DID YOU KNOW? **Solemnities** are the highest-ranking liturgical celebrations and are identified by an "S" on the calendar. Easter, Christmas, All Saints Day, the Ascension, and Corpus Christi are examples of solemnities. At Mass, the Gloria and the Creed are always said on such days. Solemnities are like Sundays, though most of them are not holy days of obligation. **Feasts** are the next rank down and are identified by an "F" on the calendar. These recognize certain saints and angels, for example, the Feast of the Archangels. Recitation of the Gloria at Mass is required on these days, but not the recitation of the Creed. **Memorials** are the lowest rank of recognition and are simply the celebrations of most of the saints. The Gloria is not said on these days. Obligatory memorials, identified by an "M" on the calendar, must be observed. Optional memorials, identified by a lowercase "m," may be observed but such observation is not required.

Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord – “A Shining Upon”

Whether we celebrate today as the Solemnity of the Epiphany or as the Second Sunday after Christmas, the message is the same and unmistakable: Christ is Light—and that Light is meant to shine upon all peoples. In the United States, Epiphany is transferred to the Sunday after January 1 and is often affectionately called “Little Christmas.” In the Eastern Christian Churches and in many countries throughout the world, Epiphany is always celebrated on January 6. The calendar may differ, but the mystery does not: God reveals Himself, and the world is changed. My brothers and sisters in Christ, may we continue to be enlightened by the Light of Christ and shine that light upon others.

Light That Changes Everything - Several years ago, while visiting a museum in Germany, I encountered an exhibit that has stayed with me ever since. It featured phosphorescent stones. Under the regular lighting of the museum, they looked ordinary—nothing remarkable. But when the lights were shut off and the room was darkened, those same stones glowed brilliantly, radiating unexpected color and beauty. Yet there was something else I noticed: after a time, the glow began to fade.


Only when the stones were placed back into the light were they able to shine again in the darkness.

That image captures the heart of Epiphany. Like those stones, we may appear quite ordinary. But when the Light of Christ shines upon us, something changes within. We are energized—not with our own brilliance, but with His Light—and we become capable of illuminating the darkness around us.

What Epiphany Really Means - The word epiphany comes from the Greek “epiphania,” meaning “a shining upon.” It is often translated as manifestation or revelation, but “a shining upon” captures the poetry and power of the feast. Throughout the Gospels, we encounter four great “shining moments” of Christ:

1. His birth, revealed first to the shepherds
2. His manifestation to the Magi, wise foreigners guided by a star
3. His baptism in the Jordan, when the Father’s voice is heard
4. The wedding at Cana, where His glory is revealed through His first sign.

Each epiphany tells us the same truth: God’s Light does not remain hidden.



Light for All Nations - The Scriptures today are filled with light imagery and universal hope.

- The First Reading proclaims that the glory of the LORD shines upon the earth, drawing nations from afar.
- The Responsorial Psalm echoes the promise: “LORD, every nation on earth will adore you.”
- Saint Paul reminds us that Gentiles and Jews alike are now co-heirs in Christ—no longer strangers, but members of the same household of faith. The Epiphany is not simply about the Magi’s journey; it is about God’s intention: His salvation is for everyone.

The Magi and the Courage to Follow the Light - The Gospel presents us with the Magi—wise seekers who noticed a light in the sky and had the courage to follow it. Their journey was not easy. It required leaving home, asking questions, risking misunderstanding, and confronting a fearful king clinging to power. Herod represents darkness that resists the Light. The Magi represent hearts willing to be led by it.

When they finally encounter the Child, they offer gifts that speak volumes:

- **Gold** for a King • **Frankincense** for God • **Myrrh** for One who will suffer and die

In that moment, the true Light of the world shines upon them, and they are changed. They return home “by another way.” Encountering Christ always sends us back transformed.

Called to Be Light-Bearers - Epiphany does not end at the manger. It moves outward—to us. Like phosphorescent stones, we do not generate the light ourselves. We receive it—through prayer, Scripture, the sacraments, and our relationship with Christ. And then we are sent into the world to shine.

We shine when we:

- show compassion to those who suffer
- stand with others in their darkness
- speak hope where despair has taken root
- love when it would be easier to turn away. But here is the key: we cannot shine unless we regularly return to the Light. Without prayer, without worship, without drawing close to Christ, the glow fades.

A Question for the Feast - Epiphany always asks something of us.

How has the Light of Christ shone upon me? Where has His light healed, guided, or strengthened my life? Whom am I being called to illuminate with hope? What would it look like for me to return more often to the Light so that I may shine more brightly?

This feast reminds us: The Light has come. It shines upon us. And it longs to shine through us. May Christ, the true Light of the world, continue to enlighten your heart—and through you, may His light reach many others.

Today is the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord

The **Feast of the Epiphany** celebrates the arrival of the three Magi who came to worship the Child Jesus shortly after His birth. It is a long-standing custom for Catholics to bless their homes on the Epiphany. **Blessed chalk will be made available to parishioners for this purpose.**

After the family has gathered, the head of the household reads aloud John 1:1–18. All then recite the Our Father, after which the Collect for the Epiphany (below) is read aloud:

“O God, who on this day revealed your Only Begotten Son to the nations by the guidance of a star, grant in your mercy that we, who know you already by faith, may be brought to behold the beauty of your sublime glory.”

Using blessed chalk, the head of the household then marks the lintel of the main door of the house with the inscription 20+C+M+B+25. The letters C, M, and B are the initials of the Magi, whose names are Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. They also abbreviate the Latin phrase “Christus mansionem benedicat,” meaning, “May Christ bless the house.” The crosses represent the protection of the Precious Blood of Christ and the holiness of the Magi, who were sanctified by their adoration of the Infant Jesus. As the lintel is inscribed, the following prayer is said:

“The Three Wise Men ...

from the great American bishop and media evangelist Venerable Fulton J. Sheen.

"As St. Peter said in one of his first sermons, 'The young men see visions; the old men dream dreams.' By this he meant that the old look backward; the young look forward. With the passing of each year, time goes more quickly; but with youth, time proceeds slowly. The young live in the future and in hope and promise. Lacking experience, they are apt to think that the emotions and pleasures and thrills of youth continue all through life.

Hence when a new year rolls around, the aged are amazed that time passed so quickly. The young would like to give time more wings in order that it might speed both their pleasure and their hope. Both are apt to forget that time is a part of eternity. Just as our present moment has a memory behind it and a hope in front of it, so too time is like one circle that is locked in another circle, or better still, time and eternity are like two hearts carved by lovers on an oak tree as if to give perpetuity to their love. Each new year is actually a testing and proving ground for eternity, a kind of novitiate in which we say 'aye' or 'nay' to our eternal destiny, a season of plenty from which we shall later on reap either wheat or weeds."

Retrouvaille Marriage Healing Retreat Weekend




