



First-year application UI updates




Upon login, students are presented with a personalized view of their My Common Application and My Colleges progress.


Students can take action to work on their applications from the Dashboard, or by selecting a section in the 'Apply' menu header.





In the 'Financial aid' section of the 'Explore' main menu section, students will find opportunities to learn about financial aid and apply for scholarships.

Account rollover

The 2024-25 Common App will close to students, counselors, and recommenders:

- First-year app: July 28, 5 pm ET
- Transfer app: July 29, 5 pm ET

The Common App launches on August 1 each year, but students don't have to wait until then.





The Community disruption question (with reference to COVID-19) is becoming a "Challenges and circumstances" question

The word count will remain 250 words max

In the 5 most recent application cycles:

- The # of students responding to this question has dropped from 300K (2020–21 app cycle) to 100K (2024–25 app cycle)
- The average # of words / student responding to this question has remained below 200

2025–26 revised question (max 250 words)

Student context inventory pilot

In partnership with the Harvard Graduate School of Education's initiative, Making Caring Common, the Student Context Inventory gives students the option to tell colleges more about their circumstances and responsibilities in a checklist-style within college-specific sections of the application.

- 2022–23: 12 participating colleges, 196,000 applicants reached
- 2023–24: 23 participating colleges, 277,000 applicants reached
- 2024–25: 40 participating colleges, 461,000 applicants reached

After a 3-cycle pilot, the question will be added to the common portion of the application for the 2025–26 cycle.





Citizenship question

Students will see updated choice options and hint text for the citizenship status question

- U.S. permanent resident will include the clarifying term 'green card holder'
- Introducing new U.S. resident choice option
 - Collapses two previous choice options
 - Encompasses a variety of statuses including but not limited to:
 - U.S. refugee or asylee
 - DACA, Deferred Enforced Departure (DED), or Temporary Protected Status (TPS)
 - Undocumented students
 - Students eligible for noncitizen U.S. federal aid
 - Student whose status is pending




ACT self-reporting changes


As of April 2025, the ACT Science section has become optional for the online administration of the test.

Beginning in August, students in Common App will have the option to self-report scores for:

- ACT with science and writing
- ACT with science
- ACT with writing
- ACT without science or writing

The order of the subsections will also be updated to reflect the order as they appear on score reports.





Self-reported transcripts

Some colleges ask students to self-report the grades they've earned in the courses they've taken.

This can be in Common App (Courses & Grades) or through STARS (the Self-reported Transcript and Academic Record System, formerly known as SRAR or SSAR).

In 2024-25:

- 66 colleges used Courses & Grades (Courses & Grades FAQ)
- 36 colleges used STARS (STARS FAQ)

2025-26 updates

- FAQs with list of participating colleges will get updated
- Common App member colleges using STARS will be encouraged to include language on:
 - College information page in the app
 - Post-submission messaging



Recommender invitations

Students invite and assign recommenders in My Colleges.

When students attend a school using one of Common App's integration partners to submit school forms, their Common App will prevent them from inviting their counselor and teacher recommenders. Students do this in the platform their school uses.

Students are still able to invite 'other recommenders' and 'advisors' from their Common App account.

Direct admissions

Common App Direct Admissions provides proactive admission offers from partnering member institutions to **first-generation and low- and middle-income students**, so they feel worthy and welcomed on a college campus.

To receive a Direct Admissions offer, students answer questions related to eligibility criteria.

- Create a Common App account
- Indicate their U.S. permanent residence
- Enter their GPA and GPA scale
- Respond to the Common App fee waiver question
- Provide highest education level of parent(s)



In partnership with Scholarship America and the National Scholarship Providers Association, our scholarships program connects students with scholarship opportunities they're eligible for based on their Common App data, helping scholarship partners better reach and serve underrepresented students.



Who can match?


Students who have a permanent address in the United States can match. Students in Colorado can opt in on account creation.

How do students match?

- After creating a first-year account, students should complete the profile, education, and activities sections of their Common App
- 2. Students will be notified of matches in the Scholarships section
- Students can apply for programs on the scholarship providers' sites

What types of programs will students see?

Students may match with opportunities offered by private scholarship providers or state grant programs. Some programs are national, while many are local.




