- ➤ The Restricted Information Period is over and once again we will be able to engage fully with providers.
- Providers are encouraged to reach out with any questions, concerns, or comments moving forward.
- ➤ An email was sent to Assisted Living Services providers on April 4th regarding the implementation of biweekly capacity reporting, two identical information sessions have been scheduled on April 22<sup>nd</sup> & April 30<sup>th</sup>. The sessions will include:
  - An overview of the biweekly capacity reporting process.
  - A demonstration of the Microsoft Forms submission process.
  - The new reporting process is expected to be launched in early May, with the official start date to be confirmed during the information sessions.

## **Funding Timeline Update:**

- > The majority of community funding is expected to flow by **June 1st**.
- There is a possibility that some allocations may be delayed until **July 1st**. The overall aim is to ensure funding begins on **June 1st**.

The focus remains on forward planning and strengthening sector-wide collaboration.</li> <li>Provincial Integration and Communication – Key Considerations</li> <li>Highlighted the region's strong history of collaboration and recent interest from CSS in enhancing communication integration.</li> <li>Expressed support for innovation but noted that, as part of a large provincial organization, initiatives now require more rigorous approval processes.</li> <li>Communication-related efforts must go through provincial IT authorization. The shift from local agility ("motorboat") to broader coordination ("ocean liner") means slower implementation timelines.</li> <li>Local proposals must be well-rationalized and aligned with provincial strategies before proceeding.</li> </ul>

<ul> <li>→ InterRai Assessor Training &amp; Capacity in Ontario East.</li> <li>→ Committee Membership.</li> </ul>	The CSS Collaborative, Ontario East Table includes representatives from Champlain, South East, and Central East sub-regions to discuss shared resources and system-level topics.  • At the March meeting, Michael Wallen (Ontario Health) presented on the role of Clinical Assessment Educators, focusing on:


- Building capacity
- Establishing and maintaining content and best practices for assessments.
- The group is exploring regional conversations (not a working group) to:
  - Assess current models for InterRAI assessor capacity.
  - Identify needs and potential support
  - Recognize and respect effective existing models.
- Participants are encouraged to share input in the chat to help plan discussions tailored to each sub-region.

## **Expressed needs/ thoughts:**

- ➤ Interest in learning about established InterRAI assessor models across Ontario Health East.
- > Openness to adapting successful models locally.
- Support for sharing best practices to strengthen regional approaches.
- ➤ Willingness to collaborate to improve capacity and outcomes.
- > Need to clarify the value proposition of RAI assessments:
- > Uncertainty around how RAI data is used and its actual impact.
- Concern that data is often ignored or not tied to outcomes.
- > Desire to understand how RAI informs planning and decision-making.
- Interest in exploring alternative tools, such as frailty scales from RGPs of Ontario, which may better capture:
- > Socioeconomic factors, mental health challenges, dementia and cognitive decline & caregiver burden.

- > Understand existing models (e.g., assess if the known model is effective).
- ldentify pros, cons, strengths, concerns, and areas for improvement in each region.
- Request to develop a comparative summary of current practices across regions to:
- > Expedite understanding of what is working.
- > Facilitate a generative discussion on region-specific solutions.

	<ul> <li>Emphasis on finding fit-for-purpose models rather than a one-size-fits-all approach.</li> <li>Action for CSS Shared Resources: The CSS shared resources team will plan to set up three meetings with sub-regions to understand their needs regarding the frailty scale and InterRAI assessments. They will then report back on the findings.</li> <li>Committee Membership Expression of Interest: There will be an upcoming expression of interest for membership in the CSS collaborative table. Nathalie highlighted some vacancies and encouraged members to keep an eye out for this request.</li> </ul>



### E-Referral Stats (2019-2025):

- > Data shared on the impact of Ocean e -referral for non-clinical services.
- > Significant jump in public referrals; goal to increase provider use through campaigns and collaboration.
- ➤ 16 new CSS organizations onboarded.

### **Top Referral Services:**

Care coordination most requested; Meals on Wheels and Housekeeping remain popular.

#### Regional Coordinated Access:

Focus on simplifying referrals with a holistic approach; increased referral volume since 2023.

<u>Referral Flow:</u> 27% of regional referrals directed to CSS services. Some referrals related to social determinants like transportation or recreation. Form updates to clarify service scope and align with Care dove's offerings.

**Report Card Overview**: A report card was provided to all providers with listings on the Access CSS network for the period of January 1st, 2024, to December 31st, 2024.

**Key Categories**: Four categories were analyzed: agent profile, receiving referrals, and partner engagement.

Community Impact: > The program strengthens community connections, supports autonomy, and fosters leadership. > It has led to successful initiatives like vaccination clinics, falls prevention COMMUNITY RESOURCE CENTRE programs, wellness clinics, and a reduction in isolation and depression. **Program Reach:** Oasis is active in three apartment buildings with 641 seniors, currently serving 198 participants. **Program Focus:** Focuses on basic, low-cost, preventative programs such as nutrition, movement, and social engagement to help seniors stay active and connected.
