A Message from Michelle. . .

Great Cloud of Witnesses

Have you ever looked up in the sky and seen a shape in the clouds...? Maybe the cloud formation looks like a dog or a dinosaur or an angel? Scripture





tells us about a "great cloud of witnesses." This isn't like a cloud you

might see up in the sky. This is more like thick fog that surrounds you. This word for cloud is used in the Bible to describe a large crowd of people—you can feel them as much as you can see them, pressing in around you. The "great cloud of witnesses" isn't just watching us. It's like fans in an arena, cheering on athletes. When the writer of Hebrews talks about running with perseverance the race marked out for us, he's saying we don't run alone.

We're remembering our church's heritage — how we have been *Held Together in Faith Since* 1878. Every person who kept this church going through hard times, who showed up and served when it would have been easier to quit, who passed the faith along to the next generation—they're part of what holds us together now. Their perseverance becomes ours. Their faithfulness sustains our own.

This All Saints' Sunday, we'll remember that we're part of something bigger than ourselves. When you feel like giving up, remember: you're being held up by a great cloud—generations of faithful people who didn't give up. That's how faith works across time. That's how we're held together in faith.

And here's the thing: we're not just surrounded by this cloud—we're becoming part of it. Our faithfulness, our giving, our showing up and serving—that becomes part of what holds together the people who come after us. When we practice stewardship and live our faith today, we're joining that great cloud of witnesses, running our part of the race so others can run theirs.

Thanks be to God who holds us all in faith.

OUR HISTORY... FAULDS CHAPEL

As we walk into the sanctuary from the south stairs, I have often wondered about the Faulds Chapel and its story. It is a lovely and quiet place in our otherwise expansive church named after Rev. William Faulds.



FAULDS CHAPEL Just who was Rev. William Faulds? Turns out he was the pastor of the church when World War II began. Our congregation and Rev. Faulds supported the war effort. The church began presenting a New Testament to each member of the church as he or she entered the nation's armed forces. Also, in July 1942 the Session voted to grant free use of the church to families of servicemen during the war.

On July 13, 1942, Rev. William Faulds notified the Session he had decided to volunteer for service as a chaplain for the US Army. The Session approved his

request for a leave of absence for the "duration of the emergency plus 6 months." Rev. Faulds reported for duty on December 23, 1942.

Below is an article that was published in the Sterling Journal Advocate sometime during the war.





Where's Chaplain Faulds? Did you say the guardhouse? The chaplain, Capt. William Faulds, was in the guardhouse, but wasn't there for going AWOL. He was holding services in the army jail for 16 boys who had been "over the hill" or done something else to provoke the wrath of some commanding officer.

The guardhouse is just one of the Sunday stops for the busy 32-year-old chaplain from Sterling, Colorado, who is now holding services "somewhere in England." He's especially busy on Sundays when he has church services twice in the morning and once in the evening in the village church he

wrangled from a bishop on the condition that no civilians attend the service. The church is close enough to the airfield that Chaplain Faulds occasionally has to raise his voice to be heard above the engine roar.

Chaplain Faulds rightfully should have wound up "somewhere in the Pacific," because for the past 18 years he's been drifting west. When he was 14 years old, he went from Scotland, where he was born, to America. He stopped off at Cincinnati, Ohio, where he went to school and then went to the middlewest for college. Eventually he stopped at Tecumseh, Nebraska, where he had his first church. Someone from Sterling, Colorado, heard the young man, liked him and persuaded him to go to Sterling, where he was a minister of the Presbyterian Church until he decided to become an army chaplain.

"I'm a firm believer that the strength of post-war religion depends on what's done now," Chaplain Faulds will explain.

If there's a bombing missions scheduled you'll not find the brown-haired chaplain in the chaplain's office. Go to the briefing room. He'll be there. When the planes are due back, you'll find him sweating out the mission in the interrogation room. If there's a baseball game in progress, Chaplain Faulds will be taking a cut at a ball. The boys claim he's a good ball player. He's known as a good guy and a good minister, both of which accounts for a well-filled church at the Marauder base.

Interestingly, Rev. Francis White, an American Presbyterian missionary was called to serve as interim pastor for the church. He was available to serve this post because he had recently been recalled from his post in the French Cameroons of West Africa because of the conflict. He served as pastor of the church until 1945 and was able to return to sail for Africa to resume work in the mission field.

Faulds returned to fill the pulpit in Sterling until 1949 when he accepted a call to a very large church in Chicago. Rev. White was the members' first choice to return to Sterling which he did until 1958.

In 1949 a small chapel was created on the main floor of the church. Much of the carpeting, equipment and installation of pews was provided by members of the congregation as gifts. The chapel was dedicated as the Faulds Chapel.

In 1963, on the church's 85th anniversary, Rev. Faulds returned from Amherst, Massachusetts, to speak at the celebration.



The July and August 2025 Transaction Detail reports were approved.


Approved the purchase of new computers for the Office Administrator and Bookkeeper up to \$1800.




