In observance of the **Christmas** holiday, the rectory will close at 12:00pm on Tuesday, December 23.



The Astonishing Humility of God: An Advent Reflection on the Incarnation

As Advent draws us ever closer to the celebration of Christmas, the Church gently but firmly invites us to slow down, to step back from the rush, and to contemplate a mystery so profound that it can never be exhausted: the Son of God has become one of us. Not in appearance only. Not as a symbol. But truly—fully—God has taken on our human nature.

This is the heart of Advent. This is the wonder of Christmas. This is the mystery of the Incarnation.

It is easy—almost inevitable—to become absorbed by the externals of Christmas. And these externals are not bad. In fact, they are good and beautiful. The lights shining against the darkness, the familiar carols echoing memories of childhood, the decorations, the meals, the exchanges of gifts—all of these help awaken joy, warmth, and a sense of communion. They are signs that something holy is near. Yet Advent asks us not to stop at the signs. It asks us to ask why there is joy at all.

What we celebrate is not simply a birthday. We celebrate God's love made visible. We celebrate the Almighty and Eternal God choosing to enter human history—not as a ruler, not as a warrior, not as a philosopher—but as a helpless infant, born in poverty, wrapped in swaddling clothes, laid in a feeding trough. The Creator of the universe chose dependence. The Lord of time chose to be subject to time. The Holy One chose vulnerability.

This is not a sentimental detail of the Christmas story—it is the very method of God's salvation. From the very beginning, this mystery was announced in prophecy. Isaiah speaks of a child born of a woman who would be called Emmanuel—“God-with-us.” This was not poetic exaggeration. It was a radical promise. God would no longer remain distant. He would draw near—not merely in power, but in presence.

St. Paul echoes this fulfillment as he opens his Letter to the Romans: Jesus is descended from David according to the flesh—truly human—yet declared Son of God in power—truly divine. In the Gospel, Joseph is confronted with the impossible truth that the child conceived in Mary is from the Holy Spirit. What human logic cannot explain, faith must receive. The child is Emmanuel. God has come to dwell with His people.

To the ancient world, this was scandalous. To Greek philosophers, it was foolishness. To political powers, it was insignificant. To many today, it is easily overlooked or domesticated. But the Church insists: this is the center of everything.

God has entered our condition. He did not remain distant from human suffering—He entered it.

He did not speak salvation from afar—He lived it among us. He did not merely command love—He embodied it.

There are many beautiful ways to reflect on this mystery in these final days of Advent. The winter solstice reminds us that just when darkness is greatest, light begins to return. The ancient Roman feast of Sol Invictus, the “Unconquered Sun,” was transformed by Christians who recognized that Christ is the true Light whom darkness cannot overcome (cf. John 1:5). The Church's ancient “O Antiphons,” sung in the days leading up to Christmas, cry out to Christ under the titles foretold in Scripture—Wisdom, Root of Jesse, Key of David, Rising Sun, Emmanuel—each proclaiming that salvation is near, personal, and real.

Yet sometimes, a story can illuminate the mystery in a way theology alone cannot.

On a bitterly cold Christmas Eve, a family prepared to attend Midnight Mass. The father, a good and honest man, appreciated Christmas as a family tradition, but struggled with its deeper meaning. He could not understand why God would need to become a baby, born in a stable, so long ago. As the family left for church, he stayed behind, keeping the fire lit. Later that night, he noticed a small bird outside his window—alone, shivering, having missed its migration south. Moved by compassion, he tried to help. He attempted to guide it to the barn. He laid out food. He waved his arms gently. Nothing worked. The bird was afraid. It could not understand his intentions.

*Then the thought struck him: If only I could become a bird—speak its language—walk beside it—then it might trust me and follow me to safety. At that very moment, the church bells rang out across the snowy fields, announcing the birth of Christ. And suddenly, the man understood. **God became human for the same reason: out of love.***

God does not shout salvation at us from heaven. He does not force us into safety. He comes alongside us. He speaks our language. He walks our roads. He shares our fears, our joys, our sufferings, our tears. In Jesus Christ, God enters the cold and darkness of our world—not to condemn us, but to lead us into the warmth and light of divine life.

St. Paul tells us that Christ “emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave... humbling Himself, becoming obedient unto death” (Philippians 2:7–8). This humility begins not on the Cross, but in the manger. Christmas already points toward Calvary. The wood of the crib already foreshadows the wood of the Cross. Love always makes itself small so that it can be received. This is the message of the Incarnation: God comes close. God shares our life. God leads us home.

A Personal Prayerful Reflection

- What does it mean for my life that God chose humility instead of power?
- Where am I being invited to trust Emmanuel—God-with-me—more deeply?
- How can I reflect Christ's humility, compassion, and nearness to others during this holy season, especially to those who feel cold, lost, or alone?

As Christmas approaches, may we not simply celebrate that Christ was born long ago—but rejoice that He still comes, still dwells among us, and still leads us from darkness into His marvelous light.

O Come, O Come, Emmanuel.





"Lord Jesus Christ, Thou didst call Thyself the vine and Thy holy Apostles the branches; and out of all those who love Thee, Thou didst desire to make a good vineyard. Bless this wine and pour into it the might of Thy benediction so that every one who drinks or takes of it, may through the intercession of Thy beloved disciple, the holy Apostle and Evangelist John, be freed from every disease or attack of illness and obtain health of body and soul. Who livest and reignest forever."

A toast to the love of St. John is then made by all the family. Members of the family "clink" their wine glasses together while saying, "I drink you the love of St. John."






