May you respond to the Lord Jesus' call and follow Him in loving service of others.

At the heart of Christian discipleship lies this question: **What motivates my actions?**

Is it the pursuit of prestige? The desire for comfort or personal advancement? Or is it the love of Christ and a longing to serve others as He served us?

We live in a culture where self-interest is often championed as success. There's nothing inherently wrong with relaxation or recreation—Scripture itself upholds the Sabbath rest—but the Christian path does not begin or end with self-indulgence. Instead, we are called to self-gift.

Too often, people are only generous when it benefits them. But Jesus flips the script. The Gospel—the GOOD News—of our Master-Teacher is a summons to be other-centered. Discipleship means seeking the good of the other, even when it costs us something precious. To follow Jesus is to be shaped by His Cross, guided by the Holy Spirit, and fueled by sacrificial love.

Our Readings Today: A Symphony of Joy and Purpose

Each of the readings this Sunday contributes to a greater vision: the joy-filled call to discipleship—and the response that flows from a life grounded in God.

• **Isaiah** (First Reading): We are given an image of divine tenderness. God, through the symbol of Jerusalem, is described as a nurturing mother—feeding, comforting, and delighting in her children. Just as an infant finds peace in its mother's arms, so too do we find security and joy in the presence of our God.

• **Psalms 66** (Responsorial): The psalmist lifts a call to the entire earth: *"Cry out to God with joy!"* Why? Because God has done great things for His people. Worship and joy go hand-in-hand for the one who recognizes God's saving deeds.

• **Galatians 6** (Second Reading): St. Paul offers a powerful declaration: *"May I never boast except in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ."* He identifies himself as crucified to the world—a man whose life is no longer governed by worldly values, but by union with Christ. Paul isn't claiming his own strength; rather, he finds meaning in his suffering because it conforms him to the Lord.

• **Luke 10** (Gospel): Jesus sends out seventy-two disciples, two by two. He tells them to take no money, no extra supplies—just the authority of His Word and the power of their witness. When they return, amazed by the miracles they saw and the authority they wielded, Jesus reminds them: Rejoice not because of the power you exercised, but because your names are written in heaven.

What Does All This Mean for Us Today?

The Gospel message is clear: the spectacular moments of ministry are not the goal. The true joy of discipleship is not in the fireworks—but in the relationship. Signs and wonders can inspire, but what sustains us is the knowledge that we belong to God, that our names are written in the heart of the Father.

Consider a modern analogy: On Independence Day, we are mesmerized by fireworks. They light up the night sky and provoke awe. But the day isn't about fireworks—it's about freedom, unity, and the ideals our nation aspires to uphold. The fireworks are just signs.

So too in the spiritual life. Miracles, conversions, and emotional highs are real and beautiful—but they are signs pointing to something greater: our union with Jesus Christ. The Cross is the foundation of our joy, not the noise of spiritual spectacle.

A Reflection with Questions for the Heart

- What drives me? Do I live for Christ, or do I follow Him when it's convenient for me?
- Do I boast in the Cross—or do I avoid discomfort? Am I willing to sacrifice my preferences, my time, my comfort, for the sake of someone else's healing or salvation?
- Am I more excited by “fireworks” or by relationship? Do I only feel God's presence when I experience something grand, or do I rejoice in the quiet daily fidelity of walking with Him?
- Do I trust in God's providence like the disciples did? Am I prepared to proclaim the Gospel even when I feel ill-equipped?
- Do I recognize God as my nurturing Parent? Like the image in Isaiah, do I allow God to feed, comfort, and strengthen me in my weariness?

The Invitation to a Deeper Joy

The more we enter into relationship with God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—the more joy we discover in the mission. And when that relationship becomes the center of our lives, then ministry is no longer about what we do or accomplish, but about who we are in Christ.

Like St. Paul, we can then say, *“I bear the marks of Jesus on my body.”*


Not because we are saviors, but because we have shared in the saving work of the Savior. We have become His hands and feet. His voice and heart.

The Lord still sends disciples two by two. He still entrusts the proclamation of the Gospel to ordinary men and women. He still promises to provide, to nourish, and to rejoice over us like a mother holding her child. Let us respond with boldness, humility, and joy.

“Do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice because your names are written in heaven.” — Luke 10:20

Let us go out with joy. Let us follow the Master-Teacher. Let us serve others in His name. And may we boast not in our achievements, but in the Cross of Christ, through which we have life, freedom, and love.

And if fireworks come along the way—praise God. But may our hearts always burn with a deeper fire: the joy of belonging to Jesus.



Summer Feasts and Summer Not

How do solemnities, feasts, and memorials differ from one another?

A **solemnity** is a celebration of greatest importance. Each solemnity begins the previous evening with vespers (evening prayer). Some solemnities, such as the Assumption of Our Lady, have their own Vigil Mass.

A **feast** is of secondary importance. It is celebrated on a particular day, and does not normally have vespers or a Vigil Mass, e.g. the feast of the Holy Family on December 29.

A **memorial** commemorates a saint. There are two kinds of memorials: obligatory and optional. Only on an obligatory memorial, such as the July 11 memorial of St. Benedict, is a priest required to honor the saint of the day at Mass.


