### "Go and Do Likewise": Knowing God Through Love and Relationship

When you take a moment to reflect on your life, what are the moments that have truly shaped you into the person you are today?

For many of us, the most formative experiences come from loving relationships. These moments often include:

- The tender care of a parent or grandparent;
- The commitment of marriage, and all the joys and trials surrounding it;
- The birth of a child, when love becomes incarnate again in your arms;
- A special holiday or family celebration that made you feel deeply connected;

These experiences all echo one truth: we are formed through relationship, and relationship is rooted in love.

And for others—perhaps even for you—there have been "God moments" that left a deep spiritual imprint:

- A moment of peace or healing in prayer;
- A powerful experience in the Sacraments;
- A time when the presence of God became undeniable, even in suffering.

All these moments, whether personal or spiritual, point toward the central mystery of our faith: God is Love, and Love is revealed in Relationship.

### The Simplicity Hidden in the Mystery

This Sunday's readings confront us with a paradox: God is awesome and mysterious, beyond our comprehension. Yet God desires to be known, to be in relationship with us. And God makes this possible through:

- Revelation in the Law (Deuteronomy);
- Compassionate presence (as in the Psalms);
- The Incarnation (Jesus, the image of the invisible God-Colossians);
- And in today's Gospel parable of the Good Samaritan.

Moses reminds us that God's command is not far off: "It is something very near to you... in your mouth and in your heart."

### What Is God Really Asking of Us?

*Not* to master complicated theology. *Not* to follow a checklist of 613 commandments perfectly. But to live in right relationship:

- With God;
- With our neighbor;
- And even with ourselves.

This is the "knowledge" of God in Scripture—not just head knowledge, but relational knowledge. In Scripture, to "know" is to be in union. Mary says, *"How can this be? For I do not know man."* The relationship God seeks is personal, intimate, covenantal.

### The Parable of the Good Samaritan – More Than a Morality Tale

Jesus responds to the scholar's question, "Who is my neighbor?" not with a definition, but with a story—a divine drama rich in layers:

• The man beaten and left for dead is not just a stranger — he represents all humanity, wounded by sin.

• The priest and Levite represent ritual law and the Old Covenant—good, but incapable of salvation on their own.

• The Samaritan—the outsider, considered a heretic—is a symbol of Christ Himself: despised and misunderstood, yet filled with compassion, willing to cross boundaries and bear burdens.

• The inn is the Church, where healing takes place.

• The two coins symbolize the Old and New Testaments (St. Ambrose), the two great commandments of love (St. Augustine), or even the image of the Father and the Son entrusted to the Spirit (St. Irenaeus).

The parable doesn't just show what mercy looks like— It reveals God's plan for salvation and calls us to imitate Christ in showing divine mercy.

### Relationship and Salvation: Two Sides of the Same Coin

The scholar begins with the right question: *"What must I do to inherit eternal life?"* The answer? Love God with your whole being and love your neighbor as yourself. Eternal life isn't earned by religious status or rule-keeping— it's received in loving union with God and others. So Jesus says to us: *"Go and do likewise."* 

### Simple... Yet Transformative

We don't need to solve the mystery of God. We need to live it:

- By turning to the Lord in prayer and trust;
- By entering more deeply into relationships of mercy;
- By allowing Christ to heal our wounds, and then becoming healers of others;

### **Reflection Questions for the Week Ahead**

- · When have I experienced the "knowledge" of God through love?
- Who in my life is in need of compassion right now?
- Have I passed by anyone, like the priest and the Levite, rationalizing my inaction?

• Am I willing to become "the Samaritan"—the Christ-like one, crossing boundaries to bring healing?

### Let Us Remember:

God is Love.

Love is Relationship.

And eternal life begins not in heaven someday, but here and now, in loving like the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.
