



What is Ordinary Time? (Hint: It isn't "ordinary" in the usual sense.)

The season of Ordinary Time is divided into two parts. It begins on the Monday following the Sunday after January 6 and continues until the beginning of Lent. It begins again on the Monday after Pentecost Sunday and ends on the Saturday before the First Sunday of Advent. The Sunday Gospel readings in Ordinary Time reveal the teaching and healing and mission of Christ, allowing us to better understand the God Who became human for our sake. Ordinary Time is anything but "ordinary." It is a time of conversion in which we grow into who we are called to be by imitating the lived reality of Jesus.

May this be
the best year ever!

May the Lord Jesus continue to manifest His presence to you, and may you lift up His Name in praise.

One of the most important questions we can ever ask—and answer—is this: Who is Jesus for me? Not simply who is Jesus in general, but who is He for me, here and now, in my life?

That question has layers. On one level, we can answer it with knowledge. Scripture gives us a rich treasury of names and titles for Jesus: Son of Man, Son of God, the Christ, the Lamb of God, the Way, the Truth, the Life, the Light of the World, the Good Shepherd, Prince of Peace, Emmanuel—God-with-us, King of kings, Savior, Lord. Each of these titles reveals something true and beautiful about Him.

But knowledge alone is not enough. The deeper and more demanding question is this: What is my relationship with Him? When I pray, how do I address Jesus? What image of Him lives in my heart? Do I approach Him as Lord, Friend, Shepherd, Savior, Brother, Redeemer? My answer reveals not just what I believe about Jesus, but how deeply I am living with Him.

The Church's Wisdom in the Rhythm of the Liturgy

Today, on the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Church gently continues the mystery we have been contemplating since Christmas and Epiphany: the Incarnation. Last week we celebrated the Baptism of the Lord. Today, we reflect again on who Jesus truly is—the Word made flesh who has come among us.

Although we are in Year A and will soon be following the Gospel of Matthew in sequence, today is a beautiful exception. In all three liturgical cycles—A, B, and C—the Church proclaims this Gospel from John. Why? Because John invites us to gaze more deeply, more contemplatively, into the identity of Jesus.

The First Reading, Responsorial Psalm, and Gospel are woven together around a single theme, while the Second Reading—often from Saint Paul—moves forward sequentially, grounding us in the lived faith of the early Church. The liturgical color is green, the color of hope and life, reminding us that our faith is meant to grow, mature, and bear fruit.

"Here Is My Servant": Called from the Womb

The passage from Isaiah comes from the powerful Suffering Servant songs. The servant is called from the womb, formed for a mission, and sent not only to Israel but to be a light to the nations. Scholars may debate whether Isaiah originally referred to an individual or to Israel as a whole, but for us as Christians, the meaning is clear: Jesus is the true Servant, the one who reveals God's glory precisely through humility, sacrifice, and obedience.

Saint Paul echoes this theme in his opening words to the Corinthians. He identifies himself as one called—not self-appointed, not accidental, but chosen by the will of God. And he reminds the community that they, too, are called to holiness. Faith is never an afterthought.

Then comes John the Baptist. Once again, John points away from himself and toward Jesus: "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world."

Who Is Jesus? Four Titles That Shape Our Faith

The Scriptures offer many images of Jesus, but today let us pause with four that are especially powerful: Lamb of God, Christ, Son of God, and Lord.

The Lamb of God - In the Old Testament, the lamb was a symbol of sacrifice, purity, and redemption. The blood of the lamb marked the doorposts of Israel at the Exodus; it was a sign of belonging to God, a sign that salvation came not from human effort but from God's action. At Passover, a spotless lamb was offered so that the people might live.

It is no accident that Jesus dies at Passover. He is the true Paschal Lamb. His blood does not merely mark doorposts; it marks hearts. Through His sacrifice, sin is forgiven, freedom is restored, and a new covenant is sealed. When we say or sing "Lamb of God" at Mass, we are proclaiming the very heart of our salvation.

The Christ - “Christ” is not Jesus’ last name. It is a title. It comes from the Greek Christos, translating the Hebrew Messiah—the Anointed One. Priests, prophets, and kings were anointed in the Old Testament, but Jesus fulfills them all. He is the priest who offers Himself, the prophet who speaks the Word perfectly, and the king whose throne is the Cross. To call Jesus “the Christ” is to proclaim that God has kept His promise. Freedom has come—not political freedom, but freedom from sin, fear, and death.

The Son of God - At first, this title expressed closeness and favor. But as the Church reflected on Jesus’ words and deeds—especially His intimacy with the One He calls Abba—it became clear that this relationship was utterly unique. Jesus does not merely belong to God; He is one with God. The Church, guided by the Holy Spirit, came to profess that Jesus is true God and true man. Not half of one and half of the other, not a divine mask over a human life, but fully God and fully human. In Jesus, God truly enters our condition so that we might share His life.

The Lord - To call Jesus “Lord” is to say something radical. In the Scriptures, “the LORD” refers to the holy name of God revealed to Moses—“I AM.” This name was so sacred that it was never spoken aloud. Instead, God was addressed as Adonai, “the Lord.” And yet, the early Christians dared to say: Jesus is Lord.

Saint Paul preserves one of the earliest Christian hymns, proclaiming that Jesus humbled Himself, took the form of a servant, and was obedient unto death—and that God exalted Him, giving Him the Name above every name. When the Gospel of John places on Jesus’ lips the words “I AM”—the bread of life, the light of the world, the resurrection and the life—it is making a stunning claim: the God of the burning bush now stands among us in human flesh.

Who Is Jesus for Me?

All of this theology, all of these titles, ultimately lead to a deeply personal moment of truth. Who is Jesus for me?

For me, Jesus is God-with-us, the One who has entered history, fulfilled the promises of old, conquered sin and death, and invited me into the intimacy of calling God Abba. He has drawn me into the family of God, not as a spectator, but as a beloved son among brothers and sisters.

This realization fills me with gratitude, humility, and desire—desire to spend more time with Him, to listen more closely, to love more faithfully, and to live more courageously in communion with the Father and the Holy Spirit.

Called for a Purpose: Vocation and Mission

As I reflect on vocation, I cannot help but recall words that deeply shaped my own discernment. As a young man, I longed for a life of meaning, but I feared that priesthood might take that away. Instead, I discovered the opposite: God never calls us to nothingness. He calls us to something particular, specific, and necessary.

Our readings affirm this truth. Isaiah hears the Lord say, “You are my servant.” Paul knows himself to be “called by the will of God.” John the Baptist understands his entire life as preparation for pointing to Christ. None of them wandered aimlessly. None of them invented their purpose. They received it.

The world tells us to create our own meaning. That path leads to exhaustion and sadness. The Gospel tells us that meaning is given, not manufactured. Every one of us has a vocation—not only in the great states of life (marriage, priesthood, religious life), but also in the daily calls to serve, sacrifice, and evangelize.

There is something the Lord has entrusted to you that no one else can do in the same way. The world will be poorer if you do not live it.

A Personal Invitation

So today, let us ask ourselves honestly and prayerfully:

- Which title of Jesus speaks most clearly to my heart right now?
- How does my prayer reveal who I believe Jesus to be?
- Am I open to God’s call—both the great and the small—in my life?
- Do my choices proclaim that Jesus is truly my Lord?

May we not only know the names of Jesus, but belong to Him. And may our lives, like John the Baptist’s, point beyond ourselves and quietly, faithfully proclaim: **“Behold the Lamb of God.”**

On January 22, 1973, the Supreme Court legalized abortion. Since that time, millions of children have lost their lives, and millions of families have been wounded by abortion.

On June 24, 2022, the Dobbs v. Jackson decision ended the nearly fifty-year regime of abortion on demand. But many state and federal laws remain hostile to pre-born children.
