

On this, the 20th anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, the Soci-

ety invites you to come enjoy an afternoon in Pass Christian, learning about the history of our area and the remarkable recovery of our city and coast over the past two decades.

This year's Tour features four unique Pass Christian homes, including a lovely cottage gem on historic Seal Avenue and three beautiful Scenic Drive homes spanning a century of construction.

This year's featured homes are:

127 Seal Avenue, c. 1895, home of Louana and Ted Frois. The home was featured in Southern Living magazine in 2020 as a perfect example of the "casual elegance of the Mississippi Gulf Coast."

513 East Scenic Drive, c. 1880-1910. Home of Ashley and Chris Bass. Few beachfront homes survived Hurricane Katrina west of this local treasure, which is now the only remaining example of a late nineteenth-century Swiss Chalet-style bungalow on the Coast.

765 East Scenic Drive, 1972 and 2008. Home of Carroll and Dale Mathews. The Mathews transformed this originally Georgian-style home into an informal, airy, coastal classic after Hurricane Katrina. Guests will enjoy the Society's traditional Tour Tea on the lovely porches here.

925 East Scenic Drive, c. 1978. Home of Cindy Walker and Dave Dennis. We welcome this lovely home, which offers sweeping views of the Mississippi Sound from nearly every angle to the Tour for the first time.

Hurricane Katrina Commemoration

As we all know, 2025 is the 20th anniversary of Hurricane Katrina. This was certainly an historic event for our city and for our nation. The Historical Society would like to remember and commemorate this event in a couple ways.

First, at our August luncheon we would like to hear some Katrina stories from those who stayed in town for the storm. If you or someone you know has a compelling "up close and personal" story and you do not mind sharing with our members, please reach out to us at info@passhistory.org. Of course, time is limited at our luncheon so our current thinking is to have four or five speakers talk for ten minutes each and then take questions and comments.

Second, we would like to create a repository for everyone's Katrina story so that our descendants, future generations of Pass residents, and visitors can understand the storm through a collection of individual written stories. We think of Katrina as having three phases:

Landfall with residents bravely coping with one of the most destructive storms ever to hit the continental United States.

Recovery, when the immediate days and months after landfall saw citizens sorting through debris fields for treasured items, cleaning up flooded homes and businesses, finding a place to live either in town or out of town, eating in mobile kitchens set up by generous volunteer organizations, dealing with the trauma and shock of vast destruction, submitting insurance claims, and so much more.

Rebuilding, as we come back house by house, business by business, even now 20 years later.

This is history that we lived through and made, and in fact continue to make. We should not let our stories go untold and unrecorded. Some may have already committed their Katrina story to paper. For those who have not, time is passing, and we are not getting any younger and our memories of that time are not getting any sharper. Please, take the time to tell your story. Write it down and share it with our Society so that it is preserved.

Writing is hard work, we understand. If putting it down on paper is too daunting, we can make a recording of you. Either way, please let us hear your stories and preserve them for future generations.
