

York County, with the cities of Biddeford and Sanford, is the southernmost county and the second most populous, with approximately 38,400 children.

### Areas of Strength

York County had a strong economy, based on pre-pandemic economic indicators. York had the second highest household median income; the second lowest poverty rate; and the second lowest rate of uninsured children. York had the third highest rate of 4th graders reading proficiently and was one of two counties with high school graduation rates above 90%. Children thrive when their families’ basic needs are met.

### Areas of Challenge

York County was below statewide averages in the rate of high-quality child care sites and in the rate of 4-year-olds attending public preschool. Attention to the educational, social and emotional needs of children under age 5 is important to build a foundation for success. Comparing the 2020 annual unemployment rate to the previous year, York’s unemployment rate nearly more than doubled and was the largest increase in the state.

For other data, the most recent data is 2019 and this can serve as a baseline for assessing well-being before the onset of the Covid-19 crisis.
