
Lene & Danny, a 21-5 family







Q&A Wybe van der Gang

TIMELESS DESIGN

WITH HIS LUXURY WATCH BRAND VAN DER GANG WATCHES, FOUNDER WYBE VAN DER GANG AIMS TO CREATE THE PERFECT WRISTWATCH. HIS LOVE FOR WATCHES BORDERS ON OBSESSION, HE ADMITS.

How and why did you start making wristwatches? As a child, I already had a fascination for mechanics and repairing things. My grandfather ran a mattress factory and my father had a motor scooter factory, so becoming an entrepreneur was something that ran in the family. While I was studying at the Leiden Instrument Makers School, I started my first business repairing Italian mopeds in a little workshop in the centre of the city. When I moved back to my hometown Dokkum in Friesland in 1990, I decided to focus on precision mechanics with my business Exakt Fijnmechanika. The company grew very fast and before I knew it, my team and I were producing precision mechanics for big companies in the medical industry, the military and astronautics. Think of night vision equipment for the military or tiny cannulas used by surgeons during eye surgery. In 2002, I decided to make my first wristwatch for two reasons. Firstly, I wanted to challenge myself and make something beautiful for myself to wear, and secondly. I felt there was a niche market for wristwatches made from a precision mechanics expertise instead of a marketing or jewellery perspective.

What sets Van der Gang Watches apart? Our incredible attention to detail, use of the highest-quality materials, and super-specialised manufacturing techniques. Where most watch brands are focused on maximal production, we prefer to use machines and techniques that only allow us to produce about 170 watches a year. We're not interested


in making flashy watches; a Van der Gang watch is understated elegance. I have an obsessive desire to make a perfect product and can have an emotional response when a watch is finalised. To me, a perfect watch is as beautiful as a work of art in a museum.

Are you working on anything new?

We're launching Sportiv, our first sportive and highly water-resistant watch. It's made of white ceramics, and is something I came up with when I was on holiday by the sea with my family. I often get ideas when I travel, but inspiration also comes from reading industry magazines and staying up to date on all the latest technology. Or when I'm walking my dog, whose curiosity and intuitive way of exploring the world always moves me.

Who's your dream co-passenger for a long flight? This is a personal one for me, but it would have to be my twin sister, who passed away at the age of 37. The twin bond is something that's hard to explain unless you have one. I would just like to catch up and hear where her journey took her. vandergangwatches.nl









Always on the move

THE NEW ART MUSEUM ABOUT MIGRATION

From the quays around the Fenix warehouse in Rotterdam, millions of emigrants once departed by steamship to the other side of the world, in search of a better life. Many also arrived here from places such as China and Cape Verde. At this place of departure and arrival, in what was once the largest warehouse in the world, Fenix now tells stories about migration.

From all directions

In the exhibition *Alle Richtingen* ('All Directions'), you can view migration through the eyes of more than a hundred artists worldwide. The collection ranges from video

projections to installations and from paintings to sculptures and historical objects. You can take a seat in a fabric New York City bus created by artist Red Grooms, view a 3.6m-high fragment of the Berlin Wall and discover a tiny portrait of Desiderius Erasmus, painted by Hans Holbein the Younger in the early 16th century. Together, the works depict countless migration stories from the past and present.

The world in one warehouse

You will also encounter these migration stories in other places. Such as in *The Suitcase Labyrinth*: an installation of thousands of


suitcases where you can listen to the stories of the suitcase owners. Or the exhibition *The Family of Migrants*, a collection of almost 200 photographs proving that people have always been on the move. In the heart of the building, the largest artwork, *Tornado*, takes centre stage as a double, twisted staircase that rises above the museum. Stories of migration truly come to life at Fenix in Rotterdam.

SHARKS HAVE AN ELECTRIFYING SIXTH SENSE

FREEK, A DUTCH BIOLOGIST WHO STUDIES AND FILMS UNIQUE ANIMALS WORLDWIDE TO INSPIRE A LOVE FOR NATURE. TALKS ABOUT A SHARK'S HIDDEN SENSE.

ying on my stomach, I glide through the crystal-clear waters of a Bahamian mangrove. Below me stretches a bed of fine white sand, sprinkled with silt and tiny shells. From it rise the slender aerial roots of the mangrove trees, reaching upward like crooked fingers clawing at the sky. Between those roots, the water comes alive: crabs scurry into their burrows, shrimps toil busily in the sand, and small fish streak past me in quick, silver flashes.

Then it happens. A little further on, a tiny, grey dorsal fin appears and silently slices through the almost glassy surface. And it's heading straight towards me – a lemon shark pup, only a few months old. A baby!

For sharks this young, mangrove forests are vital. Adult females seek out these extremely shallow waters (so shallow they sometimes nearly strand themselves) to give birth, all to give their pups the best chance of survival. At high tide, the roots vanish beneath the water, turning into a maze of hiding places where the pups can slip away from larger predators. At the same time, the mangroves overflow with food, a lavish banquet for hungry young sharks. These nurseries-cumdining halls sustain the pups until they are strong enough to face the open sea.

The little shark glides right past my mask. I take in its tiny streamlined, torpedo-shaped body, the two pointed dorsal fins, the catlike eyes, the narrow snout. A soft yellowish glow

across its skin reveals why it's called a lemon shark. When the curious pup circles back and slips past my face again, a thought grips me: what would it be like to experience the world as a shark? For them, there is a whole other dimension, hidden from us. In addition to seeing, hearing, smelling, feeling and tasting, sharks possess a sixth sense: the ampullae of Lorenzini, tiny pores around their snout that allow them to detect electric fields. Without electricity, there is no life: every cell in every living organism carries an electrical charge. Every heartbeat is sparked by an electrical signal, every muscle movement begins with one. Sharks have the incredible ability to detect even the faintest of these currents. A fish lying motionless beneath the sand may believe it's invisible and safe, but to a shark it glimmers like a star in the night.

And that's where the magic lies. Sharks remind us that entire worlds exist, forever hidden from our limited senses. While we cling to what we can see, smell and hear, sharks spend their lives gliding through a universe of electric waves. For me, it's a lesson in humility. We humans like to think our perception of the world is complete, but that is an illusion. No matter how clever or technologically advanced we become, vast parts of reality will always escape us, yet are vividly experienced by other creatures. Perhaps the deepest lesson nature has to offer is her reminder of how small and narrow our perception really is.

What do you love about Bali? I love my island for its deep-rooted culture, community spirit and beautiful daily rituals. Every morning, the Balinese place offerings of rice, flowers and incense at sacred locations across the island as a form of devotion. Living in Bali encourages us to slow down, reflect and truly connect: with our surroundings, with others and with ourselves.

Best parts of the island?

Candi Dasa and the area around it is a hidden gem on the east coast and a great place to unwind. It offers timeless, tranquil seaside villages and lots of nature and heritage attractions. You'll find incredible snorkelling and diving sites here, the iconic Lotus Lagoon, historic water palaces such as Tirta Gangga and Taman Ujung, and Tenganan Village which showcases Balinese cultural traditions. With its high-end dining scene, great shopping, surfing and wellness spa

options, Pererenan is a more relaxed yet sophisticated alternative to busy Canggu. Sanur is a great option for families, and Munduk is a haven of waterfalls, hiking paths and misty hills. Lastly, as the island's cultural hub, Ubud is the place to go for culture, yoga, jungle river experiences, galleries and craftsmanship.

How do we respect the local culture? The local vibe is warm, tolerant and welcoming. We encourage visitors to respect local customs, and to observe etiquette at temples and sacred sites.

What are the must-sees/dos? For cultural experiences, I recommend booking a cooking class and market tour at Bali Asli (East Coast), browsing local crafts at the Art Market • and attending a dance performance at the Ubud Royal Palace (Ubud). For sports- and nature lovers, I suggest snorkelling with

manta rays around Nusa Lembongan island ②, surfing on Seminyak or Uluwatu beaches ③, trekking the rice fields of Sidemen ④, or doing a sunrise climb up Mount Batur volcano.

Where should we eat?

The intimate Fed by Made (Seminyak) offers elevated modern bistro cuisine that showcases local produce and flavours. For a truly local experience, Warung Melati (Legian) is a local lunchtime gem for home-style Indonesian dishes. And Locavore NXT **6** (Ubud) focuses on local, often foraged, ingredients in its 20-course tasting menu.

Any shopping tips? Tulola Jewellery (Ubud) uses Balinese techniques to create refined contemporary pieces inspired by Indonesian music, literature and heritage.

Threads of Life (Ubud) sells original handwoven textiles and crafts to support indigenous peoples. And Jenggala (Kuta) has incredible

handcrafted tableware and home decor.

Favourite places to stay?

For beachfront nostalgia, Tandjung Sari (Sanur) is a boutique hotel with lots of charm. Surrounded by jungle and rice fields, Soulshine **6** (Ubud) balances wellness, music and design beautifully, and offers farm-to-table dishes. And The Menjangan, located within the West Bali National Park, is a great off-the-radar resort for nature lovers longing to combine jungle wilderness with snorkelling and diving.

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Femke Bol

GOLDEN GIRL

Known and praised for her positive mindset, athletic versatility and incredible finishing speed, Dutch track and field athlete Femke Bol (25) is on a winning streak. We meet the Olympic champion at the iconic London Stadium.

ain has been lashing over London Stadium in the city's eastern district of Stratford all day, and the track is slippery wet for the women's 400m hurdles at the London Diamond League 2025. Yet, starting in lane six - her favourite position - with American Jasmine Jones on one side and Jamaica's Andrenette Knight on the other, Femke Bol doesn't seem fazed by the less-than-perfect conditions, nor by her fierce competition. After flashing her big smile and blowing her signature kisses to the cameras, Bol quickly puts on her game face and prepares for the start. She then jumps over each hurdle with extreme focus, elegance and deceptively effortless ease, finishing first at 52.10 seconds and leaving her competition more than one second behind. It's Bol's 28th consecutive win at the Diamond League, which is considered the Champions League of athletics and takes place every year in main cities around the world.

Body as an instrument

We meet the four-time Olympic medallist the next morning at the same location, where the surface of the gigantic, multi-purpose stadium is being covered by turf trays and converted into a grass pitch to prepare for a match of its football club, West Ham United. The 1.84m-tall, long-legged Bol has the same sweet and humble demeanour she displays when she's being interviewed before or after one of her races. Despite being tired from the physical exertion and a late-night dinner with her parents, who try to be present for as many of her races as possible, Bol is in good spirits. Though she informs us politely but firmly that her body now needs rest. so she won't do any sprints for the camera, must keep her body consistently warm and needs to eat at a specific hour. "It's a bit of a hassle at times," she says. "But I'm used to it. My body is my instrument; I must protect it and care for it as well as I can." Although Bol is happy with yesterday's victory, she's not 100% content with her performance. "I'm obviously pleased that I won, but I feel like I could have done better," she explains with a shy smile. "The previous race in Monaco went a little more smoothly and consistently. But my parents always remind me to celebrate every win and never take it for granted. Plus, I love this stadium and the British supporters; athletics is huge here and I always feel a lot of love from the crowd."

Over the past few years, Bol has established herself as one of the most dominant athletes in the international track and field world. Since 2022, she has secured multiple European and World Championship gold medals in the 400m, the 400m hurdles and relays, setting championship records along the way. She has broken the world indoor 400m record twice, most recently in 2024, and has continued to dominate the Diamond League circuit with consistently fast times throughout 2025. After winning a bronze medal at the Tokyo 2020 Olympics held in 2021, she won three more medals at the Paris 2024 Olympics, including gold in the 4x400m mixed relay. A few months after this interview, Bol retained her world title in the 400m hurdles at the 2025 World Athletics Championships in Tokyo with a world-leading time of 51.54 seconds.

All this aside, Bol recently decided to close the book on the 400m hurdles and open a new chapter in her athletics career: the 800m. "The 400m hurdles has given me unforgettable memories and shaped me into the athlete I am today," she says. "But I'm driven by the need to push my boundaries. The 800m is a completely new challenge – one that excites me as it will require fresh strengths, strategies and resilience. My ambition is not just to compete but also to reach, and be successful at, the highest level."

Bol's versatility, consistency and incredible finishing speed have made her a standout force in \gg









global athletics. In 2023, after her double gold at the World Athletics Championships 400m hurdles and 4x400m women's relay in Budapest, Jamaican athlete Usain Bolt even sent her a text message to congratulate her. "That was pretty cool," Bol reflects. "He also sent me a video message to congratulate me when I won Dutch Athlete of the Year. It's really special getting recognition from such a legendary icon."

Shooting star

Bol is becoming somewhat of an icon in her own right, being on a winning streak since she first stepped on the international athletics stage in 2019. Growing up in the Dutch city of Amersfoort with her parents and older brother, she initially joined a local athletics club at the age of eight. "I was an active child and had already tried different sports, but hadn't really found something that I loved," she says. "When you first join an athletics club as a junior, you try out all the different disciplines. But when I was 15, my coach noticed that I was a good runner and encouraged me to try the 400m. I fell in love with it and wanted to train every day."

Her talent and drive didn't go unnoticed and just one year later, Bol was already competing in the European Youth Championship. After she added the 400m hurdles and relays to her skills, Bol's star started to rise even faster. At the age of 19, she reached the semi-finals in the 400m hurdles of the World Championships in Doha. "What I like about hurdles is the fact that it's very technical; you can exactly measure out your steps between each hurdle and calculate the best running speed. It's as much a mind game as it is a physical performance. And the relay always appealed to me because of the team element."

Even though Bol enjoyed school and spent two years at university, she decided to quit after the Tokyo Olympics and focus on sports full-time. "When I enjoy something, I want to do it all the time and become the best at it – I'm a perfectionist," she says. "And it proved too hard for me – in a good way – to be the best at both my studies and my athletics."

Visualising the race

Bol's ability to accelerate in the last stretches of a race is something that keeps fans and sports press alike on the edge of their seats. "Femke Bol turns on I'M NOT SATISFIED UNTIL EVERY MUSCLE IN MY BODY ACHES

the jets!" commentators of American news network NBC exclaimed during the dramatic finale of the 4x400m mixed relay at the Paris 2024 Olympics, where Bol left her competition behind in the final metres of the race. There's no real secret to this ability, Bol says, but what certainly helps her is writing down a race plan before each one, from the focus points for each hurdle to the curves on the specific tracks, so she can visualise the whole race. Together with her sports psychologist, Bol has developed an additional visualisation technique that she uses before a big competition. "It's almost like a meditation-style visualisation," she explains. "We go through the entire day, from the moment I wake up and what I eat for breakfast to every detail of the actual race. This helps me to not get distracted when something unexpected happens. For example, if my competition sprints off faster than I expected, I can stay focused on my own race and balance my energy. That way, there's enough left in the tank for the final metres."

Bol thinks her perfectionism is one of the driving forces of her success, but is also something that she struggles with at times. "I'm the type of athlete who wants to give 110% during every training too; I'm not satisfied until every muscle in my body aches. Sometimes, it can get a little excessive."

Bol's psychologist also helps her to deal with this perfectionistic nature. "I used to get quite upset »



when my pick-up was late or the wind had turned from tail to head wind. But I'm getting better at letting go of things that are out of my control. Now, I also use my notebook to write down things that went well and that I'm grateful for. I love to write; it's a great way for me to release and reflect."

Giving back

Bol has launched a series of fictional children's books titled *Go Femke!* in which a young girl discovers her talent for running during a summer camp and goes on different adventures with her friends. "These books are not only meant to inspire kids to do sports, but also to encourage them to find their own passion and be proud of themselves despite the difficulties they might encounter. As athletes, we have a big platform, and I think it's important to explain that life isn't always easy and we struggle sometimes too."

Another way in which Bol tries to give back is as an ambassador of the non-profit organisation Free a Girl, which focuses on freeing children from sexual exploitation. "I was raised in a safe and encouraging home, and unfortunately that's not the case for many children around the world. Every child deserves to grow up in a secure and loving environment."

Golden era

Bol also believes that every child deserves to experience the joy of sports. "I myself know how sports can help expand your horizons, boost your self-confidence and build your social skills. I've made some beautiful memories and great friends along the way." One of these friends, Belgian pole-vaulting athlete Ben Broeders, became her boyfriend and is now her fiancé. The fact that they both perform at the highest level in sports really helps them understand each other, Bol says. "It's nice to analyse competitions together, but we're also great at relaxing together."

When asked how she would describe this chapter of her life, Bol doesn't need much time to respond. "I don't want to jinx it, but I feel like I'm in my golden era. I've won all the titles I've dreamt of, I'm engaged to the love of my life, my parents are happy and healthy, and I have a group of wonderful friends around me. And all this at the age of 25. I kind of hope this chapter of my life will never end." «

Old and new

Walking through Athens is a little like flipping through the pages of a history book. One moment you're standing in front of the iconic Parthenon temple, atop the UNESCO World Heritage Site of the Acropolis, the next you could be admiring ancient treasures at the National Archaeological Museum (28is Oktovriou 44). But in Athens, history goes hand in hand with modernity, thanks to a flourishing arts and culture scene, colourful street art and a young, hip vibe. In some circles, Athens has even been promoted as 'the new Berlin' and a paradise for solo travellers and digital nomads.

Where to go

While Athens has numerous neighbourhoods, certain areas are particularly popular. Plaka • is the postcard-perfect historic area with cobblestones, neoclassical architecture and scenic squares. For a taste of genuine Athenian life, head to the residential Koukaki. Psyrri • has an edgy vibe with its street art and trendy bars. And centrally located Monastiraki is famous for its flea markets and historic sites such as the Tzistarakis Mosque (Areos 1) and Hadrian's Library (K, Areos 3).

Fuel stops

There's an abundance of cafés and bakeries, both traditional and contemporary, all over the city. The cool Williwaw (Kerkyras 69) serves tasty treats, including babka (a sweet, braided bread); Asterisque (Charvouri 2) is a gluten-free bakery, known for its pastries, bread and

sleek interior; and Bel Ray Bar (Falirou 88) is a popular spot housed in a repurposed former car wash. Meanwhile, the coffee menu at Foyer Espresso Bar (Vriaxidos 2) won't disappoint as it's been designed by an awardwinning team of baristas. Their frappé (Greek ice coffee) is arguably the best in town.

Indie stores galore

Athens is teeming with independent shops run by creative Athenians. At It's a Shirt (Asklipiou 67), you'll find high-quality, handmade unisex shirts, often cut from dead stock fabrics, that you'll want to add to your wardrobe at once. Ere (Erechthiou 30) is a stylish and aesthetically pleasing concept store and, if you're into art and design, it's hard to walk out of Hyper Hypo (Voreou 10) bookshop

Beach getaway

Leave the bustle of the city by heading to one of the beaches along what's known as the Athens Riviera. Edem Beach is close and easy to reach from central Syntagma Square; Astir Beach in Vouliagmeni is the ultimate beach club experience; and the rocky Limanakia offers an adventurous coastal escape.

Dinner time

The food scene in Athens is thriving, thanks to a younger generation of Greek chefs opening exciting restaurants. Housed in a former candlemaking workshop, Isandsia 6 (Melanthiou 2) serves Greek and Mediterranean cuisine with an emphasis on organic ingredients; visit Seychelles (Kerameikou 49) for local dishes with a modern twist, plenty of veggie options and a great wine list; and no-frills restaurant Atlantikos (Avliton 7) offers excellent, fresh seafood that won't break the bank.

Cocktail hour

Athens has a lively afterhours scene with plenty of rooftop bars, casual pubs and clubs. If you like to mix your drinks with fine tunes spun by top DJs, take a seat at Pharaoh **6** (Solomou 54). Known for its natural wine collection, it boasts more than 400 labels to choose from, so you'll be spoilt for choice. Rooftop cocktail bar A for Athens (Miaouli 2-4) might not be the most affordable place for a late-night drink, but the stunning view of the Acropolis and Monastiraki square is definitely worth it.

Live entertainment

It's fair to say that Athens has a vibrant live music scene, and there are many places where you can experience traditional Greek bouzouki performances, for example at authentic taverna Klimataria (Pl. Theatrou 2) or, for a more modern approach, concert hall and live music venue Kentro Athinon (Pireos 142). Housed in a former industrial

warehouse, cultural hub Gazarte (Voutadon 34) hosts musical performances by all kinds of artists, both local and international. And highly acclaimed by jazz-loving Athenians for decades, the cosy Half Note Jazz Club (Trivonianou 17) is a great spot for lovers of jazz, blues and soul.

Where to rest your head

Close to Syntagma Square, Electra Metropolis Hotel (Mitropoleos 15) offers a five-star experience with personalised concierge services, modern amenities, and a rooftop bar and infinity pool, as well as energy-efficient practices and recycling programmes. Also known for its eco-friendly practices is The Stanley ? (Odisseos 1), a historic 374-room property that

boasts the largest hotel rooftop terrace in town, with spectacular views of the Acropolis and Lycabettus Hill. For a more intimate experience, the Herodion Hotel (Rovertou Galli 4) is a family-run boutique hotel with a prime location in the historic centre and can organise a tailormade guided tour through the city for you upon request.

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t 74km/h, I shoot up in one of the world's fastest lifts and feel my ears pop. When I reach the 118th floor, I step out. I'm in the Shanghai Tower, which, at 632m, is one of the tallest buildings on the planet. Below me stretches a sea of lights and a futuristic skyline, leaving the impression that this is a city years ahead of the rest of the world. But there's another side too, one of century-old teahouses and serene gardens. Strolling the streets of this dynamic metropolis, you can still sense echoes of the 1920s and '30s, Shanghai's Golden Age, when the city became a vibrant blend of East and West, earning it its nickname, 'Paris of the East'. This mix of modern and traditional is called Haipai, literally 'Shanghai style', a cultural identity born in the late 19th century, when, thanks to its position as a global trade hub, the city became a crossroads of Chinese tradition and Western influence. Once criticised as flashy and too commercial, Haipai today proudly represents Shanghai's unique character, and is exactly why it remains one of my favourite cities in Asia.

Green city

The next morning, with my feet firmly on the ground, I venture into the buzzing metropolis. This is my third time in Shanghai, but what strikes me immediately is how clean and green the city has become since my last visit almost 10 years ago. Every motorbike is electric, and at times it even seems like all the cars are. As a result, the traffic is surprisingly silent. What's more, the pavements are filled with bikes from bike-sharing schemes that the locals use intensively. But the 'green' is not only evident in Shanghai's sustainable character; it's also visible in every corner of the city - from the parks and immaculate landscape designs to the exteriors of buildings, such as The Roof, a bright-red Instagram sensation designed by architect Jean Nouvel, that has taken vertical gardens and living facades to the next level. Walking along the streets, I also encounter motorway pillars and classic buildings wrapped in ivy in an almost apocalyptic way. Shanghai is letting nature take over, and it sure looks good.

I make my way to Tianzifang, an excellent example of how Haipai culture exists in the city. This residential area was built in the 1930s and consists of traditional shikumen ('stone-gate') houses - a hybrid of Western townhouses and Chinese courtyards. Nothing would give Tianzifang away from the outside but behind the simple facades, I dive into a maze of alleys, filled with shops, teahouses and art galleries. The beauty of this hidden world is that people still live here. I peek into side streets where laundry hangs from the balconies and old ladies sweep their doorsteps. The contrast with the hipster matcha latte cafés and cute boutique shops right around the corner is like nothing I've ever seen anywhere else. I sit down with a perfect white jasmine tea and watch the people go by, caught up in their daily business.

Food, glorious food


After I finish my tea, I continue to the charming Former French Concession (FFC), Shanghai's prettiest neighbourhood, with lush trees, classic streetlights and European architecture. Behind elegant wrought-iron gates, stately mansions stand proudly amid decades-old plane trees and tropical palm trees. I meet up with Li, a guide with UnTour Food Tours, which organises culinary tours of the city, and he greets me with, "I hope you came hungry."

Haipai is also very evident in Shanghai's food culture, which is a tasty fusion of traditional Chinese fare and Western influences. Li takes me through Xiangyang Park, where people are dancing and water calligraphers show off their skills; it's the weekend and locals flock here en masse. Our first stop is to sample a traditional Shanghai breakfast dish: youtiao, Chinese fried dough sticks served with sweetened soy milk. To counterbalance the sweetness, I also have cifantuan – balls of sticky rice stuffed with pork and pickled vegetables. After that, we're off to the next stop for a jianbing. Inspired by the French crêpe, this is China's most popular »



The Former French Concession (left); a pocket of green with the Shanghai Tower in the background (right)



street breakfast. Before my very eyes, a woman prepares one at lightning speed. She spreads the batter, covers it with egg, and tops it with some chopped coriander.

We continue to meander along noodle shops and street markets, and I happily sample my way through the tour, although I am feeling pretty full. "Don't worry, we're almost done," Li reassures me. "All that's left is xiaolongbao." Ah xiaolongbao, an almost religious institution in Shanghai. The ultimate street snack, these popular dumplings stuffed with soup and meat are sold everywhere. You don't want to bite into these though. "The soup is piping hot. It's better to bite into the tip of the dumpling so that the soup can cool off. Then you slurp out the filling," Li advises. They taste delicious, and I get why this snack is such a core food here.

A hidden oasis

I thank Li for the tour and head off on my own once again. After immersing myself in the city for more than an hour, it's time for a coffee. In the FFC's narrow side streets, hidden behind anonymous doors, there's a host of bars and cafés that are unknown to most people. Li tipped me off about a place called Makoo Café tucked away in a side lane off the busy Changle Lu. After some toing-and-froing, I find the right lane and head down it. Not long after, I come across a heavy wooden door with a sign that reads 'Makoo Café' and as I walk through it, I step into an oasis of green. The owner tells me that his wife is an avid gardener; the walls are covered with drawings of plants and even the menu features many natural elements. I'm immediately drawn to the Pink Sakura Soda and order it along with a slice of grapefruit cheesecake. Cherry blossoms line the glass, making this the most photogenic drink ever. Maybe it's my imagination, but this exclusive location makes everything taste even better.

Water towns

The next day, I venture out of the city. Shanghai sits at the mouth of the Yangtze River, at the

heart of its vast delta. Scattered across this watery landscape are the so-called 'water towns' that seem untouched by time. Laced with rivers, lakes and canals, and only two hours from the city, they offer a striking escape from Shanghai's modern skyline into a world of stone bridges, narrow waterways and centuries-old charm. My first stop is Wuzhen, one of the most scenic water towns, and with two separate parts: the East- and West Scenic Areas. The former is the most authentic and is home to numerous artisans and crafts. My visit includes a stop at the Sanbai Wine Workshop, which produces 200 litres of Sanbai rice wine a day. Wuzhen is also famous for its production of indigo blue fabric, which is still dyed by hand, and you'll see this blue fabric billowing everywhere across the town. Wuzhen West is larger and, in my opinion, much more beautiful. Xizha, a charming main street that lines a canal, is packed with shops and restaurants, and I take the opportunity to sample some rice cookies and sip tea in one of the tea pavilions along the water.

Just a short drive away is Nanxun. Not often visited, this 1,400-year-old town is a bit of a hidden gem despite its strong connection to the silk trade in the 12th century, from which it acquired its wealth. As I stroll along the quay, a boatman waves and motions to his gondola. Naturally, a water town is best seen from the water, so I take my seat in his vessel, and we glide along the weeping willow-lined canals, past the former homes of wealthy silk merchants before I disembark at the Little Lotus Garden. Designed as a quiet and peaceful haven, this garden was the private property of Liu Yong, who was one of the richest men in Nanxun during the Qing Dynasty. From the tea pavilion, I gaze out over the gigantic pond with water lilies and feel very zen indeed.

Another beautiful spot in Nanxun is Baijianlou. Also known as the '100 houses complex', it's a 400m-long stretch of traditional houses that line a canal and as it's off the beaten path, even Chinese tourists are absent. »

Which is just fine with me as I find only the locals doing their laundry, taking a nap or painting along the shore. Little has changed here in the 400 years since it was built.

I make my way back to the city via Zhujiajiao, a water town that is on Shanghai's extensive metro network, line 17 to be exact. This is an advantage if you want to visit from the city, but it also makes the town busier, and less sleepy and authentic than Wuzhen or Nanxun. Nevertheless, if you want to get a glimpse of what water town life is like and aren't feeling too adventurous, this is by far the easiest option.

All that jazz

Back in Shanghai, night has fallen and I'm ready for a musical outing. Beyond the neon-drenched glamour of the skyline lies a jazzy world of soulful melodies and improvisational rhythms. The jazz scene is a testament to the city's enduring cosmopolitan spirit, a legacy from its days as the Paris of the East, and it's everywhere. I've already passed quite a few bars that sound melodically tempting, but tonight I'm seeing something really special: one of the world's oldest (by seniority) jazz bands, who play at the Fairmont Peace Hotel seven nights a week. Most of these men, donning bow ties and suits, performed in prestigious ensembles, playing for presidents and royalty all over the world. Built in 1929 as the Cathay Hotel, the Fairmont Peace Hotel remains the crown jewel of the Bund waterfront area, and the Jazz Bar was once the gathering place for Shanghai's elite. As soon as the band starts to play, the chatter in the audience stops and everyone listens in awe. Despite their age, these men have no problem dazzling the crowd with their skills. Listening to the music and sipping the colourful cocktail that the bartender just mixed for me, I realise Shanghai is also a cocktail: a wonderful blend of cosmopolitan energy and nostalgia where tradition and modernity do not compete, but co-exist, giving the city its irresistible character. Haipai in optima forma. And I'll be back for more, For sure, «

To see

Yuyuan Garden

Shanghai has many parks and gardens, but my favourite remains the famous Yuvuan Garden. an extraordinary example of a traditional Chinese garden. Nestled within it is the enchanting **Huxinting Teahouse** with a legacy that dates back several centuries. I love getting a cup of exquisite Chinese tea here.

The Bund

When night falls, go for a walk along the Huangpu River on Shanghai's Champs Élysées: the Bund. Rows of elegant Art Deco trading houses from the past are now hotels and restaurants with epic views of the futuristic skyline on the other side of the river, which forms quite a contrast.

Ferguson Lane

I love this little courtyard in the FFC. The entrance is covered in plants and leads you to an oasis of specialty boutiques, flower shops and cafés. Don't miss C'est Si Bon, a carefully curated homeware shop with designs by some of Shanghai's best local talents.

Jia Jia Tang Bao

To try the infamous xialongbao, go to Jia Jia Tang Bao, near the busy People's

Square. This simple restaurant has been around since 1986 and is nothing fancy. but they serve some of the best xialongbao in town. 90 Huanghe Rd

Hakkasan

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Jim Taihuttu

AS A DIRECTOR, I ASK A LOT OF MYSELF, MY TEAM AND MY ACTORS

Diving deep into complex history, sub-cultures and the psychology of his protagonists is essential for Dutch-Moluccan film director Jim Taihuttu (44). He counterbalances this when he's pursuing his other passion: touring the world as a DJ. Text Marietee Verhoeven Photography Ester Gebuls

hat role did cinema play in your **childhood?** My father is a huge cinephile, so, growing up, we were always watching films together. I remember seeing quite serious ones such as the German classic Der Blechtrommel (The Tin Drum) and the dystopian Blade Runner at a young age and being completely invested in them. When I saw a documentary on how Back to the Future Part II by Steven Spielberg was made, I thought: I want to do that too someday. Luckily, my parents always supported me when it came to following my dreams and never expected me to choose a 'safe' career path. They were very young when they had me and raised me with a lot of freedom; it took them another 12 years before my sister - and, then later, my brother - were born. Being

a single child for the first decade of my life never bothered me; I was a dreamer, playing with LEGO, watching TV and travelling to different worlds in my mind. Music always played a big role in our home as well; both my father and brother are professional musicians.

You became an entrepreneur in your early twenties. Why and how? At the HKU University of Arts in Utrecht, where I was studying Media, I met fellow student Victor Ponten and we became close friends. In 2004, we decided to start our own creative agency, Habbekrats. The early 2000s were a golden age for Dutch ad agencies such as KesselsKramer and 180 Amsterdam, and we saw a niche creating content in the music industry and more specifically

Dutch hip-hop, a scene that was also blooming at the time. Since I was also DJing under the name Jim Aasgier, I already had a large network in that world. We began making music videos for upcoming Dutch artists such as The Opposites and De Jeugd van Tegenwoordig, which led to bigger commercial assignments. Making music videos was a great way for us to test cinematic techniques and creative ideas, which eventually led to our first feature film in 2011, called Rabat. It's essentially a story about friendship as it follows three Dutch-Moroccan friends during a road trip to Morocco. But it also tells a larger story about what it means to grow up between two different cultures and feel like you don't really belong to either one of them. »



Is that something you've experienced yourself too, being Dutch-Moluccan?

I certainly felt like an outsider as a child, growing up in a segregated environment in the city of Venlo in the south of the Netherlands. I've always felt strongly connected to my Indonesian heritage in a positive way, and I've travelled to Indonesia often. While making my film De Oost ('The East'), a film about the battle for independence in Indonesia, on Java, my wife and I decided to stay in Bali with our four sons, because it was easier to travel back and forth from there. We enjoyed it so much that we decided to move there full-time. The Molucca Islands, where my grandfather is from, are also part of the Indonesian archipelago, which is why I experience a deep connection to my roots there.

Is there a common thread in your oeuvre? I pondered that question recently and realised that my main characters are all young men who are searching for themselves and have a complicated relationship with their father. I personally have a great relationship with my dad and my sons, but I've seen the negative impact of



a distorted or absent bond between sons and fathers in my surroundings. My next project, however, is a series for Dutch TV that centres on a Dutch-Indonesian woman who inherits a family home in Indonesia and decides to move there with her daughter. I'm excited to tell a story from a woman's perspective for a change.

What kind of director are you? One who asks a lot of himself, his production team and his actors. I take my research very seriously, work long hours and require my actors to do the same. Marwan Kenzari, for example, who played a professional kickboxer in my film Wolf and who's also a close friend, trained every day for a year to perfect his boxing moves and became super fit. Jim Deddes lost a lot of weight and worked tirelessly on his Rotterdam accent for Hardcore Never Dies, a film about the Dutch hardstyle music scene of the 90s. I don't like to order people around or to push them to do things they're not comfortable with; it's more about getting them as excited as I am to give it their all. And in general, I prefer to work on small and more intimate sets, so I have more flexibility to make last-minute changes.

You're also part of Yellow Claw, a successful DJ duo with fans around the world. How did that come to be?

I formed Yellow Claw in 2010 together with my two friends Bizzey and Nils Rondhuis, initially as a theme DJ-night at Amsterdam's Jimmy Woo club. We shared a love for trap, hip-hop, dubstep and hardstyle music, and our unique blend of these genres became a hit, first by making remixes for other artists and later in our own tracks. Bizzey left the group in 2016 to pursue his solo career, but I still tour the world with Nils in between film projects. In general, I'm a very calm person, but I'm a sucker for hardcore music and I love being on stage, hyping up a crowd. We have a very

loyal fan base, especially in Asia and the US, for which we're incredibly grateful.

How do you maintain a healthy work-life balance?

Living in Bali certainly helps. The first thing I do in the morning is go for a walk on the beach with my dog. I still travel quite a bit, but thankfully, I'm a great sleeper and not easily stressed. When I'm home, I try to be fully present with my family. Being surrounded by nature automatically calms me and for my sons, it's such a blessing being able to grow up here. For them, it's simply their everyday reality, but I try to remind them frequently that they're very lucky to be living in paradise. «



A FUTURE OF TRAVELLING WELL

HOW DO WE TRAVEL BETTER AND MORE SUSTAINABLY IN THE FUTURE?
AS KLM'S SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF STRATEGY, TRANSFORMATION & SUSTAINABILITY,
ZITA SCHELLEKENS TRIES TO ANSWER THAT COMPLEX QUESTION.

an you introduce yourself and explain your role at KLM? I'm

responsible for developing and driving the company's overall strategy when it comes to making KLM ready for a future in which we can service people as well as we possibly can, while trying to reduce our negative impact on the planet. Working at KLM means we are always focused on doing everything we can to bring our passengers to their destinations, on time and with their luggage. At the same time, as a company, we need to look ahead. Where are we headed? How do we combine growth and sustainability? People will always want to travel, but the way they travel might change. And that's where my team comes in and tries to anticipate that.

Do you have a concrete example?

Take the train, for instance. We know a lot of people would like to travel more by train or combine rail services with long-haul flights. But making that happen is quite complex. So, we've used a method called design-thinking, which is a creative, collaborative approach to problem-solving. We brought together people from different departments of the company and sat down with Eurostar, the Dutch Railways (NS) and Amsterdam Airport Schiphol. We then posed the question: what's preventing us from offering more train services? For instance, by replacing flights with train options.

Then we asked: What are the biggest bottlenecks and what's holding us back the most? And we started tackling those, one by one. My department also focuses on decarbonising the company in all its operations and making it more environmentally responsible.

What does that decarbonisation process look like? KLM focuses on four key areas to make our operations more sustainable. Firstly, there's our fleet renewal. The latest aircraft models are around 25% more fuelefficient than their predecessors, which makes a huge difference. That's why we're investing billions of euros over the next few years in new planes. But there are challenges: there are delays in aircraft deliveries. It's not possible to replace our entire fleet in one go. Plus, an aircraft typically operates for 25 years, so you want to use it efficiently and not discard it prematurely. It's about finding the right balance. Then there are operational improvements; implementing 42+ projects to reduce CO2 through smarter flying, lighter loads and efficient ground handling. The third lever is investing in Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF). SAF reduces CO2 emissions by at least 65% but is scarce and expensive. KLM is a major user and is investing in production, but scaling up is slow. Lastly, it's about future innovation: exploring electric and hydrogen

aircraft, though heavy regulation means these technologies will take years to become viable. So, in short, meaningful change is happening, but progress is gradual due to industry constraints and technological limits.

What drives you personally? I have a background in business and politics, and what excites me about working at KLM now is being out in the field, where it's possible to make concrete changes. I strongly believe that big corporations can be a force for good. When it comes to a more sustainable future of aviation, we often get stuck on what's not possible, but I like to focus on what is possible. An initiative such as The Aviation Challenge, an annual friendly competition between 27 airlines of the SkyTeam Alliance trying to fly as sustainably as possible, is a great example of a positive development in our industry. It won't happen overnight, but the willingness to invest and share knowledge is there.

YOU'RE DISCHARGED

"These little rod-like devices are called 'static dischargers'," explains Aircraft Maintenance Technician, Anas Ouazzani Touhami. "Here, we see the static dischargers belonging to an Airbus A321neo. You can tell it's an A321neo because the winglet is quite high. Although, the type of plane doesn't really matter as these tiny carbon sticks are placed in the same location on any aircraft. They're fastened to the tips of the wings and the tail and provide a pathway for accumulated charge to be safely released into the atmosphere, without any sparks. The reason this is important is because the built-up charge could potentially mess with electrical systems, such as radio frequency which would in turn disrupt communication."





About TAC

Through friendly competition, participating airlines challenge each other to reduce the impact of their operations on the environment. Each year, they organise showcase flights on which they test and implement solutions in key areas such as emissions reduction, energy efficiency and waste management.

Driving impact

The 2025 theme for TAC – which is now in its fourth year – is 'Impact', reflecting the challenge's commitment to tangible, measurable outcomes. While early editions focused on generating ideas,

TAC now emphasises putting solutions into practice – showing how they can be effectively adopted, scaled and rolled out across the wider industry.

Airlines compete not only to innovate but to demonstrate verifiable progress, sharing data and lessons that benefit the sector. HOUSE RULES

Electronics on board

On board the aircraft, electronic devices, such as smartphones, tablets and e-readers, may be used at all times. If they include wireless functionality, they must be set to airplane mode before the aircraft doors are closed and remain so throughout the flight. You may use an electronic device's Bluetooth mode (e.g. a Bluetooth headset) at all times as long as you enable airplane mode before you switch on Bluetooth. If the aircraft offers Internet onboard. Wi-Fi mode may be used at all times as long as airplane mode is enabled first. Before connecting to the onboard Wi-Fi, switch off any VPN services on your device. Larger electronic devices (e.g. laptops) must be stowed during taxiing, take-off and landing. If in doubt, check with the cabin crew. Cabin crew may request that all electronic devices are switched off completely if it is deemed necessary.

Drinks and smoking

Alcoholic drinks are served one at a time to passengers seated in their assigned seats. For safety reasons, the purser may close the bar. Passengers are not permitted to drink alcoholic beverages brought on board with them. **Smoking**, including artificial cigarettes such as 'SuperSmokers', **is strictly forbidden** at all times on KLM flights.

Privacy

KLM respects the privacy of its customers and staff. Taking a **photo** or making a **film recording** of any person on board without their explicit consent is not allowed.

Lithium batteries

Mobile phones, laptops and other electronic devices contain lithium batteries, which can catch fire if they are damaged or if they short-circuit. Please make sure that you keep an eye on your device while it is charging, and do not charge it while sleeping. Please check 'restricted articles' on klm.com for more information.

Hand luggage at EU airports

To increase passenger safety, security rules for hand luggage are in place for all flights in accordance with European Union regulations. When passing through security control, you are required to present liquids, gels, pastes, lotions and aerosols separately, and in individual containers of no more than 100ml

and packaged in a resealable, transparent plastic bag (maximum volume 1 litre, 1 bag per person).

Animal products

To prevent the spread of animal diseases, you are prohibited from entering the EU with meat, meat products, milk and milk products. Small quantities for personal use are permitted on arrival from Andorra, the Faroe Islands, Greenland, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, San Marino and Switzerland. For further information, visit europa.eu.

Airport shopping

In the EU: Within Europe, you can travel with your tax-free liquid purchases. They will be packed and sealed for you. The seal is valid for 24 hours. You may not break the seal until you have reached your final destination, even if your journey includes a transfer.

Outside the EU: Transfer at an EU airport? You may bring liquids and gels from non-EU airports. They will be checked at Schiphol. Travelling to the US? Only bring liquids on board bought and sealed at Schiphol. Transfer in the US or Canada? Pack your liquids in your check-in luggage.

Wi-Fi & free messaging

STAY IN TOUCH ON BOARD

Our entire ICA fleet has Wi-Fi, and more and more of our European aircraft are being equipped with it. If there's a Wi-Fi logo on your aircraft, you can use Wi-Fi. Just follow the instructions to the right and select a package of your choice. As a Flying Blue member, you can send basic texts with our free message package. Non-members can enrol for free during the flight via the Onboard Portal and make use of the Free Messaging pass. If you'd like to surf the Internet, send & receive emails, listen to music, use social media or stream a film, you can buy a Wi-Fi pass for the full flight or 1-hour (ICA-only).
