and for the Anglican Church of Burundi.

O Spirit of the Living God, lead us on the path of patience. May the nations of the world be filled with grace, compassion, and love for all who suffer. As we walk together toward your promised paradise, may we see God in all people, honoring all creation, a rich tapestry of color and textures—each person a special thread, intertwined in heart and soul.

Fill us with strength and courage.

O Spirit of the Living God, lead us on the path of joy. May we create true community, intentionally seeking out and supporting one another. May we bring your loving presence and peace to all marginalized people, those living in fear and threat of exclusion and oppression. We pray for healing of relationships, the softening of hearts for all who would choose disdain and hatred over understanding and love.

O Spirit of the Living God, lead us on the path of hope. May we reach out to those who are suffering in spirit, mind and body, touching them with your love and healing hand. We pray for

peace and wholeness for those feeling fearful, alone, or neglected, and for those facing illness and disability.

Fill us with strength and courage.

O Spirit of the Living God, lead us on the path of peace. We pray for those who have died, for those who are dying, and for those who grieve, that they might find comfort and solace in your promise of eternal life.

Fill us with strength and courage.

Presider: O Spirit of the Living God, the promise and anticipation of this Advent season gives us a glimpse into your Kingdom. We pray for the strengthening of our weak hands and feeble knees, that we may reach out to others, and hand in hand, walk with courage toward you. **Amen.**

The Confession of Sin

Deacon: Let us confess our sins to God.

Silence. The people may kneel or stand.

All: God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done, and the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

Presider: Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

The Annunciation (Catacomb of Priscilla, Via Salaria, Rome, late 2nd century)




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
The Great Thanksgiving Eucharistic Prayer B (inclusive language)



Presider: It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, Creator of heaven and earth; because you sent your beloved Son to redeem us from sin and death, and to make us heirs in him of everlasting life; that when he shall come again in power and great triumph to judge the world, we may without shame or fear rejoice to behold his appearing. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven, who forever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

The people remain standing.

Presider: We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. For in these last days you sent Jesus to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

All:

We remember Christ's death, We proclaim Christ's resurrection, We await Christ's coming in glory;

Presider: And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Savior of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, through whom we are acceptable to you, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your children;

through Jesus Christ our Savior, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever.

All: AMEN.






If you require gluten-free bread, tell the priest when he comes to you and it will be provided. To abstain from Holy Communion, cross your arms over your chest to indicate that you would prefer that the priest bless you. In



addition, it has always been our understanding that those who receive communion in only one kind (bread or wine) have received communion in the fullest sense.

Becoming a Christian ... or renewing your faith

January – May 2026 (dates and times TBD by the group that forms)

Before we were called Christians, we were called followers of "The Way"—a way that led through death to Resurrection, as modeled by Jesus Christ. Followers of The Way were initiated into this new, transformed life through baptism. At Good Shepherd in 2026, we'll use the term The Way to refer to a process that leads toward baptism or some form of reaffirmation of baptismal vows. Everyone is invited!

Baptism: Why be baptized? It's what makes you a Christian. You can be a believer before baptism, but being baptized means committing to find your place in the community of Christians all over the world. Perhaps the Holy Spirit is urging you to get wet.

Confirmation: Why be confirmed? Baptism makes you a full member of the faith. But confirmation shows that you recognize for yourself that you are part of the Body of Christ and take responsibility for your own relationship with God. If you have made an adult affirmation of faith in another denomination, you are already considered to be confirmed. In that case, read about ...

Reception: Why be received? To be a member of Good Shepherd, all we need to know is that you're baptized and want to be considered a member. But perhaps you feel a call to make public your intention to make the Episcopal Church your home base. Some leadership positions also require confirmation or reception as an Episcopalian.

Reaffirmation: Why reaffirm? This option is available for everyone else, including sponsors of those going through other rites. Some people feel a call to reaffirm their baptismal vows, especially when they have been through a big change in life. You can reaffirm your baptismal vows anytime you like and as many times as you like, right alongside those who are undergoing these other rites.

VESTRY RESOLUTION #2025-12-D: Intent to Sell the Woods

Resolved: ... that the Vestry, with the recommendation of the Executive Committee, the Finance Committee, and the Property Redevelopment Task Force, intend to sell a portion of Good Shepherd's woods, including the 3.7-acre south lot, as soon as is feasible, consistent with the church's mission.

Background: In recent years it has become clear that the congregation does not have the capacity to manage the woods we own. Increased camping, piles of garbage, and drug activity, plus evidence of fires being set, have raised the urgency of this issue.

In 2025 the vestry and rector committed, via mutual ministry goal, to come to a definitive understanding of what needs to happen with the woods. Congregational input, plus the formation of a Property Redevelopment Task Force, have enabled deep investigation of the possibilities.

A Woods Subgroup of the Task Force learned that selectively logging the woods would not be practical. They also learned the high level of maintenance needed to keep the woods healthy—maintenance that we do not have a plan for.

The question of parting with wooded areas beyond the South Lot sits on the plate of the Task Force. This would be an item of negotiation with potential builders. Redrawing the existing property lines and/or rezoning are also possibilities.

At the very least, though, selling the South Lot would likely allow Good Shepherd to invest enough funds to free us from our chronic operating budget deficits, and hopefully also could provide us with ongoing funds for ministry.

The vestry approved this resolution on 12/16/25.

Ministry Opportunities

Saturday Community Meal: Our Saturday Community Supper has several volunteer opportunities. Each week of the month has a different team. We are in need of help with serving, clean-up, and food prep (washing, chopping, and mixing). In addition, we would love to have a substitute coordinator and substitute lead cook. Eucharistic Ministers & Eucharistic Visitors: These are confirmed Episcopalians who serve the chalice during worship and/or visit those who are unable to be with us on Sunday mornings. Safe Church training is required. Talk to **Pastor Josh.**

Eucharistic Visit "Seconds": We always send our visitors out two by two, so this role is for literally any adult not related to the Eucharistic Visitor. Tech Team: The crew in the loft maintains Good Shepherd's online worship connection. At least as many folks join us via YouTube as do on Zoom. Pastoral Care Team: Important skills include a listening ear, confidentiality, and the willingness to meet and befriend people we don't see in church very often. Talk to Carole Loudenback.

Coffee Hour Teams: Provide refreshments on a monthly basis after the 10:30 service. Talk to **Mary Aronen.**
