

FireFly Facilitation's Process for Reaching Consensus

Once you have diverged to consider several options, you need to have a process for vetting the options and converging on a decision that all will support and fully execute. These are the steps to achieving that.

How FireFly Defines Consensus:

- Input of every member is considered
- · Effort to address all concerns
- All members help develop the decision
- All members agree to support decision 100%
- "I believe this is the best decision for the organization at this time, and I will support it."

How to Test for Consensus - Red, Yellow, Green Method:

- What the vote means:
 - Red: I do not support.
 - Yellow: I could support, but I have some questions I need to have addressed.
 - Green: I support; it's the best decision for our organization at this time.
- Ways of voting:
 - Show of hands for each color
 - Round robin with or without explanation
 - Hold up colored sheet of paper simultaneously
 - Secret ballot

How to Resolve Differences:

- 1. Green voters remain quiet
- 2. Yellow voters describe their concerns
- Any member can then offer ideas or refinements
- 4. Red voters then state their opposition and proposed alternative(s)
- Resolve differences
- 6. Re-vote if still not there

Tips for Reaching Consensus:

- Remind group of the presenting issue and the ultimate goal.
- Encourage all members to have a full say.
- Emphasize positives.
- Find out how serious the negatives are.
- Keep summing up the areas of agreement..."I have noted four major reasons that have come up. Thev are..."
- Change the facilitation process
