Acupuncture is an **ancient healing therapy**, with origins in China dating back more than 2,000 years

Q&A Ross J. Barr

#### **BALANCING THE ELEMENTS**

LONDON-BASED ACUPUNCTURIST ROSS J. BARR USES THE CHINESE FIVE ELEMENTS THEORY TO TREAT HIS CLIENTS. HE ALSO DEVELOPED HIS OWN WELLNESS PATCHES.

#### When and why did you decide to become an acupuncturist?

When I was 20 years old, my dad died unexpectedly. This was obviously a life-changing event, and my mum recommended acupuncture for the heartbreak and shock. I went into the session absolutely broken, and I came out with a completely different feeling. There was a sudden sense of calm and clarity. I wanted to do for others what this acupuncturist had done for me, so I went to the College of Integrated Chinese Medicine in Reading, UK, and got my Bachelor's degree. I focused on Five Element acupuncture, an ancient theory that emphasises the balance of Wood, Fire, Earth, Metal and Water within body, mind and spirit. I also studied Japanese Seitai chiropractic body therapy, gaining knowledge in bodywork therapies that combine principles of chiropractic and osteopathy.

#### What are the benefits of

acupuncture? In Traditional Chinese Medicine, the general idea is that we all have a kind of current, or energy flow, running through our body, called Qi. What the needles do is help distribute, or redistribute, that Qi to invigorate it. Acupuncture also helps stimulate the organs to do their jobs more efficiently. With Five Elements, the focus is on restoring the natural balance of the elements within your body. Everyone has all five elements in their body and they're all connected to certain organs and functions. A big misconception is that acupuncture is a painful procedure. It's not. You might feel a tingling sensation but it's mostly a relaxing experience.

#### What do your wellness patches do?

The patches started during lockdown as a way to reach patients I couldn't see in my clinic. We launched the Healing patch first for aches and pains, and later added Sleep and Calm patches. The smell of the herbs helps calm the nervous system and they stimulate the acupuncture point. The transdermal absorption is minimal – it's more about the sensory and energetic effect. We

created the Patch Pack for travellers, which has a bit of everything.

Any travel wellness tips? Unpack your bag properly, no matter how long you're staying. It sounds small, but it grounds you. I try to use travel time to do the things I rarely manage at home, such as reading fiction or watching a film from start to finish with my phone off.





#### DATE WITH A MOUNTAIN GORILLA

FREEK, A DUTCH BIOLOGIST WHO STUDIES AND FILMS UNIQUE ANIMALS WORLDWIDE TO INSPIRE A LOVE FOR NATURE, TALKS ABOUT HIS ENCOUNTER WITH A SILVERBACK GORILLA.

"The silverback walks straight towards me"



t's a misty morning in the dense jungle of Bwindi Impenetrable
Forest in Uganda. I've been trekking for hours through glistening ferns and tangled roots, and I can feel that I'm getting close. Suddenly, a colossal silverback gorilla rises from the greenery a few metres ahead of me.
Although he's about as tall as the average man, he's built like a tank:
204kg of raw power wrapped in black and silver-grey fur.

I've stood eye-to-eye with many large and potentially dangerous animals, but there's something different about being this close to a silverback. It's humbling. He stares at me with a calm yet unshakable authority. I'm careful not to lock eyes with him. In his world, that's considered a power move, as it signals dominance or defiance. Then, without a sound, he turns and starts eating again. In those few seconds, he's judged me and decided I'm not a threat. Within moments, leaves rustle, branches sway aside and I find myself surrounded by a family of mountain gorillas. They're among our closest living relatives, and yet they're also some of the rarest on Earth and are almost extinct.

As the undisputed leader, the silverback's in charge. He has only one mission: to protect his family. Every female and every youngster in the group looks to him for safety. But despite his enormous size, huge strength and fearsome reputation, he only fights when it's necessary. When

challenged, a silverback first relies on intimidation and display. He'll rise to his full height, growl, drum on his chest, bare his teeth, or even lunge forward in a dramatic bluff.

Gorillas don't actually beat their chests with clenched fists, they cup their hands to amplify the sound, so their palms can act as resonators. Rather than a display of machismo, this is clever communication. It's meant to prevent a fight, not start one. You see, the bigger the gorilla, the lower the frequency of the sound he produces. In a sense, he's broadcasting his weight class. Chest-drumming allows silverbacks to size each other up by sound, so they can figure out who's likely to win, without fighting. Most conflicts end with nothing more than sound and posture.

Suddenly, the quiet breaks as the silverback rises. Calm and purposeful, he walks straight towards me. My heart races; not from fear, but from awe. He comes so close he brushes me gently aside with his enormous shoulder. Then he lowers himself onto the ground behind me, his furry back facing mine, as if to say: "You're one of us now."

Overwhelmed by a deep emotional connection, my mind drifts to the way we characterise gorillas as creatures to be feared. But this is to completely misunderstand these intelligent animals. Fewer than 1,100 mountain gorillas are left in the world, so the only thing we should be fearing is their extinction.

#### UP CLOSE & PERSONAL

Guests who are lucky enough to get a reservation at Itamae Ao in Miami are invited to sit at one of 10 seats at the counter, where they'r reated to an 8-course omakase dishes chosen by the chef-ment of Peruvian-Japanese fare by chef Nando Chang. Sourcing is a priority for Chang, who regularly flies whole fish in from Japan. This bigfin reef squid ceviche is a perfect example of his attention to detail and aim to achieve the perfect balance between acidity and spice. This dish can't be guaranteed however, as the *omakase* format means frequent changes to the menu.

#### **TORONTO**

TORONTO-BASED MELISSA CHAI IS A MULTIDISCIPLINARY CREATIVE PRODUCER WHO BRINGS CONCEPTS TO LIFE, CRAFTS MEMORABLE EXPERIENCES AND KNOWS ALL THE BEST SPOTS IN THE CITY. @MELISSA\_CHAI



What do you love about living in Toronto? It's a place that refuses to be just one thing. Every pocket of the city has its own rhythm, its own flavour and its own people. Toronto wears its diversity proudly, with every neighbourhood telling a different story through food, art and energy.

#### How would you spend a day exploring the city?

I'd start at a cosy local café, such as Sam James (multiple locations) for a strong, no-fuss espresso, or Milky's (multiple locations) for design-forward vibes and dreamy lattes. Then, I'd wander into a gallery and get happily lost among the art. Gallery 1888 (20-225 Sterling Rd), Cultural Goods Gallery (Unit 15, 1444 Dupont St) and Cooper Cole 1 (1134 + 1136 Dupont St) all showcase thoughtful, often underrepresented voices in contemporary art. Next, I'd go and explore boutiques and vintage shops, including 313 Design Market (313

Roncesvalles Ave) for curated finds, Blue Button Shop (1499 Dundas St W) for timeless, high-quality fashion, and Mjölk (2959 Dundas St W) for carefully selected Japanese and Scandinavian design treasures. And finally, I'd enjoy some chill time in High Park ②, just soaking up the sounds and watching the city breathe.

Which areas do you recommend? The Distillery District 6 is a beautiful, historic part of town that's great to wander around. Little Portugal and Brockton Village are bustling with indie galleries, lively terraces and cool energy. And Dovercourt-Wallace Emerson-Junction is more under the radar, but buzzing with breweries, studios and industrial charm. It feels like a work-in-progress - in the most exciting way.

#### Where should we eat? Family-run Maha's (226 Greenwood Ave) is a must for

brunch, serving up Egyptian comfort food that's totally worth the queue. For pastries, head to Coco's (668 College St), Roselle (362 King St E) or Emmer (161 Harbord St), where everything is golden, buttery and made with love. Dinner-wise, Imanishi Japanese Kitchen (1330 Dundas St W) serves up homestyle cooking in a warm, low-key space; Fat Pasha (414 Dupont St) brings bold, joyful energy to Jewish and Middle Eastern comfort classics; and Dotty's (1588 Dupont St) offers nostalgic bistro vibes with simple, yet refined, seasonal dishes.

#### What about the nightlife?

To dance, head to Standard Time (Unit A, 2nd Floor, 165 Geary Ave) for sleek vibes and a killer sound system, or Cafeteria (1650 Dupont St) for a late-night crowd that knows how to move. To chill and soak up live music, Rooms (915 Dupont St) is a go-to for soulful beats and eclectic nights.

#### Best hotels to stay at?

1 Hotel Toronto (550 Wellington St W) and Ace Hotel 4 (51 Camden St) are both central and perfect if you want to stay close to the action while surrounded by great food, culture and beautifully curated spaces. For a more boutique, west-end experience, I love The Drake Hotel 6 (1150 Queen St W) - an artsy institution with live music, rooftop cocktails and rooms that feel like mini creative studios - and The Annex (296 Brunswick Ave) - which is more minimalist and mellow.

# CHEERFUL NOTE

Singing live for a TV audience of 166 million ought to be daunting, but for Congolese-born Dutch artist Claude (21), the Eurovision Song Contest 2025 was all about enjoying the moment; something the young singer learnt to do early in life. Text Marieke Verhoeven Photography Anne Timmer

here are some people who simply seem to bring the sunshine with them wherever they go. Claude is one of those individuals. The moment he steps into the luxurious entrance of the Rosewood Amsterdam hotel, housed in the former Palace of Justice on Amsterdam's central Prinsengracht canal, it seems to light up with his sunny disposition. "Good morning, I'm Claude!" he says with a radiant smile and bright eyes as he introduces himself by hugging the entire production crew. When we sit down for the interview at the hotel's speakeasy-style bar with a cup of tea and honey ("a must for any singer"), I ask him if he'd mind me taking a picture of him for a friend's nine-year-old daughter who's a massive fan. But he proposes to make a selfie video instead. "That's much nicer, right?" says Claude before accepting my smartphone and recording a short video, thanking his young fan for her support. It might be his age, or the fact that he's new to the music business, but Claude displays a genuine curiosity and sense of excitement about his newfound success that's infectious. After his first single 'Ladada (Mon dernier mot)' - which he sang in French, his mother tongue, and Dutch - became a hit in his adopted country in 2022, Claude's star quickly began to rise. Since representing the Netherlands at the 69th edition of the Eurovision Song Contest in Basel in May, his popularity increased even further, and he's now garnered more than 3.4 million monthly listeners on streaming platform Spotify alone.

#### Singing with family

Growing up in the war-torn Republic of the Congo in Central Africa, Claude's current situation is a far cry from his early childhood. After his father passed away unexpectedly, Claude's mother had to care for their seven children on her own. With his six siblings (he has three older brothers, two older sisters and one younger sister), he moved around his home country often, trying to find refuge whenever a place became unsafe. "I remember hearing bombs and hiding under couches and behind refrigerators," recalls Claude. "We were constantly on high alert, and I didn't get to go to school very often. But at the same time, we were also doing normal kids' stuff: being outside a lot and playing football." An important outlet for the family was music, he says: "We sang every day, mostly



church songs because I was raised as a Christian. And I loved watching Trace Africa, Africa's number-one music channel, admiring artists such as Adele, Beyoncé and Michael Jackson."

Claude's musical talent wasn't noticed by his family at first. He was often asked to "sit this one out" when his older siblings would begin harmonising, and he wasn't allowed to be in the band they formed. "They weren't very impressed with my skills," says Claude, laughing. "I wasn't bad, but they're all good singers. I guess being one of the youngest, they didn't take me that seriously. But I was always determined and eager to make something of myself; I just didn't know in which capacity vet."

When Claude was nine years old, he moved with his family to the Netherlands after his mother secured refuge there for herself and her children. Claude has warm memories of his time spent at an asylum seekers' centre in the Dutch city of Alkmaar. "I remember being genuinely happy there," he shares. "I've always had an interest in other cultures and languages, and suddenly, I was living in the same building as kids from Iran, Somalia, Syria and many other countries. I was picking up other languages and making new friends in no time." The asylum seekers' centre's primary school teacher Mr Kees became an important mentor for Claude and even inspired him to consider a career in teaching. "I have major respect for Mr Kees," says Claude in »









a serious tone. "I can't imagine how challenging it must be to teach a class of kids who don't speak the language and are often traumatised and distracted. But, somehow, he made it fun and engaging for all of us, and I find that inspiring. Teachers deserve the utmost respect." Even though he spent a relatively short period - 1.5 years - at the asylum seeker's centre, Claude's still in touch with his former teacher and some of his fellow students. "We keep in touch via social media, and try to get together for dinner or drinks every few months. Obviously, they want to know everything about my music career and all the craziness that comes with it, but I'm just as curious and proud of everything they're doing. It's amazing to see each other's journeys and realise how far we've come."

#### **Talent competitions**

The asylum seeker's centre is also where Claude watched Eurovision for the first time. He vividly remembers being instantly mesmerised: "It was 2014, the edition where Austrian singer Conchita Wurst won, and I was in awe of the spectacle, the scale and the variety of the acts. But I still had no idea I'd ever end up on that stage myself; it seemed very far from my daily reality." Five years later, when Claude was living in the city of Enkhuizen with his family, attending a local high school and waiting tables on the side, he saw an audition call for the popular *The Voice Kids* singing competition TV series. This inspired him to submit a video of himself singing - recorded by his younger sister - to the show. "My initial drive was to make it to Disneyland Paris for the auditions," admits Claude. "It wasn't even about the competition; I just wanted to visit the theme park. But, once I made it to the second round and tasted the experience of being on stage with a studio audience cheering me on, I knew that I wanted more of it."

Even though Claude didn't make it past that second round, his performance of Belgian singer Stromae's hit 'Papaoutai' touched the hearts of many. Unfortunately, the pandemic abruptly brought an end to his emerging singing career. "It wasn't a major disaster for me," explains Claude. "I was just focusing on school again and got a job as a clerk at a national chain of pharmacies. So, when I was scrolling on Instagram in 2022 and saw a post about Are You Next?, a talent competition initiated by music label Cloud 9 Music and music channel

XITE, I didn't think much of it. I actually deleted Instagram for a while after that to focus on school. But when I downloaded it again and this was the first post I saw, I decided to enter." To Claude's surprise, he won the competition and got the opportunity to book multiple studio sessions with a team of experienced writers, producers and other music professionals. "I guess they liked the fact that I was mixing French, Dutch and English, and had a different sound," he reflects. "There was also an instant chemistry between me and the songwriters, with whom I still work and who became my friends and musical mentors. Before we knew it, we had written a few songs. One of them was 'Ladada (Mon dernier mot)', which was soon picked up by national and international radio stations." After that, he started landing singing gigs and began performing at small venues around the country.

#### **Bizarre** experience

His multilingualism, international appeal and charming personality were also the reasons for Claude being approached to represent the Netherlands at the Eurovision Song Contest in Basel. His performance of the song 'C'est la Vie', an uplifting tune in which he mixed English and French, made him one of the jury's favourites, but in the end, he came in 12th place out of 26 in the Grand Final. "It was such a bizarre experience, a rollercoaster ride with all those camera »

media attention," says Claude. "But it was a lot of fun as well. Once I was on that stage, I was solely focused on making a connection with the live audience, not with the hundreds of millions watching at home. And even though I didn't end up in the top five, I received so many supportive messages from people all over the world on social media, telling me how much the song resonated with them." The message behind the song, which is an ode to living life to the fullest and accepting all its ups and downs, has a lot to do with Claude's childhood, he explains: "The Latin phrase carpe diem, which means 'seize the day', is very important to me because I know from experience that every new day is a gift. You can't take anything for granted." When asked if the positively spirited singer ever has an off-day, he smiles and then says: "Of course I do! The state of the world right now can make me sad at times. Why can't we just all get along and be nice to each other? That's why I delete my social media from time to time. I don't want to be confronted with all that negativity and the constant flow of news." He's also open about seeing a therapist, which he began doing every now and then when his career started taking off. "It's great to be able to share my thoughts and experiences with an objective professional who doesn't judge me. Going to therapy is still taboo for some people, but I've experienced the benefits and can recommend it; I see it as a workout for my mind."

After a busy summer of performing at various festivals and venues, including a special concert with the Metropole Orchestra at Amsterdam's prestigious The Concertgebouw concert hall, Claude is now focusing on releasing new music and recording the next season of The Voice Kids, which will air in the Netherlands in January 2026. This time however, he's a judge and mentor rather than a contestant. Claude realises that it's a full-circle moment early in his career: "It's amazing to be on the other side already, seeing the raw talent of those kids and helping them to develop further. Putting on that mentor hat and showing them the ropes of this industry is something I really look forward to. I've had a lot of great mentors and opportunities in my life so far, and I can't wait to pay it forward." «

Favourites

#### Amsterdam

I've only been living in Amsterdam for 1.5 years, so I still have a lot to explore, but I enjoy the international character of this city. You can find people from all walks of life here. My favourite thing to do is to simply stroll around the canals or meet up with friends at coffee places, such as Cafecito, which has a few locations around the city.

#### Friends

I'm obsessed with American 90s sitcom Friends. It took me a few episodes to get into it, but now I can't stop watching it. I've almost finished all 10 seasons, and I'm dreading the moment when I do. I find it hilarious. and it's the perfect series to relax with in the evenings; the characters are so funny and unique.

#### Pearls

At one of my first big performances, a stylist gave me a pearl necklace to wear, and it somehow became my lucky charm. I now wear pearls in one way or another for every show; I even rushed backstage once right before a performance because I was missing my pearl necklace. Besides looking beautiful, pearls symbolise purity and wisdom, and I like that meaning.

#### Adele

British artist Adele is probably my favourite singer of all time. I went to see her show in Munich in the summer of 2024 and was crying tears of joy for most of her performance. Even at a huge venue, Adele can make vou feel like she's singing only for you. That's a rare skill. And her voice is incredible. I still play her latest album on repeat. A duet with Adele is my ultimate dream.

#### How to get around

Santiago's neighbourhoods, or 'barrios', each have their own, distinct character. There's the historic centre **0**, with grand colonial buildings; the modern business district of Las Condes; bohemian Bellavista, with its artsy vibe; and upmarket Providencia, with elegant boutiques and restaurants. The Metro de Santiago connects most of the areas of interest, and a BIP! Card, available at any station, gets you access to both the metro and buses. Santiago has lots of wide streets, so for shorter distances, walking or cycling (use the Bike Itaú app) are great options.

#### An 'old-school' lunch

White tablecloths, mahogany walls, lace curtains and a menu of Chilean classics: stepping into Confitería Torres @ (Av. Libertador Bernardo O'Higgins 1570) feels like stepping into the Santiago of a century ago - which isn't surprising as it's the oldest restaurant in the city, having opened its doors in 1867. Another great option is Emporio Zunino (P. Puente 801), Santiago's oldest empanaderia. It might be busy, but it's worth the wait, as they make their empanadas fresh all day long. Pro tip: take your empanadas and eat them in the nearby Parque Forestal. And at family-owned Antigua Fuente (Av. Libertador Bernardo O'Higgins 58), you'll find no frills, just great sandwiches with fresh ingredients on homemade bread. They're so good that they've been hailed by locals as the best sandwiches in town for more than 50 years.

#### Parks and Politics

The city's long boulevards, hillside lanes and green parks make it a paradise for bikers. Find out for yourself by booking a tour with La Bicicleta Verde (Constitución 153). Their signature Parks & Politics tour guides you through Santiago's historic centre and leafy parks while recounting Chile's fascinating political history. Local, English-speaking guides will show you around areas rarely seen by tourists, stopping at local markets to sample fresh produce.

#### Dive into culture

Another way to learn about Chile's politics and history is at the Museum of Memory and Human Rights (Av. Matucana 501), which aims to raise awareness of the human rights violations committed

by the Chilean state between 1973 and 1990. For a more lighthearted experience, the Mirador Interactive Museum (Av. Punta Arenas 6711) is a science museum that's fun for both adults and kids. Also worth visiting is La Chascona Museum House (Fernando Márquez de La Plata 0192), which was owned by politician and poet Pablo Neruda. Besides his belongings, it houses an art gallery, a collection of African wood carvings, and items by designer Piero Fornasetti.

#### **Sunset drinks**

As the day draws to an end, take the 10-minute Santiago Funicular 8 ride from the boarding point at Plaza Caupolicán and head up to the park on top of San Cristóbal Hill 9. Grab a cup of mote con huesillo, a traditional Chilean (non-alcoholic) drink made of cooked wheat and dried peaches, from one of the carts selling it, and enjoy the view over the city as the sun sets.

#### **Must-try restaurants**

Santiago's culinary scene has blossomed in recent years, with chefs celebrating local ingredients and traditional techniques, and giving them a contemporary twist. For an authentic Chilean experience, visit El Mesón Nerudiano (Domínica 35), housed in a historic building near Neruda's former home. Dishes such as pastel de jaiba (crab cake) and caldillo congrio (conger eel soup) honour recipes mentioned in his poetry. For contemporary Chilean cuisine, head to Boragó 6 (Av. San José María Escrivá de Balaguer 5970) and try the 16- to 20-course Endémica menu, which changes daily. Chef Rodolfo Guzmán sources his ingredients from all over Chile, as well as from the restaurant's biodynamic farm and orchard. A more laid-back option is Chipe Libre (José Victorino Lastarria 282), which offers modern takes on Chilean and Peruvian classics, and pisco-based cocktails.

## **Evening entertainment**Santiago's nightlife offers

Santiago's nightlife offers something for every taste. The Municipal Theatre

(Agustinas 794) presents a year-round programme of classical music, ballet, opera and plays in a magnificent 19th-century building. For contemporary performances, check the schedule at Gabriela Mistral Cultural Center 6 (Av. Libertador Bernardo O'Higgins 227), a dynamic arts complex that hosts theatre, dance and music events in a repurposed building with striking architecture. Jazz enthusiasts can get their groove on at The Jazz Corner (Santa Isabel 451), an intimate venue that features both local and international musicians.

#### Sleep tight

At The Singular Santiago (Merced 294), one can expect nothing less than a five-star experience, as this hotel boasts an award-winning

restaurant, a rooftop pool with mountain views, a prime location and fabulous service. And the Renaissance
Santiago Hotel (Av. Kennedy 4700) is one of Chile's most sustainable hotels and a great choice for travellers who like to enjoy luxury and comfort in an eco-friendly way. Ask for a room on a higher floor and enjoy the amazing view of the Andean peaks.


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Cape Town South Africa



arrived late last night among the ghostly outlines of trees and rooftops beneath an inky sky. As I fumbled with the keys to my cottage, the warm, moist air contrasted sharply with the crisp cold of winter I'd left behind in the Netherlands. Cape Town was just a silhouette of shadows and blinking lights in the distance. But even in the dark, I could feel it: that subtle thrill of returning to a place you love. And now, with the morning sun pouring in, I have butterflies in my belly as I step outside to be greeted by the city in full colour. And rising behind it all: Table Mountain. The most enchanting mountain I've ever laid eyes on. Ilet out a deep sigh. I'm home again.

When people ask me why I love Cape Town, I always say it's because it has everything. The city is surrounded by unspoilt nature, white-sand beaches, rugged mountains, charming bays and sprawling vineyards. During my first visit here 14 years ago, I fell in love with the city's rich mix of cultures and nationalities, the warmth, openness and friendliness of its people, and its amazing food and wine. For six winters in a row, I've swapped my Amsterdam apartment for a home base in 'the Cape'. I'd usually stay for a few months, but this time it's just a visit of six weeks. Which is why I want to soak up every bit of Cape Town life while I can.

#### Strolling along the prom

One of the first things I do after arriving here is visit the Sea Point Promenade: a broad, 3km stretch that runs right along the ocean's edge. I grab a flat white to go from Bootlegger and start walking. The Atlantic Ocean shimmers in the distance as seagulls call overhead. It's the best cure for jetlag. This is where Cape Town awakens and gathers. From as early as 7am, 'the prom' comes alive with joggers, cyclists, dog-walkers and early birds soaking up the fresh sea breeze, greeting each other in a friendly manner as they go by.

To extend my warm-up, I do the short but steep hike to Lion's Head: the lion-shaped peak that towers beside Table Mountain. The trail winds in tight spirals, past fynbos bushes and rocky outcrops, as the city grows smaller with every step. The climb takes about 90 minutes and rewards me with sweeping views of the city, the mountain and the coastline beyond. Up here, the world lies at my feet, and I feel the powerful energy of the African soil and a deep connection with Mother Earth, all at once. It's one of the most photogenic spots the city has to offer, together with the historic Bo-Kaap neighbourhood at the foot of Signal Hill, known for its iconic rainbow-coloured houses. But they're more than just photogenic, they tell a story.

After slavery was abolished in the 19th century, many former slaves and their descendants settled in Bo-Kaap. Painting their homes in bold colours became a tradition said to symbolise freedom and self-expression, a joyful legacy that still lights up Bo-Kaap today. Cape Town looks good from just about any angle. Turn your head and there's a view. Add in the golden light that photographers dream of and it's no wonder the city is a favourite with international film crews and for fashion shoots. It's no coincidence that the streets are filled with cool creatives and pretty people.

Once I feel fully reconnected to the Mother City following my climb, I meet up with my friends. Many of them came here for a short stay but ended up building a life here. Cape Town seems to have that effect on people. Jennifer Dröse first landed here in 2000 while working as a flight attendant for KLM, and kept coming back. Eventually, she stopped leaving altogether. During her layovers, Dröse used to find hidden gems and share them with her colleagues. Now, she runs Tailor-Made Cape Town with her cofounder Claudia Schotman, creating custom-made holidays focused on slow travel, local connection and small-scale, naturebased stays. "We believe in creating meaningful memories with the people you love, in the most unique places we know," explains Dröse. "There's a huge increase in people coming to live here for a while. Families with young »


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

children, freelancers, remote workers. Some even relocate permanently."

Our mutual friend Emmelie Steentjes tells a similar story. She visited 10 years ago and now lives here. As the founder of Bumbuntu - a company that primarily provides private offices and a coworking space - Steentjes has experienced the rapid growth of the digital nomad scene from the inside and helped shape it. "Bumbuntu was born out of a personal need," she says. "I was missing a real connection with locals." At the same time, she felt the urge to give something back. "As a freelancer, I was earning well, and the contrast between wealth and poverty is impossible to ignore here. That's why I created a space that connects people across backgrounds and communities." Bumbuntu organises events and activities, always hosted by locals, and in collaboration with local entrepreneurs. Ten percent of the membership fee goes to the Ukhanyo Foundation, which gives young people from the townships a second chance at education. "We chose that cause deliberately," she explains. "If you ask people in South Africa how to break the cycle of poverty, most people say the same thing: education."

#### Wine o'clock


When the weekend comes, it's time to explore Cape Town's stunning surroundings. After five days working from the city, I'm itching for a trip to the Cape Winelands, a group of wine-making towns that luckily aren't far. Constantia is just half an hour by car, Stellenbosch and Paarl about an hour's drive, and Franschhoek – also known as 'Africa's culinary capital' – another 30 minutes from there. And it's not just your palate that's spoilt along the way: the drive itself is a treat too. Think rugged mountains, wide valleys and endless fields heavy with hanging grape clusters. Whether you stay at a romantic rustic estate, grab a farm-to-table lunch or enjoy a great wine tasting, you won't be disappointed.

My favourite spot is Babylonstoren, just outside Franschhoek, my destination this afternoon. I've lost count of how many times I've been for long lunches at their farm-to-table restaurants, for tastings of their crisp white and bold red wines, or simply to wander through the vast gardens: five hectares of herbs, veg, exotic plants, colourful flowers; all immaculately laid out like a living painting and reachable via perfectly manicured paths. The estate itself spans 250 hectares and has everything from a bakery and butcher to its own beehives. What began as the Manor House with a garden grew into one of the Cape's most iconic wine estates, with a hotel, spa, restaurants and shops, all rooted in the botanical richness of the land. During my visit this time, I speak to the founder Karen Roos. "Diversity is our aim," she says. "The garden features more than 300 tree varieties and thousands of plant species. We also have ducks, chickens, bees, and our own herd of water buffalo for fresh mozzarella. This is a paradise anchored to the land. A place to reconnect with the beauty of the landscape."

#### **Rock art and stars**

A few weeks later, I trade the city for an escape in the red dust of the stunning Cederberg Mountains, known for their rich legacy of ancient rock art, made by Bushmen. The area boasts more than 2,500 rock art sites, some dating back as far as 6,000 years. While hiking the Sevilla Rock Art Trail, I come across red paintings of elands, elephants and half-human and half-animal figures, which are faded but still powerful, whispering stories of a time when humans and nature were deeply entwined. At Kagga Kamma Nature Reserve, my shelter for the night, luxury tents come with hot tubs and, on this occasion, perfect views of the Milky Way as I stargaze following a wood-fired dinner. The next morning, I head home via Paternoster: a sleepy coastal village where the whitewashed houses and blue sea make you feel like you're in Greece. But that's not why I'm here. Arguably the best thing about Paternoster is Wolfgat, a world-class restaurant hidden in a humble fisherman's cottage, where just 20 guests are served at a time, and I'm one of the first. Chef Kobus »

van der Merwe does it all: from foraging seaweed at dawn to cooking and plating, and also pouring your wine. It's not just lunch, it's a beautifully curated, local and wildly delicious experience, with the Atlantic Ocean as your backdrop.

#### The end of the world

Cape Town's surroundings offer more beauty and diversity than you can possibly fit into one trip. On my final day here, I squeeze in an experience that captures a fair amount of it, and that's the drive to the end of the world: Cape Point, to be exact, the tip of Cape Peninsula, which is about 65km from Cape Town. The first stretch of the route, known as Chapman's Peak Drive, is considered one of the world's most beautiful coastal roads, and has featured in countless car commercials. It's only 9km long, but has more than 100 bends winding along wild cliffs. As I meet the first of those bends, the wind whistles through the windows, the fresh sea air wakes up every cell in my body and each turn reveals a new picture-postcard view leaving me in complete awe. I feel a deep sense of freedom. But there's more beauty ahead: the untamed bay of Misty Cliffs, where waves crash so fiercely that a veil of sea mist always lingers. This mysterious, damp, wild coastline feels otherworldly. Then comes the hippie town of Scarborough, where I wave at the barefoot locals crossing the street with their surfboards. And finally, Cape Point Nature Reserve, where the wilderness begins. There's nothing here but open space and untouched nature, until you reach the tip of the peninsula. And when the road ends, there's only one way to go: up. I go on foot, but you can also opt for the little funicular that takes you to the lonely lighthouse. As I arrive, the world falls quiet, except for the howling wind.

From the end of the world, I head to the airport for my flight home. With a happy heart, and my stomach full – of butterflies and far too much food – I say a temporary goodbye to my beloved Cape Town, because it's always a 'see you soon'. «

# THE PROSPECT OF SAVING HALF A MILLION LIVES IS EXCITING

Meta Roestenberg is professor of vaccinology, and clinical head of the Controlled Human Infection Center, at Leiden University Medical Center. She's currently working on a groundbreaking malaria vaccine. Text Charlotte Latten Photography Dana van Leeuwen.

hat inspired you to study medicine? I was looking for a subject that would build on my analytical mindset and could positively affect other people. As a teenager, I struggled to answer the existential question: What's the meaning of life? I eventually realised that, for me, it's to try to leave something behind for society. That was mainly due to the fact that I felt privileged being born in the Netherlands where opportunities are plentiful. I decided to sign up for courses in both medicine and pharmacy, and I was accepted onto a medicine programme. But I didn't yet have a clear idea of what I wanted to do with it.

What sparked your passion for infectious diseases? In my third year of study, I did a public health internship

in the Philippines. While I was there, I saw how much rural populations, particularly the poor, suffered from infectious diseases, such as TB, HIV and malaria, and how much these diseases affected their everyday lives. Since the pandemic, most people now understand the impact an infectious disease can have on a society, but back then I had no idea. It made me realise how much there was to gain in that field. I eventually saw that there was only so much I could do as a medical doctor, and I decided to focus on developing my research skills instead. Research can lead to new developments and products, such as vaccines, that can impact the lives of millions of people.

Why did you choose to focus on malaria? I had told my professor at the

medical centre that I wanted to be in poverty-related vaccine research, so he introduced me to the research group of Robert Sauerwein, a very well-known professor of malaria who asked me if I'd like to be his PhD student. I agreed on the spot, and I was hooked from day one. Malaria is caused by parasites; they're truly fascinating creatures. Do you know the book, The Very Hungry Caterpillar, where a caterpillar changes into a butterfly? Parasites also transform. When malaria parasites go into their host, they change the way they look and behave, and they can multiply themselves by 10,000. Perhaps even more fascinating is the fact that they can travel through our body without being noticed by our immune system. When I learnt about that, it boggled my mind. I wondered »



how this could be, and how we could turn it around. I arrived at the following question: How can we train our body to recognise parasites and attack them appropriately? The answer has immediate consequences for the design of a vaccine.

# In which stage are you and your team regarding the new malaria vaccine?

We're in the experimental phase. We cultured a parasite in the lab that's 'crippled': it lacks a gene that it needs to enter the blood. Because it cannot enter the blood, it cannot make people sick. By infecting healthy people with this parasite - via mosquitos - we can train their immune systems. In this way, next time a malaria-carrying mosquito bites them, their immune system will start attacking the parasites. The results show that one exposure to these crippled parasites induces full immunity in 9 out of 10 people. If you translate this to vaccinology, it means that you only need to get your shot once and you'll be protected. That's better than current vaccines, which are 30-70% effective. So, the concept is there and it's promising, but there's no vaccine yet.



Could you estimate how much longer it will take? That's hugely complicated to answer. What we have shown now in adults in the Netherlands doesn't necessarily translate to countries in Africa, where malaria is endemic. If it did, there could be a vaccine in 5-10 years, but if we stumble upon problems, we'll need to solve those first. And then there's the funding problem: we need more money for research. But overall, I'm positive: we're running a race we'll finish. We're talking about half a million people, mainly children below the age of five, in Sub-Saharan Africa, that die of this horrible disease every year. The idea of being able to prevent that is exciting.

# Why do healthy people agree to be infected with malaria for vaccine

research? For several reasons. They want to contribute to science, to society in general, or they want to know what it's like to participate in medical research; a lot of them are from the medical field. And, of course, they're financially compensated for their time. But that's not the main reason; you get much more money when you work in a bar. To me, these people are heroes. They contribute to science and society; as far as I'm concerned, we should appreciate this altruism. I find it strange that a lot of people consider it weird. It's normal to become a fire fighter, but it's not normal to participate in a clinical trial? It's the same thing to me.

# You also work as a physician and have two teenage sons. How do you manage

it all? The secret weapon is my husband. He works part-time as a nurse and made the choice to reduce his hours to be there for the kids. He does most of the work at home, as well as being a taxi driver for our kids, so I never have to worry about that. If you want to put your mind to something really complicated, you need to have a mind free of the worries associated with the small things that

need to happen at home. I wouldn't be who I am and where I am today without my husband's support.

Do you travel a lot for work? Once every two months roughly; mainly for meetings with colleagues worldwide. I took my kids to Kenya last year. We did a street tour in Nairobi guided by a man who used to be a street kid. I wanted my sons to know that life can be very tough if you grow up in a place where your options are limited. It affected them a lot, and I hope it helps them to be aware of the responsibility they have to society. They don't need to change the world, but they can make their own small difference in their own circle. If everyone did this, the world would be a better place. «



The building's external decorations aren't the only elements that make this structure interesting: it also has three intact period rooms. The most remarkable is the front room, where two of the three overdoors are dated '1760' and signed by painter 'A.H. van Beesten'. 

# THE LOWDOWN ON CONTRAILS

HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED ABOUT THOSE WHITE STREAKS AIRCRAFT LEAVE BEHIND IN THE SKY? THEY'RE CALLED CONTRAILS. BUT WHY DO THEY FORM? AND WHAT'S THEIR IMPACT? SUSTAINABILITY MANAGER LISANNE VAN WIJNGAARDEN PROVIDES AN INSIGHT.

hort for 'condensation trails', contrails form under specific weather conditions, typically when the air at the aircraft's cruising altitude is extremely cold and contains high humidity. "They form as a result of burning kerosene in the engines," Van Wijngaarden explains. "However, the combustion process is never completely perfect and some particles, such as soot, don't fully burn. So when these very hot particles are released, and they enter cold, humid air, water vapour begins to cling to them and quickly freezes. This forms tiny ice crystals. As more soot particles and moisture accumulate, the crystals grow and eventually form a cloud – a 'contrail'."

#### **Changing altitudes**

While contrails are much too high up in the atmosphere to affect air quality on the ground, they do impact global warming alongside aviation's CO2 emissions. "The longer these contrails linger, the more damaging they are as they form a little blanket in the sky. This reflects sunlight from reaching the Earth, which has a cooling effect. But it also traps the warmth of the sun that radiates back from the Earth. So, on average, the effect is warming."

According to recent research, rerouting just 5% of flights could reduce the climate impact of contrails by as much as 80% but in practice, that's easier said than done. "At the moment, it's still very hard to predict precisely when and where these contrails form," says Van Wijngaarden. "Naturally, it makes sense to avoid certain altitudes where conditions are favourable for contrail formation. But, if all airlines begin to follow the same routes or fly at the same altitudes, this can lead to congestion. Aircraft need to remain at safe

distances from each other, and safety will always be our highest priority."

#### **Hopeful developments**

Van Wijngaarden believes scientists, airlines and meteorological institutions are heading in the right direction when it comes to reducing the climate impact of contrails. "KLM has partnered with an external provider who developed a weather model that predicts contrail-forming regions. We connected this to our flight dispatch department, and ran a six-month trial in 2023 in which we integrated the weather data into our flight-planning process once a week to help minimise the risk of forming contrails. It was highly insightful." So why not keep going? "Currently, it's still a very labour-intensive process as the systems aren't fully integrated, but we're exploring options to incorporate accurate weather forecasts for humidity and temperature directly into our planning systems, so we can automatically take these contrail-forming regions into consideration. I believe that by 2030, we'll have made significant progress in reducing the non-CO2 effects of aviation, including contrails. The integration of weather models is key for this."

Rising awareness of the issue also helps. A 2020 European report outlined the climate impact of contrails and led to the first policies on these non-CO2 aviation emissions. "Airlines flying within Europe now need to monitor and report the climate impact of their contrails annually. This will lead to more research, and hopefully, faster solutions," says Van Wijngaarden. "As long as we continue to work closely with the scientific community, I'm confident that a solution is within reach."



### **HOUSE RULES**

### **Electronics on board**

On board the aircraft, electronic devices, such as smartphones, tablets and e-readers, may be used at all times. If they include wireless functionality, they must be set to airplane mode before the aircraft doors are closed and remain so throughout the flight. You may use an electronic device's Bluetooth mode (e.g. a Bluetooth headset) at all times as long as you enable airplane mode before you switch on Bluetooth. If the aircraft offers Internet onboard, Wi-Fi mode may be used at all times as long as airplane mode is enabled first. Before connecting to the onboard Wi-Fi, switch off any VPN services on your device. Larger electronic devices (e.g. laptops) must be stowed during taxiing, take-off and landing. If in doubt, check with the cabin crew. Cabin crew may request that all electronic devices are switched off completely if it is deemed necessary.

### **Drinks and smoking**

Alcoholic drinks are served one at a time to passengers seated in their assigned seats. For safety reasons, the purser may close the bar. Passengers are not permitted to drink alcoholic beverages brought on board with them. **Smoking**, including artificial cigarettes such as 'SuperSmokers', **is strictly forbidden** at all times on KLM flights.

### **Privacy**

KLM respects the privacy of its customers and staff. Taking a **photo** or making a **film recording** of any person on board without their explicit consent is not allowed.

### Lithium batteries

Mobile phones, laptops and other electronic devices contain lithium batteries, which can catch fire if they are damaged or if they short-circuit. Please make sure that you keep an eye on your device while it is charging, and do not charge it while sleeping. Please check 'restricted articles' on klm.com for more information.

### Hand luggage at EU airports

To increase passenger safety, security rules for hand luggage are in place for all flights in accordance with European Union regulations. When passing through security control, you are required to present liquids, gels, pastes, lotions and aerosols separately, and in individual containers of no more than 100ml

and packaged in a resealable, transparent plastic bag (maximum volume 1 litre, 1 bag per person).

### **Animal products**

To prevent the spread of animal diseases, you are prohibited from entering the EU with meat, meat products, milk and milk products. Small quantities for personal use are permitted on arrival from Andorra, the Faroe Islands, Greenland, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, San Marino and Switzerland. For further information, visit europa.eu.

### Airport shopping

In the EU: Within Europe, you can travel with your tax-free liquid purchases. They will be packed and sealed for you. The seal is valid for 24 hours. You may not break the seal until you have reached your final destination, even if your journey includes a transfer.

Outside the EU: Transfer at an EU airport? You may bring liquids and gels from non-EU airports. They will be checked at Schiphol. Travelling to the US? Only bring liquids on board bought and sealed at Schiphol. Transfer in the US or Canada? Pack your liquids in your check-in luggage.

Wi-Fi & free messaging

### STAY IN TOUCH ON BOARD

Our entire ICA fleet has Wi-Fi, and more and more of our European aircraft are being equipped with it. If there's a Wi-Fi logo on your aircraft, you can use Wi-Fi. Just follow the instructions to the right and select a package of your choice. As a Flying Blue member, you can send basic texts with our free message package. Non-members can enrol for free during the flight via the Onboard Portal and make use of the Free Messaging pass. If you'd like to surf the Internet, send & receive emails, listen to music, use social media or stream a film, you can buy a Wi-Fi pass for the full flight or 1-hour (ICA-only).

GARRET DISCUSSES HIS ROLE AS SECOND OFFICER, ROUTE INTO KLM AND INVOLVEMENT IN KLM'S CONNECTING COLOURS ORGANISATION.

What does your job entail? As a Second Officer, I work in a team with other pilots. Our primary objective is to fly our passengers efficiently and safely to their destination. Before each flight, the cabin and cockpit crews meet at the KLM Crew Centre to check in and conduct the Flight Briefing. During this briefing, we discuss our flight at length, covering important subjects such as our flight path, weather conditions, unusual cargo and the amount of fuel we need.

Did you always want to work in aviation? Sort of. As a child, I lived next to Gilze Rijen Air Base. I often watched F-16 figher jets taking off. This inspired me to fly gliders when I was 15. Later, I became an athlete and studied at the Johan Cruyff Institute. When an injury caused me to change course, I decided to join the Martinair Flight Academy. After graduating, I worked for Ryanair as a First Officer and then at Norwegian as a Captain. I joined KLM in 2019.

What do you like most about working for KLM? My work-life balance is ideal at KLM. I also enjoy the diversity of the colleagues and passengers I connect with around the globe. In addition, working at KLM has enabled me to become an ambassador for Connecting Colours, an organisation within KLM that promotes diversity and inclusion.
