

THE RECTOR’S REFLECTION

On Monday, February 2, we in Georgetown joined the Church throughout the world in the celebration of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Presentation of Our Lord. It commemorates forty days after Christmas and is also known as Candlemas since the Mass can be preceded by a blessing of the candles and procession with the newly blessed candles. The prominence of candles in the annual liturgy naturally leads to a contemplation of the candle.

We are aware especially in the winter of darkness and the cold. When dusk begins to arrive at 4 o’clock or we arise at a normal waking time and night is still around us, we turn on the light switch. When the temperature drops to below freezing and remains there for weeks, we regularly check the thermostat and make sure that the heat is operating. In neither case do we typically light a candle, although some of us may have a fire in the fireplace. And yet, even though we do not need candles for heat and light, we still use them in the liturgy or on the dining room table for dinner or during the summer we make a bonfire and linger around it for hours. Candles and flames remain in our lives.

There is something peaceful about a group encircling a fire on a summer evening to chat or have a drink or have a cigar. Candles on the table may encourage a relaxed dining experience, once that dismisses a utilitarian approach to food as potential energy for the body and facilitate dining with fellowship and conversation with the food as something secondary. Yes, candles have benefits and purposes that go beyond merely providing heat and light.

Pope Leo XIV issued a statement in anticipation of World Communications Day. He begins with a reflection on the face and voice of each person, something unique, something that sets one apart, as seen in the etymology of the words “face” and “person”. Technology is threatening to mimic and replace these elements that distinguish an individual, which leads to enormous harm. “By simulating human voices and faces, wisdom and knowledge, consciousness and responsibility, empathy and friendship, the systems known as artificial intelligence not only interfere with information ecosystems, but also encroach upon the deepest level of communication, that of human relationships.”

Human beings cannot be recognized as means for each of us to arrive at an end nor is an individual simply an image to

our eyes or sound to our ears. There is a being of immeasurable value and worth under it all. Even if technology can duplicate these things through the medium of a speaker and screen, a human person is much more that technology never can attain or provide. Man is one who God wanted “to be his interlocutors, and, as Saint Gregory of Nyssa explained, he imprinted on our faces a reflection of divine love, so that we may fully live our humanity through love.”
