
Kindergarten Bonding Tour

BUILDING CHARACTER AND INTEGRITY AMONG STUDENTS

Today's children and teenagers are inundated with messages on various platforms and a close look at the messaging has both parents and teachers worried about the effects on the young generation. What is considered child- or teen-friendly content is a far cry from what we would routinely want children exposed to. Of greatest concern are messages that present both children and teenagers skewed information about their identity, with emphasis on who they ought to be rather than celebrate who they are. In a world that boasts of being more self-aware than previous generations, it is unfortunate that we have increased cases of children and teenagers weighed down with issues of low self-esteem, poor self-perception and body image, and a loss of confidence in who they are as individuals.

It is in response to this sad reality that Crawford International School introduced the "I am enough" program for the Year 6 – Year 13 students. This is a character development and integrity program whose aim is to help students develop skills and aptitudes necessary to navigate adolescence in the twenty first century. The program has been created to meet the unique needs of girls and boys, with each age-group exploring topics that are relevant to them. The younger students, ages 11 to 14, have teachers within the school who serve as mentors and meet with them twice each month. On the other hand, the older students, aged 15 to 18, have sessions that are facilitated by external youth counselors, with whom they meet twice in a semester.

Openness among students is encouraged, with mentors using different approaches to share information. These approaches include power point presentations, videos, discussions and experience-sharing. Students are encouraged to ask questions or make comments about the various topics without fear of being judged. The program has, over time, created a safe space for most students, with a number seeking professional counseling services either at school or externally, to deal with issues affecting them. It is hoped that students will grow in their sense of personal value, worth and purpose as they go through the "I am enough" program.

Character development is a life long process that requires collaboration between the school and parents. Both parties have the moral responsibility to nurture children and teenagers into adults that will contribute meaningfully to society by exercising values such as respect, citizenship, and

responsibility for self and others. A healthy collaboration also means there is an agreement on messaging for students, both at home and in school. When children and teenagers are able to discern unity of voice and purpose between the home and school, they will be motivated to not only put into practice lessons drawn from the "I am enough" program, but also critically analyze messages they access on different platforms. As a result, we will have a generation of children, teenagers and young adults who are not afraid to question what they consider unhealthy rhetoric. The active engagement of students in defining who they are and giving them opportunity to participate in their own character development will go a long way in changing the current tide which, if left unchecked, promises to derail a generation that is uniquely talented and equipped for the twenty first century.

This week, our A-Level Biology students have been studying Biodiversity and ways to conserve the environment which is facing a great threat due to climate change.

In class, the learners looked at how climate and human activities have threatened the organisms in their habitats. To enhance their study, the students carried out a study on the land next to our school and analyzed the biodiversity and the effect of climate change and human activities that have affected species richness.

They carried out random sampling using Frame quadrats as well as systematic sampling (Line and Belt transect), a skill they learn in class.

WORLD SCHOLARS CUP PREAMBLE

World Scholars Cup (WSC), while academic at its core is an inclusive, encouraging, inter-disciplinary, teamoriented, and whimsical activity whose goal is to motivate students of all backgrounds to discover new strengths, develop and sharpen existing skills, practice new skills, and to inspire a global community of future scholars and leaders.

It has a vibrant atmosphere of fun and friendly competition packed into a span of 2-5 days, from the Regional Round in Nairobi to a highly diverse Global Round and finally a snagging coveted spot in the Tournament of Champions (ToC) at Yale University. While at the ToC, students get an opportunity to tour the prestigious academic institutions in the world i.e. Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

In World Scholars, students bond through team events; collaborative writing, thought-provoking debates, scholars' challenges, an exam where it is impossible to score 0%, and the scholars' bowl tested by multiple choice questions. The topics are selected from a range of subject areas namely History, Special areas, Art and Music, Science, Literature, and Social Studies. Scholars also engage in community events, debate showcase, scholars bowl, scholars' cultural show, and scholars' scavenge.

The event is organized in a way that everyone learns something without feeling pressurized. Every year, World Scholars Cup sets a global theme that guides the study and research of scholars throughout the three rounds of the competition. This year, the scholars are guided by the theme 'A World Re-Renewed. It gives an opportunity for students to challenge their knowledge through 6 diverse fields: Special Area – Mistakes & Recoveries, Science & Technology – To Edit a Planet. History – The History of Succession. Social Studies-Out with the old. Art & Music- Second Chances, Second Glances. Literature & Media- Sequels, Reboots and Reconsiderations.

Crawford International School students participated in the World Scholars Competition this year. They started with the Nairobi Round where all 53 students qualified for the Global Round in Dubai, and now for the Tournament of Champions in the U.S.A. Yale University.







YOU'RE SAFE

A walk around the school campus reveals posters with the words, "You're Safe." This is the theme for our annual campaign to create awareness on mental health, a topic that is often considered taboo, a no-go zone. The theme is meant to inspire and spread hope among members of the school community.

On Friday September 16, students and staff members wore yellow ribbons as an emblem to create awareness on mental health issues that are almost always invisible. Students and staff were engaged in conversations that aimed at sharing experiences, inspiring hope and offering support for those among us who are struggling with mental health challenges.

In addition, a parents' session was held on Saturday September 17, and the topic of discussion was "Children and Depression." The purpose of the session was to build capacity among parents by sharing information as well as provide them with resources that would help them play a more active role in the mental health of their children. There were presentations by Mr. Moffat Kago, an accredited mental health professional with specialty in marital and family therapy, and Ms. Muthoni Wangai, a counseling psychologist.

When we have honest conversations about mental health, in a safe space, we give ourselves the permission to be vulnerable with ourselves and our children. As a result, our children are drawn more to us, as they see a genuineness about our own fears, anxieties, 'not-knowing yet willing-to-know' and our weaknesses. Our vulnerability creates in them a sense of hope and belief that we will hear them and provide them with the much-needed safe space to be who they truly are.

As a school, we are committed to continue having these conversations among students, staff and parents, however difficult they may be. The theme "You're Safe" continues to be the impetus upon which we will build a sense of belonging for those among us struggling with their mental health.

Any student applying to any university must have a Personal Statement that details who they are, what they have achieved and what they want to do and why. Writing is a daunting task! Uni Abroad Reps were in CIS to give the students a head-start on what it takes to write a good Personal Statement. Each student has been allocated a teacher from the English Department who they are to work with in ensuring that the Personal Statement meets the requirements. Students have a rubric and notes on the same. We implore the students to expediate this as we begin the university application process. The process has a strict time line.

On Wednesday 14th September, all Career Teachers in CIS had a virtual training on how to use BridgeU. BridgeU is a university application guidance platform. As a guidance platform, BridgeU is first and foremost an interactive database designed to support our students throughout the entire university application process, from initial to research right up until confirmation and enrolment. By compiling university data from across the world, BridgeU streamlines university research for both students and counsellors:

- Students just starting out can explore university options worldwide to compare courses, cost, and career pathways for different countries and subjects.
- Students ready to narrow their options can build their profile to unlock personalised, data-driven university matches.
- Students who know where they'd like to apply can search for specific degrees and institutions and keep track of deadlines and requirements with ease.

On Friday 16th September, the Year 13 students attended a Uni-Fair at the Oshwal center where about 40 UK universities showcased their courses. It was a good experience for students as we start the university application process. We want our students to make informed choices and be prepared for the journey into the tertiary environment.
